SUBJECT: Wearing of Shoulder Insignia.

4 - MAY 1945
RPT

TO : All Units this Regiment.

1. All members of the 2675th Regiment, Allied Commission (Ovhd), will wear the "AF" shoulder insignia on the left shoulder sleeve.

2. Such personnel who have served in an active Theater of Operations, with one or more combat units, may wear (but it is not required), the shoulder insignia of that unit on the right shoulder sleeve, in the same relative position as that prescribed for the left shoulder sleeve.

3. Individuals may select the particular combat unit shoulder sleeve insignia they desire to wear, from those organizations to which they were assigned in an active Theater of Operations. Under no circumstances will more than one such insignia be worn on the right sleeve at a time.

Accounting for Authorized Allowances of Equipment Upon Change
of Station I
Rescission of Circulars III. ACCOUNTING FOR AUTHORIZED ALLOWANCES OF EQUIPMENT UPON CHANGE OF
STATION.

1. Officers and enlisted men transferred from one company to another, this regiment, will take with them one (1) Cot, canvas, folding, and authorized allowances of individual small arms and equipment.

a. In order to account for the transfer, a Shipping Ticket listing the abovementioned items will be prepared in triplicate by the (old) unit commander from which the individual is transferred, and forwarded with attached Memorandum Receipt through this headquarters to the (new) commanding officer of the unit to which the individual is transferred.

b. Copies of the Shipping Ticket will be distributed as follows:

- (1) The new commanding officer will retain the Memorandum Receipt and the third copy of the Shipping Ticket as a debit voucher to his Company Property Book. He will sign the (2) copies of the Shipping Ticket and return them through channels to the old commanding officer.
- (2) Regimental Supply Office will withdraw the duplicate signed copy of the Shipping Ticket as an information copy.
- (3) Regimental Supply Office will indorse the original copy of the Shipping Ticket on to the old commanding officer who will use it as a credit voucher to his Company Property Book.

2. Units having excess stocks of cots and individual small arms will turn in the excess amounts to Regimental Supply by normal procedure.

3. Units receiving personnel who do not have in their possession the above items, will notify this headquarters by requisition using strength of unit as a basis.

4. Cots are organizational property and will not be transferred from 2675th Regiment to another unit. Transfer of individual equipment outside the Mediterranean Theater of Operations will only be made in accordance with current regulations.

SUBJECT: Limitation upon Forfeitures by Sentence of Court-Martial.

TO : See Distribution.

1. Following is an extract from War Department Circular 484, 29 December 1944:

"III -- Foreign Service.-- 1. With reference to Section 2, Act 16 June 1942 (56 Stat. 360; 37 U.S.C. 102; M.L. 1939, Sup II, Sec. 1371c-2), relative to pay for foreign service, an extract of an opinion of the Judge Advocate General, 25 November 1944, is quoted below:

"It is the opinion of this office that * * * a soldier is not entitled to foreign service pay for any period during which he is confined pursuant to a sentence adjudging confinement * * * While the increase in pay of an enlisted man for foreign service is included within the term "base pay" as used in the fourth subparagraph of paragraph 104c, Manual for Courts-Martial, 1928, * * * the amount of pay which may be forfeited by courts-martial is governed by the actual pay status of the accused at the time the forfeiture is imposed * * *. Accordingly, * * * in determining the maximum limits of forfeiture prescribed by paragraph 104, Manual for Courts-Martial, 1928, in cases in which the sentence of a court-martial adjudges confinement and partial forfeitures, foreign service pay may not properly be considered as an element of pay subject to forfeiture * * *"

"2. Section II, Circular No. 437, War Department, 1944, pertaining to the foregoing subject is rescinded."

2. The information contained in this extract should be brought to the attention of all special courts-martial and summary court officers for their guidance as to the amount of forfeiture to be imposed in cases where confinement is adjudged.

1. It has come to the attention of the Regimental Commander that numerous persons are violating the prescribed uniform regulations for members of the 2675th Regiment, Allied Control Commission, (Overhead).

2. The following points of proper uniform are again stressed, and the enforcement of same is desired of all Sub-Commission and Division heads.

- a. Neckties will be worn at all times.
- b. Sweaters will not be worn as an outer garment. (This means that when a sweater is worn under the Blouse or Field Jacket that if the Blouse or Field Jacket is removed, the sweater will also be removed.)
- c. Blouses or Field Jackets will be properly buttoned at all times.
- d. The cotton shirt is prescribed for wear with the Blouse only, and under no circumstances will a cotton shirt be worn with any other combination of the wool uniform.

Subject: Persons Subject to Military Law.

To : All Unit Commanders, Peninsular Base Section.

1. Under article of War 2, "All persons accompanying or serving with the Armies of the United States in the field" are subject to military law and may be tried by court-martial.

2. Under international law, when enemy territory is occupied by an invading power, it is the duty of the invading power to establish and maintain a government for the control and protection of the civilian population. The native civil population is subject to military law, but it is customarily tried not by courts-martial but by provost courts or military tribunals set up and operated by the invading powers.

3. In Italy, therefore, not only the military forces, but all persons accompanying or serving with the armies of the United States will be tried by court-martial for offenses properly brought before such courts. This will include military personnel, U.S.C. and Red Cross personnel, merchant seamen, base-land personnel, and all others serving directly with or under the armies in the field, but will exclude naval, coast-guard, and diplomatic personnel of the United States.

4. Native inhabitants, whether citizens of Italy or citizens of other countries, will be tried for their offenses by the courts established by Allied Military Government, which is the agency established by the invading powers for the government and control of the occupied territory. All offenses committed by native inhabitants will be vigorously prosecuted, and unit commanders are directed to lend every reasonable assistance to the Allied Military Government in the apprehension, prosecution and confinement of such offenders.

5. The foregoing will be brought to the attention of all military personnel of this command and all civilians who are in the IBC territory.

1. It has come to the notice of the Chief Commissioner that Italian authorities have been offering honorary academic degrees and honorary ranks to Allied Officers in the A.C.C.

2. Allied Officers will discourage such offers. Acceptance of them is forbidden just as is acceptance of gifts or other tokens from Italians. The reason must be obvious to all.

3. For the same reason the formation of mixed Allied-Italian Social clubs is forbidden.

MEMORANDUM

TO : All Chiefs of Sections and Commanding Officers of all
Units.

1. There have been brought to my attention several instances of an improper attitude on the part of individuals of the Allied forces toward the Italian civilian population, Civil Police and military units. The following cases are examples:

- a. On November 24 American soldiers removed by force the hat of an Italian officer and drove away in a truck.
- b. On November 26 a similar incident occurred.
- c. On November 23 Allied soldiers fired pistol shots at an Italian officer in the vicinity of the Naples Railway Station.
- d. On November 29 four American soldiers took by force money and official papers from an Italian corporal.
- e. On November 26 an American officer illegally "Requisitioned" a vehicle belonging to the 10th Automotive Regiment.
- f. On numerous occasions individuals have illegally taken arms and equipment from the Civil Police and from Italian military personnel.
- g. On numerous occasions individuals have illegally taken away and converted to their own use items displayed for sale in stores.
- h. On numerous occasions drivers of Allied trucks have failed to obey the legal orders of the Civil Police in directing traffic.

2. These incidents are indicative of a lawless attitude on the part of military personnel which must cease. They bring discredit on the Allied cause and retard the Allied effort.

3. The Commander-in-Chief has stated that the Italians will be treated as co-belligerents. They are fighting for the same cause as the Allies, and their troops and the Civil Police are affording considerable help to the Allied forces in the maintenance of law and order. The command of Italian troops rests with their local commanders. General Antonio Basso has been designated to command all Italian troops in Campania. Operational control is vested in the Allied Headquarters to which the Italian troops are attached.

4. Looting and the unauthorized conversion of private property to the personal use of any individual are violations of the Articles of War and are punishable by the most severe sentences. Such acts are likewise contemptible and beneath the dignity of an Allied soldier.

5. I look to Unit Commanders to take the necessary steps to prevent recurrences of incidents such as those cited above and to insure that members of their commands conduct themselves in a manner to bring credit rather than discredit to the Allied cause.

"V - RETENTION OF CAPTURED MATERIAL. TROOPS BY MILITARY PERSONNEL

Reference War Department Memorandum Number W570-7-43, 22 July 1943, which was reissued and given distribution "2" on 16 August 1943, the following instructions will govern the retention of captured material trophies by military personnel in this theater:

- 1 -

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4. Military personnel are not permitted to retain, ship, mail, sell or give away any of the following:

Amalgams or Bullets Instruments or Control
 Sights
 Empty Hoses or Copper Shells (weighing more than two pounds)
 Explosives
 Fire Control Instruments and accessories
 Mine Mines removed from captured equipment
 Optical Instruments and accessories
 Firearms

Articles whose combined length and girth is more than five feet,
 or of a weight in excess of twenty pounds.

For the convenience of Officers of this Headquarters, O-1 will receive receipt and make the proper delivery to the Ordnance Depot.
