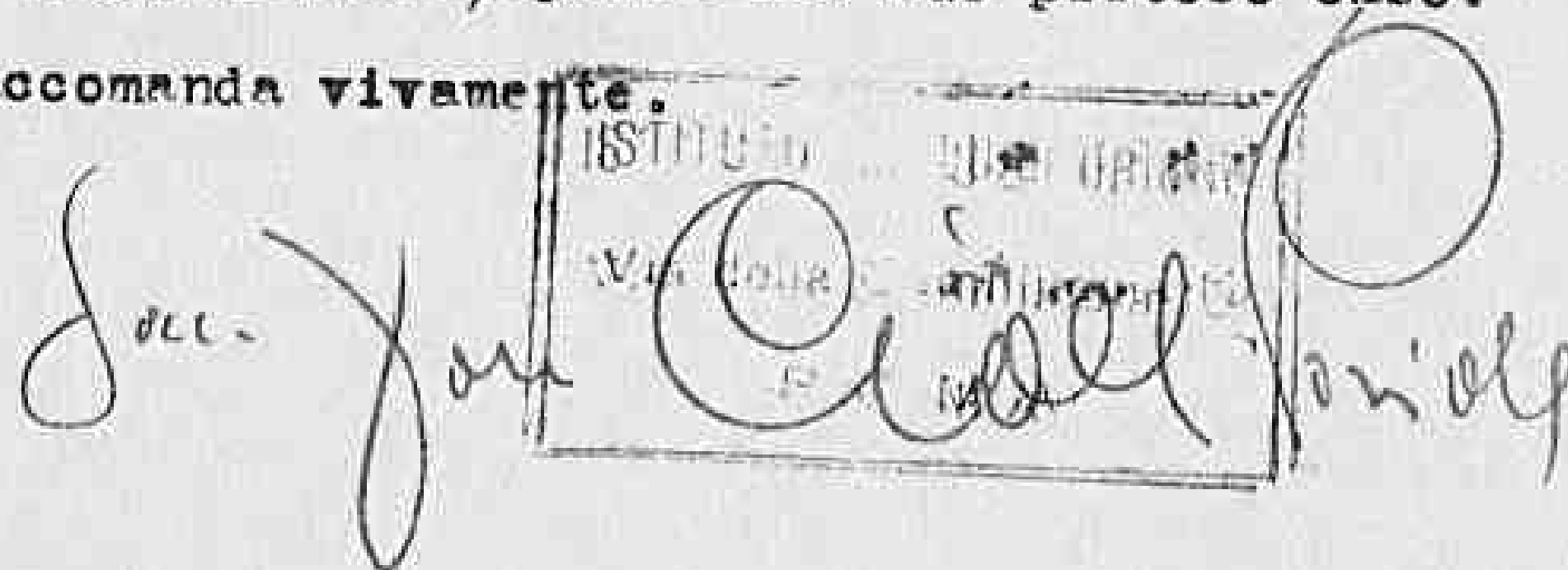

To His Excellency Admiral

STONE

ROME

Your Excellency,

Having come to know and admiring the multitude of aid which your Excellency has generously contributed for the "OPERA DON ORIONE" which on the occasion of your honourable visit to the Institute of the Camilluccie in November 1946 had the son of the undersigned to read in latin all their gratefulness, encloses the photograph beggin to accept it. The undersigned Alberto Giuliana exposes with this letter his pitiful case, trustful that Your Excellency assists in his favour for what he asks.

An Italian citezen, born in Cairo Egypt on December 13th 1907 where he studied and resided up to 1940 with his parents, a distinguished family still living in Cairo in Madabeg Street 15-A, a clerk by profession of Catholic Religion, he returned to his country definitively from Egypt in May 1940 together with his two children, owing to the dishonour caused him by his wife from whom he is legally separated.

After having spent all the period of the war in Rome as clerk at the Post, fighting with enormous sacrifices to educate in a Christian way his two children without any relative in Italy and proceeding to keep himself always neutral both in politics and the war, thanks to his absolute military discharge, finds himself at the moment for the time being sheltered together with his children at the Institute Don Oriore at Street delle Camilluccie n.10, being a refugee without a home or work.

He begs his Excellency that they grant him.

An employment, owing to his sad economical conditions, the difficulty to find any owing to the actual moment and the preference granted only to war returned.

He would have need of a Touristic visa for Egypt of two months only to reembrance his family in Egypt since it is 7 Years he has not seen them.

And if it was possible, he would wish also to receive throught

U.N.R.R.A. of Italy and Egypt or in the way which is thought best, some help from his family in packages of clothes, sweets for the children, seeing that postal communications of this kind are still closed with Egypt.

Whilst waiting to be able to receive help from his people, since the war Post has answered him he must wait long for the new arrivals, and finding himself absolutely deprived he would accept any whatsoever clothes.

As regards the employment, owing to his honesty, knowledge of languages English, French, Italian, Arabic and Book keeping, he could honourably fulfill the post of accountant, storekeeper's help a controller at the Custom Office "American department of any Port in Italy for the disembarkment and embarkation of merchandise.

As regards the tourist visa, through the Hon. American Embassy Cairo and the Egyptian Ministry of Interior one could obtain it.

He made in 1945 through the English Embassy Rome his regular practice n. 585, (especially on the occasion when he wanted to assist at his late father's funeral in May 1946) to which he received no answer. Therefore through the American Embassy in Cairo with the assistance of Your Excellency one could surely obtain it.

His practice at the Egyptian Ministry of Interior bears the Number 10/56.

He wishes to show also that the undersigned possesses a favourable penal certificate, very good certificates of good moral and civil conduct. He is favourably known at the Italian Ministry of Foreign affairs, at the particular cabinet of U.E. De Gasperi, by the Segretaria of the Vatican and by the Opera Don Orione.

Excusing himself for the trouble, profoundly grateful, he thanks for what his Excellency may vouchsafe to his pitiful case.
