Dr. Arbanassi is one of the three members of the Court of Appeal, and a reduction of this number would prevent the Court from functioning in accordance with Italian procedure, both civil and penal.

The Chief Administrator, Tripolitania, has therefore informed the First President of the Court that, although the reasons for the application were fully appreciated, it was regretted that Dr. Arbanassi's repatriation to Italy could not be approved, unless and until a duly qualified replacement was provided.

Would you kindly approach the Italian Ministry of Justice with a view to the selection of a Civil Servant, suitable and qualified for the appointment of Member of the Court of Appeal, to replace Dr. Arbanassi, who will then be repatriated to Italy.

By order of Col. Robert C. Ross, former Chief Liaison Officer, Allied Commission, for Tuscans, the following report is respectfully submitted:

1. The Italian Judicials in Livorno and Pisa are without any means of transportation, which results in a serious handicap for the normal work of the entire Court system. In several occasions this office tried to help the situation by taking in its own cars the Italian judicials to the jail, to other towns, to the place of offense, etc.
2. The housing problem makes the situation even more difficult. Several members of the Court are living far beyond the town limits and are frequently unable to attend their duties because of the irregular bus-service. The President of the Court in Pisa is still living as a guest in the house of one of his friends. The Procuratore del Regno in Livorno lives with his wife in a small room, which has no windows, located in the Tribunal building.
3. At least 2 small cars are indispensable for any kind of Special Court to be established for the trial of Allied interest cases. In the opinion of the undersigned, cases under the territorial jurisdiction of the Pisa Tribunal should be equally tried by the same special Court and that can be done only if members of the Court will have their own means of transportation.
