SUBJECT: Report of Investigation of Unauthorized Confiscation of Firearms.

TO : Commanding General, XII Troop Carrier Command, APO 760, U. S. Army.

I. AUTHORITY:

1. This investigation was ordered by VOOG, XII TCC (Prov) on the basic communication initiated by AMGOT Hq., Sicily, 19 September 1943 and endorsements thereto.

II. MATTERS INVESTIGATED:

2. The basic communication reports that on 6 September 1943 three (3) pistols of the Finance Guard were confiscated at the Guard Caserma by three officers who gave to that Guard a note reading, "9-6-43, three pistols taken from this station by the undersigned officers. There was an urgent need for same. 78 TGR 426 ABS" and signed "Lt. J. T. McHugh, O-654320, Lt. D. C. Kriedt, O-520201, Lt. C. W. Barber, O-520225".

3. The basic communication was forwarded through channels to the CO 29th TC Sq, who replied by 7th Ind., dated 16 October 1943 that an investigation was made; that the action of the officers was based on information derived by them from some American officer who had stated to them that such proceeding was an orderly manner of securing a pistol for a souvenir; that the pistols had been returned; and that such unofficial actions on the part of members of his squadron would be strongly discouraged.

III. FACTS:

4. In the latter part of August or the early part of September 1943, 1st Lt. John J. Smyth O-797092, 29th TC Sq., 313th TC Gp., met, on a presently unidentifiable airdrome, in Sicily, a presently unidentifiable United States Army Major who had in his possession in his baggage as souvenirs a number of foreign pistols and who, on inquiry, advised Lt. Smyth it was the common practice of the officers whom he knew to confiscate or requisition pistols from the Italians by giving a receipt therefor in the form of that recited above.

5. Lt. Smyth, acting on the implied suggestion, at the first available opportunity, at Agrigento, Sicily, in company with 2nd Lt. Daniel C. Kriedt, O-520201, of the same organization, entered the Caserma or (barracks or station) of the Italian Finance Guard at Agrigento, Sicily, for the purpose of obtaining pistols.

6. Lt. Smyth asked the Italian officer in charge to show him and Lt. Kriedt their firearms, as Lt. Smyth and Lt. Kriedt desired three pistols. The Italian officer answered that that would be impossible as he was not authorized to permit pistols to be taken from the building. Lt. Smyth, after

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viewing the pistols, in company with Lt. Kriedt, therupon wrote on a plain piece of paper furnished by the Italian officer the "receipt" above quoted and the officer delivered to them the three pistols.

7. Lt. Kriedt signed the receipt for himself, signing his own correct name and serial number, and also signed "for" Lt. Chester W. Barber, giving Lt. Barber's correct name and serial number. Lt. Smyth signed the receipt "Lt. John T. McHugh, O-654320", a fictitious name and serial number. The "78 TGR 426 ABS" was merely as much abracadabra designed to give the "receipt" an air of official authority.

8. Lt. Kriedt delivered one of the three pistols to Lt. Barber shortly thereafter and acquainted him with the fact that they had obtained them at the police station in the manner stated and that his name had been signed to the receipt. Lt. Barber was not present at the police station nor had he previously authorized Lt. Smyth to sign his name or to obtain the pistol in the fashion stated by him.

9. All three officers retained the pistols until at or about 16 October when their squadron commander, having received the AMGOT communication referred to, instructed them to return the pistols. They carried out this instruction by turning the pistols over to the squadron adjutant who turned them over to the Finance Guard and obtained back the receipt originally given by the three officers. For their actions they received from their squadron commander an oral admonition.

IV. DISCUSSION:

10. None of the three officers was authorized to confiscate a pistol from the Finance Guard.

11. Lt. Smyth and Lt. Kriedt, together, without authority, and by signing and delivering a false written statement, induced the Finance Guard to deliver three pistols to them, which they received and two of which they retained until ordered by higher authority to return them. In addition, Lt. Smyth, in his signature, used a fictitious name and serial number.

12. Lt. Barber received from Lt. Smyth and Kriedt one of the pistols, having knowledge of the circumstances under which they were obtained and likewise retained the pistol until ordered by higher authority to return it.

13. Lt. Barber, Smyth and Kriedt took such action after Lt. Smyth had been advised by a presently unidentifiable American Major at a presently unidentifiable airfield that the practice described was the method commonly used by officers whom he knew, in obtaining souvenir pistols.

14. There was no "urgent need for the pistols". They were, on the contrary, obtained solely as souvenirs.

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V. CONCLUSIONS:

15. Lt. Smyth as the prime mover in the transaction, Lt. Kriedt as a colleague therein, and Lt. Barber, who impliedly endorsed their action, as a beneficiary thereof, obtained three pistols from the Italian Finance Guard through false pretenses, and in doing so displayed a complete lack of any sense of responsibility as officers and a further lack of any sense of wrongdoing in obtaining the pistols through such false pretenses and for a wholly unauthorized purpose.


16. The American Major who advised such procedure, whose identity, unfortunately, cannot now be determined, displayed these characteristics to an even higher degree in not only himself apparently following such practices but in advising junior officers to do likewise.

17. The evidence with respect to the unknown field officer is of course, only hearsay, but is believed reliable. All three officers were entirely candid in their testimony and gave a full and frank statement of the facts. All three officers are of young age, little experience and immature judgment.

18. No disciplinary action appears to have been taken as yet in the matter. The oral reprimand given the officers by their Squadron Commander appears to have been administrative in nature and effect.

VI. RECOMMENDATIONS:

19. In view of the age and lack of experience or mature judgment of the subject officers, of their present realization of the true character of their actions, of their prompt return of the confiscated property, and of the probability that their future conduct will be such as not to again bring such discredit upon the service, it is recommended, both in the best interests of the service and of the subject officers, that disciplinary action be initiated with respect to them under the 104th Article of War, only.

Testimony given by 2nd Lt. Daniel C. Kriedt, 29th Troop Carrier Squadron, to 1st Lt. George J. Banigan, Staff Judge Advocate, XIII Troop Carrier Command, (Prov), on 5 November 1943 at Headquarters XIII Troop Carrier Command (Prov), Palermo, Sicily.

1. Witness Sworn.
2. Q. Please give your name, rank, organization, serial number and station.
A. 2nd Lt. Daniel C. Kriedt, O-520201, 29th Troop Carrier Squadron. I am stationed at Mile Air Base, Sicily.
3. Q. I now read to you the 24th Article of War. (24th AW read). Do you understand your rights under that Article?
A. Yes.
4. Q. I show you a letter, AMGOT Hqs, dated 16 September 1943, to the President Marshall Seventh Army, referring to the taking of three (3) pistols from the Finance Guard at the Caserma (Barracks), on 6 September 1943 by three officers who gave a receipt for the pistols signing their names Lt. John J. McHugh, D. C. Kriedt, and C. W. Barber. Are you the Lt. Kriedt referred to in that letter?
A. Yes.
5. Q. Do you wish to make any comment with respect to the statements contained in that letter?
A. We were in Agrigente on DS and were anxious to procure some Berretti pistols. It was suggested that they could be procured by entering any police station filling out any required forms and signing an alias. So we went to the Italian police station in Agrigente and we entered the building and asked to see the pistols they had. They did not have any Berretti's but they did have some revolvers of an old make the name of which I don't know. We made out a receipt for them and left with the pistols.
6. Q. From what source did you receive the suggestion that that was a method of securing a Berretti pistol?
A. I did not receive the suggestion.
7. Q. Do you know who did?
A. Yes.

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8. Q. Who?

A. Lt. Smyth.

9. Q. Who were the members of the group who went to the police station whom you referred to as "we"?

A. Myself and Lt. Smyth.

10. Q. Were you and Lt. Smyth in uniform at the time you entered the police station?

A. We were.

11. Q. Have you a copy of the receipt that you gave for the pistols?

A. I do not, but I believe the original receipt is at our Squadron Headquarters because it was returned to the Squadron when the pistols were returned to the police station.

12. Q. Did the officials at the police station speak English?

A. Just a few words.

13. Q. Did you have a conversation with the officials in the police station?

A. I did not myself.

14. Q. Who did?

A. Lt. Smyth.

15. Q. In what language was that conversation?

A. French.

16. Q. Did you understand the general purport of the conversation?

A. I could understand just a few words of French but I knew what the gist of the conversation was and what we were doing.

17. Q. What was your understanding of what you were doing?

A. We were procuring pistols by confiscation.

18. Q. Your statement that there was an "urgent need" for the pistols was not true?

A. It was not.

19. Q. Was this receipt on a printed form?

A. No.

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20. Q. You wrote on the wording of the receipt?
- A. No.
21. Q. Lt. Smyth did?
- A. Yes.
22. Q. After the receipt was given did you and Lt. Smyth leave the police station with the pistols?
- A. Yes.
(Proceeding recessed from 1830, November 5, to 1030, November 6, 1943).
23. Q. How many?
- A. Three (3) pistols.
24. Q. Who signed the receipt?
- A. Lt. Smyth and myself.
25. Q. Did you sign your own name and serial number?
- A. Yes, I did.
26. Q. When was the next time you heard of this matter?
- A. Around the 16th of October. We were reprimanded by our Squadron CO for taking such action. He instructed us to return the pistols in the same condition that we received them. Lieutenants Smyth and Barber who had the other two (2) pistols, and myself, turned the pistols over to the Squadron adjutant who turned them over to the police station and got back the receipt we gave.
27. Q. Were you subjected to any disciplinary action by your commanding officer in connection with this matter?
- A. We were reprimanded by the Squadron CO and as I said before, he told us to return the pistols which we did.
28. Q. Was the reprimand oral or in writing?
- A. It was an oral reprimand.
29. Q. Were you subjected to any punishment other than the oral reprimand?
- A. No.
30. Q. Have you anything further that you wish to add to your testimony?
- A. No.

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Testimony given 1st Lt. John J. Smyth, 29th Troop Carrier Squadron to 1st Lt. George J. Banigan, Staff Judge Advocate, XIII Troop Carrier Command, (Prov), on 6 November 1943 at Headquarters XIII Troop Carrier Command (Prov), Palermo, Sicily.

1. Witness Sworn.

2. Q. Please give your name, rank, organization, serial number and station.

A. 1st Lt. John J. Smyth, O-797092, 29th Troop Carrier Squadron. I am stationed at Mile, Sicily.

3. Q. Have you been present throughout the testimony given yesterday and today by Lt. Kreidt?

A. Yes Sir.

4. Q. And have you heard the reading of the 24th Article of War to him, all the questions put to him and the answers?

A. I have.

5. Q. Do you understand your rights under the 24th Article of War?

A. I do.

6. Q. If I were to ask you the same questions which I asked Lt. Kreidt would you give substantially the same answers in so far as that testimony relates to you?

A. I would.

7. Q. Lt. Kreidt testified that the officials at the police station spoke only a few words of English and that you carried on all the conversation with them in connection with this matter in French. Is that correct?

A. That is.

8. Q. Will you please state the substance of your conversation with the police officials?

A. I asked the Italian officer in charge to show me their firearms. He took Lt. Kreidt and myself into a room, the walls of which were lined with Italian rifles and a number of old pistols. I told him that I would like to have three (3) pistols and he answered that that would be impossible as he was ordered by the Major of the town not to allow any of the pistols be taken from the building. I told him to let me have a plain slip of paper and I would fill out a requisition which he could give to the Major if the occasion arose. He gave me the paper and I wrote out the receipt in question. I signed the receipt, John J. McHugh and gave a false serial number. Lt. Kreidt signed for himself and Lt. Barber using correct name and serial number of Lt. Barber and himself. After we signed the receipt the officer in charge handed over the three pistols and we left the building.

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9. Q. Referring to the letter from AMGOT Headquarters, dated September 19, I ask you if it correctly quotes the receipt which you and Lt. Kreidt signed?

A. Yes, it does.

10. Q. Your name is not Lt. John J. McHugh?

A. No.

11. Q. And your serial number is not O-6543207?

A. That is correct.

12. Q. But this is the name and serial number you signed to the receipt?

A. That is correct.

13. Q. What is your understanding of the meaning of the phrase "78 TGR 426 ABS" which you wrote in that receipt?

A. It has no meaning at all. It's simply a fictitious organization which we gave to satisfy the officer in charge.

14. Q. In other words this phrase was merely as much abracadabra designed to give the receipt an air of official authority?

A. That is correct.

15. Q. What was your understanding of the nature of this transaction or of your authority to seize confiscate or requisition the pistols?

A. I fully realized that I had no authority to confiscate the pistols, however as Lt. Kreidt stated, we were very anxious to acquire Berretti pistols and it appeared to me that that would be the easiest way and in my mind the least harmful.

16. Q. For what purpose did you desire the Berretti pistols?

A. Simply for souvenirs.

17. Q. There was then no "urgent need".

A. No.

18. Q. Lt. Kreidt testified in substance, if I recollect correctly, that you were told prior to this event that this would be an appropriate procedure by which to obtain Italian pistols. Is that correct?

A. I wasn't told that it was the most appropriate way of acquiring pistols but that it was the easiest way and that by using this method we would incriminate no one and also have a greater selection to pick from. 76

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19. Q. Who was the [redacted]er who told you so?

A. I honestly don't know. He was an officer at some field in Sicily, and he showed me his collection of foreign arms.

20. Q. Did he state he had used this method?

A. When I asked him how he acquired the pistols he said it was the common practice of the officers whom he knew to use this method.

21. Q. At what airfield did you meet this Major?

A. I don't remember the airfield. At the time when the opportunity of acquiring the pistols presented itself, I followed his suggestion.

22. Q. Were you stationed on the airfield where you met this Major?

A. No.

23. Q. Was your organization stationed there?

A. No Sir.

24. Q. Was this airfield in Sicily?

A. I could not say whether the field was in Sicily or Africa.

25. Q. Is it therefore your testimony that although you met this Major, examined his collection of foreign pistols and the like and received this suggestion from him and was able to recall the suggestion prior to the event which is the subject of this investigation, you are nevertheless within a short time after that event unable to recall whether the airfield at which you met this Major and had that conversation with him was in Sicily or Africa?

A. Yes. Because at that particular time we were making two and three trips a day between Africa and Sicily, and on landing at fields in either Africa or Sicily, naturally carried on conversations with the officers who we carried over, or met at the fields.

26. Q. Are you able to recall the approximate time of this conversation?

A. No sir.

27. Q. Are you able to recall whether it was between the 15th of July and the 6th of September?

A. I believe it was.

28. Q. Do you recall whether it was between the 1st of August and the first of September?

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- 2 A. Before the first of September. At that time I heard of the method of pressuring the pistols but had no particular opportunity of putting it into execution and therefore I cannot recall when it occurred. I am almost certain, however, that it was more than a week before the event in question.
29. Q. That would place the conversation with the Major sometime during the month of August?
- A. Yes.
30. Q. Do you recall how many flights you made during the month of August?
- A. No.
31. Q. Do you have available to you any record of the flights which you made during that month?
- A. Our squadron has a record of the number of flights and also the fact that they were between Africa and Sicily. At the time it was the practice of the crew chiefs to write on AAF Form # 1, the point of departure from Africa which was usually definite and most often the same field at Kairouan. Our destination was usually marked Sicily unless the flight was to Ponte Olive, Catania, Palermo or some such well known place.
32. Q. Are you able to recall whether you met the Major at any of the three airfields you mentioned?
- A. I cannot recall any.
33. Q. Could you describe the Major from his physical appearance?
- A. I believe he was about 5 feet 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches, about 170 lbs and had dark hair.
34. Q. Was he an Air Corps officer, and if so, a flying officer?
- A. I don't believe he was an Air Corps officer.
35. Q. Was he a passenger on your airplane?
- A. I don't think he was a passenger on the plane. He was, I think, a passenger on one of the planes parked across from ours.
36. Q. Was it a plane of your Squadron?
- A. That I could not say.
37. Q. Was it a Troop Carrier plane? 2974
- A. Yes.
38. Q. Was anyone else present at your conversation with the Major?
- A. There were no officers present. As I recall, everyone was walking by the planes. I happened to be passing the Major when his baggage and his pistol caught my eye.

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39. Q. Do you recall anything about his baggage which would assist you in identifying him?

A. No sir, because the passengers of all planes had baggage ~~which~~ had just been removed from the plane.

40. Q. Then, would it not have been that this officer was a passenger on a ferrying mission of which your plane was a part?

A. He might have been a passenger on the incoming plane or he might have been waiting there for transportation out. I don't know if he had arrived or was preparing for departure. My conversation with him was very brief, as I had to leave.

41. Q. Did this conversation take place before or after your Squadron moved its base to Sicily?

A. Before.

42. Q. Do you remember when your Squadron moved its base to Sicily or at least do you remember when you moved?

A. The last part of August or the early part of September.

43. Q. Did this conversation take place before or after you moved to Sicily?

A. I am almost certain it was before.

44. Q. Would you be able to recognize this officer if you saw him again?

A. Not with certainty.

45. Q. Is there in fact a Lieutenant Barber?

A. Yes there is.

46. Q. But he was not present at the police station? 2973

A. That is correct.

47. Q. You signed his name and serial number to the receipt?

A. No, Lt. Kreidt did.

(Question directed to Lt. Kreidt)

Q. Is that correct?

A. That is right. I am not sure if I got Barber's correct serial number.

48. Q. Have you anything further you wish to add to your testimony?

A. I do not wish it to be thought that I am able to remember the Major I talked to because I do not as at that time everything was in a state of flux and he was somebody whom I just ran into on a field.

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49. Q. Again, is there anything further you wish to add to your testimony?

A. No.

Testimony given by 2nd Lt. Chester W. Barber, 29th Troop Carrier Squadron to 1st Lt. George J. Banigan, Staff Judge Advocate, XIII Troop Carrier Command, (Prov), on 6 November 1943 at Headquarters XIII Troop Carrier Command (Prov), Palermo, Sicily.

1. Witness Sworn.

2. Q. Please give your name, rank, organization, serial number and station.

A. 2nd Lt. Chester W. Barber, O-520225, 29th Troop Carrier Squadron. I am stationed at Milazzo Air Base, Sicily.

1. Lt. M.S. Ladd, Commander of the 1st. Platoon, Battery I,
62 Q.A. came to this office this morning to report the following:

The personnel of the Platoon Command Post, of which he is at the moment Commanding Officer, stationed since August 5th. at SPERAGAVOLO, have observed that the Guardia di Finanza, located directly across the road on a sharp curve near SPERAGAVOLO, opposite their R.Q., have been practising all kinds of graft, extortion etc. from people coming into Palermo.

The procedure followed by the guardia is to confiscate about 50% of the taxable goods such as Olive oil, pasta, wine, soap, coal, etc. and then the person is allowed to continue on his way after he has paid the tax on the remaining portion after confiscation.

2. Lt. Ladd furthermore, states that all trucks stopped by the Guards on this curve, be allowed to remain parked elsewhere than the curve, as this is obviously a danger to oncoming traffic.

3. This is forwarded to you for any action you deem appropriate.

The following report shows in abbreviated form the Authority, Constitution and Duties of La Regia Guardia di Finanza, condensed from the Regolamento di Servizio for the Corps dated 1931, obtained from the Commandant for Palermo, and lent to me by Lt. Col. Shock, Public Safety Div. These Regulations form the basic code on which the Corps and its work are founded, and, subject to minor amendments of a temporary nature by periodic official circulans it is the most recent issue.

Authority. The Regulations were approved by Royal Decree No. 1643, 6 Nov. 1930, having been proposed and codified under authority of the Secretary of State for Finance.

Constitution. The corps was constituted from various sources during the history of Italy. It has and is essentially a Revenue protection establishment. Up to the 17th century it was known as La Guardia Dogana - or Customs Guard. At the present time it is divided and sub-divided into Zones, Legions, Circuits (Circolo), Companies, Platoons, Sections and Brigades; Nuclei of Polizia Tributario, and Squadrons for service afloat. Territorial jurisdiction and Command of personnel coincide with these divisions and sub-divisions.

Down to and including Sections, jurisdiction and command are mainly administrative and supervisory. The executive sub-divisions are the Brigades, Nuclei and Squadrons.

To each of these is allotted a stretch of coastline or zone of territory or airspace to guard for Revenue purposes, to detect and prevent Revenue fraud and to prosecute urgent inquiries in regard thereto.

Personnel may not go beyond these zone-limits, save in emergency such as to pursue smugglers, conduct urgent inquiries, answer calls for help, or render aid in public or private catastrophe, without specific orders from their higher authority.

It is prohibited to employ the Corps in extraneous duties.

The Corps is liable to serve in the Colonies.

The Corps is constituted on the basis of permanent service, with provision for casual employees.

Duties. The Permanent Regulations of the Service determine its jurisdiction and competency in each branch, and lay down in detail the duties for which the units are responsible.

Broadly speaking the duties comprise vigilance and supervision of

Jurisdiction extends over the whole Kingdom, territorial waters and territorial airspace, but principally the Corps exercises uninterrupted control over the coastline, zone of Customs Guard, saltmines, cultivation of tobacco, factories, warehouses, deposits, corporations, and persons engaged or concerned in businesses subject to Revenue Control.

Executive Duties The Brigades are divided into Major Brigades and
Inshore Brigades as sub-divided again into :-
Brigades for Ports, Lakes, Lagoons, etc., who guard the sea spaces in
their jurisdiction.

Brigades Stanziali (Static) for permanent attendance on Revenue Guard
duties over saltmines, factories, deposits, warehouses, etc.

Brigades Volanti (Flying Squad) as a second line force to control and
follow up operations by the first line of Revenue defence, to arrest
smugglers and otherwise prevent Revenue Fraud.

The Squadrons are designed for service afloat, wear a quasi-naval
uniform, and are provided with craft. They consist of:-

- (a) Cruising units, operating at large in territorial waters.
- (b) Coastal units, surveying Quarantine boundaries and controlling the
movements of shipping in the immediate vicinity of the coast.
- (c) Port units, operating within the ports on guard duties, passenger
and transport services for Corps personnel during visits,
inspections, and control.

The Nucleo di Polizia Tributaria are a plain-clothes force, acting as a
Revenue Special Investigation Staff to follow up by observations, investigations,
verifications, research and specialized methods and measures, to the final end
of Revenue vigilance, revenue and repressive.

They also control closely, in conjunction with the Brigades Volanti - taxes
on Betting Slips, Public Spectacles, Advertisements, Illuminated Signs, Vehicles
and Motor-boats, Playing Cards and Stamp duties.

They work in close liaison with all the Brigades.

All Departments of the whole Corps must advise the Nucleo of all Revenue
offences.

Each Nucleo operates in three independent troops:-

- (a) Repression of smuggling - Customs Monopoly and Production taxes.
- (b) Taxes on estates.
- (c) Direct taxation.

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They work in close liaison with all the Brigades.

All Departments of the whole Corps must advise the Nuclei of all Revenue offences.

- (b) Taxes on affairs.
- (c) Direct taxation.

Hours of Duty. Hours of duty and rest for the Corps are prescribed according to the nature of the duty, such as Sentry and Outpost, Search and Ambush, Visits, Inspections and Investigations, Patrols by Sea craft etc 9:9

Arms. The Corps is armed with rifle, or pistol, and bayonet at all times except in barracks. Regulations prescribe occasions on which bayonets shall be fixed.

General. The Corps is responsible for duty at Custom Harbors and generally to maintain the Air Navigation Laws. It also exercises authority over the following:-

- Maritime Code.
- Public Water Sources.
- Private Post.
- Hunting and Fishing. (Licences and legal methods)
- Fraud in preparation and marketing of substances for agrarian use and agrarian products.
- Drugs.
- Piracies.

The Corps may also act in substitution or aid of other Police Forces under special circumstances and prescribed powers, and on a reciprocal basis. It also exercises discreet observation on the actions of Revenue officials.

Conclusion.

The Comandante Generale della Regia Guardia di Finanza exercises the mandate conferred on him by the law and ordinances of the Corps under immediate authority of the Minister of Finance.

Note 2 for C.R.O.

Except that it is an armed force, and in a country like Italy with land frontiers, operates inland as well as on the sea-board, this Corps is analogous in many respects to the Waterguard Department of the Customs and Excise in the United Kingdom. Its duties are curiously specialized, and, subject to further review in operation—the re-organization and transplantation of it into a purely Police Force would tend to deprive the Revenue Organization, prima facie, of its main executive body.
