

PUBLIC SAFETY REPORT
FOR MONTH OF OCTOBER 1944.

A. POLICE

Satisfaction is expressed in the reports of P.P.S.O.s and C.A.P.O.s, in this Army Area at the obvious improvement in efficiency and morale of all the civil police agencies. Ancona province has reached something like normality in strength. Foggia province has done so as regards CC.RR., but still lacks 40 CC.RR. and 16 Agents of public Safety (applications have been made) to bring those agencies to workable efficiency. Forlì province agencies are gradually getting into their stride. The ~~present~~^{effect} supply of much required clothing and boots has had an excellent ~~on~~ morale of CC.RR. and when the CC.RR. obtain the cloth for their uniforms, it will undoubtedly have a like effect. It is essential that a constant supply of boots be kept up as this is about the most ~~medicinal~~ item in their outfit. Provincial CC.RR. and CC.PP. are assisting in manning check posts and patrols on the coast and security control line and in the control of civilian vehicular traffic on the main military routes. Mobile Carabinieri are continuing their good work with the forward C.A.P.O.s and on various movement control measures. Their work has evoked written commendation from P.S.O.s and C.A.P.O.s. The 450 CC.RR. allotted for the provinces of Forlì, Ravenna, and Rimini have all been brought up. Forlì province men (60 of whom are on two hours notice for Forlì city) are fully occupied in their province and ample work has been found for the 300 men of the remaining two provinces. This principle of staging CC.RR. for other provinces forward and feeding them into towns as far forward as possible has been of the utmost value. Invariably occupied towns are without Carabinieri, and as civilian refugee movement commences as soon as troops occupy territory, it has been necessary often to effect day to day moves of groups of CC.RR. In the appalling weather conditions, which have prevailed during the month, the restriction of the usual refugee and particularly bullock cart movement on all the forward roads has been more than ever imperative and supervising the movement and positioning of CC.RR., to effect continuity of these control measures has seen the expenditure of the maximum time and energy of the Army's C.A.P.O.s and a devotion to duty of the highest merit. No reduction of the refugee control measures around the Republic of San Marino has yet been possible owing to an outbreak of typhoid amongst the refugees there. Compulsory evacuation of civilians on a major scale from some towns in Army Area, over a period of days, required the full time employment of 100 Carabinieri who were fortunately available in accordance with the forward staging procedure to which I have already referred. Two illustrations⁴ instances of the application to duty on the part of CC.RR., are worth recording. In one, three German prisoners who had escaped from a forward PW cage (and whose descriptions were ~~circulated~~) were re-captured by them - in the other, a carabiniere on a San Marino boundary control post captured a German soldier in civilian clothing who was headed SOUTH with a manuscript document purporting to be a pass. An order by Army Q that CC.RR., rations may be drawn from D.I.D. in 7 days supplies has made the transport problem less difficult.

- (i) General state of public morale good.

- (vii) There have been some cases of wire cutting reported and offenders detected but so far as can be learned no sinister motive is apparent.
- (viii) The general position regarding the issue of passes has unquestionably improved under Executive Memorandum No. 77, but some cases have come to notice of both Allied Officers and civil issuing agencies giving passes for a purpose or to places in Army Zone which indicates insufficient acquaintance with the Executive Memorandum. I have in a previous report taken the liberty of describing this as a most excellent memorandum, the provisions of which cannot be too often or too vividly stressed.

The Rear Army Security Control Line remains as in my previous report, though the rear Army Administrative boundary has moved up and we now have the unusual anomaly of the security control line well in the rear of the actual army boundary. Control and check of civil movement within and into Army Area is of course, of paramount importance and requires the co-operation of the maximum number of civil police personnel who can be spared.

- (ix) Cases of 83 persons arrested by US personnel on security grounds during month of October were considered by representatives of GSI(b) Army and SCAP O this H. and agreed recommendations made.

C PRISONS

- (i) The prison position is satisfactory. In ANCONA Province the pressure on accommodation has been relieved by provision for 130 prisoners in ANCONA town. PESARO Province has excellent accommodation generally though repairs are being effected at URBINO. In FORLI Province the prison at RIMINI will require extensive repairs before it can be made habitable. The prison at CASALE is only slightly damaged. The needs of FORLI Province for prison accommodation are easily met by PESARO and CASALE prisons.

- (iii) Sanitation reasonably so.
- (iv) No comment on discipline.

D FIRE AND CIVIL DEFENCE

- (i) The Fire Brigade at ANCONA has again been reported upon highly by the PPSO. Equipment is in short supply in PESARO Province. Both ANCONA and PESARO Provincial Fire Brigades have had the benefit during the month of advice from the ABRUZZI-MARCHE Regional Fire Officer. So far in FORLI Province no firefighting vehicles and equipment have been found. The brigade at RIMINI is being reformed.
- (ii) The CD organisation in ANCONA is in a high state of efficiency. In PESARO and FORLI Provinces, steps are being taken to revive organisation.
- (iii) Mine and bomb disposal still presents the same difficulty - many civilians being maimed or losing their lives. CGRR are performing a good service in reconnaissance. PC, ANCONA, has had the initiative to commence a small school for volunteer personnel in mine-lifting and disposal. Military personnel are instructing, and the security aspect has been well safeguarded.

Report for month of September 44.

A. POLICE.

1. Generally as satisfactory as can be expected. Ancone
P.D.S.O. has noticed a marked return of confidence on the part of
the Civil Police during month under review.

II. Little crime and none calling for comment.

III. With one exception, conduct of Allied troops generally
goed. The exception is with regard to Greek Troops, who have in some
cases tended to show an undisciplined-and-intolerant attitude towards
Italians. The question of their conduct is being handled by A.A.G.,
and D.P.M., Army.

IV. Excellent.

V. Only one major refugee control operation occurred during
the month, that connected with the necessity for the freezing in
the Republic of San Marino of the thousands of persons who had taken
refuge there, together with their oxen, other livestock and personal
belongings on the open drawn carts. As soon as exit-of-the Republic
came to be relieved, bit by bit, the refugees tried to come out -
which would have blocked the roads, some of which were little more than
tracks; being used in military operations. Mobile CC.RR., or Right A-
Army formed block-post all around the Republic, and in the conveying
of CC.RR., to those posts, which was carried out frequently under
mortar fire and in extremely unfavourable conditions the C.A.P.O.s
performed excellent and devoted work. Some of the tracks were almost
impassable for 3 ton trucks in which the CC.RR., were conveyed, and one
felt regret in the inability of A.C.G. to assist in the provision of
weapons carriers for such work; a desirability which lead to the
abortive request at the time of the Cassino Battle.

VI. Ancona Province strength of CC.RR., has been reduced in
order to feed men into Forli Province, and ~~promised~~ men for Ravenna
and Ferrara Provinces when captured.

The need for boots for the Provincial Police agencies
is still great, and there is no doubt that the inability to supply

VII. One case occurred of damage to railway-line by an explosion. One man was arrested and charged with sabotage but was found not guilty. The cause of the explosion has been closely investigated by Army Security and not cleared-up.

As a precaution notice to the effect that interference with communications may result in the imposition of the death penalty were printed at instance of ANC and posted along 15 miles of line. There has been no recurrence.

VIII. CONTROL OF MOVEMENT.

The excellent Executive Memorandum P.C. 77 appears to have had a salutary effect for the instances brought to notice of bad passing incurred have been almost negligible.

One feature in control of civilian-movement which has to be given constant attention is civilian traffic on the main military routes. This precise definition has been most valuable, and it is a fact, necessary in order that the movement restrictions in and about between the Army Zone and the Restricted Zone could be appropriately applied.

Army G.S.I.(b) also agreed that Eighth Army would not require the application of curfew OUT of the Control Line, and this has proved a welcome concession. The same definition of the Control Line has been applied as in control of movement. The motor vehicle temporary permit to be issued by all HQ in Eighth Army Area (until the Provincial-machiner is set up for the regular issue of the A.C.C. permit) has been standardized.

IX. CIVILIAN INTERFERENCE. Cases of 132 persons arrested by personnel on security grounds during month of September were considered by representatives of G-1(b) and this Public Safety Branch and agreed recommendation made.

X. Curfew is generally well observed, but an unusual case occurred when a kingpin of banditry was captured.

The excellent Executive Memorandum NO. 777 appears to have had a salutary effect for the instances brought to notice of bed pass insurings have been almost negligible.

X. Curfew is generally well observed, but an unusual case occurred when a string of bonfires ~~were~~ and lit late-one night after curfew, along a good stretch of coast. On inquiries made by ANC, it was found to be the ~~contadini~~ way of marking the Eve of an important religious festival. In this case it included a long stretch of coast bordering an important Port where there was concentrated the largest amount of shipping for some time. The lack of winter motive was established, however, and this ^{an} issued an order for the Ecclesiastic authorities in Army Areas to warn their flock about such practices.



3. Since precisely the same thing happened in the case of the July report and also the June report, it is clear that there is some recurrent administrative error involved. No other Sub-Commission complained of not getting July or June reports.



Some of the Eighth Army Mobile Carabinieri from the Sicily Area who fall short of this higher standard are being weeded out, and request will be made through usual channels for them to be replaced by the better type.

1. This report does not contain any detailed comments on the activities of the Socialist Fronts. Reports from each have been already forwarded separately to Sub-commisions.

2. Political.

While there can be no doubt that the usual preparatory work for later activity, normal in A.G.C. territory, is going on there is no outward indication of political trend of mind. There have been no attempts to infringe the law on Political Essencies or publications.

The P.W.B. loudspeaker van which visited CALDASSO during the month is stated to have been very well received.

3. Local Government.

(A) The new Prefect for CHIETI Province has arrived and a report will be rendered in due course.

(B) The position with regard to the Prefect of CALDASSO is still obscure, now Prefect not yet nominated.

(C) Director Interior Sub-Commission visited the area and commented on the fact that few communes had started the "Giunta Comunale". In fact no communes have started official Giunta though some C.A.O.s have started committees to assist the Sindaco in welfare etc.

No Giunta have been started because it was assumed that the bar imposed by Gen. Adm. Inst. No. 2 Part 5 (a) was still operative in A.R.C. Areas. Information to the contrary has been received by this HQ which consequently has resorted the Order to C.A.O.s who will form Giunta communi where possible.

4. Economics and Resources.

An extremely useful weekly conference has been started here and is attended by reps of Supply Divisions of Fifth Army and Regions IV and V. Certain officials from HQ Allied Control Commission have attended the meetings and made most valuable and welcome contributions.

5. Agriculture.

Generally speaking the state of crops is very promising after a favourable growing season. However land is free from occupation by troops and lack of rains the agricultural population has continued to work with neither surprising industry.

2. Political.

While there can be no doubt that the usual preparation for latter activity, now in ANC territory, is going on there is no central indication of political trend of thought. There have been no attempts to influence the Central Political assemblies or publications.

The 2.W.B. Landworker van which visited CATOBASSO during the month is stated to have been very well received.

No Giunta have been started because it was assumed that the last proposed in Catania Dept. No. 2 page 5 (d) was still operative in Army Areas. Information to the contrary has been received by this in which consequently has rescinded the order to C.A.O.s who will form Giunta Communale where possible.

4. Economics and Resources.

An extremely useful weekly conference has been started long and is attended by reps of Supply Divisions of Fifth Army and Regions IV and V. Certain officials from HQ Allied Control Commission have attended the meetings and made most valuable and welcome suggestions.

5. Agriculture.

Generally speaking the state of crops is very promising after a favourable season. Wherever land is free from occupation by troops and clearing done the agricultural production has continued to work with little surprise and success.

6. Labour.

The failure to get heavy worker returns policy clearly laid down in continuous territory continues to cause difficulty. This has been temporarily overcome in Eighth Army area by the issue of ration cards to heavy workers entitling them to earn the full additional pay, but a general policy will have to be settled.

Eighth Army and 5 Corps roads officers return the number of men employed under their auspices on roads as 15,500 who were paid approximately 2½ million lire.

7. Public Works.

The destruction of the FESCALA done by the allied Air Force was presumably an operational mistake but it will mean greatly increased difficulty in the administration of that Province. The dan will reasonably take a considerable time to repair and then to 2nd and then to 3rd (see this season) will consequently the electric power system must be disconnected.

6. Public Safety.

With all or virtually all traffic identified outside San Giovanni has been oxidized to cover the whole island area, including parts of Naples and Bonavento Provinces.

9. Refugees.

Both 1st Line mobile camp and 2nd Line Base C. 29 have been established and are ready to function.

The total number of refugees from Rangoon since May 2nd in April was 1295. Security having listed this over a great part of the population enacted Area. Tenth M.V. have now returned.

10. Communications.

(1) Ronda. The condition of roads in this area is steadily deteriorating under the great volume of traffic. First aid occupies all our road gangs but the day is not far off when first aid can do no more.

(2) Mail. The bulk of our supplies come into the area via Army railroads. In April 1100 tons of supplies came into Western L. at Orelli and 700 tons into the Western railroad.

(3) Postal. The position with regard to postal facilities in respect to your own boundary has been separately reported.


