SUBJECT : Visit of Deputy Director of P.S. to Bologna.

TO : Director Public Safety Sub-Commission. ←

1. Acting on your instructions, on 19th November 1945, I visited Bologna and consulted with Lt. Col. Walters Liaison Officer and Major A.C. Way, Public Safety Officer on the conditions of Public Safety in Emilia.

2. As a result of the consultation I was left in no doubt that the continuance of the present lawless conditions obtaining in the outer districts of Emilia is due, not to the inefficiency of the CC.RR. but to a lack of transport and P.C.L.

3. Numerous acts of Banditry have taken place in the country areas, where only 3 or 4 CC.RR. are stationed, generally without transport of any kind. At the present time telephone communications are entirely lacking, therefore long delay has occurred before CC.RR. Hq. at Bologna or at one of the Provincial Capitals has been informed of the incidents, with the result that the culprits have completely disappeared into the mountains.

Such transport as is available at Company or Legion Hqs. is sufficient only for 'Q' purposes, leaving none for transporting CC.RR. to points where action is urgently required.

Furthermore the allocation of P.C.L. to the CC.RR. is so meagre that at times when quick action was required no petrol has been available.

4. Later I visited the Legion Headquarters and Barracks of the CC.RR. and, with Col. Forle, Legion Commander, made a thorough inspection.

These barracks, which were taken over by the CC.RR. ²⁹²⁰ the occupation, (the original CC.RR. Caserma having been destroyed) had, by hard work on the part of Col. Borla and his staff been transferred from a shambles into reasonably good accommodation.

5. A deplorable feature was the condition of the dyed Battle dress worn by a large number of the Carabinieri.

It was in every case worn and shrunk to such an extent that it was not fit to be worn as a uniform.

Col. Borla informed me his Legion had been supplied with 6,000 dyed British Battle Dresses, but that only 2,400 could be issued.

The whole of the remainder were so torn and/or shrunk as to be unfit for issue.

I saw these Battle dresses in the CC.RR. Stores and confirmed Col. Borla's statement. They were all utterly useless. At my request Col. Borla paraded 100 Carabinieri

wearing battle dress and, with Lt. Col. Walters I closely inspected them. I could not find one really serviceable battle dress.

In every case it had shrunk and was too small for the wearer. They were patched and darned and were of all shades of green. Some had the pockets removed to provide patching for other parts.

In short they were in such a condition that I felt ashamed the Carabinieri should be wearing dyed British uniform in such a deplorable state. On enquiry I ascertained they had been in wear less than two months.

Col. Boria told me he had informed Headquarters CC.RR. Rome of the position and was awaiting instructions. At the present time he had 300 CC.RR. in civilian dress and has no uniform to issue to them. 150 are without great coats. These are urgently required.

6. Bedding:

The dormitories were clean and orderly. There is a shortage of bedsteads and mattresses but some are expected shortly.

Each man has one blanket and a comforter. This would probably be sufficient in Southern Italy but it is certainly inadequate in the northern areas where snow has already fallen on the high ground. Additional blankets are urgently needed.

7. The Mobile Battalion:

Later I visited the building housing the Mobile Battalion. 400 are quartered in Bologna and the remaining 150 in Ferrara.

I found similar conditions here as at Legion Hqs. The barracks were clean, food good and the officers appeared to be taking an interest in the welfare of the men under them. The Commanding Officer Major Ferreri appeared to be an exceptionally fine officer. The uniform was in the same condition as that mentioned above, some - grey carabinieri uniforms others dyed battle dress of all shades and sizes.

Various squads were being drilled and the smartness of their bearing contrasted strangely with their tattered appearance.

8. The Mobile Battalion is mobile only in name, as *Pygs* devoid of transport, however Col. Borla informed me he has received instructions to have 50 Car drivers ready to take over vehicles which are being sent up to the Legion in the near future.

The Legion has twelve Italian type tanks - seven of which are in serviceable condition. The remaining five require extensive overhaul and spare parts which are lacking. In any case the whole have so far been useless as no P.O.L. has been available for their use and applications for adequate supplies by the Legion Commander has been of no effect.

9. In their present state one cannot expect good and efficient service from the CC.RR.

Their morale and discipline is good and they are loyal. They are ready and anxious to give of their best. Given reasonably decent clothing, adequate transportation and P.O.L. I am definitely of the opinion the Carabinieri could be relied upon to restore law and order in Emilia or any other region.

With regard to transportation I would stress the necessity for small compact 4 wheeled drive vehicles i.e. Armoured cars - 15 cwt trucks, weapons carriers or jeeps and an adequate supply of F.C.L. to enable mobile patrols to patrol and visit outlying Communes at irregular intervals. I am convinced such mobile patrols would speedily put an end to the roving bands which at present infect the outer parts of Emilia. I would add that there is no complaint of any shortage of arms.

10. Questura :

With regards to the Agents of Public Safety :

I saw the Questore Jenteffi who informed me that his present strength of agents is approximately 750. Of this number 450 are regular agents with some years of experience, the remainder are ex-partisans - all Communists. The latter are useless, they have had no training as Police Officers and have no interest in the service, but are wholly and solely imbued with the spirit of Communism.

The Questore stated he was forced to enlist the 300 ex-partisans by order from Rome apparently to bring his force up to strength and has no power in himself to dispose of their services.

They work with the regular agents for guidance and instruction and are doing their utmost to convert the regular men to the Communist faith.

He alleged that the Civil authorities i.e. the Prefect and Sindaco supported the ex-partisans in every possible way and while such state of affairs existed little good work could be expected from the Questores Department.

11. There are no uniforms available for the Agents and none has been forthcoming in spite of requests to the Ministry of Interior.

From the trend of his conversation I had no doubt at all that many of the Partisan members of the Questura are using their position as Police Officers to carry out criminal acts by way of breakings or blackmail.

Like the C.C.R.R. the Questore is lamentably short of transport and P.C.L. He is allowed 400 litres petrol per month in an efficient force.

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Like the CC.RR. the Questore is lamentably short of transport and P.O.L. He is allowed 400 litres petrol per month - *2820*
as regards food :- The ration scale is adequate, but the agents buy in the open market the prices are generally prohibitive - thus in actual fact they are short of food. This is a bad position.

12. On the morning of the 20th November I saw the Area Commander Brigadier Tennant who is very keen to help the civil police forces in every possible way.

Squads of British Troops working with Sections of the F.S.S. have carried out small raids for arms in the Ferrara area with varying degrees of success. No arrests were made. These raids were carried out on security grounds. I have no comment to make regarding this.

The closest co-operation exists between A.C. Liaison Group and area command and help on either side is mutual. Brigadier Tennant agrees that given adequate clothing and transport the CC.RR. are fully capable of maintaining law and order in the area.

13. I also had an interview with General Cerica, Officer

Commanding Italian troops in the area. He is very concerned regarding reports of Communist activity in the Region.

14. It would seem that the Communists are infiltrating into every office both civil and Military. Their leader "Dario" who led the Partisans at the time of the liberation is the prime mover. He, it is alleged, has recently visited Moscow travelling from Livorno in a Russian ship and will do so again at the end of this month. Dario returns with "Orders and money" for the Party. It is suggested they are waiting the ripe moment to take over the government by force. This may be the old "Communist bogey" but the general feeling is that the majority of the Communists are hooligans, that they have members in every branch of public life and are attempting to undermine the Police Agencies. The Questore feels that his hands are tied by the Prefect and Sindaco, every move he makes or tries to make is known to his opponents beforehand due to the fact that Communists are in all his offices, therefore he is more or less forced to take the line of least resistance.

The CC.RR. alone seem to be free of political taint and they only can be relied upon to preserve public tranquillity.

The Questore appeared to me to be an intelligent capable Officer and if his department could be swept clean of the ex-partisan - Communist elements there is no reason why that force too should not become an efficient body as it was prior to the Fascist regime, but until that is done there is little hope of success.

SUBJECT : Report of trip to Pisa.

TO : Director - Public Safety Sub-Commission.

1. Attention is requested to the following correspondence in Ex. Com. file 8263/EC wherein specific arrangements were described for a trip to Pisa and Modena for the purpose effecting arrangements to turn over the Concentration Camps at these locations to the Ministry of War and the Ministry of Grace and Justice, respectively: (A) Folio 43, (B) Minutes 44 and 45, (C) Folio 49, (D) Minutes 46 and 50, (E) Note attached to Folio 49.

2. It is submitted that all correspondence referred specifically to arrangements to visit both the Pisa and Modena camps in one day and that the effective date was finally established as of 22 Aug 45.

3. Accordingly, the undersigned accompanied by an interpreter of this S/C, two representatives of the Ministry of Grace and Justice, and an Italian Army Colonel representing the Minister of War, arrived at Ciampino Air-Port where we were later joined by Colonel Kerr, WMA, and Colonel Davis, G-1 MATCUSA. Col. Davis stated that he had no knowledge of the scheduled trip to Modena and indicated that it would be most difficult to visit both Pisa and Modena in one day. The undersigned described the terms of his orders and stressed the interest of this S/C in having the Modena camp turned over to the Ministry of Grace and Justice. After some discussion it was decided to proceed to Pisa and there make further arrangements if found practical.

4. Immediately upon arrival at Pisa the undersigned was informed that the Modena camp was completely evacuated and almost

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4. Immediately upon arrival at Pisa the undersigned was informed that the Modena camp was completely evacuated and almost completely torn down; with all tents removed and electrical facilities, etc. entirely dismantled. Said evacuation and break-up was described as having been completed as of 13 Aug 45. No one from the Rome group appeared to have any knowledge of this development.

5. The representatives of the Ministry of Grace and Justice state that the taking over of the Modena camp cannot be considered under these circumstances.

6. In view of the importance of the Modena camp to the Ministry of Grace and Justice, and the close interest of this S/C in insuring additional accommodations to relieve the most critical prison situation in the history of the Allied occupation, the following is considered pertinent:

A. The evacuation and break-up of the Modena camp was evidently carried out without the knowledge of G-1 MARCUSA, since

Col. Davies stated that he had not been advised. Neither had UNIA or Allied Commission any advance information as to this action having been taken.

B. The evacuation and break-up of the Modena camp appears to have been started and completed between the date of the start of correspondence, which had for one of its objectives the taking over of this camp by the Ministry of Grace and Justice, and the actual trip to the north. The break-up was reportedly completed three days prior to this trip.

C. The loss of the Modena camp eliminates the only possibility of relieving the critically overcrowded conditions of practically every prison in the four regions still under AMG control within a reasonable period of time. With the facilities now available to the Italian Government there appears to be but little likelihood that the Ministry of Grace and Justice can secure and equip another site for the accommodation of a large number of prisoners.

D. The failure of this trip to achieve any objective results is a matter of the greatest concern to this S/C, and it is suggested that the question of securing additional prison accommodations for the use of the Ministry of Grace and Justice be taken up with higher headquarters. It cannot be stressed too strongly that the overcrowded conditions of Italian prisons, especially those in AMG territory, presents a grave threat to the Public Security of Italy.

Public Safety matters in general were discussed with the above officers and the following points were raised.

Lt. Col. Pickering was informed that Major Gould was still in hospital in Naples but would be sent to Aquila as soon as he was fit.

Lt. Col. Pickering said that he would like to take advantage of any opportunity of returning to England to resume his civil occupation. |X

Major Manifold said that he was experiencing some difficulty with travel passes into Army area. Owing to delay in obtaining approval from 5th and 8th Armies he had been using his discretion in issuing passes without obtaining prior approval. He was told that he must comply with Executive Memorandum 77 which did not allow him any discretion.

Major Greenhough said that a great deal of work had been caused by civilians being sent to the Army control line without proper passes. One of the chief offenders was Hq. A.C. The Quastore of Rome was in the habit of giving civilians passes as far as the Army control line and then advising them to obtain a pass to cross the line from the local Civil Affairs Officer.

Col. Bowman expressed his appreciation of the work done by Lt. Col. Bye and his regret at Col. Bye's transfer to 5th Army. However, he was reconciled to the appointment of Major Collins as R.A.S.C. and hoped that he would soon be promoted. Col. check posts to turn back all Italian personnel trying to travel without
proper AG passes.

(d) Location of Provost Officers with AG Public Safety.

DISCUSSION - Strongly recommended for close liaison, all branches Provost
Officers British, U.S., Canadian, South African, RIF etc. should be
located in same block of offices as AG Public Safety - Example, in
Quarters Building, as in RIF - Officers working together can sort out
problems quicker by personal contact - saved time, report, telephone -
(Col Briggs) Not considered practical at Berlin level - Public Safety
essential part of Berlin HQ.

(Col Blair) advised Gordon HQ on level with District, same principles apply. It should be possible with AMT and Provincial Public Safety Officers - Provost Officers of areas located in large towns have their offices in the most central and busiest part of the town, same position must apply for AMT Provincial Police Officers.

CONCLUSION - AMT's Areas and AMT Provincial Public Safety Officers to work out best method AMT carrying close liaison.

5. OTHER SUGGESTIONS

(i) Col Doherty - That is position remaining process for civilians working on dock clearance.

Col Blair - Employment through Civil Labour Office (CLO) as required for Port clearance by Port Commandant - local daily traffic issued, control of traffic by Port Security and Ports Troop, AMT Ports Provost Coy for CMO, will be fully conversant with normal procedure for issue of passes by Port Commandant, Port Security and other authorities concerned. Major Irwin - DMO (H) - stated that Lt. Col Blair had been appointed Port Commandant for CMO. AMT is aware for action with AMT Ports when Ports Troop Coy nominated.

(ii) Col Doherty - would it be possible for curfew hour to be included on dock request?

Col Blair - this should be normal procedure, particularly for Merchant Seamen when leave pass.

AMT 5/ Area for action with AMT Ports when Ports Troop Coy nominated.

(iii) Control of Civilian Transport.

Col Irwin stated Italian Government had issued new decree to try to reduce a large number of the Italian vehicles at present on the road. It is important this decree should be enforced in the new territory as carried. Details of the decree are being circulated and passes are in print. Allocation of transport to be affected immediately notices are put up. Difficulty may be found with Italian military vehicles in hands of civilians, many of which were sold by the Germans. Civilians in possession of these vehicles will have to prove ownership, otherwise vehicles will be taken away.

(iv) Movement of Civilians.

Col for CENQ will be fully conversant with normal procedure for issue of passes by Port Commandant, Port Security and other authorities concerned. Major Drew - DQMS(W) - stated that Lt. Col. Balfour had been appointed Port Commandant for CENQ. AM 27 Area for action with AM Ports when Ports involve Col. nominating.

(ii) Col. Donoherty - would it be possible for carter hour to be included on deck passes?

Col. Blair - this should be normal procedure, particularly for Merchant Seamen's Shore leave passes.

AM 27 Area for action with AM Ports when Ports involve Col. nominating.

(iii) Control of Civilian Transport.

Col. Young stated Italian Government had issued new decree to try to reduce a large number of the Italian vehicles present on the road. It is important this decree should be enforced in the new territory on arrival. Details of the decree are being circulated and porters are in print. Blocking of transport to be effected immediately notices are put up. Difficulty may be found with Italian Military vehicles in hands of civilians, many of which were sold by the Germans. Civilians in possession of these vehicles will have to prove ownership, otherwise vehicles will be taken away.

(iv) Movement of Civilians.

Col. Donoherty - with the opening up of NW Italy there will be considerable movement of civilians trying to get from South to North. Strictly recommended and endorsed by Col. Young, there must be complete Standstill Order and blocking of all routes as had to be done on fall of Rome, otherwise civilian movement will not completely cut off. NO movement from South Italy to NW Italy at all to be allowed without special permit. Order will be initiated by 5th Army and continued on modified by 2 Dist when they take over.

(v) Carfare Passes.

Col. Drives stated AM had had considerable difficulty with civilian movement at night owing to issue of late passes to civilians to move after curfew by Officers Messes - requested this should be subject of a District Order. Col. Blair for action with Staff.

(vi) Provost Control.

It was decided this was not within the scope of the Conference. Col. Young stated that a directive was being prepared at AFHQ and this subject would be better held in abeyance until this directive had been circulated.
