REPATRIATION OF ITALIAN NATIONALS TO ITALY.

1. This Memorandum sets out the classes into which Italian Nationals held as Prisoners of War and Internees are divided, and the procedure which must be followed in making application for their repatriation.

2. There are two main classes:

- (a) Italian Prisoners of War i.e. members of the Italian Forces in Allied hands and Italian Merchant Seamen who have been interned by any of the Allied nations.
- (b) Civilians and groups of civilians living or interned outside Italy.

ITALIAN PRISONERS OF WAR AND MERCHANT SEAMEN.

3. WAR MATERIALS DISPOSAL AND ITALIAN PRISONERS OF WAR SUB COMMISSION is responsible for the handling of all questions concerning the repatriation of Italian Prisoners of War and Italian Merchant Seamen.

4. The following are the categories in which Prisoners of War or Merchant Seamen may be repatriated.

(a) Entitled Repatriates.

Sick, wounded, those who are 30 years of age or over, those who are over 50 years of age and have been two years in captivity. These Prisoners of War are now being repatriated automatically as shipping becomes available and will be demobilized on arrival in Italy.

(b) Compassionate cases.

Forces in Allied hands and Italian Merchant Seamen who have been interned by any of the Allied nations, outside Italy.

(b)

ITALIAN PRISONERS OF WAR AND MERCHANT SEAMEN.

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4. The following are the categories in which Prisoners of War or Merchant Seamen may be repatriated.

(a) Entitled Repatriates.

Sick, wounded, those who are 60 years of age or over, those who are over 50 years of age and have been two years in captivity. These Prisoners of War are now being repatriated automatically as shipping becomes available and will be demobilized on arrival in Italy.

(b) Compassionate cases.

Cases where Prisoners of War are required to take care of a family who have no other means of support, on conditions similar to those under which an Allied soldier would be posted home. Such cases are comparable to those of men of military age exempted from service, and will be demobilized on arrival in Italy.

(c) Priority workers.

Workers who are required by a U.S. or British agency or by an Italian Government agency for important work as a direct contribution to the Allied War effort. Such cases are comparable to those of men of military age exempted from service as key workers, and will be demobilized on arrival in Italy.

(d) Effective Members of the Italian Armed Forces.

Prisoners of War who are required for active service with the Italian Armed Forces. Approval must first be obtained from the Service Sub-Commission concerned.

PROCEDURE TO BE FOLLOWED IN DEALING WITH ITALIAN PRISONERS OF WAR AND MERCHANT SEAMEN.

5. All applications and enquiries regarding repatriation with- in classes 4 (a) and (b) will be forwarded direct to the Italian High Commissioner for Prisoners of War, Corso Vittorio Emanuele 120, Rome.

6. Requests will only be submitted under 4 (c) when respon- sibility is accepted by the Director of the Sub-Commission, Regional Commissioner or the Italian Government agency, submitting the case that the Prisoner of War concerned will fill and is qualified to fill the appointment for which he has been requested. Requests under 4 (c) made by an Italian Government agency will in the first place be submitted to the Italian High Commissioner for Prisoners of War.

7. All requests for repatriation under 4 (d) will be initiated by the service Ministry concerned to the appropriate service Sub- Commission. The requests will give full particulars of the per- sonnel required and their proposed employment in the Armed Forces. After approval by the service Sub-Commission concerned the requests will be returned to the service Ministry for submission to the Italian High Commissioner for Prisoners of War. Prisoners of War will not be absorbed into the Armed Forces in ITALY by any other means.

8. The Italian High Commissioner for Prisoners of War will check and collate all applications and requests made to him and will forward them to War Materiale Disposal and Italian Prisoners of War Sub-Commission which will, if it approves, make formal ap- plication to higher authority.

9. In all cases under the above conditions repatriated Italian Prisoners of War of military age will only be demobilized or re- leased from service for other duties provided the service Ministry concerned does not require their retention in the Armed Forces.

CIVILIANS LIVING OR INTERNED OUTSIDE ITALY.

10. The DISPLACED PERSONS AND REPATRIATION SUB-COMMISSION will be responsible for the handling of all applications for the repatria- tion of civilians and groups of civilians living or interned out- side ITALY.

by the Service Ministry concerned to the appropriate service Sub-Commission. The requests will give full particulars of the personnel required and their proposed employment in the Armed Forces. After approval by the service Sub-Commission concerned the requests will be returned to the service Ministry for submission to the Italian High Commissioner for Prisoners of War. Prisoners of War will not be absorbed into the Armed Forces in ITALY by any other means.

8. The Italian High Commissioner for Prisoners of War will check and collate all applications and requests made to him and will forward them to War Materials Disposal and Italian Prisoners of War Sub-Commission which will, if it approves, make formal application to higher authority.

9. In all cases under the above conditions repatriated Italian Prisoners of War of military age will only be demobilized or released from service for other duties provided the service Ministry concerned does not require their retention in the Armed Forces.

CIVILIANS LIVING OR INTERNED OUTSIDE ITALY.

10. The DISPLACED PERSONS AND REPATRIATION SUB-COMMISSION will be responsible for the handling of all applications for the repatriation of civilians and groups of civilians living or interned outside ITALY.

11. The following are the conditions on which applications may be made for repatriation of civilians to ITALY.

(a) Compassionate cases.

Cases where civilians are required to return to ITALY to take care of a family who have no other means of support. All cases on compassionate grounds will however be considered on their merits.

(b) Priority workers.

Cases where civilians are necessary to the war effort and will be a direct contribution thereto.

12. All requests from Sub-Commissions or Regional Commissioners for repatriation of civilians or groups of civilians under para 11 (a) and (b) will be forwarded direct to DISPLACED PERSONS AND REPATRIATION SUB-COMMISSION who will be responsible for screening all applications and approving them prior to forwarding them to higher authority. Directors of Sub-Commissions and Regional Commissioners will be responsible for insuring that the applications they submit are warranted by the circumstances and facts put before them. In applications under 11 (b) the civilian for whom the application is made must be qualified to hold the appointment for which he is asked and will fill the appointment after repatriation.

Subject: Review of Civilian Internees

To : Distribution below.

1. Frequent applications for the review of Civilian Internee cases are received through Security Division, this Headquarters.
2. Civilians who have been detained for security reasons, will, normally, be interned for the duration. Cases are periodically reviewed and decision as to further internment or release is based on the individual merits of the case, its continued seriousness, and, of course, the health of the internees.
3. It is neither feasible nor practicable to indicate the possibility of the release of any internee without a full review of the case. However, cases can be reviewed specially only when there is a preponderance of evidence to indicate a great miscarriage of justice. Giving special consideration to any one individual without additional justifiable evidence would entail a loss of time prejudicial to the best interests of other cases already scheduled for review on their merits.
4. However, all applications for release of internees are forwarded to the appropriate internment camp where they become part of the internee's dossier and are given appropriate consideration when the case is reviewed.
5. The amount of correspondence required to deal with this problem makes it impossible to reply to individual cases; therefore, recipients of appeals should inform the appellants that their appeal has been forwarded to the appropriate authority for consideration and that reminders and further communications will not be supplied to. Recipients should forward the papers

War Materials Disposal and Italian Prisoners of War Sub-Commission

1. General Orders No. 26, copy attached, adds "Italian Prisoners of War" to the title and duties of your Sub-Commission.
2. The additional duties of your Sub-Commission will include:
 - a. All questions on Italian PW to be channeled through the Sub-Commission
 - b. Liaison with High Commissioner for Prisoners of War.
 - c. Co-ordinate requests for release of special PW required for Italian Armed Forces or Civil Administration in the Italian Government with High Commissioner for Prisoners of War and forward to higher authority.
 - d. Clarify and co-ordinate all political matters affecting Italian Prisoners of War with Political Section. Action where necessary to be taken by Sub-Commission. (Questions on policy and matters on which instructions and directives are necessary only to be submitted to the Chief Commissioner).
 - e. Prosecute outstanding Italian Prisoners of War questions where necessary until finalized.

1. Lt Col Campbell has arranged with Col Cripps as follows:
2. A request is being sent to AF HQ for the release of 200 POWs.
3. It is intended that POWs so released shall be re-absorbed into their previous occupations.
4. These include Local Government Administration, Health services, Banking, Public Safety, Food distribution and a host of other State and kindred institutions - all concerned with the national organization.
5. The intention (or hope) is that successive applications - each for 200 approximately, will be made in course of time.
6. Col Campbell will notify this Sub-Commission of any developments affecting it.
7. He states that official approval has been given to the principle of the release of the above class of POW.

- 1 It is requested that steps be taken to inform RC's and Sub-Coms forthwith that Exec Memo 31 is cancelled.
 - a Its policy is inconsistent with the direct instructions of the DCC.
 - b Its procedure is inconsistent with the procedure agreed between Econ and Admin Sections which was forwarded to you for publication on 15 Apr.
 - c It will cause confusion.
- 2 The matter is one of some urgency as this Section has at the present moment 40 applications from one Region alone.
- 3 Immediate publication of the instruction sent to you on the 15 Apr is not requested as a recently received letter from HQ AAI necessitates certain minor amendments being made. This matter is now the subject of further co-ordination with Sub-Commissions and will be put before DCC at an early date.

1. Reference your letters 29 March 4/4/42, 12 April w/4/208, and 15 April w/4/38b, the position is as follows:

2. ACC orders provide that "prisoners of war will be released most exceptionally on request and then only if their services are necessary for the furtherance of the war effort".

3. Accordingly, the applications for Rubinetti and Caputo cannot be entertained.

4. The provisions of AIC Daily Bulletin 13 Jan 1944, para 1, are cancelled.

5. With regard to Di Giura, if you are of opinion that his case is covered by 2, above, and desire the application to be considered on those grounds, the procedure to be adopted is for you to convey the facts to the Agriculture sub-Commission together with a certificate by you to effect that the prisoner's release is necessary to the furtherance of the war efforts. If the sub-Commission is satisfied, it is for them to make the request for release to the Deputy Chief Commissioner, who if himself satisfied, will take the necessary steps with a view to a formal application being made to the C.G. of the Army by which the prisoner is held.

6. One of the points in this case is as to whether the mill in question cannot be operated by another person.

7. The papers in each case are returned.

PROCEDURE FOR RECOMMENDATION OFRELEASE OF PRISONERS OF WAR

- 1 Prisoners of War will be released most exceptionally on request and then only if their services are necessary for the furtherance of the War effort.
- 2 The authority for initiating a request for the release of a prisoner will be the Sub Commission responsible for the class of work which the prisoner is particularly suited to do.
- 3 On being satisfied that the services of a prisoner are necessary the Sub Commission will forward their request together with a short statement of the reasons for their decision to the Deputy Chief Commissioner.
- 4 The papers relating to prisoners to whom the request for release is approved by the DCC, will be submitted by him to the Public Safety Sub Commission who will investigate and report on the prisoner's local reputation and party history, returning the papers with their report to the initiating Sub Commission.
- 5 If this report is that the prisoner is suitable for repatriation the initiating Sub Commission will prepare the formal request for release of the prisoner for signature by the DCC.
- 6 The formal request will be addressed to the G.O. the Army by whom the prisoner is held and will contain:
 - a. such particulars of the prisoner and his location as will enable him to be identified.
 - b. The capacity in which it is proposed that he shall be employed and a short summary of the reasons that his services are required.
 - c. A statement that his services are necessary for the furtherance of the War effort.
 - d. A statement that his local reputation and party history have been investigated and are satisfactory.
 - e. A request that he be released.
- 7 Any application for release of a prisoner which originates outside HQ, AOC will be forwarded to the appropriate Sub Commission who, if satisfied that the prisoner's services are necessary, will deal with it as above.

- 3 When an application is received the views of the Sub Comm responsible for the class of work which the prisoner is capable of doing decides whether or not his services are required.
- 4 The decision as to whether or not a release will be made in accordance with the recommendation is the function of the Army Commander holding the prisoner.
- 5 No precise ruling has been given as to who shall be responsible for co-ordinating the recommendations of Sub Comms and for forwarding the request to the Army.
- 6 There has been an interim decision that Interior should handle this as at that time they were interested in the release of some local government officers, but they do not seem the logical body to deal with the general question.
- 7 It would seem that before any recommendation is forwarded it would be desirable that some enquiry should be made as to the man's local reputation and party history. If so, the papers in every case should be sent to Public Safety who would thus probably become the most convenient co-ordinating and forwarding authority as all applications will channel to them.
- 8 The procedure would then be that applications would be submitted to the "using" Sub Comms to say whether or not a prisoners services are required, the papers would then be forwarded to Public Safety to certify that the mans background has been investigated and is satisfactory and his release is requested. Public Safety would then forward the request to the appropriate Army authority. (All correspondence being conducted on the file of the originating Sub Comm).
- 9 May a decision as to the procedure to be followed be made please and circulated to all concerned.

SUBJECT: Whereabouts Enquiries

TO : RC and MG SECTION, HQ. ACC APO 394

1. In my view, the best and most convenient instruction which can be issued with regard to the ^{making} writing of enquiries about Italian Nationals is that enquiries respecting

(a) Italian CIVILIANS believed to be located in Allied controlled territory should be addressed to the Public Safety Sub-Commission here, and

(b) that ALL other enquiries should be addressed to the RC and MG Section.

2. If this is done the enquiries which may be addressed to you are,

(a) in respect of Italians located in enemy controlled areas (which may be passed to the International Red Cross) or

(b) in respect of members of the Italian Forces either serving or POW's. (which may be passed to the Military Section)

3. Where a question of release of a POW arises because his services are required I think that the Sub-Commission requiring his services should have the handling of the question of release. (For example, the case of a local Government official should be dealt with by the Interior Sub-Commission; the case of a member of the judiciary by the Legal Sub-Commission and similarly for other technical experts).
