2. Plan of Operation.

This mission is divided into two principal parts, the first part deals with general matters of organization and planning; the second part summarizes the plans of the several Sub-Committees in the Economic Section with respect to the Italian economy. It is anticipated that the plans of certain Sub-Committees will be detailed and exact. For example, the Economic Section of the population is planned by the Joint Staff Commission in organizational detail, while it is difficult for the Special Forces and the Sub-Committee to state even a priority of operations in all preliminary surveys may be made of the state of public utilities in the area.

PART I - ORGANIZATION

3. Experienced teams of officers have been or will soon be assigned to each Sub-Committee to coordinate operations in Northwest Italy from the liberation of part or all of this area. These officers, who will be working in forward areas, will be alerted to move on twenty-four hours' notice into the liberated areas. They will eventually set up headquarters in the vicinity of the various towns offered in Regional and Provincial Headquarters. Each officer will handle principally matters pertaining to his own assignment, but will, of course, work in cooperation with all teams of other Sub-Committees whose work is closely related.

4. In general, these missions will have the following duties in their respective fields.

- a) Acquire Regional and Provincial Headquarters, and all other in the area and establish a working relationship.
- b) Advise the administration and reactivation of Italian Government agencies to all levels, and in advising the local authorities to the Italian Government, Italian agencies and the Italian Armed Forces.
- c) Determine or aid in determining supply requirements and other economic needs and facilitate distribution of available supplies.
- d) Work with the Security group in regard to the political situation of Italian officials for positions having to do with economic affairs.
- e) Assist in determining needs and supplies of restricted materials, and develop means for controlling materials. (This information is forwarded to the AD Headquarters for action through the Local Resources Board machinery.)

- a) Get answers, through the Provincial Commissioners to the questions on the following items:

- a) Make recommendations for rules based on answers to these questions.

14. Forestry. Agricultural officers will:

- d) Get recommendations for a plan based on answers to these questionnaires.

14. Forestry. Agrarian forest officers will:

- a) Obtain a list of all members of Royal Forest Corps on duty and submit it to the Headquarters with recommendations for any changes.
- b) Assign duties based on the Royal Forest Corps Group Commands (Provincial and Region Commands).
- c) Inspect Provincial (Group) commands of Royal Forest Corps to:
 - (i) Obtain statistics on acreage of different and located on land.
 - (ii) Prepare a five-year "Production and Distribution Plan for Forests and Timber."
- d) Obtain from Agrarian Forest Commission under monthly requirements for fuelwood and timber and submit figures to Provincial Royal Forest Corps for inclusion in six months plan for production.
- e) Instruct Provincial Forest Co. to:
 - (i) Obtain information requested to similar questionnaires mentioned in Unit 11.

QUESTIONS

15. No specialist staffs from AF Headquarters are contemplated. Civilian specialists will be employed.

16. Commerce officials will:

- a) Receive and distribute among the provinces consumer goods, such as textiles, clothing, shoes, etc., including goods produced locally.
 - b) Administer Provincial Supply Offices in the making of inventories and in allocation of non-food material; which are controlled by the Allied Forces Local Resources Board or by the Italian Government.
 - c) Keep an inventory of goods and material in short supply under supervision by inventories, receiving or disposing, and release, thereby preventing hoarding, speculation, or concentration of goods, and in making available the commodities to the needy. A list is attached showing the commodities on (i) an exclusive controlled list, (ii) the restricted list, and (iii) the list of materials under the control of the Italian Government only.
 - d) Receive requests for control of materials from Provincial Supply Offices. Collect the same and submit to specifications, quantities, and quality. Transmit to the Inter-Allied Board for presentation to the Inter-Allied Board of the Allied Forces Local Resources Board.
 - e) Develop, control or select outlets for goods that may get into black market operations.
 - f) Administer monopoly distribution of matches, tobacco, etc., in their operations.
 - g) Administer and control non-essential commodities of non-essential goods which include oil, fuel, etc.
 - h) Facilitate transportation, movement, and handling of goods for export, as directed by Provincial Trade Section, Commerce Sub-Committee.
17. Commerce officials will also have a possible work out a planning program for their region or area, along the following lines:
- a) Confer with Provincial Offices, Allied Provincial del Commercio, or Industries and the Commerce and Commerce, Industry, and Agriculture, to determine needs, resources, and means of distribution of materials.
 - b) Determine and recommend to consumers goods, non-essential materials, to supply administrative needs.

- a) The emergency phase of an industrial program is dictated by the immediate civil needs for food, clothing and shelter. The following industries are of first priority:

Food processing
Textile industry
Building materials (brick, plaster, asbestos,
tile, glass, cement, etc.)

With the cessation of hostilities and, of course, the fuel and power requirements of these industries are relatively small, and they have the advantage of fairly high labor requirements.

- b) Power production in Northwest Italy is 30% hydroelectric. Many industries will be heavily dependent on the resumption of power production. It will be essential to plan for the reactivation of plants which can furnish materials necessary to aid the Public Works and Civil Engineering in their task of repairing the damage wrought by German air attacks.

- c) The steel industrial program of first importance to transportation, repair and construction, and the transfer of high priority, but are dependent on power and import steel. Consequently, this reactivation must be done. A factory has been established to foster the production of steel wire and assembling necessary for repair to existing machinery and transport, rather than the manufacture of complete new units.

19. An Industrial Coordination Committee has been set up under the ARUP, primarily to control the utilization of industrial plants in the North of Italy. Its formation is considered to achieve a more orderly allocation of factories, their output and the materials they require. The procedure for industrial coordination in forward areas will be illustrated as soon as it has been adopted by the Committee.

20. Labor officers will take over existing civilian labor employment offices and establish new ones as required to supply labor for:

- a) The Armed Forces
b) Local direct-use work
c) Private industry

23. Railways.

26. Civilian Road Transport.

All regular civilian organizations and military transport officers have been furnished with a directive, covering on the organizing civilian road transport in any form. This was issued in organized under the RAC Plan, which has been thoroughly studied by the Regional Transport Officers. The RAC Plan is a memorandum of the Ministry of Communications and organizations of national bodies in civilian road transport and agencies established by the AG/AM. It is in the belief that the civilian trucks will be necessary to carry food and supplies within the liberated Northwest Italy and in the vehicles above mentioned in requisitioning.
