1. INTRODUCTION

Attached herewith is a memorandum drawn up by the Officer Commanding SIM/CS. It describes briefly the work and function of SIM/CS and sets out its present and proposed future organization and composition.

It is thought that this memorandum, together with the following notes on the development of SIM/CS, may possibly be of use or interest to your office.

2. DEVELOPMENT AND VALUE

(a) Following the Allied landing in Italy it was considered desirable that certain SIM/CS officers who had escaped to BREIDISI after the Armistice should set up a new and modified SIM/CS organization in S. ITALY under Allied control. Several other experienced SIM/CS officers captured in N. AFRICA were sent back from U.K. and U.S.A. to help organize and form part of the new service.

(b) In its reconstitution, the old traditional organization was largely adhered to - i.e. the 'Bonsignore' Headquarters Section, and the regional organization (Centros, Sub-Centros and detachments) working as a branch of the Italian Comando Supremo.

(c) The collaboration of SIM/CS with the various Allied security and counter-spying agencies in ITALY, though slow to develop, became by degrees both close and sincere, and since it proved to be of considerable value to Allied Intelligence, it was expanded and entrusted with progressively increasing responsibility.

(d) The knowledge, which its personnel possess, of conditions in ITALY, organizations, personalities, past political history, underground movements, character and habits of the Italians etc., and its past contacts with German

(a) Following the Allied landing in ITALY it was considered that certain SM/CS officers who had escaped to BRITAIN after the Armistice should set up a new and modified SM/CS organization in S. ITALY under Allied control. Several other experienced SM/CS officers captured in N. AFRICA were sent back from U.K. and U.S.A. to help organize and form part of the new service.

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(c) The collaboration of SM/CS with the various Allied security and counter-espionage agencies in ITALY, though slow to develop, became by degrees both close and sincere, and since it proved to be of considerable value to Allied Intelligence, it was expanded and entrusted with progressively increasing responsibility.

(d) The knowledge, which its personnel possess, of conditions in ITALY, organizations, personalities, past political history, underground movements, character and habits of the Italians etc., and its past contacts with German Intelligence, have been a considerable advantage to Allied counter-intelligence agencies working in Italian territory.

(e) It can be said that SM/CS has made a positive contribution to the success which the Allies have achieved in largely neutralising the efforts of the German Intelligence Services in the Italian theatre.

3. DIRECTION AND LIAISON

SM/CS receives its general policy direction from GSI(b), A.A.I., which maintains liaison with the Central Bonsignore Section.

It receives from S.O.I. direction in specialist counter-espionage matters.

The Sections attached to British work directly under the control of the Army I(b)/C.I. Staffs.

The Centros and Sub-Centros maintain close liaison with the GSI/G-2 Staffs of Districts and Base Sections, for whom they carry out such work as may be required of them.

Local liaison is maintained throughout the country with F.S. Sections, C.I.C. Detachments and S.O.I. units.

4. ADMINISTRATION

During the past month certain reductions in the strength of the Italian Army generally, and of the Comando Supremo in particular, have been ordered.

In order that SIM/CS should not be reduced, and also in order to place it on a more satisfactory footing, steps have been taken to organize SIM/CS as a separate entity from the Comando Supremo: it is to become the Italian C.S. Battalion, with a separate WE/TO, and its strength (for all ITALY) is to be 1000 all ranks.

Subject: Notes on the chain of command, function and development of SIM/CS.

1. CHAIN OF COMMAND

(a) The SIM/CS is an integral part of SMC (Servizio Informazioni Militare) which in its turn is a part of the Comando Supremo.

(b) SIM/CS is made up of the following:-

- (i) A Central Section (Sezione 'Bonsignore'). This comprises a directing and coordinating head-office, including a counter-espionage department, an administration and personnel department, and a Secretarial Staff.
- (ii) A variable number of Centres and Sub-Centres under the direction of (i)
- (iii) Two Sections attached to the Fifth and Eighth Armies; these are mobile and operationally responsible to the Armies concerned.
- (c) The personnel employed comprise officers, N.C.O.s and men of the HQ, AR at Centres, Sub-Centres and Army Sections. At the Central 'Bonsignore' Section there are also 3 General Staff officers and one regimental officer.

2. FUNCTIONS

(a) Counter espionage carried out according to the direction of AAI, with the following scope.

- (i) Cooperation with the Allied Security and counter-espionage agencies in the capture and rounding up of enemy espionage and sabotage agents, and the investigation and evaluation of information thus obtained.
- (ii) Collection and collation of information on the enemy intel-

(iii) Two Sections attached to the Fifth and Eighth Armies; these are mobile and operationally responsible to the Armies concerned.

(e) The personnel employed comprise officers, N.C.O's and men of the CC.Rz at Centres, Sub-Centres and Army Sections. At the Central Headquarters Section there are also 3 General Staff officers and one regimental officer.

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(i) Cooperation with the Allied Security and counter-espionage agencies in the capture and rounding up of enemy espionage and sabotage agents, and the investigation and evaluation of information thus obtained.

(ii) Collection and collation of information on the enemy Intelligence services and activities.

(iii) Provision of necessary security aid in the safeguarding of Allied occupied Italy from enemy espionage and sabotage activity. 874

(b) Maintenance of a Security Service along those parts of the coast which are most accessible to enemy agents. Certain elements of the Guardia di Finanza have been recruited into SIF/CS for this purpose and are attached to the various Centres.

(c) Supervision of the efficiency and security of the postal censorship service.

(d) Maintenance of the security of military telephonic and telegraphic communications by means of systematic checks and controls.

(e) Investigation and observation (in collaboration with Allied Agencies) of persons and movements believed to be of a subversive nature.

3. The 'Monsignore' Section

- (a) For discipline and records the above section comes directly under the Comando Supremo, of which it is a branch, and from which it receives certain tasks assigned it by the Head of SIM.
- (b) Close liaison is maintained with the SCI HQ.
- (c) In accordance with tradition, members of SIM/CS operate in civilian clothes.

4. Activities of the 'Monsignore' Section, Oct 1943 to July 1944

From October 1943 to July 1944 SIM/CS have carried out or been in the security arrest and investigation of some three hundred persons, suspects and subversive elements.

5. Present Composition and Future Development of SIM/CS

Appendix A shows the existing composition and organisation of SIM/CS and the proposed reorganisation to be in effect in North Italy when this is liberated.

1. It is now nearly six months since it was decided, now after the Italian Armistice, that the co-operation of the S.I.M. (CS) or, at least, should be enlisted with a view to assisting the Allied security/counter intelligence agencies in the performance of their duties.
2. This co-operation, though it has been rendered to a limited degree and has proved of some value, has not developed as satisfactorily as had been hoped and intended.
3. It was to be expected that, at the start, collaboration would proceed slowly and cautiously and that its course would not always run smoothly. It was natural that the relationship should be marked by some measure of mutual suspicion, distrust, prejudice and professional jealousy.
4. In some ways these early difficulties have been overcome and a degree of co-operation has been achieved which is proving of real value to our security work as an organisation. In essence, little progress has been made in this direction.
5. It is considered of great importance that full use should be made of all available security/counter intelligence resources, and it is believed that the S.I.M. (CS) officers and NCOs are, in general, willing and anxious to co-operate loyally with the Allies and to assist us in our efforts to neutralise the enemy's covert activities and other subversive elements.

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4. In some ways these early difficulties have been overcome and a degree of co-operation has been achieved which is proving of real value to our security work as a whole. In other words, little progress has been made in this direction.

5. It is considered of great importance that full use should be made of all available security/counter-intelligence resources, and it is believed that the S.I.M. (CS) officers and NCOs are, in general, willing and anxious to co-operate loyally with the Allies and to assist us in our efforts to neutralize the enemy's covert activities and other subversive elements.

6. There is no doubt that they are in a position to render a really useful service and that they are, through their nationality, experience of the country and knowledge of its people, well fitted to carry out certain functions which can be performed only with difficulty, if at all, by our own agencies.

7. Moreover, it must be borne in mind that the availability of S.I.M. (CS) is nearly unlimited, and that our resources in such personnel can be increased to a considerable extent by the transfer of territories committed in Italy; as we advance Northwards, therefore, S.I.M. (CS) coverage will necessarily grow thinner and we shall have to rely to a greater extent on the help and efficiency of the Italian security service.

8. Every effort will therefore be made by Allied Security/Counter-intelligence authorities and agencies to achieve a greater degree of co-operation with the S.I.M. (CS) organization. If the former consider that any particular S.I.M. (CS) Centre is not collaborating to the fullest extent, this will be informed.

1. Since the Italians are now collaborating with the Allies, the S.I.M. has become a potential source of information concerning the German Intelligence Service. It is believed that members of the S.I.M., and persons employed by this organization, will be willing to render us assistance against the German Abwehr and the Gestapo.

2. Security personnel will continue their efforts to contact members of the S.I.M. but, instead of arresting them, they should be invited to cooperate by providing any such German information which they may possess. This H.Q. and the nearest S.I(b) officer will be informed immediately of any such contacts.

3. (a) It is considered unlikely that the S.I.M. will prove a danger to our security: its members will not, therefore, be arrested unless there is reason to believe that they have been acting against the Allied cause since the Armistice.

(b) Security personnel must, however, observe the elementary security precaution of divulging to them no more information than is necessary to secure the full benefit of their assistance.

4. The above is applicable also to the special Counter Espionage section of the Carabinieri.

c Financial, with separate branches for supervising:

- (1) Banking operations;
- (2) Control of currency exchange;
- (3) Flight of capital abroad.

d Foreign Political (Director, General PIERO PARINI), with separate branches for each foreign country, responsible for:

- (1) Watching anti-Fascist activities abroad (including supervision of personnel of Italian Embassies, etc.,)
- (2) Political Intelligence;
- (3) Commercial Intelligence;

e Colonial and Military (Directors - Generals de BONO, PARINI, and ATTILIO TERUZZI). -- This section, besides making use of regular O.V.R.A. agents, has a special personnel of its own abroad, paid from special funds. The section works in close liaison with Army Intelligence, and Counterespionage. General BERGONZOLI, presently a prisoner-of-war, was formerly a director.

A recent report from a colony formerly in Italian possession, but captured by the Allies, indicates that in one region at least, the Colonial section of the O.V.R.A. has assumed direction of the Italian Military Intelligence (SIM) organisation remaining in that colony.

f Mixed Section for Exchange of Information. -- This is a new section formed as a result of recent collaboration with the Gestapo. It is directed by two officials, one German and one Italian, who are responsible for arranging liaison between Italian and German agents operating abroad. The expenses of this section are paid jointly by the Italian and German Governments..

The internal organisation of the O.V.R.A. is as follows :-

the SOGUSORO, the DATE ALCHIMIAL, and the associations.

Agents abroad are reportedly divided into categories according to their duties under the branches of the Foreign Political Section of the O.V.R.A. and are instructed to recruit, subvert and inform in the country where they are stationed. To escape detection, they are frequently moved, either locally, or by reassignment to another country.

The O.V.R.A. also reportedly employs a staff of foreign travelling inspectors, who sometimes have diplomatic passports and who may travel under their own or assumed names. Some of them travel as tourists or businessmen, and are enrolled frequently as students of foreign universities. In cases where some special campaign of espionage is contemplated, these inspectors sometimes establish temporary headquarters, acting in this case as centers for the transmission of information to Italy.

Agents of the O.V.R.A. operate under conditions of great secrecy, and as a rule are unaware of any of their fellow agents, with the exception of the immediate superior. They work secretly and individually.

From known instances, O.V.R.A. agents may be expected in the guise of priests, Italian bank employees, travelling comic men, tourists, touring athletes, and employees in national museums, schools of arts, and military projects in the Middle East. The official presence of Operato in

There is, furthermore, a recently introduced probability that the O.V.R.A. is planning to enlist its agents and new recruits of vessels sailing from Lisbon, Portugal, for the United States, and as a jumping ship upon their arrival there.

The personnel of the O.V.R.A. is reportedly divided to be made up of employees of the Italian Government and former members of the Italian army. Even in Italy, they operate without uniform, and they frequently hold positions high in the Italian Government. They are usually well paid, but are reportedly liable to corruption if they can be identified.

In addition, it should be observed that the personnel of the CIAF generally were under orders to "keep their eyes and ears open" for information of economic, military or political significance to Italy.

After the American invasion of North Africa, some members of the CIAF managed to escape to Tunisia and others to Spanish Morocco, but a considerable number were arrested.

The principal services of the SIS have been indicated to be as follows:

1. SIA (Servizio Informazioni Aeronautica). -- This service is of comparatively recent origin, having been introduced only since the outbreak of the war (January 1941, and as such is still deficient in personnel and efficiency. It operates both inside and outside of Italy. Its head is General SCAGLIOTTI, formerly Commandant of the Air School at Lonato Pozzuoli. Chief of the organization within the United States was Colonel GAETA.

a. Headquarters. -- Stato Maggiore della R.A., Superaero, Rome, Italy. (First floor, Air Ministry Building).

b. Organization. -- The SIA consists of four sections, A, B, C, and D.

(1) SIA, Section A.

(a) Headquarters - Superaero SIA Sez. A, Rome, Italy

(b) Chief - Lieutenant Colonel VESPAJANO SCAGLIOTTI.

(c) Organization - It is believed that there are three offices within Section A. No. 1. Office, under the direct control of Lieutenant Colonel SCAGLIOTTI, works in collaboration with the CCR Personal Section (Capitolo Reali, Sezione Personale) and acts to preserve the secrecy of important Air Force activities within Italy itself. Specific functions of offices 2 and 3 are not known.

(d) Suborganization - Section A is divided geographically into 17 regional subsections, corresponding to regions of Italy, each subsection having an SIA section and a CCR section attached to it. These "Regional Regionali" are subdivided further into 1 or 2 Provincial Groups.

(1) SIA, Section A.

- (a) Headquarters - Supercorso SIA Sez.A, Rome, Italy
- (b) Chief - Lieutenant Colonel VESPAJANO PIGNATTI.
- (c) Organisation - It is believed that there are three offices within Section A. No.1. Office, under the direct control of Lieutenant Colonel PIGNATTI, works in collaboration with the CCRP Personnel Section (Carabinieri Reali, Sezione Personale) and acts to preserve the secrecy of important Air Forces activities within Italy itself. Specific functions of offices 2 and 3 are not known.
- (d) Suborganisation - Section A is divided geographically into 17 regional subsections, corresponding to regions of Italy, each subsection having an SIA section and a CCRP section attached to it. These "Regional Regionali" are subdivided further into 4 or 5 Provincial Groups (Gruppi Provinciali), which have direct supervision of security measures in all aircraft factories. Trusted Fascist agents operate in each factory. The headquarters of the Regional and Provincial Groups are located in their respective "County towns".
- (e) Functions - Section A has a rather extensive field of activity, including the security of airports, training schools, Air Force depots, and aircraft construction and assembly plants. It has charge of counterespionage measures, such as the prevention of anti-Fascist propaganda and subversive tendencies among the workers, the execution of this function being entrusted to the CCRP (Carabinieri Reali). It also keeps register of all personnel in the Italian Air Force and in factories working for them, and maintains a check on the control system of personnel.

(c) Functions - The bulletin Office publishes a monthly bulletin of Italian aircraft achievements, including the number of planes shot down, raids on enemy territory, and personality sketches of the officers.

The Biographical Office compiles short biographies of outstanding pilots and narratives of distinguished air actions.

The Air Attache's Office acts as an information centre which transmits and collates the information to and from Air Attaches in foreign countries. It employs a staff of linguists for this purpose.

4. A Cipher Subsection, under the direction of Major SALARIS, which produces codes for use by the Air Force and also functions in the breaking of enemy codes and ciphers.

c SIA Air Photo and Film Sections. - Air Photographs are furnished by the Gabinetto Fotografia and the Sezione Cinematografica, both of these being integral parts of the General Staff of the Air Ministry.

d SIA Liaison with the German Military Mission in Rome. - The German Military Mission in Rome frequently sends liaison officers to Lieutenant Colonel PAOLETTI.

e SIA Representatives in Turin. - The SIA maintained the following representatives at the General CIAF (Commissione Italiana Armistizio colla Francia) :
