

SUBJECT : Case of Lieut. FABI Maulio.

TO : V.P. Adm Sec.

29 August 1944.

1. A serious shooting incident occurred at MESSINA on 2 JULY 1944 between British and Italian troops in the course of which several persons were killed and others wounded. The main centre of the disturbance was the ACC garage in Via S. Martino.

2. A Court of Enquiry was held and found (inter alia) the following facts:-

(a) The origin of the disturbance was an unprovoked assault by 5 British seamen under the influence of drink on an inoffensive Italian soldier.

(b) At about 2100 hours, Captain Williams, R.M. and Lieut. Hayward R.M. were walking towards Piazza Cairoli and hearing shooting took refuge in a garage in the Via Ugo Bassi (NOT the ACC garage) A group of Italians came to the garage and shot Lieut. Hayward (N.B. Lieut. Hayward was wounded, not killed) who jumped at one of the Italians.

These Italians had been brought from their barracks by a 2/Lt. FBI who declares that they were warned not to shoot unless attacked. 2/Lt. FBI appears to have had little control over his men.

3. There is also the combined and undisputed evidence of Lieut. ROSSO and Lieut. FBI to show that at about 2045 hours and prior to the episode in 2 (b) above, Lieut. ROSSO in the Piazza Cairoli "ordered Lieut. FBI to take half his men to the ACC Garage". On his way to the garage Lieut. FBI's party entered Via Ugo Bassi, and saw some British soldiers in the garage there. The incident in 2 (b) above then occurred. After this incident Lieut. FBI states that he did not go to the ACC garage because "I was afraid to go any further and so returned to the piazza Cairoli."

4. As a result of the Court of Enquiry the District Commander has directed or recommended disciplinary action against various British officers, ratings and O.Rs and has directed that the G.O.C., 12 Italian Corps take disciplinary action against Lieut. ROSSO.

5. The District Commander has however recommended, and the Commander-in-Chief A.I.I. has directed that Lieut. FBI Mallio be brought to trial before an Allied Military Court.

6. The allegations made against Lieut. FBI are :-

(i) Neglect of duty in that as a result of his failure to take charge of the situation, Italian soldiers under his command opened fire on British personnel without due reason.
Had his movements been actuated by a desire to stop the shooting and to quell the disorder rather than aggravate it this entire incident could have been avoided. He admits that no fire had been forthcoming from the garage.

(ii) Whilst he knew that a British officer or soldier had been wounded he took no action whatsoever to help him.

(iii) His subsequent admission that he failed to carry out Lieut. Rosso's orders to proceed to the ACC garage because he was afraid indicates cowardice and further neglect of duty.

7. In view of the Commander-in-Chief's order this Sub-Commission has been preparing the charges for the proposed Court. It is felt that your attention should be drawn to the following points :-

(a) So far as the first ground of complaint is concerned, a general neglect of duty of this nature by an Italian officer can only be the subject of disciplinary proceedings for breach of "regolamento disciplinare". Such proceedings are heard by the C.O. of the person charged and are not cognizable before a court of record. There is in fact no charge which can be drawn which would give jurisdiction to any court and it is submitted therefore that an Allied Military Court could not be given jurisdiction to hear the case.

It should be mentioned that there are certain specific acts of neglect of duty which are triable by a court, but these are specified in Arts. 94 - 98 of C.P.M.G. and the omissions covered by those articles are all particular acts of neglect in special circumstances e.g. failure to take command in action, failure to attack the enemy, failure to prevent being surprised by the enemy.

(b) The second ground of complaint can be made the subject of a charge under Art. 593 of C.P. which provides that a penalty up to 3 months imprisonment may be awarded to anyone who finds a person wounded and neglects to afford the necessary assistance or to give immediate notification to the authorities. There is, however, no doubt that on the facts of this case Lieut. FABI would have to be acquitted on this charge, as other persons, of his own nationality, were present who could, and did, look after Lieut. Hayward.

There is no other charge which can be brought on this head, and indeed it is doubtful whether in the circumstances Lieut. FABI's conduct even amounted to a breach of the regolamento disciplinare.

(c) On the third head a charge can be laid under Art. 101 C.P.M.G. for failure to carry out an order. It is felt that any charge of cowardice is out of the question in the circumstances (apart from the difficulty of proof) and that the charge must be limited to the fact that Lieut. FABI entered the Via Ugo Bassi garage instead of going to the A.C.C. Garage. This charge might succeed but it is felt that Lieut. FABI would argue with considerable force

- (i) that his orders were very general and really amounted to a direction to quell the disturbance
- (ii) that when he saw British soldiers enter the garage it was within the scope of his mission to prevent them causing any trouble.
- (iii) that his failure thereafter to proceed to the A.C.C. garage did not affect the course of the proceedings.

8. It is felt that the proposed trial of Lieut. FABI springs from the fact that through an unnecessary act on his part a British officer, Lieut. Hayward, was wounded although he had not taken any part whatsoever in the unfortunate events of the evening. It is thought, however, that any such trial would place the conduct of Lieut. FABI in an entirely false perspective in relation to the events of the evening; that if he is convicted any punishment which the Allied Court could award would be of a very light and entirely in-appropriate character; and that in fact he would probably be acquitted.

9. In these circumstances it is recommended that, if possible, the Commander-in-Chief be asked to reconsider his decision. If the decision is to be accepted as final it is recommended that the charges be framed as indicated in para. 7 (b) and (c) above.

10. The file, containing the proceedings and the Court of Enquiry is enclosed.
