At present I am attached to the Unit mentioned above, awaiting assignment to B.A.O.R.

As I have held the rank of Captain S.O.3 since 4 January, 1944, a period of more than two years, and regarding my record as an exceptionally good one, have - in view of my proposed re-assignment - made enquiries through the Military Secretary's Department (M.S.D.) War Office, Hobart House, S.W.1., regarding my prospects of securing an appointment as S.O.2. in B.A.O.R. Public Safety.

I enclose two copies of my record of service in C.M.P. as submitted to M.S.D., subsequently to A.G.1, and finally to O.A.(9) War Office.

Whilst admitting the excellence of my record each department informed me that it was against General policy to promote officers in course of transfer. It was particularly suggested to me by C.A.(9) - Civil Affairs Establishment - that any future promotion for me must come through the German Control Commission, but that any recommendation as to my fitness for promotion to S.O.2., received from yourself through G.I. British in Rome (in the form of the usual Confidential Report) would be forwarded by C.A.s to H.Q. German Control Commission for attention.

I am sure that, in view of my numerous commendations as shown in the attached papers, you will agree that the only reason for my not being promoted further in Italy was the fact of our having a small establishment. I was, by the way, the only Regional Security Officer in North Italy who held a rank lower than that of Major, although my work was the subject of favourable comment by Brigadier Upjohn in official minutes, also by Major S.J. Harvey (acting for the Director of Public Safety on security matters) whose personal notes I hold, stating that my security reports were the "best and most useful". I will not go into my ~~espionage~~ activities in prosecuting enemy agents and saboteurs with much more success than any other officer so engaged in Italy. That is all set out in the accompanying papers.

I am sure that I can depend upon you, Sir, to take the necessary steps to ensure that H.Q. German Control Commission, in considering questions of promotion, is made aware of the considerable amount of good work which I did in Italy, including Sicily. With great respect,

Commissioned as Lieutenant - 31 May, 1943.

In June 1943 posted to Allied Military Government School, Chres, North Africa for special course of Civil Affairs Administration.

In August, 1943 landed in Sicily and posted to H.Q. A.M.G. Palermo as Special Police Officer.

During the same month was commended by the President of the Allied Superior Court, Palermo and Chief Civil Affairs Officer for investigations leading to the conviction of members of a ring engaged in stealing wholesale quantities of Allied building materials.

In September 1943 was placed in direct command of a special squad or "Flying Squad" consisting of members of each of the Italian Police Departments. The work of this squad was subsequently commanded by C.C.A.O. - Lord Kinnell of Rood and it formed the nucleus of a larger organization on similar lines instituted when the territory was passed to Italian Government administration.

In September 1943, was further commended by the President of the Allied Superior Court and C.C.A.O. A.M.S. for the successful investigation of serious black market activities and for subsequent ^{co-operation} in the case as Prosecuting Counsel, leading to the conviction of seven Italian officials.

In October, 1943, commended by C.C.A.O. for successful investigation of serious thefts involving Allied personnel and for 90 per cent recovery of stolen property.

On 6 January 1944, promoted to Captain and transferred to Security Intelligence Branch of Allied Control Commission.

In February 1944 commended by Director of Security-Intelligence (Colonel A.M. Young) for successful investigation of a case of corrupt practice which led to an Italian official being sentenced to seven years penal servitude.

In March 1944 was appointed to take charge of all investigations of espionage within 6th Army territory. Between that time and May 1944 secured the conviction of 28 enemy spies, tried before Allied General Court. Twenty such

such

spies were sentenced to death, others to imprisonment or internment, these having been commuted on appeal on compassionate grounds.

Each individual case resulted in commendations by both British and American Assistant Chiefs of Staff, G-2 Intelligence, E.A. Allied Armies in Italy.

Later an official communication commending this work was forwarded by H.Q. A.A.I. to H.Q. Allied Control Commission where Brigadier J.S. Upjohn and Colonel A.S. Young added further minutes of commendation.

In October, 1944, Sir Frank Brook, H.M. Chief Inspector of Constabularies, during his tour of inspection in Italy, congratulated and highly commended Captain Gale personally for the above mentioned work and similar work performed subsequently in Rome.

This referred to work carried out in Rome after July, 1944 when Captain Gale was placed in charge - for investigation and prosecution of enemy agents and saboteurs - of all British, American, French and Italian Intelligence agencies S.C.I., F.S.S., C.I.C., Rome Bureau, S.T.M. etc. within the Rome Allied Area Command. Some 100 cases or more, relating to suspected enemy agents etc. were dealt with under the supervision of Capt. Gale, many of them being investigated personally by him. About seventy cases were brought before the Allied General Court and approximately fifty convictions were obtained. Many were sentenced to death, others to imprisonment, and those not convicted were interned. This work was continued to completion in June 1945 and was the subject of favourable comment by the British Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, R.A.A.C. (Mr. Col. A.S. Young).

In addition to counter-espionage work as mentioned above, Captain Gale, during the same period, investigated and submitted for prosecution, the cases of five British Renegades in Rome. For this work he was the subject of a special letter of commendation addressed to the Director of Public Safety, E.A. Allied Commission, by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, Allied Forces Headquarters.

In June 1945, when the above described work in Rome had been completed, Capt. Gale was appointed as Regional Security Officer, Emilia Region, N. Italy, being attached as such to the Public Safety Division, which secured a 90 per cent reduction in crime within two months. His reports on the situation there were the subject of favourable comments by Brigadier Upjohn, in minutes added to the reports.

In August, 1945, when Emilia Region had been placed under Italian Government administration, Captain Gale was transferred to Liguria Region, where he again performed the duties of Regional Security Officer, being the only officer holding that appointment who was below the rank of Major.

In September, 1945, he was commended by the President of the Allied General Court for investigation in collaboration with the Italian Police, and subsequent presentation of evidence in a case which resulted in the conviction of five men who had murdered three members of an Italian Police patrol near Genova.

Captain Gale has now left C.M.F. and is awaiting assignment as a Civil Affairs Police Officer in B.A.C.R. Germany. He is a fluent French, German and Italian speaker.

SUBJECT : Power of Civilian Interness

As the allied armies advanced through Sicily and Italy it was necessary to intern many civilians, who by their actual deeds or potentiality for sabotage, formed a threat to the security in forward and rear areas. The latter is extremely important as any disturbance or actual sabotage of the war effort could have an adverse effect on the fighting, causing the "my countryman to direct troops to the rear." The arrests of these civilians were effected by units of P. . . and CIC advancing with the armies, or by the intelligence sections of Districts and Army areas, naturally in the heat of battle and in the confusion of the frequent demolitions made by one Italian against another, some internments were made which could hardly be substantiated subsequently on the grounds of military security, which was the criterion for arrest. In the early part of 1943 all civilian internees were collected from various prisons, P. . . camps and detention centers, and were concentrated in a large temporary at Padua, which became known as the "Oriental Internees Camp."

It soon became apparent that these persons needed lifting, as most had arrived without any papers or documentation of any kind. The Bureau Command of the allied forces in Italy appealed to Major General (for assistance in providing experienced personnel to sort out these cases. Captain G-2 (also a police officer in civilian life, by his meticulous attention to detail and innate common sense, quickly acquired the techniques of interrogation and his judgment was rarely at fault.

The onward sweep of the Indian reconstituted pulling certain units away from this work, and for over twelve months Captain G-2 carried on alone until shortly before the camp closed in May 1945. Visits were made periodically to Major HARRY and Captain S.I.M. to review important cases and also to brief Captain G-2 on up to date S.I.M. conditions as they were in advised areas.

In all the above officers received over 5,000 cases at this camp, and following their recommendations it was found possible to release 2,900 internees. Then the second civilian Internee camp, was opened at Vernon in December 1944, the procedure for reviewing was arranged by Major HARRY in conjunction with G-2 at J.P. and Captain S.I.M. was still engaged at Madras, Captain G.H. HUNTER, attached to the work at Vernon, as a member of the Review Board. Circumstances were rather different here, as the bulk of internees were known enemy agents, while at Madras they were mainly fascists who were potentially dangerous. G-2 were very reluctant, and quite properly so too, to agree to the release of any known or suspected enemy agent who, although the actual fighting had ceased, could still be of danger to allied soldiers.

It is better, therefore, to summarize the results of this camp anti-

U.S. cases reviewed
98 recommendations made for release

Although each officer took turns at reviewing when his other duties allowed, the bulk of the cases at Madras were dealt with by Captain S.I.M., who had displayed a general flair for this type of work.

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The importance of this reviewing cannot be over-estimated. These Security organizations responsible for Interning the men are perfectly satisfied that their actions are correct, and often, quite rightly, oppose the release of a certain individual to their particular area, knowing he may well be a menace.

On the other hand the persons are interned without a trial, the informants may not have been unblashed, the conditions obtaining at the time of arrest may not apply six months later, and it becomes necessary to have some independent mind, trained in, but not dominated by, security matters, to consider the possibility of their release.

Extracts from the monthly reports show how carefully and conscientiously the officers of Security Division have discharged their duties, and kept these principles in mind. Later examples are:-

MARCH 1946 "In a short time it will also have been possible to pass on some of his, (Capt. GAGH) experiences in reviewing as will enable him to be withdrawn for other duties. Before this is done it is hoped to establish a liberal interpretation of the potential danger aspect in regard to persons resident in liberated Italy, to correspond more with the policy of withdrawal of allied personnel from the territory, and the assumption of greater responsibilities by the Italian Government".

MAY 1946 "With the end of the fighting in Italy and the relaxing of the Rear Army control line it has been possible to apply a much more liberal policy towards release. During the month officers from this division have visited the Camp for one day per week, and have reviewed 164 cases. In 111 instances recommendations have been made for releases.

It is not anticipated that this will adopt any plan of wholesale releases in regard to civilian internees, but that they will be reviewed at present individually, and released or kept in detention according to circumstances. Any sudden release of a large number of former fascists might have a disturbing influence on local morale, and lead to unpleasant incidents".

JUNE 1946 "An increased number of appeal has been received, as the relatives of many internees cannot see why they should continue to be detained now that the fighting has ceased. It has been possible to recommend that many of the persons whose cases have been reviewed at "Q" Internment Camp should be released, in fact 246 out of 233 cases considered have been so recommended. The final word, however, remains with C-2 AFHQ, and we can only recommend in the light of our experience and knowledge of the particular case".

One of the most satisfactory feature of the review and releases is that there has never been the slightest suggestion of undue influence or bribery having effected the decisions. This says much for the standard of integrity and impartiality of the officers, concerned when it is remembered that some of Italy's richest men were interned and it is a well known Italian method to "buy ones freedom". Another noteworthy tribute is that very few (probably under 10) persons were reinterned for anti-allied acts or sentiments following their release, and that no disturbance occurred in the rear areas which could be said to be due to premature release. This must have been exceptionally gratifying to the military commanders not to have to direct front line troops. At the same time it must be borne in mind that the careful consideration of individual cases from the humanitarian viewpoint resulted in a exceptionally large number of releases.

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Authority has now been given by AMHQ for the review board to sit only once a month, in view of the changed conditions affecting release and the possibility of large numbers being liberated en bloc. We may therefore regard the work of reviewing as it has been done previously as being virtually concluded, and having regard to the very important nature of the duties performed over a long period, I ask that consideration be given to recognizing the efforts of the officers concerned in some tangible form.

1. Major Goodacre joined the Leicester County Constabulary on 27th April, 1930.


2. He served for six years as a Constable in the Mobile Section, doing patrol work daily on motor cycles and afterwards in cars.

I respectfully bring to your notice for favourable consideration for recommending the above named for promotion to the rank of Major.

Capt. Ellis in civilian life was a Detective Sergeant in the Sussex Constabulary, with 16 years service. He was commissioned with the rank of Lieutenant (Civil Affairs) on 30th August, 1943. On 6th January, 1944 he was promoted to Captain together with other Lieutenants who were performing Public Safety duties.

Since March, 1944 Capt. Ellis has been assigned to Security Division where full advantage has been taken of his flair for investigation. One of Captain Ellis's duties has been the reviewing of civilian internees at Padula and Terni camps on behalf of AFHQ and in the former his recommendations formed the ground work upon which future reviewing was based.

In addition to his normal work Capt. Ellis has found time to pass on to the Military Police, information he has received concerning thefts of Allied property, and I know his efforts have been thoroughly appreciated by the Provost Marshals and their investigative staffs. It is in his knowledge of Italian political and subversive movements that his main strength lies, however.

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In view of all the above circumstances I feel I must draw attention to the exceptional proficiency of Capt. In view of the departure of Col. Doherty from this Sub-Commission and your appointment as the senior British Officer in Public Safety S/C, I respectfully draw your attention to the work performed by Captain C.B. Hayes in this theatre, particularly since he became assigned to Security Division on 10th December, 1945.

Before joining the Armed Forces Capt. Hayes was a Sergeant in the Plymouth City Police after having completed over ten years as a Detective Constable, performing Criminal Investigation and Special Branch duties. This point must be remembered, as in a small Force a man, no matter how outstanding, cannot forge ahead so rapidly, as in a larger one in the early years, and it is only later on when the qualities of leadership and broad thinking can be fully rewarded.

He was commissioned with the rank of Captain, but it must be stated that he had previous experience as an Army Officer, having passed through Sandhurst in 1926 and served for 2½ years as a 2nd Lieutenant before economic circumstances due to the world depression forced him to join the Police.

The first year of his AMG service, was spent in Sardinia, where he ultimately became Regional Public Safety Officer and Provost Marshal for the whole island.

Although Capt. Hayes readily accepted the change from Public Safety work to Security tasks in a way which one would expect from his civilian experience, his progress was so rapid that in a very short time he had an extraordinary knowledge of the Rome extremist political parties and mushroom subversive organisations which thrive in such an atmosphere as co-belligerent Italy.

His military correct, yet pleasing, personality has been of the greatest assistance in contact with other branches of this H.Q. and units outside, and his style of report writing, complete in detail yet concise, makes him an ideal administrative officer.

It will be appreciated that Security work cannot be blazoned from the housetops, and therefore much of its arduous labour cannot be proclaimed, but it can be stated that Capt. Hayes has on numerous occasions been acting as President of the Review Board for civilian internees at Terni, a task dedicated to Security Division by AFHQ because of the specialized knowledge of the

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

officers concerned. Recommendations have to be given as to the release or continued internment of persons considered dangerous to Allied Security and the responsibilities are great. A recent example was that of Achille Lauro, the millionaire shipowner, about whom appeals had been received from every conceivable angle for over two years and who was finally released following Capt. Hayes' review and recommendation.

The ease with which Capt. Hayes has discharged his duties indicate that, not only is he capable of accepting immediately the responsibilities of the next highest rank, but I would be failing in my duty if I did not recommend him forthwith in the strongest possible manner for the advancement which his persistently good work over a period of two years so well merits. He has received no promotion since joining the Armed Forces.



1. Major Percy E. Coxhead, N°P.279389, Capt. John Kane, N° P.279415 and Capt. James B. Fleetwood, N°P.279380, are Public Safety Officers in Milan City.

2. Major Coxhead came into Milan City with me on 30 April 1945, and Capts. Kane and Fleetwood arrived 2 May 1945.

3. All of these men have done an outstanding job in handling the Public Safety situation here in Milan City from the time of their arrival until the present time.

4. In the beginning and up to V-E Day they were quite busy in getting German troop Units and Commands to surrender, and took over 8000 German prisoners into custody. These Germans were barricaded in buildings throughout the City of Milan, and refused to surrender to the patriots. They were prepared to fight it out, but were induced by the officers above-named to surrender to them and be sent to P.W. cages.

5. In the reorganization of the various civilian police agencies, viz: Pubblica Sicurezza, Vigili Urbani, Carabinieri, and Guardie di Finanze, they did an excellent job to the extent that at no time have we ever been called upon to ask for help from the military authorities.

6. In connection with the partisans they also did an excellent piece of work in disbanding the partisans, taking possession of 168 armories and disarming the men.

7. In view of the outstanding performance of duty by these 3 officers, I recommend that proper recognition be given to them.
