Dear General Susloparov:

(A) On the 21st October General Vasilliev had an interview with me and drew my attention to a translation of the biography of Lenin written by Trotsky, which is now being distributed for sale in Rome. He asked that steps should be taken to prevent further printing and distribution, on the grounds that it was insulting to Lenin and that Trotsky was a Fascist.

Unless some threat is made to military security, or it appears that a publication is designed to impair or impede the war effort, or to create civil disturbances, it is not the policy of the Allied Commission to prevent the publication of books and pamphlets. It is not considered that the biography of Lenin falls within the above categories.

The Allied authorities are guided by the principle that Freedom of Expression is one of the benefits which it is their task to assure to the Italian people. Censorship and control of the press is, therefore, regarded as undesirable for purposes unrelated to military security.



SUBJECT: Censorship of Propaganda.

TO : Headquarters, Allied Commission, APO 394.

1. I have received your memorandum A/CC 000.1-1 of 22 October reporting a request from General Vasiliev that you should take steps to prevent the publication and distribution of a serial translation on Trotsky's "Life of Lenin" on the grounds that the work is insulting to the Soviet Union and that the author is an enemy of Russia and "a Fascist".
2. You are requested to advise General Vasiliev that censorship and control of the press is regarded as undesirable for purposes unrelated to military security. Unless some threat is made to military security, or it appears that a publication is designed to impair or impede the war effort, or create civil disturbances it will not be the policy of the Allied Commission to prevent the publication of books and pamphlets. The "Life of Lenin" does not fall within the above categories.
3. You may also remind General Vasiliev that the Allied authorities are guided by the principle that Freedom of Expression is one of the benefits which it is their task to assure to the Italian people.

COMMODORE STONE reported that the Russians wished to suppress the publication in Italy of works by Trotsky on the grounds that Trotsky was a fascist. The Allied Control Commission had taken the view that to accede to the Russian request would involve a breach of the freedom of speech.

MEMORANDUM TO: C-3 Section, Allied Force Headquarters, ANV 522

1. General Vassiliev called yesterday afternoon to draw my attention to the attached documents which are now being distributed for sale in Rome. They purport to be a translation of the well-known biography of Lenin written by Trotsky. The translation is appearing in serial form of which the first two numbers out of fifteen are already on sale. From a cursory inspection of the first two numbers it would appear that they are in fact a straight translation without political comment.
2. In drawing my attention to these publications General Vassiliev demanded that we should take steps to prevent their further printing and distribution. The grounds for his demand were that they were insulting to the Soviet Union and that Trotsky, as the public enemy number one of his country, was "a Fascist."
3. From such enquiries as the Commission has so far been able to make it appears that the present distribution of these documents amounts to five thousand copies and that the Italian Communist Party has not been active in trying to buy them off the market, or indeed in taking any particular objection to them. The documents are marketed as being published by "Minuscita" in Rome and enquiries are in hand about this aspect of the question as this publishing firm is not officially known to us. For distribution purposes the five thousand copies of these documents are passed to a firm called "Fioritti" who are the printers of the Socialist newspaper, "Avanti", and other Left wing publications.
4. I have consulted the Chief Legal Adviser of this Commission whether there is any ground upon which we could comply with the Russian request and I am advised that on the assumption that we are not preparing to consider this obfuscation as Fascist the only ground for action would be that the authors have failed to comply with the Italian law which requires the name and address of the publisher to be given on all copies. There is no doubt that if we were to instruct the Italian Government to proceed on this ground, we should in effect only postpone the issue, for there would be nothing to prevent future copies to be circulated in the proper manner. I should therefore grateful to know as a matter of urgency what reply I should give

General Vasilius who is pressing for early action. I have of course already pointed out to him that in the United States and the British Commonwealth there are many books published critical of the achievement of outstanding political figures such as George Washington and Queen Victoria and that we do not consider this a reason for suppression. The General accepted this statement of fact but said that whatever we were prepared to allow in the United States of America and the British Commonwealth did not affect what the Russians desired to be done in Italy.

MEMORANDUM TO: Colonel A. E. Young, Security Branch.

1. General Vasiliev called on the Acting Chief Commissioner this afternoon to present the attached documents and demand that we should stop their publication and distribution. The grounds for his demand were that they were insulting to the Soviet Union and that Trotsky as the Public Enemy No. 1 of his country, was in effect a fascist.
2. The Acting Chief Commissioner has directed that we should by tomorrow at latest send these forward to A.F.H.Q. for a decision on the line we are to take. Before doing so, he wishes to know whether you can throw any light upon how they have been prepared. The publishers "RINASCITA" are, incidentally, those employed by the Italian Communist Party; but General Vasiliev told Commodore Stone that Signor Togliatti had denied any complicity in this affair.
