This Allied Commission agrees with your view that internal Commissions as operating in industrial establishments are not appropriete to non-industrial Covernment establishments. I think it op ortune to mention, however, that it appears to be proper to allow freedom of organization of professional, technical, administrative and elerical Government employees for the normal purposes of workers, associations. Obviously, for St te employees the right to strike should be withold and idsitional restrictions should be placed on members of the police and security forces. Apart from the particular question raised by the Profect of Florence, Allied Military Government will encounter the question of the association of Government non-industrial employees and Internal Commissions in areas now under Allied Military Government and in the North of Itely shen it becomes liberated. Coldinate: It might be possible that the Austian Government, through Togliatti, is preparing the ground for requesting a continuation with the U.S. and British Governments on Italy apparement to the Crimman Agreement for consultations on liberated countries, as an offset to the Polish and Bunnanian situations. There is evidence of Communist concern arising from the recent increasingly favorable receptions which the Lucyotenente has had from Italian Patriots, regular troops, and civilians both at the front and in rear areas. This was particularly noticeable at Taranto where he was wantly received by the recently repatriated Earlbeldi Division. The soldiers of the Caribaldi Division showed marked anti-Communist Feelings and strong export of the Monarchy.

Reference our recent telephone conversation regarding the assignment of Brigadier General Lucas V. Beau, Jr. as Deputy Director of the Air Force Subcommission, Allied Commission, I have discussed the matter with General McNarney, who approves of this action. I have also discussed the subject with Brigadier General James A. Mollison in order to determine most suitable procedure for making this assignment.

As a result of the above, I believe that the best way to handle the matter is for you to issue an order appointing General Beau as Deputy Director of the Air Force Subcommission. Copies of the assignment order should be forwarded to Allied Force Headquarters; Commanding General, MTOUSA; and Commanding General of Army Air Forces, Mediterranean Theater of Operations. Headquarters, U. S. Army Air Forces have been informed through General Mollison that General Beau's assignment to the Air Force Subcommission is in addition to his other duties. Your order should state that General Beau is being assigned with the concurrence of Commanding General, AAF/MTO.*

If the above does not meet your approval in any respect, or you consider that any additional action is necessary from the viewpoint of the Allied Commission, please let me know.
