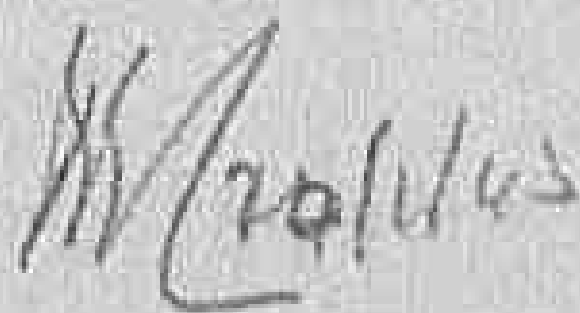

1. The following ^{is} excerpt from the January 1st report of Capt. Macfarlane, Civil Defence Officer Region III, concerning the death of Capt. Griswold.

" I regret to report that on Sunday, 26th December 1943, Captain Griswold, Civil Defence Officer for the City of Naples, was killed in the following circumstances:

On information received, Captain Griswold and myself went to Fontanelle - map reference: 205/512 Town Plan of Naples 1: 10,000. At about 1615 hrs. we found that a fire had broken out in a grotto used by the U.S. Army - Chemical Warfare Branch - Military and civilian Firemen were in attendance, but, as it was obvious from the constant series of small explosions which could be heard, that the risk involved in attempting to extinguish the fire was much too great, it was decided to withdraw all men to a distance of about 150 yards. It was also intended to find out how serious the fire would be in view of the fact that the contents of the dump were unknown to us. At 1638 hrs., there was a very heavy

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I went to PAD Control; Via Tarsia and reported these facts within a short time. I learned that there was a possibility

of another heavy explosion and an evacuation of the area for a radius of 800 yards was ordered by General Pence. This evacuation was carried out in an orderly manner with much assistance from 300 CC.RR., supplied by Lieut. Col. Doherty. During the night adequate measures were taken to provide welfare facilities for evacuated people. It was found impossible to evacuate completely the S.Gennaro al Poweri Hospital, owing to the lack of suitable space in the town. This evacuation was completed during daylight on Monday 27th December.

The whole incident was controlled by the Military Authorities and no other civilian services were in action at any time. At 1700 hrs., on Tuesday, 28th December, control of the incident was turned over to the CC.RR. and most of the area reopened to the public. Considerable structural damage was done to houses above the grotto and some of these are dangerous and uninhabitable. The Genio Civile has been asked to make an inspection of these houses and every effort will be made to avoid civilian casualties should there be any collapse".

2. As I accompanied Capt. Griswold and Capt. Macfarlane to Fontanelle on the afternoon of 26th of December 1943, I should like to add my report.

3. The report of a fire of considerable proportions at Fontanelle was received by Capt. Griswold and Capt. Macfarlane at about 1545 hrs. at our billets. Because a large water main ran through the

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3. The report of a fire of considerable proportions at Fontanelle was received by Capt. Griswold and Capt. Macfarlane at about 1545 hrs. at our billets. Because a large water main ran through the area, I accompanied Capt. Macfarlane & Capt. Griswold. When we arrived on the farm land near the mouth of the cave, Capt. Griswold and Capt. Macfarlane met Comandante Felsani and began to discuss the possibilities of extinguishing the fire. I met Eng. Negri near them, and found that there was a large water main passing near the top of the cave, but

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nothing could be done about it. As Capt. Macfarlane has reported, the explosions which were constantly occurring, were sufficient to have the Chemical Warfare Branch Military Personnel ordered to turn about and remove all Military vehicles on the location. All firemen and all other personnel were ordered to withdraw to a distance of about 150 yards from the mouth of the cave. The explosion which killed Capt. Griswold and the subsequent explosions (one heavier than the others) were of sufficient force to open up ten craters which cover approximately five acres.

Captain Macfarlane and I returned to the area at about 1930 hrs. with S/Sgt Davini, Sgt. Regonini, Cpl. Cimador, Cpl. Merighi and Private Hayes, driving a jeep, weapons carrier and one civilian car. At this time a deep large air raid shelter was evacuated of about 50 people. These included many old and sick persons one of whom was a paralytic who had to be carried out of the shelter on an improvised stretcher to an ambulance. All of these people were directed by S/Sgt. Davini (an Italian) to leave the shelter and, holding hands, to proceed without confusion and without Military Police escort towards Via Roma out of the danger zone. Because of the danger involved with the broken live electric wires in the zone, all power was ordered shut off in the 1543 transformer serving this zone. Since the Military vehicles could be of no use, they were returned to the Motor Pool at about 2100 hrs.

Subsequent to this we visited 4 hospitals in an effort to locate the body of Capt. Griswold. At 0200 hrs. the following morning a similar visit

MEMORANDUM OF THE DAMAGES WHICH OCCURRED AT THE ZONE FONTANELLE
IN CONSEQUENCE OF THE EXPLOSIONS IN THE GROTTA 26 - 27 DECEMBER 1943

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1. Grotto at "Salita Scudillo alla Conocchia" under Valiante property. The explosion has caused the projection of various materials (stones, iron, plates, oil, barrels etc.) in the street. along the first stretch towards the tunnel entrance for a length of about 50 m.

The adjoining buildings, and those along the sides of the street, have suffered damages, such as disconnection of frames, breaking of glasses, derangement of attics etc.

Farther on, the same street has been also blocked, in a considerable way, by the collapse of walls and the accumulation of debris projected in the street. The blocked stretch is of about m. 100, reaching as far as Piazzetta Taverna Nuova.

The explosion has caused, on the left side of the street before reaching the small square, a large crater and the collapse of one of the streets and some walls.

On one side of this crater, and farther on, near the slope ^{15/1} leading to Villa Accardi, formerly Valiante, and nearer to the Piazzetta, the explosion has formed another crater.

So the Accardi property, consisting of the main villa and

the little villa called Casa Serema have been both damaged.

2. The building of Pantano Institute, near the zone where the explosion occurred, has suffered static disconnections, collapse of the partition walls, and breaking of frames and glasses, while the little cottage called S. Ignazio, adjoining to the inner yard of the building, and also property of the Institute, has been seriously damaged. Near the inner yard of the college, another explosion has caused the collapse of the vault of the Tunnel, with consequent projection of blocks against the inner wall of the same college, and a breach on the front wall with relative partial collapses, for which repairing works are necessary.

3. Near by the inner yard of the college and farther on, starting from the two entrances to the old tuf quarries, the explosion has caused the caving in of a part of the grotto. This large crater is about 60 m. wide, 70 m. deep and 15 m. high. In consequence of this explosion the buildings on the hill and near the crater, are partly collapsed and partly seriously damaged. This crater has also caused the destruction of a stretch of Bonomo street, called Cuparella.

4. In the Piazzetta Taverna Nuova, the building on the right corner has partially collapsed, and the adjoining buildings have been damaged.

5. On the right of Salita Soudillo, in the first stretch, the

Good supply is key to general situation. Only 2-3 days supply available.
