SUBJECT: Italian Deserters.

TO : Chief Legal Officers, Regions 1 & 2.

Members of the Italian Armed Forces who deserted between 10 July and 8 September 1943, inclusive, shall not be punished for desertion except those who deserted to the German or other hostile army.

However, the foregoing does not preclude trial and punishment by an Italian Military Tribunal of those who so deserted between the dates above mentioned, for their failure to return to the Italian Armed Forces after 6 October 1943, provided they were given due and proper notice to return by that date. In such cases the deserters may be tried and punished for failure to return and not for the original desertion.

The Italian Commanders in Your Region should be advised accordingly.

Dear Nicky,

FCC, your letter WASH/300 of 27 Dec. 13, I beg to answer with
your instructions to advise you in regard to questions of unclaimed property.

We enclose order we issued to Region II for the following reasons:

There, Article 16 of the 1941 Act does not permit a claimant who has not been born even in the place of his last residence or has not been present at the time of his birth to file a claim. This provision is designed to prevent the collection of the same from the same individual by the same authority. It is also intended to prevent the same individual from being compelled to pay twice for the same property.

We had been unable with the limited information available to determine about this and our solution was to issue to them, at the cost of the direction of the police and the state attorney general, the appropriate order to the local public utility companies, to collect the money collected by the utility companies, to be returned to Region II, and deleted the unnecessary communication received from, to be returned to Region II.

your instructions to Region II in regard to Quarters of Abnormal property.

The enclosed order was issued by Region I for the following reasons:

Special Agents to the FBI, 10/1/53, "If a person has not been seen in the place of his last article of residence or has not been seen at his residence ever, the record of whence can only be secured by the Agent of the FBI, or by an alternative Police constable, a sufficient time has passed so the local Sheriff's office, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Oklahoma, may be asked to make contact with the Sheriff of the county and furnish him with the name of the individual, and with the property described above, he is entitled to Region II."

In just two weeks with the Federal Agent & his Assistant Agent and one Special Agent of the FBI, the Agent of the Sheriff of Polk and the Sheriff of Tulsa, the information we obtained were both more accurate to the situation, and it is our opinion that we will be Region II to contact and furnish. Considering the order which was issued, and with the property described as noted above, he is entitled to Region II.

Dear Gerald:

1. Colonel Growden has handed me your letters of 6 and 7 December and the letter from Thackrah for Guy Hannaford.
2. Guy Hannaford apparently is suffering from a kidney stone and I doubt if he will move out with the rest of the party even if he escapes an operation. I have turned over to Ed. Palmieri your letter of 7 December and enclosure and the letter from Thackrah.
3. Now apparently we go to Salerno where the administrative sub-commissions are to be housed. I have been advised that I will leave here by air after the convoy has gotten under way.
4. All files are now packed up and we will have to practice by memory.
5. Colonel Growden tells me the procuring of funds for the Electric Company went along satisfactorily. At this end it was thought that the Italian Government would want to follow some statutory course and suggested the war damage statute as a basis. However, if the Italian Government wants to make a direct authorization to AMGA without relation to the statute that is equally good.
6. I have delivered to George Pollock the files in the case of Pace and Catalano.
7. I am sending to Colonel Rowe the directives on decentralization of AMG.
8. I have had no familiarity with the memorandum of Guy Hannaford referred to in your letter of 7 December. In his absence I hope Ed. Palmieri can straighten it out.
9. There are no letters in this APO for Thackrah or yourself.

Dear Gerald,

1. I am sending this letter in answer to yours of 3rd December received yesterday by quickest route whatever that may prove to be.
2. Guy Hannaford's letter of 7th December enclosed herewith answers your questions in paragraph 3 of your letter.
3. Guy's letter also answers para. 4 of your letter.

4. Salerno and Sorrento both were definitely off yesterday. A somewhat reduced party was then made up to go to Naples on Thursday but transportation difficulties developed. I still have listed, and have approval for, the following officers and other ranks: Marc; Guy; Ed Palmieri and myself; S/Sgt. Wright. 1/Cpl. Parps and Cpl. Latella. This aside from the Chief Judicial Officer Group and Matt. Correas' Group which now includes Lt. Col. Willis and Major McFadyean who have arrived, leaves Dawson and Cpl. Principiano here to be sent for when I can. I wanted Dawson to be here for a while to see that things coming in late are routed to us. Cpl. Principiano has not finished with the Ustica Hearings. This morning Guy was taken ill and is in the hospital. He may have to be operated upon. I think it most unlikely he will come with us. The latest is we all travel by convoy leaving Saturday morning, also that we do go to Sorrento after all. Rely on none of this, however, as it all may be changed. George Parlin has not arrived and I have sent for him again. The story is that the last of A.C.C. party was one day and night on a boat at Algiers and was taken off and sent back to Tizi Ouzou.

5. The papers referred to in paragraphs 7 and 8 of your letter were started on their way last night by Guy.
6. Guy's letter of 7th December with enclosures covers the matters referred to in paragraph 10 of your letter. He told me that with these papers in hand there can be no misunderstanding. By way of further explanation, the heading "Posti Vacanti" in the typewritten list means posts that were vacant when the Allies came in or posts from which judges subsequently were removed by us, by resignation, by being pensioned, or by death. The heading "Titoli della Destinazione" signifies the method of filling vacancies i.e. by promotion, transfer etc. This typewritten list shows appointments approved by General McSherry, as they stand today. All others are in the printed booklet enclosed. The only vacancies not filled in 1943 are those marked "M.N." in the printed booklet. That is before we came in the Italian Government itself had not filled them. All this I understand to be correct as the result of much cross examination last night. I enclose a copy of a letter Guy wrote last night to

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7. The directive to legal officers concerning promotions etc. in Italian Courts will be prepared in accordance with what you say in paragraph 10 of your letter. However, you will recall that we touched on this to some extent in paragraph 8 of our long directive (copy as approved is enclosed) on change from A.M.G. to A.C.C. That has not been released yet and will not be until restoration is imminent. Therefore our directive dealing more specifically with the contents of your paragraph 10 can not go out. In a conference with Dickie, I had him select the three legal officers he wants to be attached to the three First Presidents in Region I. I have not written to Major Howe on this and prefer not to do so until we are closer to the dead line.

8. Documents A, B and C have never been received here.

9. There are enclosed copies of General Orders 12, 13, 14 and 16 and the position with regard to General Orders since General Order No. 10 is as follows :-

General Order No.11. This is the one dealing with the Amendment of Rationing Scheme and Amassi Laws on which you wrote to Industry and Commerce as to whether they wanted us to take the matter further. No reply has been received.

General Order No.12. Deals with Reorganization of the Bar Association and was published in "Sicilia Liberata" of 22nd October 1943. It will be printed in Sicily Gazette No.4.

General Order No.13. Bills of Exchange. Approved by Finance and signed by Brig-General McSherry on 23. Nov.43. Finance is dealing with its publication.

General Order No.14. Temporary Wage Adjustment. The whole of this was prepared and distributed by Region I.

General Order No.15. Re-opening of Bank of Italy. Has not yet been finally approved by Finance.

General Order No.16. Extension of Property Control to appropriate provinces on the mainland of Italy. ~~Has~~ ^{to} been approved by D.C.C.A.O. and Colonel Harris is attending to its publication.

10. Some Russians are expected to be here tomorrow and we were asked to turn over the legal car to them. However, the Sicilians got there first and stole it two nights ago.

11. Any mail for you and Thackrah will be sent along with this letter.

12. Capt. Severn's letter which you sent me has been returned to the A.P.O. for delivery.

13. Also enclosed is a formal letter I wrote you yesterday morning about Italian Military Tribunals. They are going to be quite a headache and will require some further consideration on our part and also on the part of our own Military people.

14. I am enclosing a directive gotten out about office of Director of Special Prosecutions which Colonel Spofford approved. It has been distributed.

15. ⁶³ Your telegram asking that memorandum on Italian Courts and legal set up be held up if not already distributed, for amendments, Guy told me it has already been distributed.

16. I hope before long we can be working at the same place. It is difficult now to be sure we are keeping on exactly the same lines with work being done at two places.

Advised by Poletti that at recent meeting Prefects Region 1, all incumbents except 1 career Prefect expressed view that they would be unable to continue in office after turn over if oath to the King was required. Similar attitude said to be taken by considerable number Sindacos and other officials appointed by AMG. This general reaction items from fact that King associated with Fascism in minds these officials. Poletti believes feeling sincere and for most part not dominated by partisan considerations.

Paragraph three Document C seems enough to permit Prefects and other officials appointed by AMG to continue without oath. However feel you should be advised of present attitude here and concur in this interpretation.

1. This comes per Col. Allright and will I hope reach you speedily.
2. The place is in an upsurge as the Muslim Insurrection has arrived; Vyshinsky, Macmillan, Murphy; no one knows what they are up to, but personally I hope we may get a useful line on policy after their deliberations.
3. I am the Minister of Justice minister. They want to know the whereabouts of:

Cassetti - formerly Int. President of the World of Civilization, Rome and Mazzini - Section President of the Govt. of Civilization, Rome.
They think they may be in Tel Aviv. Can you ask G. Stamford and Col. Young to make arrangements and send up a signal.

4. I have to get a signal from G.H. fairly soon that Ghermano or Homo is on his way.

5. I left one writer outstanding which I forgot to take up with you, as that was the question of printing those 5,000 extra copies of certain publications and papers which have waited.
