SUBJECT: Note of Interview - Ministry of the Interior

DATE : 2 May 1946 - 11:30 hours

PRESENT: Dott. Adalberto BERRUTI, Capo di Gabinetto  
Major Ralph R. Temple  
Lt. D. MODLINO, interpretingSUBJECT: SCIORILLI BORGELLI

1. I explained to Dott. BERRUTI that I was here to converse with him off the record concerning SCIOPILLI BORGELLI, who is now Capo di Gabinetto in the Ministry of Occupied Italy. I informed him that some time ago, after we had rejected SCIOPILLI BORGELLI as Prefect, we received a report of the Epuration Commission which listed SCIOPILLI BORGELLI as one who was not subject to the judgment of the Epuration Commission. Since apparently there was a clearance of SCIOPILLI BORGELLI by the Epuration Commission, I wondered whether the Ministry and the Epuration Commission were aware of the existence of a document purporting to award the German Eagle Order of Merit to him, at the request of the German Embassy in Rome, a photostatic copy of which I had in my possession. I showed Dott. BERRUTI the document and he said that they were aware of its existence and that as a matter of fact CARAVARI had written to the then High Commissioner for Epuration, SCOCCHIMARRO, informing him of this point. Apparently, however, SCOCCHIMARRO did not deem this of sufficient importance to warrant a recommendation for dismissal on epuration grounds. Dott. BERRUTI stated that the receipt of German honors is not one of the grounds for epuration.

2. I pointed out that in this photostatic document recommending this German honor for SCIOPILLI BORGELLI appeared the names of two other Italian officials--Dott. CALCAERRA and Dott. CANAPERIA. Dott. CALCAERRA has been nominated as a Prefect for a northern province by the Italian Government and heretofore had also been cleared by the Epuration Commission. Dott. BERRUTI pointed out that Dott. CANAPERIA presently is a Medico Provinciale in one of the provinces under AIC, and that he has also been cleared by the Epuration Commission.

3. So far as the receipt of the German honor was concerned, Dott. BERRUTI indicated that it was difficult to evaluate its importance; that it depended upon the attitude of the person receiving it and his position. In the cases of the two officials other than SCIOPILLI BORGELLI, Dott. CALCAERRA was a medical technician occupying a medical position, whereas the other, Dott. CARCAERRA, was a Vice Prefect of not great importance. SCIOPILLI BORGELLI, however, at the time he actually received the honor had been made a Prefect.

4. Dott. BERRUTI questioned why we should be so concerned about the grounds for asking the removal of the man. He stated that heretofore when the Allied Commission objected to a person they merely stated that they did so on security grounds, without actually stating the reasons, and at no time have the reasons been requested. He intimated that this might be done in SCIOPILLI BORGELLI's case.

5. Throughout this conversation, Dott. HERRUTI was speaking with some hesitancy, and apparently very carefully. I told him that we did not want to do anything that would embarrass either the Allied Commission or the Prime Minister and that although we felt that SCIORILLI BORRELLI was a depraved character, we felt that the only point on which we could base a request for his removal was that of insecurity. HERRUTI then said that he had been speaking very guardedly because of the personal animosity which existed between him and SCIORILLI BORRELLI, of which he said I was perfectly aware. In the past few weeks, there has been no difficulty. SCIORILLI BORRELLI has gone his own way without stirring up any trouble. From a personal standpoint, HERRUTI said it might be just as well to leave the matter as it was. On the other hand, as an official he could not help but state that it was undesirable to have a man of SCIORILLI BORRELLI's attitude in a position of such great importance. He said the man's every gesture and statement bespeak his anti-Allied attitude. He also said they have ample evidence of this. SCIORILLI BORRELLI was issuing passes now to people without exercising the care and scrutiny demanded by an official.

6. Summarizing, I got the definite impression that HERRUTI felt that a formal communication from AC objecting to SCIORILLI BORRELLI's retention on security grounds would be sufficient to bring about his removal. There might be a little fuss and talk which would react perhaps personally against the calm now enjoyed by HERRUTI, but he did not think that was too important. The position occupied by SCIORILLI BORRELLI was characterized by HERRUTI as being one which should require the incumbent's and indisputable loyalty to the Allied cause and there was serious question of SCIORILLI BORRELLI's possessing this attitude.

Prefect Roberto SCIOPIELLI BORGELLI

Born on 12/1/1894 in Chieti - Living in Rome, Via Luigi Luzzatti, 29

He joined the Administration of the Interior as employee in 1911, and became an official in 1920, doing service in the Ministry. He was then sent as Inspector (as-prefect) to Salerno, where he left a bad memory.

Appointed to the General Direction of Public Health he was greatly trusted by the Director General, Giovanni Petracca, fascist prefect, who was rather lenient from the moral point of view. In September 1942, Borgelli was appointed prefect and sent to Parma. There he won many enemies because of his overbearing and meddling character.

In 1943, for the threatening of the corn, he participated in a stampede banquet together with the Federal secretary and all the fascist members of the Banquet which took place at a time of very strict food restrictions, gave rise to many complaints, so that, after an investigation made by Prefect Inspector Francesco Murglia, the fascist Government decided the punishment of all the fascists who had participated in the banquet, and the dismissal of Dr. Borrelli. However, after a good deal of intriguing, Borrelli obtained from the Undersecretary of State Alibini that his dismissal be turned into a mere indulgent suspension.

In August 1943, he was destined to Catania, where, after the 5th of September, he remained in charge till the end of October, which seems to show that the German authorities of occupation were not unfavourable to him. In October he was able to go back to Italy; this is significant, for, as it is well known, the German authorities in Italy allowed no Italian to go back to Italy if he hadn't first adhered to the collaborationist fascist republican government.

He doesn't seem to have had any social political activity under the fascist regime; it appears however, that he was always protected by the famous chief of the police Scoppini, and that in January 1945, he was conferred a high roman dignity, Order of the eagle, for merit, in the direct proposal of the Governor of the Reich in Rome.

After the liberation of Rome, he tried to make himself conspicuous by getting the support of the communist party, and of ... Cominardi especially, to whom he is supposed to have denounced and calumniated many colleagues.

In this way, he obtained to be appointed member of the Liberation Commission for the Public Safety personnel, but a decree of the President of the Council revoked his appointment in October 1945, because of his very suspicious precedents. This is known to the P.D. Sub-commission of the Allied Commission.

In autumn 1945, through clever intrigues, he obtained to be appointed president of a cooperative between the employees of the interior department; after a few months, he was eliminated from this charge by the employees themselves.

His administration of the cooperative was also extremely discredited.

For instance, it seems that he obtained a loan for a car Fiat 108, none 65279 - by saying it was used for the requirements of the cooperative only. Instead of that, the said car was entrusted to a certain Borghetti Giuseppe, owner of a restaurant, living in Piazza Vittorio Emanuele, 70, Fiat n. 10, who had already been condemned for robbery, swindling, bankruptcy, etc. He also used this car for other illicit trade and also for transporting people for hire, etc. It must be noted. This has been ascertained by the present board of administrators of the cooperative, and denounced to the interior department.

In October 1944, Sorrelli summoned by the chief of the local government sub-commission of the Allied government for a possible appointment to one of the provinces administered by the allied military government, behaved very badly in the presence of the said chief and of two other members of the Sub-Commission, expressing judgments and using offensive words against the Prime Minister, Mr. De Gasperi. Sorrelli later sent an insolent letter to Col. Spicer.

All this is proved by the written evidence of the officers of the local government sub-commission, and the Italian government was officially informed.

In this occasion, Col. Spicer verbally expressed the following judgment a propos of Sorrelli: 'I never saw such a contemptible and disloyal functionary. I request the Italian Government not to send any Scorselli Sorrelli to my office. Sorrelli is a serious threat for the Italian Government in any post'.

Indeed, the minister for Occupied Italy, R. M. Goncalves (on whom Dr. Sorrelli evidently has a great influence), and who, perhaps, doesn't know exactly his whereabouts) asked for Mr. Sorrelli to be appointed to the Ministry for Economic Policy for a confidential job.

The president of the Council answered negatively and let the said commission of the Allied government know about his answer (letter of the 17th January 1945).

The family descendants of Sorrelli are most malignant. His father, Scorselli Pasquale was condemned 12 times for various offenses (robbery and swindling mostly).

His brother, Vittorio has also been condemned and is well known to the police.

His step-mother, Sgarbi Maria Ferrara, of Mirandola, living in Viale Angiolico, n. 103, has been condemned for breaking the law on prostitution and for pimping. She has managed several brothels in Rome (Via Cassiopio, n. 1, Via dei Saccatelli, n. 41, Viale Giuliano, n. 21 e 28). It seems that even now she is carrying on her shameful trade.

Her step-son, project manager Scorselli Girolito always frequented her house; it even seems that he advised her to open her clandestine brothel in Viale XX settembre, n. 21.

TRANSLATION.

Since the 15th of January it has been requested that the Prefect Dott. Umberto Sciorelli Borrelli to be put at the disposition of the new Ministry of Occupied Italy, which is to be organized under the control of the Allied Command. Until today no consent has been given, while it seems that either H.E. Spataro or H.E. Bonomi have already expressed their opinion verbally in favourable sense.

- 1) I have been "sanctioned" before even having known my justifications.
- 2) Following these justifications and steps taken by the High Commissioner for the Epuration in defence of the intangibility of the officials entrusted with judicial functions, I have, in fact, remained member of the commission for the Epuration of the P.S. personnel, until the same Commission has been reconstituted under the Presidency of Baratone, instead of H.E. Savini - Ricci.
- 3) That Colonel Spicer had no intention of having me punished is proved by the fact, in past January, Major Temple and Miss Pellei have asked why I did not belong any more to that Commission and why, before excluding me, the approval of the Allied Command was not asked.  
(N.B. by Director Colonel Spicer. "This paragraph is unintelligible to me").
4. I am one of the very few Prefects for whom the Commissario Aggiunto for the Epuration of the Administration has not asked neither incrimination nor any kind of element, as I am an official who has suffered from the Fascism and has fought before the 8th of September against the Nazi-fascism.
5. I never had the intention of being disrespectful to Colonel Spicer, as it results from the fact that I applied to him with confidence in order to attract his attention on my person and that I was pleased to meet him.
6. If I committed a fault, I deserve the benefit of many extenuating circumstances for all that has happened to me and I have reported to my

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senior officials.

However, in order to give my cooperation to the struggle for a return of Democracy in my Country, and for the dispersal of any residue of Fascism, and also hurry the drive of the German invader out of my country, I am even ready, if necessary and accepted by Colonel Spicar, to present him my apologies.

STATEMENT.

After finishing his interview with Colonel Spicer, the Prefect Sciorilli Borrelli said to me the following things in the ante-room:

- 1) He was very anxious to introduce me to his son, a Lieutenant in the Italian Air Force. I answered that I would certainly be pleased to meet his son on any other occasion, but I did not think this was the right time as I hoped he appreciated my delicate position. Therefore he dropped the matter.
- 2) He was sure to obtain the appointment he applied for, because he knew that some high personalities of the Royal House were going to back him up.
- 3) He knew also that Berzuti, an old Fascist, did not like him.
- 4) The phrases said to him by Col. Spicer in his last interview were of the same character that he heard from a German Lieutenant during the German occupation.
- 5) He appealed to my sense of patriotism in appreciating what he was telling me.

Note of conversation between Major Temple and  
Major Fielden, Public Relations  
Officer

SUBJECT: Clearance of material with Capt. G. P. Bruno, of the Joint Intelligence Collection Agency, RAC.

1. I saw Major Fielden and told him that we had been instructed to clear with the Public Relations Officer people from intelligence units with whom we had business, before issuing any statements to them.

2. The particular person we had in mind was Capt. Bruno, of JICA - RAC, with whom information was exchanged concerning officials in whose appointments we were interested.

3. Major Fielden said that there was nothing to worry about—that he knows Capt. Bruno personally and everything was quite all right. Bruno was not a newspaper man, nor was his office a newspaper. Apparently, there was unnecessary concern by higher ups about Bruno.

4. Major Fielden said that he telephoned Bruno and told him to stop into see him whenever he calls upon any of the Sub Commissions. Major Fielden said that we could continue to do business with Bruno without bothering to consult him, except in cases where the matter, in our opinion, was very important, in which case we would mention the fact to him.

1. Thank you for your letter R-75-44 of 20 October 1944, which Captain Bruno Loft with Captain Williams this afternoon.

2. I enclose for your information a copy of my record card as to this Prefect, from which you will see that I think little of him as an official on the ground of the unpatriotic and selfish attitudes he has up with regard to his duty. Accusations of Fascism and scandalous conduct do not seem to have been borne out by the facts which have hitherto come to my notice.

3. I do not feel disposed to attach much importance to the denunciation enclosed with your letter. Much of it is merely scandalous and some (e.g. para 5) contradicts previous reports. We get a number of such documents in this sub-commission, and too many bear all the marks of personal or political spite.

4. It is, of course, for you to judge whether SCORILLI-BORGHELLA is the sort of person in whom you should be interested.

5. I keep a fairly complete card index of Prefects, Vice-Prefects which contains biographical notes and personal appraisals of each. The index also extends to the higher ranking officials of the Ministry of Interior, and to the mayors of the more important towns. If you should require information on a person in any of these classes, I shall be happy to place these records at your disposal.

6. This sub-commission in its turn would be very grateful to receive from you from time to time any information coming into your possession as to the same classes of individuals.

SUBJ/DT: Notes of interview with Capt. Carl P. Bruno ( ) JICA, R&amp;G

DATE : 20 October 1964

1. Capt. Carl P. Bruno ( ) called this afternoon. He represents Joint Intelligence Collection Agency (JICA) R&G.
2. He showed me a copy of an AFIS directive as to his work. JICA is a branch of AFIS, established for the purpose of collecting intelligence which might be useful to the War and Navy Departments in Washington. It is also authorized to disseminate intelligence to other military organizations on its own or a lower level. Its functions are confined to the collection and dissemination of intelligence: it is not military police or counter-intelligence. Capt. Bruno represents the branch of JICA established at R&G.
3. Part of Capt. Bruno's work consists of preparing short biographies of prominent Italians, particularly those who are now becoming or are likely in the future to become prominent, and to transmit these to Washington, where they are recorded for future use by the Military Intelligence Department. He is, therefore, interested in Prefects and functionaries on the same or higher levels and also in the Simbaci of the very large towns.
4. He promised to send a copy of his directive to this Sub Commission.
5. He also showed me a letter dated 9 October from the Establishment Branch, this HQ, to JICA, AFIS (signed by Col.ough) approving of the proposal of exchanging information by the JICA and this HQ, and a thorin JICA to deal direct with Sub Commissions.
6. I explained our card index system to Capt. Bruno and told him that if ever he wanted information on the class of people which it covers, we would be happy to place it at his disposal. Conversely, if any information reached him as to Prefects and Vice Prefects and persons of similar or higher rank, or as to the Mayors of the most important towns, we would be grateful if he would pass it on to this Sub Commission. He agreed to this.

7. He left with me letter, o. 618 on this file as to SCIORILLI-SORRELLI. After studying the enclosure (618 on the file) and showing Capt. Bruno SCIORILLI-SORRELLI's card, I said I did not think we should attach much importance to this documentation, considering (a) the source from which it came and (b) the purely scandalous character of parts of it; (c) the known immorality of other parts. However, we were glad to have it for whatever it was worth.
8. I promised to send him a copy of our record card on SCIORILLI-SORRELLI and Capt. Bruno could then judge whether he was the sort of person whom JICA should be interested.
9. Capt. Temple was also present during most of the interview.

SUBJECT: Confidential Report Concerning the Prefect  
SARTORIUS SORRELLI

- 1) - He is a person with a very bad record as appears from the following:  
He won a university degree by disguising himself as a soldier  
at the end of the war 1915-18, whereas he had neither fought  
nor been a soldier.
- 2) - His step-mother kept houses of prostitution in Rome in which  
he had an interest.
- 3) - He was a trusted assistant, serving as Division Head of His  
excellency Petruzzani, Fascist Prefect and General Director  
of Sanitation, notorious for his looting.
- 4) - While he was serving as Prefect at Taranto, a post to which  
he was appointed by the Fascist government, he was removed  
from office because of a scandalous banquet which he organized  
to ridicule the English and Americans at a time of very serious  
food shortage. This banquet led to a careful inquiry conducted  
by the Prefect Miratli which established fully the reprehensible  
conduct of Sorrelli, with the result that the Fascist government  
removed him from office and it was announced to the press that  
he had retired.
- 5) - He was Prefect at Cottbus on the 5th of September 1943 and he  
maintained the best relations with the German government up  
until the end of October.
- 6) - He belongs to a family of degenerates. His father has been  
convicted 11 times. His brother has been guilty of ~~murder~~ 449<sup>th</sup>,  
etc., etc.

Sorrelli is, in short, a person unworthy to fill an important  
position and for this reason we are certain that the Allied Command  
will take immediate action against him.

SUBJECT: Prefect SCIORILLI-BORRELLI

TO : His Excellency the Minister of Interior

Your Excellency:

1. I forward for your information copy of the record of interview I had with Prefect SCIORILLI-BORRELLI yesterday, whose name was submitted to me as Prefect-designate for a forward province and in which regard I interviewed him.
2. I have no wish to comment on the interview, which speaks for itself; nor have I any wish to comment further on the manner in which he referred to His Excellency Berri-ti in my presence, nor, indeed, in the manner to which he referred to Your Excellency, personally.
3. I have since received the enclosed letter which I forward together with the interview document for your information.
4. I must protest against receiving such a letter as this, since I treated Prefect SCIORILLI-BORRELLI with every consideration. I have three witnesses consisting of myself, Captain Lewis, and 2nd Lt Modiano who were present throughout the interview. The only possible interest I had in the interview was that of this gentleman as Prefect for a northern province, and I had to inform him repeatedly that it was not my business to listen to personal grievances. One of his excuses was that he had a son in Rome, and I felt it my duty to point out - and you will agree it was a fair remark - that I myself had a son in England who was still in school, and from whom I was parted.
5. I would conclude this letter by saying that I must protest against the receipt of such a letter from Prefect SCIORILLI-BORRELLI.

PLACE AND DATE: DO B.C., 4th October, 1944.

INTERVIEWER: Major W. Madaro

1. Col. Spioer intimated that he had desired to see H.H. SCORTELLI-SORRELLI in connection with his nomination by the Italian Government for appointment to a northern province when liberated. The proposal as yet was not realized but could be one of a number emanated by Col. Spioer. The latter enjoyed SCORTELLI-SORRELLI's present position.

2. SCORTELLI-SORRELLI stated that he was a Director General of the Ministry of Interior, a member of the Operation Committee of Public Safety and Personnel and an official of Cooperative Al Cittadino.

3. He stated that he did not know that he had been nominated for "political" appointment in a northern province and advised to express his opinion only if asked "whether that he should stay in Rome". He produced many papers and documents in what Col. Spioer intimated he was not interested.

4. Col. Spioer made it clear that such recommendation had been made by the Government and not by ACC. It had merely been submitted to ACC which had referred it to his interview.

5. SCORTELLI-SORRELLI stated that he had not been properly treated compared to other officials. He agreed that in the national interests it was an honour to go forward, but thought that he had given to Florence and had taken to an "agent trustee" in that operation. He concluded he should have a more important province than those referred to.

6. Col. Spioer pointed out that SCORTELLI-SORRELLI had not been considered for the Florence appointment as he was not amongst those nominated by President Bonomi. Col. Spioer was not prepared to listen to any talk which involved any criticism of the President by SCORTELLI-SORRELLI.

7. SCORTELLI-SORRELLI commented by stating that he wished to point out an injustice. Col. Spioer interrupted to say that this was entirely untrue for SCORTELLI-SORRELLI to deal with his own Ministry and referred to Italy's present plight and the urgent necessity for assistance to do whatever must be done.

CONFIDENTIAL-SOURCE stated that he had not been properly trained or prepared for other assignments. He agreed that in the internal interview, he was an answer to go forward, but thought that he also had some "qualifications" and could have a more important place, "to teach something." He considered his answer to one service time those received to.

6. Col. Spicer pointed out that CONFIDENTIAL had not been considered for the Pichino assignment, as he was not amongst those mentioned by President Bonelli. Col. Spicer was not prepared to listen to any talk which involved any criticism of the President by CONFIDENTIAL.

7. CONFIDENTIAL continued by stating that he wanted to point out an instance. Col. Spicer referred to any that this man, originally "Spicer," for CONFIDENTIAL himself to add with his own military and reported to Italy's present flight and the current decorative awards he would like to receive from us.

8. CONFIDENTIAL said he had 30 years service and was now the object of a "client" and live at the Villa del Colle. Col. Spicer replied that such a person was one continual trouble to the Government. CONFIDENTIAL stated he had asked assistance with Italian clients, but without result.

9. Col. Spicer again said he could not tolerate criticism of the Ministry. CONFIDENTIAL said it has been suggested by orally by the President to go forward as a "spymaster." He asked whether which countries were used, Spain was as to whether CONFIDENTIAL would still not enter other countries. They were not his business and he would not listen to them. Col. Spicer's interest following the nomination was merely another CONFIDENTIAL was a suitable request to be sent to AIC a result.

10. CONFIDENTIAL indicated that he personally had to make a statement he would do or not. Col. Spicer disagreed.  
11. CONFIDENTIAL indicated when stated that he wanted to become U.S. Marshall to the Southern Commission, and will be used to no use to current Spanish and Spanish consulates.

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12. Col Spicer asked him to state definitely whether he was prepared to go on or not, following the Ministry's nomination.

13. SCORZONERA replied that he had voted to go "but not now" as he desired to submit his case to the Ministry.

14. Col Spicer mentioned SCORZONERA of the recent Churchill-Roosevelt conference at the desire to give greater power to the Italian Government, he was not prepared to discuss criticisms of Roosevelt or any others but desired only a definite answer as to whether or not SCORZONERA would go forward. The latter replied "At this moment I cannot go". He said that his son who had been collaborating with the Allied Armies had returned to take his degree. Col Spicer drew attention to the daily separation of Allied officers rendered necessary by war conditions and to why morale.

15. SCORZONERA assured Col Spicer that the ministry was not his concern, Col Spicer said that the ministry was still in office.

16. SCORZONERA then intimated that the Government were "laying a council or going to make him out of the Ministry". Col Spicer asked if Italiac could make other orders and SCORZONERA replied that Berardi was not senior to him, although the letter with his resignation may have been Berardi's signature, Berardi had drafted it. Other methods had also seemed to go forward and said De Cesare, recruited for Florence, Col Spicer stated that De Cesare had produced a second certificate. SCORZONERA referred to the prime minister financially in terms which could not be considered respectful.

17. Col Spicer repeated that formal quarel with the Italian Government were no concern of his.

18. SCORZONERA desired to emphasize that "I will not in case of "no" not go", but "cannot go". He wanted to explain his stand. He could not do it elsewhere therefore he had tried to do it in this interview.

19. The grounds of his objection were recounted as stated as follows:  
 1. that he deserved a better position  
 2. the "corridor zone"  
 3. the return of his son to Rome

20. Col Spicer stated that there was no formal promise given in concluding the interview.

21. The object, SCORZONERA was logistics, he gave the impression of suffering under a sense of personal entwined.

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15. MONTALBETTI asked why certain Soviets (unnamed) were still in office. Col. Spicer said that the country was not his concern.

16. MONTALBETTI then intimated that the Germans were "laying a trap to catch him out of Italy". Col. Spicer asked if Italian officials did not take orders and SORRELLI responded that Herrini was not a "signature, terrorist, terrorist, terrorist or Florence". Other terrorists had also refused to go forward and named De Orsi, represented for Florence. Col. Spicer stated that De Cesari had produced a medical certificate. MONTALBETTI referred to the Prime Minister, however, in terms which could not be considered respectful.

17. Col. Spicer repeated that personal contacts with the Italian Government were no concern of his.

18. MONTALBETTI desired to emphasize that it was not a case of "will not do", but "cannot do". He wanted to explain his case. Col. Sp. did not do it elsewhere than from his back door to do up to this interview.

19. The contents of his questions were recounted and extracted as follows:

1. What he deserved a better position.
2. the "counterpart" factor.
3. the nature of his act to Rome

20. Col. Spicer stated that there was no such provision in his contract.

21. Col. Spicer under a sense of previous promises, and gave the interview.

7. SCIORILLI-BORELLI - I mentioned what is said in the Security Report about the reasons for his dismissal by the Fascists. There seems to be nothing in this, really. Berutti says it was not a banquet: it was a "trebbiatura" - or "harvest bear feast" which was held annually on the property of some landowner near Taranto where S-B was Prefect at the time. It was not especially given for S-B, but he was invited. Then some one wrote an anonymous letter to Mussolini's Cabinet - where S-B had a personal enemy. The result was he was dismissed with every circumstance of publicity as an "example".

8. Berutti says everybody in Italy knows the story of SCIORILLI-BORELLI's "banquet".

9. He was afterwards Prefect of CATANIA where he resisted the orders of the Germans and was dismissed by them and threatened with the concentration camp. He escaped with great difficulties with the help of the bishop.

10. Berutti agreed he is a man of marked and somewhat difficult character as stated in the Security report.

Following your instructions I have screened Dr. Umberto Sciorilli-Morelli and have found the following.

Subject was born at Cserta in 1892. He began his career in 1911 and was appointed prefect in 1942, and was for a while General Inspector at the Ministry of Interior. He held office in Trieste and Cattaro.

He was put in retirement in 1943 because of a scandalous luxurious banquet deemed very out of place in war time.

He is said to have a difficult character, he has not too good a name with his colleagues and dependents.

However he has not carried any fascist honours and never actively participated in the fascist party. He would therefore be acceptable from a security standpoint.
