I am directed to acknowledge receipt of your  
letter AC/4113/2/L dated the 26th May, 1945 and its  
enclosures.

The following decisions have been taken by the  
C.C.A.C. with regard to these Decrees:-

- (a) they should not be extended to the occupied  
territories in Africa by a Proclamation of  
the B.M.A. concerned;
- (b) as they are not to be extended they will not affect  
the Custodian in the territories.
- (c) no regulations will be issued in the territories  
as a result of these or any similar decrees which  
may subsequently be issued;
- (d) the attention of the Custodian of Enemy Property  
in each territory has been drawn to these decrees  
in so far as they affect him in case he should  
have occasion to communicate with Italy or to  
dispose of any of the assets of any of the  
companies concerned in the territory.

3. I am further to point out that it is held that in  
view of the Proclamation which has been published in each

(2) they should not be extended they will not affect territories in Africa by a proclamation of the S.M.A. concerned;

- (b) as they are not to be extended they will not affect the Custodian in the territories.
- (c) no regulations will be issued in the territories as a result of these or any similar decrees which may subsequently be issued;

(d) the attention of the Custodian of Enemy Property in each territory has been drawn to these decrees in so far as they affect him in case he should have occasion to communicate with Italy or to dispose of any of the assets of any of the countries concerned in the territory.

3. I am further to point out that it is held that in view of the Proclamation which has been published in each territory in the terms of the Tripartite Italian Legislation Proclamation No. 93 a copy of which is enclosed herewith these Italian decrees have no effect in the territories and accordingly the occupying power's rights over the statal and parastatal property of the enemy state are unimpaired.

W H E R E A S it is desirable that the inhabitants should be left in no doubt as to the applicability to the occupied territory of legislation enacted by or under the authority of the Italian state since the British Military Occupation;

Now, THEREFORE, I, CHARLES HENRY JOHNSON, Colonel, Officer of the most Excellent Order of the British Empire,  
HEREBY PROCLAIM :-

ARTICLE 1.

As from the 23rd day of January 1943 no Law, Decree-Law or other legislative enactment of any kind made or passed by or under the authority of the Italian State on or after the occupied territory or any part thereof unless expressly proclaimed by the Chief Administrator to be applicable thereto.

SUBJECT Italian Decrees affecting Colonies.

TO Civil Affairs Branch, GHQ., N.Z.F.

1. Recently the Italian Government has passed without previous reference to this Sub-Commission six decrees concerning the administration of State and parastatal bodies in Libya and Italian East Africa.

These are as follows:-

DL of 15 Feb 45, No. 43 (G.U. No. 29)	Suppression of the African Italian Police Corps.
MD of 7 Oct 44 (G.U. No. 34)	Nominating a Receiver for the Ente for construction of Acqueducts in Italian East Africa.
MD of 26 Jan 45 (G.U. No. 37)	Appointment of liquidator for the AR&S.
MD of 10 Oct 44 (G.U. No. 40)	Appointment of Receiver for the Libyan Savings Bank.
MD of 15 Feb 45 (G.U. No. 40)	Substitution of administrator of CIAC.
MD of 21 Mar 45 (G.U. No. 46)	Nominating an Extraordinary Receiver for the "Ente di Colonizzazione della Libia".

The text of these decrees are contained in the attached marked copies of the "Official Gazette" sent for easier reference.

2. It was represented to the Italian Government that the enactment of decrees of this nature, without limitation as to the territory to which they refer, might cause confusion and create legal difficulties as to the effect of measures taken by the Military Administrations which are at present governing Italian Colonial territories.

3. To this the Italian Government has replied by suggesting, that to obviate possible difficulties, this Sub-Commission should request the Military Administrations concerned to advise what regulations if any have been issued by them in respect of these and any further decrees of a like nature issued in the future, so that steps may be taken to co-ordinate the administrative functions and financial position of the institutions affected.

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4. In the event that this suggestion is considered workable will you kindly advise this Sub-Commission so that a suitable reply may be made to the Italian Government.

Dear Admiral,

I have received your letter of April 11th about the decrees for the administration of parastatal institutes in Libya and in Italian East Africa.

For what concerns the decree which suppresses the Italian Africa police Corps, we agree; it is understood that this decree can change neither the status, of the officers and other ranks who belonged to this Corps and as such are still prisoners of war in Africa, nor the action which has been taken by the Allied Military Authorities for the possible utilization of elements of the P.A.I. in the Italian Colonies.

For what concerns the other regulations, as you have seen, their aim is to take care of the patrimony of the parastatal Institutes, which exercise an industrial or commercial activity, and administer their property placed under the administration of the Italian Government, and settle the question of the personnel, in the service of these Institutes, and at present in liberated Italy. My dear Mr. Prime Minister,

The Italian Government has recently passed five decrees for the administration of parastatal institutions in Libya and Italian East Africa.

The decrees are:-

MD of 15 Feb 45 N. 43.

Suspension of the African Italian Police Corps.

MD of 7 Oct 44 (G.U.N. 34)

Nominating a Receiver for the Fund for Construction of Aqueducts in Italian East Africa.

MD of 26 Jan 45 (G.U.N. 37)

Appointment of liquidator for the AIS.

MD of 10 Oct 44 (G.U.N. 40)

Appointment of Receiver for the Libya Savings Bank.

MD of 15 Feb 45 (G.U.N. 40)

Substitution of administrator of CAAO.

I appreciate that it is necessary to make provision for the management and administration of assets of such concerns which are at present situate in Italian Government Territory. I feel, however, that the enactment of decrees of this nature, without limitation as to the territory to which they refer, may cause confusion and may create legal difficulties as to the validity of measures taken by the Military Administrations which are at present governing Italian Colonial territories.

I must therefore request Your Excellency that if it is necessary in the future to issue further decrees of this nature, you will ensure that the decrees are so framed as to contain definite words of limitation which restrict the scope of the decree to property or assets now situated in Italian Government territory and actually under the control of the Italian Government.
