SUBJECT : Press Law.

TO : Mr. George W. Edman, ADPWO (Lia) Italy.

1. The Under-Secretary explained that pending consideration of the projected Press Law by the cabinet he proposed sending a circular of instructions to the Prefects substantially based on the points of the suggested Press Law itself.
2. Copy of the suggested circular to Prefects was left with me. I consider it a first-class document. The salient points are: Recognition that it is a Commission and not the Prefect which has exclusive power to authorise, suspend or revoke publications; that the only preventive censorship is military; and that "political crimes are excluded from any application of the existing penal code" (which is, of course, still the Fascist one until that can be adjusted by the Italian Government some time hence).
3. The Under-Secretary believes that it might be a month or so before this circular could be transformed into terms of a decree by the cabinet, but in any case this makes it applicable de facto though not de jure.

1. Reference your R/2017 of 19 May 1944, the position of the three draft Regional Orders is as follows :

(a) Aliens.

This Order is being prepared, as you know, for issue as a General Order. Since, among other things, the proposed legislation has to do with matters concerning internment, the Public Safety Sub-Commission felt obliged to consult A.A.I. before making any recommendations on the subject.

(b) Public Meetings.

This Order has been prepared and approved. It is being published as General Order No.25 and is now in the hands of the printers.

(c) Newspapers and Publications.

Reference is made to this HQ letter 291/19/CA of 4 April 1944. The suggested Decree has been drafted and approved but is under discussion with the Italian Government. It is hoped that it will be finally approved before the next meeting of the A.P.B. on 29 May 1944.

In the light of military and economic exigencies and in order to secure uniformity of regulations and procedure in Royal Italian Government territory and Allied Military Government territory, the Italian Government hereby issues the following Decree:

Art. 1.

Whosoever publishes or intends to initiate the publication, printing or reproduction of journals or of other periodicals must first apply for authorisation to the Prefect of the Province in which the said periodicals are published or to be published. A similar obligation is imposed upon whosoever intends to print, publish or reproduce papers or writings of a non-periodic character whether in the form of books, pamphlets, brochures, posters or otherwise. The Prefect of the Province shall forthwith transmit all such applications to the Minister of the Interior for immediate consideration of a specially appointed publications board to whom is delegated the sole right to grant such authorisation. The right to suspend or revoke such authorisation is likewise delegated to the publications board.

Art. 2.

The application for authorisation must contain, in case of periodic publications, the following data:

- (a) Name and place of publication.
- (b) Purpose intended by the publication.
- (c) Financial backing.
- (d) Political affiliation, if any.
- (e) Statement as to whether the publication is to appear daily, weekly, monthly, etc.
- (f) Selling price.
- (g) Seat of the management of the editor and of the administration.
- (h) Name, surname and address of the responsible director, of the responsible vice-director and of the administrative director.
- (i) Name, surname and address of the owner or owners.
- (j) Name and address of the printing establishment and of its director.
- (m) Number of copies of each issue.
- (n) Size and number of pages.
- (o) Estimate of monthly paper requirements with indication whether in sheets or rolls.
- (p) Area and means of distribution.
- (q) Quantity of paper already held at the time of application and its location.
- (r) Specification of the quantity of paper which it is assumed will be necessary to use and place where it can be found.

Art. 3.

The application for authorisation must contain in the case of non-periodical publications the following data in addition to that required under Article 2 (a), (b), (c), (d), (f), (l), (p), (q) and (r):

- (a) Name, surname and domicile or residence of the publisher or publishers, and of the author or editor;
- (b) Number of copies intended to be printed;
- (c) Size and number of pages;
- (d) Estimate of required quantity and type of paper.

Art. 4.

Any change in ownership, management, and direction, declared political affiliation, professed purpose of a periodic publication, name or place of publication as declared by the applicant in terms of Arts 4 & 5 hereof shall be immediately notified through the same channels as the original application, and upon failure so to do, the authorisation theretofore granted shall forthwith lapse and be of no force and effect.

Art. 5.

There shall be no pre-publication scrutiny or censorship, but nothing herein contained shall be construed to modify or in any way affect the regulations for Allied Military censorship which may from time to time be in force.

Art. 6.

Copies of all publications authorized shall be delivered on the day of publication to persons or authorities in accordance with such instructions as may from time to time be issued by the Allied and Italian authorities.

Art. 7.

Every periodical publication shall carry the name of its responsible editor; every non-periodical publication shall carry the name of the publisher or printer.

Art. 8.

Any journal or other periodical, paper, writing of a non-periodical character, book, pamphlet, brochure, poster or other thing or matter, printed or published in violation of the provisions of this decree shall be confiscated and its authorisation automatically revoked.

The confiscation shall be undertaken by the Public Safety Authorities without any special authorisation.

Art. 9.

The violation of this decree shall be punished by a fine of 10,000 lire to 50,000 lire; or by reclusion from three months to one year; or by both.

The following persons shall answer for the said violation:

(a) in case of a periodic publication whoever holds the position of the responsible editor and the owner of the periodical or its legal or de facto representative.

(b) in case of a non-periodical publication whoever ordered the publication to be made and its owner as well as its publisher or, in the absence of the latter, the printer.

Art. 10.

R D L 14 January, 1944, No. 13 is hereby suspended together with all legislation which has the effect of imposing pre-publication scrutiny or censorship in the Italian Press.

Art. 11.

The provisions of the foregoing articles shall be applicable for the duration of war.

Art. 12.

This decree shall become effective on the day of its publication in the Gazzetta Ufficiale of the Kingdom - Special Series - and shall be presented to the legislative assembly to be embodied into law.

The Minister of the Interior is authorised to present the relative bill.

Publication ... the above Decree should be accompanied by an exchange of letters between the Chief Commissioner, Allied Control Commission and the Prime Minister of the Royal Italian Government in which it is recognised that:

The special publication board referred to in Decree No..... is the Central Allied Publications Board.

The Central Allied Publication Board has the power to delegate authority to local Publication Boards subject to confirmation by the Central Board.

The said Central and local Allied Publication Boards shall each include a representative nominated by the Italian Government and approved by the respective Boards who shall act in a consultant and advisory capacity only.

The Minister of the Interior or his delegate will transmit with as little delay as possible all applications referred to in the Decree to the appropriate local Allied Publication Board.

The authority vested in the Central Allied Publication Board shall be handed over to the Royal Italian Government at such time as may be designated by the Commander in Chief of the Allied Forces.

The Minister of the Interior or his delegate shall likewise communicate the recommendations and decisions of the Allied Publication Board to applicants and take the necessary action for implementation with as little delay as possible, informing the Central A.P.B.

The Minister of the Interior or his delegate will work out a modus operandi with the Executive Secretary of the Central Allied Publications Board or his delegate to ensure the speediest possible transmission. (Ingerit star paper and copy of all applications to Local A.P.B.)

1. This is to confirm the telephone call made this evening by my assistant, Miss Peart. The Central Allied Publications Board, at its meeting on May 1st, approved the inclusion of an Italian representative on the Central and Local Boards, to act in a consultant and advisory capacity.
2. This is also to confirm that Major Fielden, at the meeting yesterday, undertook to communicate this decision to Lt. Col. Cripps.
3. The question of Italian representation on the Central and Local Boards was the only point in the draft law brought before the meeting.
4. I received your letter ACC4104/7L of April 29th, enclosing the revised draft, with your comments, and duly crawled into a corner in a thoroughly humiliated and demoralised condition.
5. Having recovered slightly, I would beg to point out that your article VII is ambiguous. Allied military censorship exercises pre-publication censorship and to say that there shall be none, while at the same time safe-guarding existing rights of the Allied military authorities, will surely lead to confusion. I feel that the Allied military censorship position should be clearly stated by itself and that the character of any other kind of scrutiny or censorship should be clearly stated, even in its negative form. I would therefore suggest that the wording of Article VII in my draft should be restored. Its merit lies in the word "other"; and that word cannot be employed without first defining the military part. 46
6. The Board took no exception to the words "and approved by the respective Boards" in your Article III.

quire to have special authorisation to act, and that such authorisation would emanate from the Allied Publications Board. I would appreciate your guidance on this and also on how that should be translated so as to fit in with the Italian police organisation.

8. I would also like your opinion on the possibility of revoking the former decree. It was conceived by APB in error, and with the misguided intention of saving the face of the Italian Government by not publishing the fact that APB was behind the Prefects, and has put a weapon of power in the hands of the said Prefects such as they never enjoyed even in the most violent days of Fascism. I feel I could never be comfortable were I to leave Italy and feel that all I had succeeded in doing was to betray (albeit unwittingly) Liberty of the Press. How can we have the previous decree washed off the slate?
9. I enclose a copy of the aide memoire of our last meeting, as promised, and may I add how much I appreciate your help in all this.

MINUTES of a meeting held in the offices of the Legal Sub-Commission, ACC, Salerno, on 27 April 44, to discuss the proposed all-Italy Licensing Law

PRESENT : Col. G. R. Upjohn, Legal Sub-Commission, ACC.
Major M. J. Grossman, Legal Sub-Commission, ACC.
Major A. R. Thackray, Legal Sub-Commission, ACC.
Lt. Col. R. G. B. Spicer, Interior Sub-Commission, ACC.
Lt. Vernon Lewis, Interior Sub-Commission, ACC, and
Lt. Col. I. S. Munro, Executive Secretary, APB.

Acting on recommendation of the Central Allied Publications Board (see minutes of meeting held 17 April), Col. Munro read a copy of the resolution adopted by the Board "with a view to expediting the work of the Legal Sub-Commission, ACC, in drafting an all-Italy Press Licensing and Procedure Law for application in ACC territory and for the suggested acceptance of the Italian Government."

Col. Upjohn said the Legal Sub-Commission, on being informed that the APB was dealing with the Italian Government direct, through Lord Stansgate, and that the former Minister of the Interior took strong exception to the proposed law (as per his letter to Lord Stansgate under date of 4 April 44), had suspended all work on draft of the law. He said that, through a misunderstanding, Col. Munro had not been informed of this fact.

Col. Munro pointed out that the APB had made no approach to the Italian Government with regard to the proposed law; that Sig. Reale's letter was sent to Lord Stansgate in reply to APB's request, transmitted through Lord Stansgate, that he designate Prefects to sit on Regional Boards.

Col. Munro said that Sig. Reale's letter, and reports on difficulties experienced in some Local Board centres with regard to licensing powers of Prefects, had been tabled at the last Board meeting, but action had been suspended so as not to handicap the work of the Legal Sub-Commission.

New Draft 44

It was therefore agreed that a fresh start, on draft of the proposed law, could be made. To this end, Col. Munro tabled a suggested draft, based on the Legal Sub-Commission's earlier draft, and texts were compared and changes noted.

Col. Munro said the Board was aware of the administrative difficulties involved in having Prefects sit on Local Boards but that these could be overcome if the Italian Government were to appoint its own nominee to sit on Local Boards, responsible to the Government and with the necessary authority for the particular job.

It was noted that the new draft called for Italian Government representation on Local Boards and on the Central Board, in a consultative and advisory capacity. Col. Munro said he had submitted a proposal for consideration of the Central Board at its next meeting, to the effect that the Italian Government should be invited to appoint a representative to the Central Board.

It was agreed that the Legal Sub-Commission could not complete its draft until the Board reached a decision on this outstanding issue. In the meantime, however, Col. Upjohn and his colleagues undertook to re-word some of the clauses of the draft under consideration, without altering in any way any of the principles set forth, and Col. Munro agreed to communicate the Board's decision with regard to Italian representation on the Central Board immediately it was taken.

Censorship

Col. Upjohn said that the Italian Government appeared to be finding difficulty in reconciling the principle of Freedom of the Press with Italian Government policy. He pointed out that Italian law, long before fascism, gave the Government certain powers of censorship, and that the former Minister of the Interior, and others, were very much opposed to the Government being deprived of those powers.

When Col. Upjohn suggested that this question also required clarification, Col. Munro pointed out that only one form of censorship existed in Italy today, namely Allied Military Censorship; that pre-publication political scrutiny, both by Allied and by Italian authorities, ceased on 7 April 44, in accordance with a decision of the Allied Publications Board as approved by Gen. Mason MacFarlane, and that all concerned had been so informed, including the Italian Government. The question of censorship could therefore be considered settled.

Central APB Meeting 1.5.44

As the discussions and reasons behind APB decisions are often veiled from the Italian Government or officials, leading to misunderstandings and, on occasion, misrepresentations; and as this situation puts a smoke-screen between ourselves and the Italian Government, choking goodwill and smothering real understanding, I propose that, in order to ensure a better working machine to promote Allied war aims in Italy, the Italian Government be invited to nominate a representative to attend the Central and Local Board meetings in a consultative and advisory capacity.

With regard to the above, it might be useful to recall that Italian administrative difficulties in appointing a Prefect to sit on Local Boards (because one Prefect cannot speak for other Prefects whose jurisdiction may also be within the Local APB area) will be solved by inviting "a Government representative, thus leaving it to the Italian Government to choose their man and to give him the necessary authority for the particular job even if he is a Prefect.

Apart from solving the local problem of Prefects, the above proposal also solves the illogical position of having Italian representatives on Local Boards which are responsible to the Central Body on which they have no representation.

Subject : Identifying of Additions.

To : Armed Publications Board.

1. Pursuant to our conversation of 27 April, enclosed is revised draft of suggested clauses covering above subject matter.

2. The following comments are to be noted in connection with the draft submitted by you, and our draft enclosed herewith.

3. Article I has been entirely rewritten in the interests of clarity and better draftsmanship.

4. Article II has been revised with the objective of leaving no doubt that the Board shall have the sole right in its absolute discretion and without the giving of reasons to suspend and revoke authorizations.

5. Article III has been revised so as to make it clear that the representatives referred to shall be nominated by the Indian Government and shall act in a consultative and advisory capacity only. It is desired to be approved by the Board so as to guard against imprudent and unworkable nominations and if Article has been accepted as it stands, the obviously is article a cause of worry and is for you to decide. If this suggestion is not acceptable the matter can be remedied by the omission of the phrase "and approved by the respective Boards."

6. Articles IV and V have been slightly revised as to language in the interests of clarity but without any substantial change.

7. Article VI has been entirely rewritten with the objective of making it mandatory upon the publisher to notify the Board of any of the changes referred to therein. No such requirement was contained in your draft. Unlike your draft a change in ownership, etc. does not operate automatically to cancel the authorization. We have provided that failure to notify the Board of such change does not operate but if notice is given as required, it then becomes discretionary with the Board as to whether or not the change is of such a nature as to warrant a cancellation. Thus, the matter remains entirely within the control of the Board, but obviat 411

what might result in unnecessary work and complications if an automatic cancellation of the authorization followed from some inconsequential change.

f. Article VII of your draft is a rearrangement of Article IV of our original draft. We believe that our draft legally better accomplishes the objective thereof and we have accordingly restored the language of Article IV of our original draft.

g. Article VIII of your draft covers the subject matter of Article V of our original draft. We fail to understand what is intended by your Article VIII. Moreover, the matters covered thereby are purely administrative and can better be handled, in our opinion, along the lines of Article V of our old draft which has now been made Article VIII of our new draft.

h. Article IX of your draft has been revised to substitute the word "shall" for "will" and the word "authorization" for "license." We also omitted the phrase "as prima facie evidence of authorization to publish" since it would seem to serve no useful purpose. We have also added at the end of the article the phrase "or otherwise reproduced" since your Article IX as drafted would appear to cover printed copies only whereas the intention is clearly to cover all other types of reproduction.

i. Article X of your draft is a revision of Article VI of our original draft. In view of the serious consequences following upon a violation of provisions of the decree as therein provided, we think it is desirable that the various types of publications referred to be specifically listed and we accordingly prefer our draft to yours. Moreover, we have concluded that it is preferable to provide for the automatic revocation of the authorization in case of violation rather than for the prohibition against future publication. Article X has been re-drafted accordingly. When and if this Article is translated into Italian, it is imperative that the phrase "Public Safety Authorities" be so translated as to specifically designate the particular authorities which you have in mind.

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*3rd Draft*ART. 1

The Central Allied Publications Board is hereby vested with the sole power to grant the authorizations hereinafter referred to. Such power may by it be delegated to Local Allied Publications Boards.

No journal, newspaper or other periodical, paper, writing of a non-periodical character, book, pamphlet, brochure, poster or other like publication shall be printed or otherwise reproduced or published without the prior authorization of the Central Allied Publication Board, or such Local Allied Publications Boards as may by it be designated.

Applications for such authorizations shall be filed with the prefect of the province in which the proposed publication is to be printed, ~~or~~ otherwise reproduced, and by him forthwith transmitted as directed by the Allied Publications Board.

ART. 2

The Central Allied Publications Board shall have the sole right in its absolute discretion and without any statement of reasons therefore to suspend and revoke authorizations.

ART. 3

The said Central and Local Allied Publications boards shall each include a representative nominated by the Italian Government and approved by the respective Boards who shall act in a consultative and advisory capacity only.

ART. 4

The application for authorization must contain, in case of periodic publications, the following data:

- (a) Name and place of publication.

1. Your 291/25 of 17 Apr addressed to us for Legal Sub Commission.
2. The Allied Publications Board passed certain resolutions on the 14 Mar among others, one including Prefects on certain Regional Boards. This resolution was passed without previously consulting either the Interior Sub Commission or the Italian Government.
3. At the same time the APB asked the Legal Sub Commission to draft a decree to implement their resolutions but did not inform the Legal Sub-Commission that there had been no agreement in principle with the Italian Government.
4. This section was then asked to obtain from the Italian Government the names of the Prefects to sit on these boards. Our letter asking for nominations was the first that the Italian Government had heard of the proposed formation of these boards. For reasons stated in the Minister of the Interior's letter 274 of 1 Apr (some of which the Interior Sub Commission considers to be perfectly sound) the Italian Government objected to making these appointments. A copy of the Minister's letter of objection was forwarded to the APB on the 9 Apr since when no communication had been received from the APB.
5. Until the question of whether Prefects are or are not to be members of Regional Boards has been settled with the Italian Government, the drafting of the decree cannot proceed.

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LAW OF LIBERTY

1. Before attempting to draft any notices it would be advisable to make a study of Italian law on this subject. It may be that various orders, inspection certificates issued by the Ministry of Interior which would fully satisfy the purpose of the AB 43 properly informed. Such procedure would concord to our policy to interface with Italian law as little as possible.

2. It appears that licensing of all printed matter including books, posters, etc. is contemplated (See V, Part 7 of the laws). However, as provided for licensing and supervision of periodical and nonperiodical publications. However, the heading of the license contained in App A does not make it clear whether only periodical publications or any kind of periodical publications and any type of "newspaper" or "periodical" and non periodical publications are involved. It would seem that a notice should clearly state just what type of publications are intended to be covered. Two alternatives would seem to be open.

- (a) The notice would include all publications in which case the heading would read as follows: "...newspaper, magazine, explicit, obscene, periodicals, books, poster, placed, and any form of news or opinion."
- (b) There would be two separate types of notices, one of which would cover only periodical publications, the other one would cover the nonperiodical literature.
- It is question must be settled before any drafting is attempted.

3. The first part of this notice should read, "All persons or organizations now publishing, publishing or reproducing any of the above specified publications,

Under (1) the competent subject must be specified in relation to applicant's domicile or residence, seat of corporation, etc. To whom it should be made clear that if one person or organization and another publishing a publication, both persons or organizations must file the application. The same as "11" article goes... to the above should be omitted.

4. The results stated in AB 43 above apply to the second part of the notice as well. The closing sentence should read as follows:
- After January 15, 1945 issue of the above mentioned publications will be published prior to the receiving of the License from the Director

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(b) There would be two important types of notices, one of which would cover only periodical publications, the other one would cover the more incidental literature.

The first part of this notice should read, "All persons or organizations non publishing, printing or reproducing any of the above named publications must be notified before any writing is printed. In addition (1) the content must be registered in relation to applicant's locality or residence, date of composition, etc. It should be made clear that it is the person or organization publishing and another utilizing a publication, both, remains an organization that calls the application. The content of all printed forms...in the above must be omitted."

4. The notice stated above, I believe applies to the second type of the notice as well. The specific notices should be as follows:
 1. For January 15, 1945, one of the above named publications will be published prior to the receiving of the license from the competent agent authorizing such publication.
 2. To receive the or other publishing material must always be allotted by proper authority except when presented to the publisher of the publication.
 3. A license will be issued for a period exceeding three months. No license will be issued at least 15 days prior to the date of application for renewal. Failure to file such application within one month of the expiration of cessation of publication will be considered as application of cessation of publication.
5. Please consider the following: Before a license is granted, the writer will send copies (one or two) to Ministry of Interior, (MO), M&S, AC, Ministry of Interior and Export. Such "clearnelling and clearing" books through several offices will make place every three months in the case of periodical newspapers. To this cabin one procedure is absolutely necessary, should there not be simplified procedures, it is best for the renewal of license?
6. It is suggested that an extract be made of the AC memo giving the procedure and also of decision and this extract will be copies of AC office and be left with the Italian Ministry of Interior for comment.

Memorandum on Licensing of Publications - Region 3

1. Although RC Region 3 in his explanatory letter to the Executive Commissioner (No. 10 in File) states in para. 4 thereof that APF & PWB are in agreement with the proposed Regional Order, no reference is made to the Italian RDL, 14 Jan. 44 No. 13.

2. This RDL was inspired by the APF in accordance with its memo to ACC dated 14 Dec. 43 (attached) and followed the policy laid down in MGS letter ref. MGS 334-34 dated 27 Nov. 43 namely that the procedure to be followed in the then AMG territory should be substantially the same as that under ACC.

3. The annexed comparison of the Italian RDL and the proposed Region 3 Order shows that they are substantially the same in effect. In view of the fact that Region 3 is under ACC administration, the question arises as to whether it would not be sounder policy to implement the Italian legislation in both Regions 3 & 5, always assuming that the APF and PWB are in accord.

The following persons shall answer for the said violations:

(b) in case of a non-periodical publication whoever ordered the publication to be made and its owner as well as its publisher or, in absence of the latter, the printer.

ART. 12

The provisions of the foregoing articles shall be applicable for the entire duration of war.

ART. 13

This decree shall become effective on the day of its publication in the Gazzetta Ufficiale of the Kingdom - special series # and shall be presented to the legislative assembly to be embodied into law.

SUBJECT : Freedom of the Press.

TO : V. P. Administration Section.

1. The question has arisen as to how far the Italian press may be allowed to go in its statements criticizing the present Italian Government and its members and what steps we will permit the Italian Government to take to control the press and control journalists in the occupied territory to prevent criticism.

2. In approaching this question we are met with two lines of approach which will affect the situation. The first is the present condition of the Italian press, so as to keep Italian journalists from being condemned to be mere mouthpieces. The second is the proposal which endangers the war effort, in order and 2nd of control which might endanger the war effort.

3. The report of the Conference states : -
At the Moscow Conference states :

- 1. Incelop of speech, of religious worship, or political groups.
- 2. Incelop of press and of public meetings which be held to point anti-social and political meetings in Italy at the time at which it is

approach which will be very necessary to be made workable. The first is the freedom of the press. The second is the necessity of supporting the present Government until a more permanent one can be formed in Rome, so as to keep liberated territory in order and free of turmoil which might endanger the war effort.

3. The report of the Conference states :—
- a. The present Conference states :—

- 2. Freedom of speech, of religious worship, of political belief, of press and of public meeting shall be restored in full measure to the Italian people who shall also be entitled to form anti-Nazi political groups.

"In making this declaration the three foreign secretaries recognise that so long as active military operations continue in Italy the time at which it is possible to give full effect to the principles stated above will be determined by the commander-in-chief on the basis of instructions received through the combined chiefs of staff.

The latter paragraph gives the Commander-in-Chief certain powers of control over the press. He also has complete control of censorship under the Tripartite Treaty. However, as much that comes out of Italy is misunderstood at home, any action taken by the Commander-in-Chief permitting the Italian Government to exert control will have to be considered from at least five angles :—

- (a) Military necessity.
- (b) Support of present Government.
- (c) Misunderstanding outside of Italy.
- (d) Diverse interest of all Italy itself.
- (e) German propaganda.

4. The entire question is political rather than legal but the certain suggestions do appear to be pertinent to present consideration. It should be added that while no definite lines can be laid down for guidance in so nebulous a field, a course of procedure can be suggested for meeting a particular situation when it arises.

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5. It should be clearly understood by the Italian Government that without the permission of A.C.C. it will not take any affirmative steps to control or suppress the press. That does not mean that a representative of the Government might not attempt to persuade a particular editor for the good of the country and the war effort to desist from a particular line of attack.

6. If the Italian Government believes that it is being damaged by any attack in the press, as to which it is powerless to deal, it should so advise A.C.C. through its appropriate minister.

7. The ordinary would not permit of a reference to A.C.C. of the question and , for better or for worse, it will have to be decided by the Chief Commissioner as to what steps he will permit the Italian Government itself to take to remedy the situation. It may well be that a suggestion from the Chief Commissioner to the offending press will solve the difficulty, but if not it will have to advise the Italian Government specifically how far it may go on its own initiative. Certainly at this stage it is impossible to lay down any specific limitations as to what kind and degree of criticism by the press is permissible and what is not permissible.

8. As to criticisms of the United Nations, A.C.C. etc. or praise of enemies or Fascists there would seem to be no difficulty as to what may be done by or at the direction of A.C.C.

9. The Political Section which would have particular interest in this question and would probably be relied upon principally for advice, should be consulted. It may have already received some instructions that are pertinent.

- 3) That PALERMO authority extend over SICILY and contiguous islands; that CAGLIARI's extend over SARDINIA; that BARI's authority extend over APULIA and the ABRUZZI; that POTENZA's authority extend over CALABRIA and LUCANIA, and that NAPLES' authority extend over CAMPANIA.
- 4) That in PALERMO, BARI, CAGLIARI and POTENZA the Regional

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Boards be composed of representatives of PwB, ACC, Censorship and the Local Prefect.

- 5) That the Central Board be composed of representatives of PwB, Censorship, G-2, ACC Political Section, ACC PRO, and Economic Section ACC.
- 6) That the Regional APB Boards be authorised to grant licenses for the publication of newspapers, magazines, books, posters, placards, brochures and similar publication products, in their Regions.
- 7) That their decisions be governed by considerations of security, political policy, and printing facilities and supplies in or available to their Region, directives on these matters to be sent from time to time from the Central APB.

- 9) That the Central Board sit in MAPLES for the present, meeting fortnightly or oftener if circumstances justify it.

The Regional PWB Press Officer, keeping the Regional Board informed, will immediately communicate with his Theatre Chief, forwarding three marked copies of the offending newspaper and all necessary information. Any action taken will be reported back to the Regional PWB Press Officer, who will again keep Regional Board informed, the Chief Press Officer likewise informing the Central Board.

Paragraph 1, Administrative Memorandum Number 89, 1943, is rescinded and the following substituted therefor:

II - GRANTING OF INTERVIEW TO THE PRESS.

' i. a. Senior Officers may give "on record" press conferences or interviews only after obtaining permission of the Commander-in-Chief. In cases involving British Officers, C-in-C permission must have further concurrence and permission from the Admiralty, War Office, or Air Ministry. Request for permission should, if possible, contain a brief outline of what Senior Officer proposes to say.

b. In giving such authorized "on record" press conferences, the speaker must make it clear to the press as to the statements on which he is prepared to be directly quoted. If in reply to questions, the speaker departs from his subject, he must advise the press that such matter is "off the record" and not for publication. In such authorized conferences or

2. Senior Officers may give "off the record" (not for publication) conference without obtaining the permission of higher authority, but will be responsible for instructing the press that information so given is not for publication.

3. The above instructions do not apply to interviews or conferences held to give guidance and back ground to the press, nor does it apply to similar conferences given by Public Relations Officers or Staff Officers whose duty it is to inform the press.

4. Subject to usual censorship, officers other than Senior Officers may give confidential accounts of operations in which they have participated and names may be quoted, except in cases where Divisional or Higher echelon Commanders may see fit to prohibit such interviews.

5. For the purpose of this memo note, Senior Officers are defined as the following grades and above:

In compliance and sympathy with the objectives of liberation for which the Allied Nations of the United States of America, Great Britain and the Union of Soviet Republics are fighting, Marshal Badoglio on October 29, 1943, declared that liberty of the Press was restored in Italy.

By virtue of that disposition all political parties of the nation could openly publish their newspapers and freely spread their political ideas.

Six weeks experience has revealed that in some cases there is evidence of profound ignorance of what "liberty" in civilised society implies in general and what "liberty of the Press" implies in particular. There is also distressing evidence that the realities and exigencies of war are far removed from the conceptions of those responsible for much that is published in the name of "liberty."

The allied authorities are,--in conjunction with those responsible for the present Government of Liberated Italy,--therefore constrained to call the attention of Direttori Responsabili to the following:

1. The Italian Press cannot be extenuated a greater freedom from military censorship, decency or language, accuracy of facts and political constraint than that exercised in the countries of the allied nations themselves, especially as such censorship, decency, accuracy and restraint in the countries of the Allies is conducted in a spontaneous sense of citizenship rather than by the imposition of the apposite measures, wartime or otherwise.
2. The allied authorities made their attitude to Italian affairs perfectly clear at the time of the Armistice and since, namely:
 - a) The future of Italy at the Peace Table depends on the contribution which the Italian people and Italian arms make in the common cause of driving the Germans beyond the Brenner.
 - b) The allied authorities have recognised and recognise the Government of Marshal Badoglio and the existing institutional position in the present task of cooperation as co-

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merit, at the same time recognising that the Italian people ultimately shall be given every opportunity to decide their own forms of government and other institutions based on democratic principles when paramount military requirements permit.

- c) The Allied authorities are quite aware of institutional differences of opinion among Italian parties and groups. The Allied position is one of complete neutrality. The only proviso is that the time at which it is possible to give full effect to the principles of complete liberty of action will be determined by the Commander-in-Chief on the basis of instructions received through the Combined Chiefs of Staff of the American, British and Soviet Republics forces.
- 3. The above does not imply a restriction of political opinion. On the contrary, the Allied authorities have explicitly expressed their hopes and desires to see the basis of the Italian Government extended to encompass all legitimate political thought. Liberty of the Press was considered an essential contribution to that end.
- 4. Abuse of that liberty will not be tolerated.
- 5. Grievances may be aired; opinions may be voiced; points of view may be advanced; differences may be debated; polemical discussion may be developed,--as in all democratic countries.
- 6. Incitations of class against class; threats; vulgar epithets; anonymous accusations; insinuations and innuendoes; personal vilification; willful accusations will no longer be allowed.
- 7. No criticism reflecting on the honour or good faith of Italian soldiers, irrespective of rank, fighting or cooperating with the Allied Forces will be allowed.
- 8. No writing calculated to disturb or foment the public, or calculated to lead to public disorder and disaffection can be allowed.
- 9. The existing wartime censorship control exercised in Apulia is considerably less than that exercised in allied countries at this time.
- 10. In order to lighten the task of those responsible for censorship, no material concerning the work of Italian individuals or units operating with the Allies are to be submitted in page proof or published unless the facts contained in such statements have been verified. Page proofs must similarly be free of all abuses such as those cited in para 6, 7 and 8 above.

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11. Any infringement of this order will mean not only the cancellation of the offending items, but cancellation of the whole number, the Allied authorities reserving to themselves any further action considered necessary.
12. To avoid such inevitable consequences, the authorities appeal to all newspaper Direttori Responsabili to think more of the dignity of the Italian Press than of its "liberty." The former will guarantee the latter.

F O R : The Allied Control Commission.

- I. For some time the Allied Governments have viewed with growing concern the multiplication of publications--authorised, unauthorised and clandestine--through all zones of liberated Italy from Sicily, Sardinia to the fighting lines.
- II. Three questions of major importance to Allied and Italian interests are involved in such productions: security (military censorship); political policy; and availability of printing facilities and supplies (paper and printing materials).
- III. The existing machinery of control is not adequate for present and future requirements.
- IV. General Eisenhower has accordingly created an Allied Publications Board comprised of members of PWB, AMG, ACC, Military Censorship and Security.
- V. The Board is empowered to draft such regulations and perform such functions as are necessary properly to carry out the following:
 1. Authorise the granting and revoking of licenses for the publication of newspapers, books, posters, placards, brochures and similar publication products.
 2. Control the flow into Italy, Sicily and Sardinia of all newsprint, and to control and distribute all newsprint found in Italy; to perform such functions as are necessary to maintain an adequate supply of newsprint.
 3. Control the construction, rehabilitation and allotment of line and radio services necessary for news; that is, all existing news wire and radio services necessary to maintain a steady-flow service to publications.
 4. Direct the consolidation, movement or rehabilitation of all equipment necessary for publication production.
 5. Enforce the directives of the various sections concerned with publication problems, and to issue censorship and policy directives as are necessary to the proper carrying out of the Commission's authority.
- VI. As a necessary preliminary, all publications now being printed,

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whether previously authorized or not, must file application for a license. (See Appendix A)

- VII. Application forms are available at the offices of all Prefects. (See Appendix B)
- VIII. All applications must be executed and filed with the Prefect prior to January 15th, 1944.
- IX. The Prefect may add his comments to the application and then channelize same to the Minister of the Interior.
- X. The Minister of the Interior may express his comments to the application and then present the application to the ACC who will direct the application to the Allied Publications Board for consideration and action.
- XI. It shall then be the duty of the APB to grant or disallow the issuance of a directive which will empower the local Prefect to so issue the license to publish and such directive if granted shall specifically set forth the terms of the license, i.e. duration of the license which will be standardized at three months, authorized circulation, size of the newspaper, and other clarifying matter.
- XII. The directive of the APB shall be channelized back to the applicant through the same procedure as its receipt.
- XIII. In the analysis of the applicant's request the APB shall take into consideration the following factors:
1. The availability of newsprint.
 2. The availability of adequate military censorship.
 3. The availability of PWB editorial direction.
 4. The general desirability of the newspaper from the standpoints of security, the need for such a newspaper in the locality in which publication is proposed, and other factors deemed important to determine whether directive shall be issued.
 5. The APB shall be further aided in its determination by special analysis reports filed with the board by the representatives in the field of ACC, Censorship, PWB and G-2.
- XIV. In order to carry out proposed censorship of publications in Italy, Sicily and Sardinia in conformity with the plan approved of by the Chief of Staff, the following procedure must be adopted:

(1P)

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1. Italian Press censorship must be established in all locations where publications have been or will be authorized.
 2. The Italian personnel to be used for censorship will work directly under the Italian Prefects and will follow the censorship instructions to be issued by the Censorship Branch, AFHQ. The Prefect will be held responsible for any breaches of the Allied Censorship directives.
 3. No Italian censors will be appointed by the Prefects until they have been approved by security personnel and the SCAU's attached to the Prefects. On approval full particulars should be forwarded to Chief, Censorship Branch at AFHQ.
- XV. Notwithstanding the foregoing procedure, all printed forms of news or opinion that are not fundamentally continuing or periodical in character, may be authorized or denied locally by a committee consisting of:
1. The Prefect.
 2. Censorship Branch, AFHQ.
 3. Psychological Warfare Branch, AFHQ.
- XVI. All persons or organizations having in their possession newsprint stock (roll or flatbed) and printing materials shall immediately report the inventory of the newsprint and its location to the Prefect. (See Appendices C and D)
- XVII. The above procedures are deemed adequate for proper publications' control. However, these procedures are subject to change by the Allied Publications Board and full notification shall be given such changes.

(a) Those now in publication with the proper Local, Censorship and PWB approval shall within ten days of the publication of notice make application for such license.

(b) Those newspapers now in publication without proper approval to so do must immediately discontinue publication until a license to so publish has been issued.

(c) Newspapers planning to publish shall properly make application prior to engaging in publication.

7. APB will advise all enforcement agencies of its decisions and the minimum and maximum penalties for violations thereof.

(a) In ACC territory formal enforcement of the APB directives shall be in the hands of the Italian Government.

(b) In AMG territory the formal enforcement shall rest with AMG.

Your participation in this work will be twofold:
