Yesterday on December 29 1946, at about 12.30 hrs., our motor car, reg. plate AGI.JB 5, driven by our driver Filiplic Anton, returning through Via Flaminia to Via Monti Parioli, was followed by a USA Military Police jeep (20118790) with three U.S. military personnel aboard, who entered after our car into the court-yard of the seat of our Delegation (Via Monti Parioli 24) without asking permission to do so. An official of our Delegation demanded the M.P. to get out from our territory, after which the jeep left the yard, but one soldier remained behind. He was of rather small growth. Asked what he wanted, he refused to reply, upon what our official demanded him to get out. He started to insult our people saying that we were those who are killing the Americans in Trieste. Threatening vengeance he withdrew. Half an hour later the same jeep and the same people stopped before our house and behaved in the same way.

This was not the first time that our drivers were disturbed by the same USA MP personnel, who used to be on duty along Via Flaminia, and this was the second time that a MP jeep forcibly and without asking for permission entered into our court yard.

I therefore protest herewith against such behaviour of the USA Military Police and request that the USA Military Policemen be warned that they have not the right to enter on our territory without asking for permission, and that the s/m persons of the Military Police who are often disturbing our drivers be changed from the duty in Via Flaminia and punished for their behaviour.

In case that our drivers might trespass the road traffic regulations, we should be informed through regular channels about it and we shall take measures to punish them.

SUBJECT: Perquisition of Yugoslav S/S "Karmen" and S/S "NETI"

TO : The Supreme Allied Commander, Mediterranean Theatre.

FROM: The Chief Commissioner, Allied Commission.

I have the honour to state on behalf of the Yugoslav Government as follows:

1. In July 1946, the Yugoslav S/S "Karmen" was anchored in the Italian port Margherita di Savoia where she was loading salt. On July 4, at 22.00 hrs. an Italian man-of-war approached S/S "Karmen" and an Officers Patrol came on board and performed a perquisition of documents and rooms of the ship. The perquisition was ended at 23.15 hrs. with a negative result. On July 9, 1946, an Italian Corvette stopped near the same Yugoslav ship and performed another perquisition from 21.30 to 22.00 hrs. The result was negative again.

2. On August 21, 1946, the Yugoslav S/S "Neti" left the port of Margherita di Savoia and sailed following the common route in the direction of the Yugoslav coast. At 21.50 hrs., when S/S "Neti" was about 7 miles West off the island Palagruza, an Italian Corvette "C 45" (Chimera) approached and stopped her. Four officers under command of a captain, two sailors, all armed with pistols, and one sailor armed with a rifle came on board S/S "Neti". Two of the sailors were filled bags. A perquisition was imposed for the doubt that the ship was carrying illegal goods, as wheat, exported from Italy. The perquisition was ended at 2.00 hrs. with negative result.

3. Considering that the forementioned cases of perquisition of Yugoslav vessels by the Italian man-of-war have been preceded by some other case (see our protest Br.1147/46 dated August 4, 1946), I protest herewith again on behalf of the Yugoslav Government against such proceeding of the Italian Maritime Authorities, who have not the right to do so for the following reasons:

(a) Italy, being an ex-enemy state has not yet regularized the relations with the Federal People's Republic of Yugoslavia by the Peace Treaty, and the right to stop and perquisition the United Nations vessels is contested to her.

(b) The action of the Italian man-of-war in case of the perquisition of the Yugoslav S/S "Neti" was in contradiction with the general international maritime rule of hot pursuit (droit de poursuite), as well as in contradiction to the Italian R.M. Decree from the year 1896, stating that the Italian authorities can perform perquisitions of suspected foreign vessels up to the distance of 10 kilometres off the coast. Moreover it is pointed out that the Yugoslav S/S "Neti" had left the port of Margherita di Savoia with knowledge and permission of the Italian Maritime authorities in the port, who would not have given that permission if anything had not been in order with the ship.

In the meantime the Ministry for Foreign Affairs considers expedient to bring to the knowledge of the Allied Commission that, according to information supplied by the crews of recently captured fishing motor-boats, the Yugoslav Authorities maintain that Italian and Yugoslav waters of the Adriatic are separated by the middle line. In view of the circumstances indicated in paragraph 1 above and the facts outlined in Ministry of Marine letter 3815/UT, of 7 December 1946 it is requested that the approval of the Supreme Allied Commander, may be given for the destruction of the subject vessel to expedite clearance of Leghorn Harbor for reasons of operational necessity, observing that the United States Army remains in military occupation of the Port.

Yesterday on December 29 1946, at about 12.30 hrs., our motor car, reg. plate AGI.JD 5, driven by our driver Filipic Anton, returning through Via Flaminia to Via Monti Parioli, was followed by a USA Military Police jeep (26118790) with three U.S. military personnel aboard, who entered after our car into the court-yard of the seat of our Delegation (Via Monti Parioli 24) without asking permission to do so. An official of our Delegation demanded the M.P. to get out from our territory, , after which the jeep left the yard, but one soldier remained behind. He was of rather small growth. Asked what he wanted, he refused to reply, upon what our official demanded him to get out. He started to insult our people saying that we were those who are killing the Americans in Trieste. Threatening vengeance he withdrew. Half an hour later the same jeep and the same people stopped before our house and behaved in the same way.

This was not the first time that our drivers were disturbed by the same USA MP personnel, who used to be on duty along Via Flaminia, and this was the second time that a MP jeep forcibly and without asking for permission entered into our court yard.

I therefore protest herewith against such behaviour of the USA Military Police and request that the USA Military Policemen be warned that they have not the right to enter on our territory without asking for permission, and that the a/a persons of the Military Police who are often disturbing our drivers be changed from the duty in Via Flaminia and punished for their behaviour.

In case that our drivers might trespass the road traffic regulations, we should be informed through regular channels about it and we shall take measures to punish them.

1. I have the honour to refer to the letter from M. Georges Belay of the 5th August and this Headquarters reply of 25th October in which the hope was expressed that it would be possible to supply you with the information you desired at a later date. I now forward the promised report.

2. With regard to List A you will note that, before Yugoslavia brought the matter before the Advisory Council, she had been informed that so far as the first eleven items were concerned, she had no case. Items 13 to 17 have either been handed back to or are awaiting take over by Yugoslavia. Items 18 to 23 cannot be traced. Of the 100 small vessels in items 24 and 25 - 77 cannot be traced, many of these small motor launches may have been repainted and renamed. Further action is not possible without fuller and better evidence of identity and present location. Of the remaining 23 vessels, 12 were last heard of in Yugoslav ports, 6 are stated to be in Allied and not Italian hands but have not been identified by the Allies, 2 are stated to have been destroyed and 3 have been traced.

3. With regard to List B, you will note that of the 18 items only four had been presented to the Italian Government prior to Sir Noel Charles' letter of the 15th May. The Yugoslav Government has received reports from the Allied Commission about the first four items. The Supreme Allied Commander does not consider that the remaining 14 items should have been presented to him as matters on which the Yugoslav Government had been unable to obtain redress until all proper efforts to obtain satisfaction had been made and had failed. The Allied Commission is in contact with the Italian Government on these items and will keep the Yugoslav Delegate informed. The Supreme Allied Commander does not propose to take any further action as regards Lists A and B until he learns the results of the contacts of the Allied Commission.

4. Will you please also note that the Supreme Allied Commander has not the means to conduct investigations into disputed matters nor is he prepared to adjudicate on such. Where the case is clear, the Supreme Allied Commander, if satisfied that he should do so, is prepared to act; but, contentious matter must be settled through diplomatic channels.

1. Reference is made to your letter no. 0-5: 912.23.1 dated 6 December 1946 on this subject.

2. In accordance with your request contained in para 1 of the lists "A" and "B" have been completed and in the case of List "A", it will be seen that suggested amendments have been substituted for items numbered 13, 14, 16 and 17, 21, 24 and 25, to bring this list up to date.

3. With reference to Appendix "A" item 12, it can be stated that the unseaworthiness of this vessel makes it unreasonable to expect that a voyage to a Yugoslavian port can be accomplished. When the port of Civitavecchia was liberated the ship was found sunk and heavily damaged. She was salvaged in the interests of clearing the harbour, but is considered so damaged that repair is not economical.

The Italian Government is not prepared to make repairs unless the Yugoslav Government can make an agreement in line with the policy outlined by the Commander-in-Chief, Mediterranean Station (Flag A), based on the Admiralty decision (Flag B) and furnished in response to the Navy Subcommission request (Flag C) submitted in the interests of clarifying the question of repair to salvaged or seized vessels. The Yugoslav delegation was informed of the Admiralty decision (Flag B) by the Navy Subcommission on 9 April 1946 (Flag D).

4. With reference to List "B", it is noted that items 19 and 20 should be deleted from the list and that has been done on this Commission's copy.

5. With regard to the covering letter to the Chairman in turn of notation of the Advisory Council in Italy, the statements have been verified and this Commission has no comments to make.

6. It would appear that in the opening sentence of para 3 of the draft reply, reference should be to "10 items" and not "20 items".

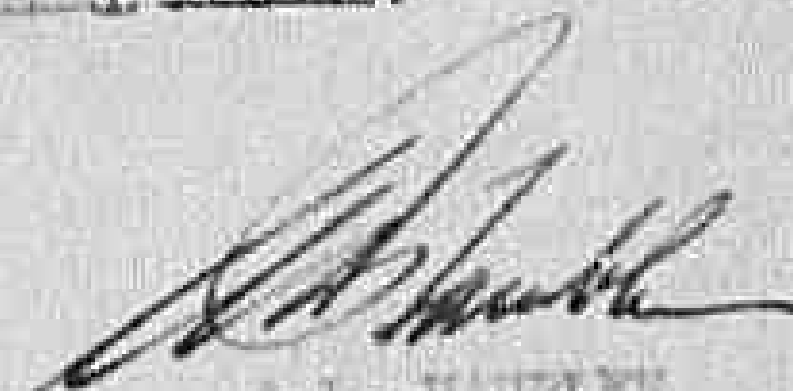

DISTRIBUTION 'R' (British)

1. Yugoslavs displaced persons may only be employed by military units provided they have been accepted and retained to date on AECOM eligible D.P. list. All applications for employment will be made direct to Labour Branch this HQ.
2. Such Yugoslavs will be paid at normal civilian labour rates as laid down in current regulations.
3. Deductions will be made on pay rolls for full rations provided at a rate of 53 Lire daily.
4. A deduction will be made on pay rolls for accommodation as laid down in para 40 of "Regulations for the Employment of Civilian Labour, Italy Sicily and Sardinia", I.P. L.Q. 1945.
5. Application will be made to this HQ (C-4, British Section) for authority to issue WD rations.
6. They are not entitled to military medical attention or hospitalization other than the normal First Aid given to civilian employees.
7. Discipline:- These displaced persons have the same status as other DP's and cannot be subject to military law, only to civilian law.

Reference is made to your letter no. Br. 762/46 dated 5 June 1946 on this subject.

The Italian Government has now advised this Commission that the "Istituto Nazionale delle Assicurazioni" was instructed to investigate this case and has reported as follows:

"The Agencies of the "Jugoslavijska" Insurance Company of Ljubljana and Spalato were not put under sequester by the "Istituto Nazionale delle Assicurazioni" but by the High Commissioner for the province of Ljubljana with decree n. 191 of December 31st, 1941, and by the Governor of Dalmatia with decree dated March 12th, 1942.

This "Istituto" took over the stock of the a/m agencies by contracts of transfer stipulated with the sequestrators. Such contracts were approved by the local Authorities and subsequently confirmed by the General Manager of Jugoslavijska Company in Ljubljana and Belgrade.

The archive of the stock of Ljubljana has never been removed to Rome, and it is therefore supposed to be still in Ljubljana. The archive of the stock of the Spalato agency should be found in Belgrade at the Main office of the Company.

This "Istituto" is preparing the necessary elements for the retrocession of the stocks. It is not, however, in a position to supply the adjourned situation of payments in as much as the Ljubljana, Spalato and Zara agencies failed to forward the accounts to the "Istituto" as from September 1943.

It is to be pointed out that the transfer of amounts of mathematical reserves has never been effected by Belgrade, while the "Istituto" continued to meet its obligations for contracts in respect of persons covered by insurance."

Concerning the request about the spectroheliograph of the Askania-Werke forwarded by the Soviet Military Administration I wish to state the following:

The signal service for the troops organized by the German air force showed evidence for the necessity of performing sun observation using spectroheliograph.

The German observatories were not provided with useful spectroheliograph but on the other hand as it was known that the Askania-Werke had delivered a good spectroheliograph to the observatory at Belgrad, a Committee headed by Chief Engineer PLENK was sent to Belgrade after the occupation of this town by the Germans. This Committee found that the spectroheliograph in question delivered by the Askania-Werke, was not in use but still packed in cases inside the observatory and was flown to the signal post at Syracuse, Sicily.

When Syracuse was menaced by the Allied Troops the spectroheliograph was disassembled and packed in cases. But it was impossible to carry away the cases in time.

The personnel of the signal post retreated and left the spectroheliograph behind. It is probable that the Allied Troops that took Syracuse obtained possession of the spectroheliograph.

away from the observatory in Belgrade a spectroheliograph, make Askania

registration number 79973.

The Yugoslav Military Mission in Germany requested the restitution
of the apparatus through the Allied authorities there, but received the
reply that the Germans had transferred it to Siracusa, Sicily, where it
was left at the time of evacuation of the German forces therefrom. A statement,
whose copy is enclosed to this letter, was given at that occasion by Prof.
Walter Grottrian in Potsdam.

The Italian Government have replied stating that the
Department of Antiquities and Fine Arts of the Ministry of Education
has supplied the following particulars:

a) On June 27th, 1941, the Academy of Sciences and Literature
of Zagreb unanimously decided to proceed to the exchange of two paintings
by Carpaccio (N. 54 - St. Peter Martyr - and N. 56 - St. Sebastian-) with
the baptistry of Prince Visslav, a property of the Correr Museum of
Venice. The Mayor of Venice on August 1st, by decree n. 33650 R.M.A.,
authorized the Correr Museum to proceed to said exchange. The Italian
Government only intervened in giving the final authorization and in
granting the necessary export permit. Therefore the parties concerned
were only the Academy of Zagreb and the Municipality of Venice (on behalf
of the Correr Museum).

b) As far as the baptistry of Prince Visslav is concerned, it
is pointed out that it belonged to the Cathedral of Roma and remained there
until the demolition of said Cathedral in 1746. It was then brought to
Venice by the monks of the Redemptor in the Cindecos, either because it was
granted to them as a present, or because they intended to safeguard an
historical relic from loss or from destruction. It remained in their
possession till 1853, the year in which the baptistry was handed over to
the Correr Museum. The term "removal" is therefore a misnomer. No element
exist whereby, as stated in the Yugoslav Delegation's note that the
restitution of the baptistry would have been decided after the year 1914-1918.

c) The two paintings by Vittorio Carpaccio were originally parts
of the panels of a polyptych disappeared between 1808 and 1812. Of the

- 2 -

panels a part was lost, and 3 were bought by Count Guglielmo Duchi, who kept one of them (St. Rocco - now at the Academy Carrara of Bergamo). The a/n wrote in 1858 that the remaining two panels (St. Peter and St. Sebastian) were in the possession respectively of Signor Valania and Signor Petroballi. At their death they were in 1863 bought by Bishop Strossmayer and brought to Zagreb. At the death of the latter the panels were handed over to the Academy of Zagreb.

d) At the moment of the exchange, which was officially effected in Venice on May 24, 1942, the Correr Museum gave in addition to the baptistry as a gift a painting attributed to F. Bencovich, representing San Gimon or San Bartolomeo. This gift was conditioned upon the exchange of the baptistry with the two paintings by Carpaccio. This particular is entirely ignored in the note of the Yugoslav Delegation.

e) The exchange effected is to be considered valid inasmuch as it was not effected by the two governments but by two private institutes, namely the Academy of Zagreb and the Correr Museum. The request for a restitution of the two paintings without the correlative restitution of the baptistry and of the painting by Bencovich is entirely unsound because the baptistry (besides the prescription of two centuries) was never removed by the monks of Giudecca but saved from destruction.

Reference is made to your letter no. Br. 459/46 dated 11 April 1945 regarding the cartographic instruments taken to Italy.

This matter was referred to the Italian Government who have replied as follows:

"The Ministry of the Navy, after having carried out an accurate investigation, has apprised this Ministry of the following:

- a) that in 1941 the instruments were transferred from Split to the Istituto Idrografico in Genoa and distributed among its departments;
- b) that at the time of the German occupation of Northern Italy, a Commission of the Croatian Navy, accompanied by a German officer, came at the Istituto Idrografico of the Italian Navy (at that time provisionally located at Savona) with the task of collecting and taking back the instruments. The said commission was in possession of a detailed list of all the instruments which were removed from Split;
- c) that the greater part of the said instruments was recovered and sent to Vienna on a freight car;
- d) that the instruments which were left behind in the Battery of the "Stella" (Genoa) were, after September 8th, 1943, lost because the Battery was destroyed and subsequently looted;
- e) that the Istituto Idrografico till recently had a copy of the list of the instruments consigned to the a/m Croatian Commission together with a copy of the list of the instruments left and subsequently destroyed during the German occupation of the Battery "Stella",

These lists were destroyed in a fire which occurred 2 months ago in the archives of the Istituto Idrografico".

Enclosed for your information are copies of two memoranda from the Italian Government numbered 6/3207/1233 and 6/3235/1230 dated 5th and 23rd October, 1946 respectively which request this Commission to forward the information to the Yugoslav Representative to the A.C.I.

The information that the vessels concerned were outside Yugoslav territorial waters would appear to be confirmed by the map, showing the position of some of those ships at the time of their capture, forwarded to you with this Headquarters letter ref. 5609/303/20 dated 28th August, 1946. It is not known what action was subsequently taken by your Headquarters.

In view of the statement contained in Dr. Smolaka's letter No. Br. 1122/46 dated 3rd August, 1946 (copy forwarded to you with this Headquarters letter No. 5607/278/20 dated 9th August 1946) it does not seem that any useful purpose would be served by complying with the Italian Government's request that this further information be transmitted to the Yugoslav Representative. At the same time however, it is felt that some pressure should be brought to bear on the Yugoslav Authorities in order to obtain the release of these vessels and your advice regarding the next step to be taken is requested please.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE ALLIED COMMISSION

Subject: Italian fishing-boats seized by Yugoslav authorities.

1. Further to this Ministry's memorandum no.6/3150/1229 dated September 23rd, 1946.

2. Mr. Arderio PERLA - via Alessandro Poerio 127, Rome -, attorney in charge of the interests of the owners of the fishing-boats seized by the Yugoslav authorities, has solicited this Ministry, on behalf of his clients, to make the competent Yugoslav authorities acquainted with the following facts:

a) It seemed for a time, according to informations reaching the owners, that their vessels were seized on suspicion of smuggling arms and of spying activities. This has proved itself to be groundless, since the crews were later on released and repatriated into Italy;

b) Such being the case, it is not understood why and on what grounds the Yugoslav authorities are still detaining the vessels;

c) All men of the vessels have unanimously averred that their crafts were at least 6 miles off the Yugoslav coasts and that the Yugoslav territorial waters were never violated;

d) It appears, moreover, that the fishing-boats in question are not being taken care of, and consequently are subject to quick deterioration.

3. The Allied Commission is kindly requested to bring Mr. Arderio Perla's statement to the knowledge of the Yugoslav authorities, A.C.I.

1. Reference is made to letter n.5609/279/EC of 13 August 1943, which the Allied Commission has addressed to the President of the Council of Ministers Dr. Alcide De Gasperi.

2. The Ministry of Navy, which has been duly apprized of the contents of the a/m letter, is confirming now that the seizure of the ships took place in the high seas and not in the Yugoslav territorial waters as it appears from Dr. Smolaka's assertion.

3. The truth of the Ministry of Navy's communication is also proved by the statements made by the crews which have recently been repatriated.

4. Therefore, having regard to the elements already furnished with previous memoranda, the Ministry for Foreign Affairs would appreciate if the Allied Commission could kindly effect additional steps in order that the Yugoslav Authorities, considering the fact that the crews of the a/m vessels have been liberated, would also return the above stated craft to the Italian Government.

I refer to your note 9008/120/EC dated March 14, 1946, concerning the problem of war-prizes.

The contents of the above-mentioned note has been brought to the knowledge of the Ministry of Navy, which, as far as the materials belonging to the Italian Navy left in zone "A" and claimed by Yugoslavia are concerned, has now pointed out that it has no knowledge of the decisions reached on the matter by the Committee for War-Prizes, and neither is it informed whether among the materials possibly already assigned to Yugoslavia there are some items which were declared War-Prizes by the Yugoslav Armed Forces during the period of their occupation of zone "A" and partly already removed, as for example from Pola.

I shall be much obliged to you if you could supply me with those detailed particulars which would put the Ministry of Navy in a position of clearing the above points.

Dear Mr. Prime Minister:

Reference your letter 43/01431/2 of 15 January 1946 and my 9008/99/EC of 13 February 1946 to Dr. Renato Prunas.

I have been instructed to give a general statement on the development of war booty problems leading to the position as it is at present. The War Booty Committee was established in September 1945 in accordance with the terms of Appendix F of the Morgan - Jovanovic Agreement. It has so far held ten meetings, and is now preparing its final report. 23 October 1945 was fixed as the final date for the submission of claims by the Yugoslavs, and although the delegation protested that this date allowed insufficient time for the completion of lists, no claims submitted after that date have been admitted. Lire and lire accounts, warships and merchant ships were expressly excluded from discussion by the Committee, the latter since, as you know, the question of shipping in general is to be decided on a governmental level. The setback to industry caused by the delay in the salvage and repairs of shipping is, however, gradually being overcome and Allied Military Government is already taking action to ensure the development of a programme for salvage and repair and the completion of ships already in construction.

Some of the stocks at the Ilva plant are subject to a war booty claim which was rejected by the Anglo-American members of the Committee. These stocks are as a result still blocked. For the time being orders have been issued that no items in relation to which any question of ownership by your State can possibly arise will be removed. While these lists were under discussion it was naturally necessary for the movement or consumption of certain industrial and other materials and facilities to be blocked. Blocking is, however, no longer necessary except in the case of the few items still under dispute and free movement of the remainder is being restored.

In order to facilitate the salvage of Yugoslav ships therefore, it is advised that a Lira account be obtained from the Italian Government. It must be emphasized that the final disposal of this account is not considered to come under the terms of the Armistice, but is a matter left to be determined by the Peace Treaty.

In addition Dr. DeBourgh, the director of the American Legion, has frequently asked the ability to complete the mission but without success.
