1. Reference is made to letter 11 Sept. 1945 to Economic Section attn. Brigadier D. L. Anderson; also to LOC 303, 13 Sept. 1945 to LOC AIRGRAM 77 Appendix B; also to LOC AIRGRAM 111, 14 Sept. 1945.

2. Attached is the second and concluding set of recommendations for changes in the 1945 Import Program referred above. These changes include deletions, addition of new items, replacements and additional specifications as required.

3. Again all information was obtained from the various Comitato, approved by the Central Comitato in Milan and by Prof. Saccareno in Milan.

4. Approval of Ministry in Rome has been obtained.
"C.I.R. concurs" *Stm.*

5. In particular, attention is called to a complete revision of Section C, animal and vegetable oils and oil seeds, of this Program in the light of present needs. Consequently this section has been eliminated as section C. and the new oil program for these items is set up as a new and additional section Q. It is noted that although this section has been changed quite radically in its elements, the total new requirements in tonnage is smaller than the previous section C.

6. Items which are now required as additions to this Program have been placed under section P, miscellaneous. Two such items were added in LOC AIRGRAM 111 reference above and were given the numbers P-65 and P-66. The present recommendation adds items P-67 through P-80.

SUBJECT: Plan for the Control of the Manufacture and Sale of Industrial Products of Northern Italy.

TO : addressees below.

1. The Plan for the Control of the Manufacture and Sale of Industrial Products of Northern Italy attached hereto and made a part hereof is transmitted for the information and guidance of all concerned. It will be implemented at once.

2. This plan was developed by the industry of northern Italy to provide through cooperation and self-discipline a means for re-establishing an orderly economy subsequent to the impact of liberation. The Italian government has approved the plan and will participate therein through its established AC/AG contact for that part which pertains to territory still under Allied Military Government. The presence of members of the Italian Government on the North Italy Industrial Council and the North Italy Industrial Price Fixing Board assure the fact that the government is always informed.

3. Since the plan affects primarily the industry of northern Italy, with the seat of control at Milan, the plan must be implemented under the full authority of Allied Military Government. The plan embraces the entire north with the exception of Venezia Giulia and must be administered uniformly without regard to regional boundaries with the exception above noted. Therefore, the plan will be administered by the Allied Commission through its forward office in Milan. Regional Commissioners will be called upon extensively for advice and cooperation, and for local administration.

4. A forward office of the Industry Sub-Commission, ^{also} the Commission, will be established 10 July 1945 at the Milan office of the Allied Commission, 7 Via Appiani, Milan. This office will effect the necessary organization in the North to implement this plan. A forward office of the Commerce Sub-Commission, Allied Commission, will be established at the same location within the near future.

Industrial Committees.

5. The organization of the committees listed in the plan will be completed without delay. As the occasion may demand, committees covering additional fields of industrial endeavor may become necessary. The proposed organization and plan of operations of such new committees must be transmitted to the Allied Commission for approval and inclusion in this order by appropriate amendment.

6. Each committee listed in paragraph 3 a. of the Plan will submit its organization, membership and list of officers, together with its detailed plan of operations, through the North Italy Industrial Council to the Allied Commission for approval. The Council will examine all plans and cause their modification and revision to fit the plan.

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5. The organization of the committees listed in the plan will be completed without delay. As the occasion may demand, committees covering additional fields of industrial endeavor may become necessary. The proposed organization and plan of operations of such new committees must be transmitted to the Allied Commission for approval and inclusion in this order by appropriate amendment.
6. Each committee listed in paragraph 3 a. of the Plan will submit its organization, membership and list of officers, together with its detailed plan of operations, through the North Italy Industrial Council to the Allied Commission for approval. The Council will examine all plans and cause their modification and revision to fit the limitations of such general factors as coal, power and transportation availabilities, etc.; will secure the Plan's approval by the North Italy Industrial Price Fixing Board if price fixing is involved; and will present the plans to the Allied Commission. The Allied Commission will screen the plans for conflicts with existing plans for all of Italy and for coordination with the import program and will suggest necessary modifications, before giving final approval.

7. Once the committee organization and plan of an industry group has been approved, this approved plan will form the basis upon which the industry will operate freely with its own management and without interference by SC/MAG except when absolutely necessary. Emphasis must be placed upon permitting Italian industry and commerce to proceed under its own management and to provide for the enforcement of its own self-imposed restrictions.

North Italy Industrial Council.

8. The president of the North Italy Industrial Council will be appointed by the Italian Government. Each regional Commissioner will transmit promptly to the Milan office of A. C. his designation for member of the Council as provided in paragraph 3 b. of the Basic Plan. At the same time Regional Commissioners may transmit suggestions for the selection of the labor member of the Council.

9. In its operations the Council should be permitted full exercise of its powers provided in paragraph 3 b. (1), with only the minimum necessary limitation thereof through the overall AIG control provided in paragraph 3 b. (4) of the Basic Plan.

North Italy Industrial Price Fixing Board.

10. The president of the North Italy Industrial Price Fixing Board will be appointed by the Italian Government. Each regional Commissioner will transmit promptly to the Milan office of A. C. a list of nominations of residents of his region engaged in the fields of endeavor specified in paragraph 3 c. of the Basic Plan. From the lists of nominations the members of the Board will be selected to give the coverage by callings and by regions provided in the Basic Plan.

Distribution.

11. The planned distribution of existing frozen stocks of consumer goods must progress rapidly. Therefore, distribution plans must be approved and placed into operation at the earliest practicable date. Distribution plans for consumer goods must not be delayed pending submission and approval of more elaborate and time consuming production plans.

12. In those cases where necessary interim action has caused the creation of regional industrial committees or organizations which now become in conflict with this overall plan, every effort will be expended to effect the harmonious transition of the local organization into the appropriate industrial committee created by this order. Failing this, local conflicting groups must be disbanded in furtherance of the subject plan.

13. General Order No. 41, Allied Military Government, is modified insofar as it is in conflict with the provisions of this order.

PLAN FOR THE CONTROL OF THE MANUFACTURE AND SALE OF INDUSTRIAL PRODUCTS
OF NORTHERN ITALY

1. It is essential that a uniform plan be put into effect in all the regions of northern Italy which are under the jurisdiction of Allied Military Government, with the exception of the Venezia Giulia region.
2. In collaboration with the appropriate ministries of the Italian Government, the Allied Commission has approved the plan which is set forth below. This plan will be effectuated under the supervision and direction of the Allied Military Government and of the Allied High Commission in Rome. The Italian Government will participate in the plan by following the regular channels of administration through the Allied Commission. The plan has been prepared with a view to an early withdrawal of Allied Military Government and the consequent transfer of the territory to the Italian Government.
3. The plan is as follows:

- (2) To control the nature of the products to be produced and the level of production to be performed by the several plants within the industry.

- (4) To recommend the allocation of: raw materials, obtained either by importation or from local resources; equipment, tools and operating supplies necessary to carry out a scheduled production.

 - (2) To establish, if deemed necessary, advisory committees, either on a regional or other basis.
- d. The North Italy Industrial Council will determine what goods are available for distribution to the consuming public (1) for the provinces under the jurisdiction of the Italian Government, and (2) for the provinces in Northern Italy under the jurisdiction of the Allied Military Government.

The distribution of the consumer goods which are to be regulated will be made in Northern Italy as follows:

The Industrial Council will allocate the amounts to each province. The Chamber of Commerce of each province in consultation with the Camera del Lavoro of the province will determine the method of distribution within the province and the retail prices.

The distribution of goods among the provinces under the jurisdiction of the Italian Government will be assumed by the Italian Government.

4. All products may be moved freely from one part of Italy to another with two exceptions: (1) the limited number of items retained under control by Allied Military Government (including Allied Forces Local resources board controlled and restricted items and those materials controlled by the Italian Government) and (2) ¹⁰⁰ those which are brought under regulation and control by the North Italy Industrial Council.

USE OF COMMERCIAL FACILITIES FOR CIVIL
REQUIREMENTS

1. It is the responsibility of the Supreme Allied Commander to provide for the civil population of liberated territory that which is necessary to prevent disease and unrest. It is his policy to make the maximum use of local resources in providing for the essential civilian requirements.
2. The duty of all ranks of the Armed Forces in the discharge of the Supreme Allied Commander's responsibility to the civil population should be constantly present in their minds. All ranks must, even in the stress of active operations, remind themselves that whenever it is possible to achieve a military object by a choice of means otherwise equal, the method which damages least the essential needs of the civil economy is the method to be preferred and adopted. Care must be taken by the responsible commander that, except in definite emergencies, he neither occupies a premise that is essential to the civil economy nor dismantles, nor removes by purchase or requisition, the equipment therein. Except to prevent combat damage or destruction, or to meet the immediate operational needs, raw materials essential to civil economy will not be purchased, requisitioned or removed except by the procedures set forth in Section III, AFHQ Administrative Memorandum No. 46, 1944.
3. a. In the detailed planning for the occupation of an area, the military authority responsible for such planning and the Allied Commission, will consult as to the anticipated military and civil requirements in that area affecting local resources. The military authority will elaborate his plan so far as practicable to include any proposals agreed as the result of such consultation. Any such agreement must of necessity be tentative and adjustments made dependent upon the physical condition of the area when occupied and upon the military situation. So far as practicable the agreement should include definite facilities preserved by the military and definite facilities reserved for essential civil requirements. Facilities not so defined will not initially be reserved for either military or civil exploitation but are subject to further agreement as the need is recognized.
- b. In sections of the country for which no definite military operational plan is considered necessary, instructions defining military requirements and those civil commitments for which the military assume responsibility will be issued by the military authority responsible for planning for the area as a whole, if so desired by Allied Commission.
- c. In the case of property to be used by the military which

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c. In the case of property to be used by the military which Allied Commission has stated to be essential to the civil economy, the

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probable degree of development by the military and the estimated period of occupancy will be stated in the plan.

d. In the immediate execution of operational plans the decision of the Army or equivalent commander in operational command will govern. However, when Allied Commission is of the opinion that the use of the facility during military tenancy will cause undue harm to the civil economy, and local agreement cannot be reached, Allied Commission may, without interrupting the operational plan or its immediate execution, inform the Army or equivalent commander that an appeal will be made, and submit such an appeal as indicated in paragraph 4 below.

e. In the further execution of a plan in Army or equivalent areas, or in routine functioning within or without Army areas, in the event there is a conflict between military interests and interest which Allied Commission considers essential to the civil economy with respect to:

- (1) The equitable allocations of factories, warehouses, and other commercial and industrial facilities including mines and space, and
- (2) The control of their use and operation; the procedures set forth in paragraph 4 will be followed.

4. a. The Allied Commission may present its case and recommend action to the responsible Area District, Base Section or Army Commander, or other responsible military authority whether urgent operational need has been advanced by the military authority or not. Allied Commission will accompany their case with a complete and factual justification.

b. The responsible military authority to which the case is referred will consider the case and every effort will be made to reach a solution satisfactory to Allied Commission and the military commander. In the event a satisfactory solution cannot be found, the military commander will return the request to Allied Commission with a written statement as to the extent to which he can meet Allied Commission's desires and as to the conditions which he cannot accept.

c. Allied Commission then may submit the matter to an investigating subcommittee appointed by the Industrial Co-ordination Committee of the Allied Force Local Resources (Italian) Board, through AFLRS. The investigating sub-committee will investigate the case in detail and attempt to find some solution agreeable to the parties concerned.

d. If no such solution can be found, the sub-committee will submit the case to the ICC (Industrial Co-ordination Committee) with recommendations.

e. The ICC will then adjudicate and make its award. If no protest is received by AFLRS from an interested party within 48 hours after the award, such award will become effective. In the event of a protest, the matter will be referred to the AFLR(I) Board, the decisions of which will be binding upon all parties.

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5. a. Except in the immediate execution of operation plans as stated in paragraph 3d above, the military will not exercise initial control of a facility concerning which Allied Commission has initiated a request for

Allocation, until definite action has been taken in accordance with these instructions.

- b. When a plant, mine or other commercial facility has been de-requisitioned to permit of its producing materials or services essential to civil economy, all machinery, fixtures, equipment and plant essential to such production, except that which may have been installed by the using service, shall be exempt from subsequent requisition unless the facility itself is again requisitioned. Surplus materials, as declared under the provisions of Section III, AFHQ Administrative Memorandum Number 46, 1944, are subject to allocation as set forth in that memorandum.

SUBJECT : Applications for de-requisitioning of industrial premises.

TO : Heads of Sub-Commissions and Regional Commissioners A.C.

1. The terms of reference under which applications for the derequisitioning of industrial premises are considered before the newly-formed Industrial Coordination Committee of Allied Force Local Resources Section require cases to be prepared and documented in the following way:

a) An application for the derequisitioning of the premises must be made by the firm to the Italian Ministry of Industry, Commerce and Labour, either direct or through the local inspectorates of the Ministry, setting forth the answers to the attached Form AC/5615/IND.

b) Before submission the statements contained therein should be verified by the Sub-Commission or Regional Commissioner most closely affected by the operation of the subject firm.

c) A statement must be prepared over the signature of the head of the Sub-Commission or Regional Commissioner effected attesting to the potential value to Italian economy which should follow upon liberation of the plant, and verifying the actual possibilities for the recommencement of operations if released to the owners under A.C. control.

d) To this must be attached the report of an A.C. expert certifying that the plant can, in effect, be reactivated if released from military occupation; that repairs, if necessary, can be effected, that machinery can be operated; that raw materials, power, transportation facilities, etc. can be provided, and that local (including skilled) labour is, or can be made, available.

e) On receipt of this collated information, a request for evacuation can be addressed by this Headquarters to the appropriate military authority in command of the area in which the plant is located.

f) The written refusal of the military authority in question must be included in the documentation.

g) Upon receipt of this refusal a report must be prepared by an arbitration officer and submitted to Industry Sub-Commission A.C.

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f) The written refusal of the military authority in question must be included in the documentation.

g) Upon receipt of this refusal a report must be prepared by an arbitration officer and submitted to Industry Sub-Commission A.C.

2. The case is then fully documented for presentation at the regular meetings of the Industrial Coordination Committee, AFIR(I)3.

3. It should be noted that while this procedure is necessary before a case can be considered before the Industrial Coordination Committee, unless a refusal to surrender the premises is received from the military authority, following the request made under 1. c) above, the case will not proceed to the Committee stage.

4. Similarly, if prompt action is taken by Regions or Sub-Commissions when requisitioning of industrial premises is first contemplated by a military unit, channels exist for securing directives at a high level in AFHQ to prevent such requisitioning until a report on the circumstances can be prepared and submitted to AFHQ.

5. In order to secure such preventive action, it is essential that a responsible officer of A.C. should have visited the premises, and be prepared to certify that the premises or plant are such as to warrant Allied Commission submitting a request to AFHQ.

6. This will not prevent telephoned requests to Industry Sub-Commission from being made by Regional officers, but is intended to emphasize the fact that the responsible officer must be in full possession of the facts from his personal inquiries before committing Allied Commission to action at the high level required.

TO : H.E. the Minister
Ministry of Industry Commerce & Labour, Rome

1. Reference is made to this H.Q. directive ACC/5158/10 of 27 April addresses Regional Commissioners Region III, IV and V and to S.I.A.C.'s 5th & 8th Armies, copy to your Excellency's Ministry and through Rear H.Q. ACC Salerno to your Excellency's predecessor at that date. (Two further copies herewith for easy reference).

2. Upon the recent transfer of A.M.G. territory, to which the above quoted directive referred, to the executive control of the Italian Government, attention is re-directed to this directive, as it is considered desirable that no action should be taken which would disrupt the programme before its completion, that is, until all hides released under this directive have been tanned and the resultant leather controlled and disposed of through official channels at official prices.

3. This H.Q. would be glad to hear therefore that your Excellency's Ministry is prepared to implement this programme to its conclusion.

4. It is also hoped that the proposals to the future regulation of the leather and tanning industries, attached as appendix to this H.Q. ACC/5158/10 of 16 May 1944 and agreed by the Ministry of Industry Commerce & Labour, may shortly be made effective for the whole of liberated Italy. This scheme is at present held up until official prices as required by Article 5, have been determined. As soon as this is done, your Excellency will be informed in order that simultaneous action can be taken in both Military and Italian Government territory by order or decree.

1. Agreement has been reached with the Italian Government for the regulation of the leather and tanning industries on a uniform basis throughout Liberated Italy.

2. Pending the approval and publication of the necessary decree and/or order, immediate action is called for in order to prevent deterioration of hides and skins in the approaching hot weather.

3. Regions should therefore arrange forthwith for all hides and skins frozen in the hands of the Consorzi, collectors, jobbers or tanners, to be released to selected tanners for treatment.

4. Delivery will be to selected tanners only (see list attached), and in AMG territory it has been arranged that the Commissioner, Consorzio Polli, Naples will advise on such releases on behalf of AMG.

5. Tanners receiving delivery of skins and hides will be responsible for strict accounting for them and for their proper storage and processing, and shall hold the resultant leather as to 80% at your disposal.

6. In order to reimburse holders of hides and skins for any depreciation which may have already occurred, and for their increased warehousing expenses, and to encourage the putting into circulation of hitherto "hidden" hides, it is intended that 20% of the resultant leather shall be free as to control and price. The remaining 80% will, as stated in para. 5 above, be controlled by you on our behalf.

7. In accordance with the provisional agreement reached between HQ ACC and the Italian Government the 80% of hides to be subjected to control will be released to tanners at the Official Prices in force on Sept. 1st, 1943, and the remaining 20% will be released at the current market value. Copy of these Official Price Lists are in the hands of both the Consorzio and the tanners.

8. All requests from whatever source for allocations of the controlled leather shall be submitted only through the recognised channels; namely to this HQ.

9. It should be noted that the scheme outlined above is to be read as applying only to heavy skins for footwear, belting, etc. (bovine, equine, buffalo) and not to light skins (sheep, goat, etc.) which will not be subject to control.

10. Official prices will be fixed for controlled leather produced as above, and subsequently for standard footwear.
