SUBJECT: Evasion of Censorship in Italy.

TO : G-2 (Communications Censorship), AFHQ, APO 513.

There are strong indications that evasion of censorship is on the increase throughout Italy. During the eight weeks ended Saturday, 1st April there were over 750 comment sheets on this subject, and whereas they were coming in at the rate of two or three a day during the early part of the period, the rate increased three-fold during the later stages.

The great bulk of the evasions were through the means of intermediaries. Apart from letters being carried throughout Italy generally, many letters pass between Italy and other countries. During the period under review, for example, the following places have figured in the comment sheets: Argentina, Spain, Switzerland, Bulgaria, Casablanca, Egypt, Albania, Sweden, England and German occupied Italy. Legations and couriers have proved to be useful channels for correspondence.

Censorship has disclosed the following practices:
 Letters are sent to German occupied Italy via Switzerland.
 Letters coming from Switzerland are often posted in Rome, and so pass through our hands. The Italian Embassy in Ankara has been used to forward mail to Bulgaria. Commercial correspondence from Italy to Sweden has been forwarded through the Swedish Legation in Rome. It is stated that Allied aircraft carry letters to and from Albania. Couriers carry letters between liberated and German occupied Italy. Travellers from Egypt bring letters into the country, and the same thing applies to other places in North Africa.

Vatican mail channels have been used as a means of transmission. Other letters revealed that various individuals connected with the Vatican were used as intermediaries. Vatican couriers to the North of Italy and to Switzerland are regarded as **476** safe carriers of letters.

Individuals crossing the front lines frequently carry letters with them. Such letters coming south are often posted in

Rome or Florence and so pass through our hands. These letters also disclose that other letters have been delivered by hand. This type of traffic is increasing.

Both Allied and Italian military personnel have been involved in illicit mail practices. Italian civilians, when writing to Italian soldiers, sometimes enclose other letters to be handed by the soldiers to civilians in their locality. Civilians also send letters to soldiers, and vice versa, for delivery to the addressee. Sailors are occasionally used as intermediaries in forwarding packages from the U.S.A. It was also discovered that a French chaplain was being used as an intermediary. Occasionally Italian civilians write direct to Allied soldiers. There were 37 cases of the use of the Italian civilian post by soldiers, of which four were Americans and the remainder Italians.

The following extracts illustrate various types of censorship evasion:

"I received your kind note. Thank you so much for the package you brought for me from Madrid. I shall send someone to your house with a note of such a kind that you can not be worried about handing over the package to her." (21/1/45 - Rome, No. 11543)

"Yesterday, I received your letter dated 26/2/45 and I hasten to send you a copy, made by Ciccarelli, of the mail which arrived for you. There are six postcards and one letter. As I think the latter is very important, I write clearly for you the sender's address: Lot. M.L. Ital. Vittorio Veneto (Zwick) Switzerland...."

On the enclosed sheet were copied the text of six postcards coming from occupied Italy. An extract from the letter reads: "I received here in Switzerland, where I am interned, news from German occupied Italy. Since I have the opportunity of acting as an intermediary between you and Mr. Fusco, in case you want me to, you may send me your news which I will forward to him as soon as possible." (20/3/45 - Rome, No. 11171)

"You can write to me, addressing the envelope in the following way: Franklin Mariano, Laganone 0'115/11, Sofia. Have this envelope put in another one addressed to P. Ambasciate di Italia, Anzara, Turcchia." (20/2/45 - Rome, No. 10926)

"I sent you a few lines through Tino's brother-in-law who was going to Spain. I also gave some other letters to Feder's brother and some small parcels for Giovanni, but I

don't know whether they have all been delivered. I also asked you to inform Gimmi's family that both she and little Marie Teresh are well. Should you be able to have some news, for example through Antonia's aunt, you ought to go to see her and tell her to be so kind as to send your letter to Berre, through the courier, addressed to me. From there it will be forwarded to Geneva." (2/3/45 - Rome, No. 10025)

"I talked to Sandra who, having come from Foggia to Terri, was able to inform me that all the letters sent to you by means of aunt Elena, which in their turn were consigned to a courier plying between Rome and Florence, were delivered by hand to Signor Gunesi, your commercial traveller in materials." (24/2/45 - Rome, No. 11681)

"I am writing you a second letter through the same channels. If you are in time to reply, seal up a short message in a double envelope. Address the outside envelope to 5th Army American Command, and the inside envelope to Capitano Zerbato, Commander 5th Mountain Battalion, Pistoia Brigade. I warn you that the message must be brief. Ask the 5th Army Command to do their best to deliver the message. Above all I beg you to keep my address a secret." (16/3/45 - Foggia, No. 11846)

"At last I can let you have no news. I enclose this letter in Cardinal Schuster's pouch." (4/4/45 - Rome, No. 11683)

I have just received a letter from your daughter and son-in-law in Tuscan fires, sent to me in the hope that I could forward it to you with greater safety. In the meantime, Mr. D'Amico, I beg you to answer your daughter's letter as soon as you receive this, addressing the letter to me - Silla Fiori, via Acciara 64, Rome, and I will forward it by a quick and safe way."

Second note: The envelope contained a letter forwarded from Tuscan fires. (9/4/45) - Rome, No. 11855

A letter forwarded to a civilian through a front line soldier: "Dear Sirs of Selvelli, thank you for forwarding to me my dear wife's letter. I apologize for the trouble I am causing you by asking you the favour of forwarding this letter of mine." (2/4/45 - Roma, No. 11705)

A letter similar to the above, "though I do not have the pleasure of being personally acquainted with you, I thank you for the favour you are doing me, and I apologize for the trouble I am giving you, but it is better so, as Pasolini says,

1. I refer to your letter SIEN/84/FJP requesting information on the value of censorship intercepts to this Sub-Commission.

2. I am definitely of the opinion that these intercepts serve a useful purpose in helping us to form an over all picture of the Local Government set up. They have also been useful on occasion in giving us advance information about complaints which eventually reached us through official channels some weeks later, thus enabling us to have the matter investigated beforehand and putting us in a position to answer promptly.
