The attached report by Inspector Comm. TOMMASO PENNARITA contains very derogatory remarks about:

1. MOSCATELLO Corrado and
2. LUCRETINI Salvatore

both of whom were appointed, before my arrival, by A.M.G.

Since being in Macerata I can say without fear of contradiction that LUCRETINI has rendered great assistance to me, and although his home life has not interfered with his duty, it is to be deprecated.

MOSCATELLO is infirm and medically unfit for active police service, although he was most co-operative while filling the office of Acting Questore. With regard to his behaviour I re-iterate what I said to the Inspector that disciplinary action should and undoubtedly could be taken if the allegations were true.

There are still some temporary agents employed, but when the Questore was told to reduce the numbers he asked to be permitted to retain them as they were waiting for vacancies in a training school in Rome and he felt that it would be better if they could perform temporary duty and so gain experience.

Generally speaking, the Questura is running well - at least Questore CRISTOFALONI has made no complaint to me - and from my observations and information it is unflinched by political parties and there are no Patriotic Groups functioning in this Province.

Generally speaking, the Questura is running well - at least Questore CRISTO MALONI has made no complaint to me - and from my observations and information it is influenced by political parties and there are no Patriotic Groups functioning in this Province.

The whole trend of the report confirms what I said to the Inspector "That you desire to get rid of both Moscatello and Lucretti". In this connection I will support them for the way they have assisted A.M.G. but deprecate their behaviour if what the Inspector writes, is true.

The present Questore who arrived here on 13 Oct 44 has never reported to me that their private lives were so bad and even now he will agree that their work has not been prejudiced.

With regard to Dott. FERRIGNO Carmine I was warned against trusting him as he has the reputation of "hunting with the hounds and running with the hare". The Questore has been approached by the Ministry of Interior to re-employ this officer, and his reply was against such a step. Today I asked the Questore CRISTO MALONI his opinion and he informed me that he does not want Ferrigno owing to his previous unreliability and political actions.

As a result of the conclusions drawn it is thought to be opportune to assign Commissario Moscatello and Archivist Lucretti to other offices.

It seems also that Acting Commissario Ferrigno Carmine might be reassumed into service, after he has been deferred to the Epuration Commission.

The Commission is therefore asked to make known its own opinion on the subject.

SUBJECT : Macerata Questura (AMG territory).
Situation of Group A Personnel, apprentices and
auxiliary agents.

TO : The Head of the Police, Rome.

At the Macerata Questura, directed by the Questore
Maione Oreste, there are at present in service the following
functionaries:-

MOSCATELLO Dott. Carrado - P.R. Commissario - Acting
Vice-Questore, as a result of the nomination conferred upon him
by the local Allied Police Command, who, in the absence of the
holder of the title of Questore, nominated him provisional
regent of the Questura together with Dott. MAROLA Raffaele,
Directing Commissario of the II Division.

MISERANDINO Vincenzo - Commissario, acting, charged with
the repression of rationing evasions.

LUCHETTI Salvatore - Archivist - acting auxiliary
Commissario and head of the Political Section, following his
nomination as such by the local Allied Police Command.

On the arrival of the Allies at Macerata, Moscatello
was on duty at the Questura together with Acting Commissario
Merola, and as the functionary of the highest rank present on
the spot he was, on the proposal of the Prefecture, nominated
by the Allies as Questore and assumed the direction of that
provincial police office.

Subsequently, upon the assignment to Macerata of the
Questore Comm. Maione, Moscatello, still on the proposal of the
Prefecture, was nominated Vice-Questore by the Allies, with the
charge of directing also the III or Administrative Division.

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MISERANDINO Vincenzo - Commissario, acting, charged with the repression of rationing evasions.

LUCRETTI Salvatore - Archivist - acting auxiliary Commissario and head of the Political Section, following his nomination as such by the local Allied Police Command.

On the arrival of the Allied at Macerata, Moscatello was on duty at the Questura together with Acting Commissario Merola, and as the functionary of the highest rank present on the spot he was, on the proposal of the Prefecture, nominated by the Allies as Questore and assumed the direction of that provincial police office.

Subsequently, upon the assignment to Macerata of the Questore Comm. Maione, Moscatello, still on the proposal of the Prefecture, was nominated Vice Questore by the Allies, with the charge of directing also the III or Administrative Division.

Acting Commissario Merola has always directed and continues to direct the II or Criminal Division.

The Archivist, Lucretti Salvatore, who had some time previously gone into the bush, on a proposal made by Moscatello to the Acting Prefect, was on the 1st July, 1944, nominated by the Allies as Acting Auxiliary Commissario, with the charge of directing the Political Section.

Moscatello, as he declares in the report of his interrogation (Encl. 1), immediately after the Allied occupation, made haste to assume a certain number of selected persons from among, so he affirms, the Patriots, and nominated them Agents of Public Security, to prevent the Questura being "fired" and the agents remaining in service "being killed", given that, always

according to Moscatello, the Questura was hated for having executed round-ups.

These affirmations, however, are not based on truth, inasmuch as the few round-ups were always carried out by Fascist military and Fascists and only on a few occasions P.S. Agents took any part against their will, passively and negatively.

It has been ascertained from unanimous declarations that the Germans during their occupation did not interfere with the Questura, so much so that the personnel were not asked to take the usual oath or to give any active collaboration.

Meantime the dangers represented by Moscatello of reprisals on the part of the Patriots in order to justify the assumption of auxiliary personnel should be considered as a political move on his part.

Among these auxiliary agents, a certain Pinessi Mario, ex-political confinee, aspired to be nominated Questore.

The abnormal situation created in regard to Moscatello and Lucretti with the ranks they have actually assumed, is the exclusive work of Moscatello, who, although he asserts that his classification has always been "excellent" has nevertheless remained stationary at the rank of Commissario for a full 15 years. To him also is due, as has been said the nomination of Lucretti as Acting Commissario, but what is more surprising and inexplicable is that the nomination was made by Prefect Ponte who provoked the relative decrees from the local Allied Police Command.

Acting Commissario FERRIGNO Dott. Carmine, previously director of the Macerata concentration camps, and then, under German occupation, Prefectorial Commissioner of the Comune of Macerata and finally Head of the Price Control Office, not having been on ordinary duty at the Questura cannot be considered as a member of the staff of that office. He has recently abandoned the service and has

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The Questura personnel was completed at the time of the arrival of the Allies by a few clerks, apprentices and agents, the majority having gone into the bush.

It will be useful, for the purposes of this enquiry, to examine the position of each employee as regards his past, his activities during the German occupation and his actual qualities.

MOSCATELLO Dott. Corrado - P.S. Commissario.

This functionary was transferred on the 12th April 1927 from Ascoli Piceno to Macerata. He affirms that he asked for the transfer, without, however, specifying his reasons. On the other hand, from information gathered, it appears that his transfer was brought about by the Prefect as he had contracted so many debts at Ascoli that his continued presence there was not desirable.

Moscattello says that he has never suffered from any physical disability or illness, but he drags his right leg badly and has difficulty in speaking. Even in the absence of other causes his physical condition would be sufficient to put an end to his career.

There is much criticism in Moscattello's regard even among the public for the charge he has assumed since the arrival of the Allies - he is described as deceitful, eviltongued and an opportunist, and he is further criticised for shady dealings which are known in the office and among the citizenry.

He is accused of having appropriated for his own use at home a radio and an electric cooking stove which were consigned to the Questura for custody. Also three or four quintals of wood from a quantity sent from one of the concentration camps for the heating of the Questura. When the Germans ordered the consignment of arms to the Questura, he asked the German officer in charge for, and obtained, a very fine hunting gun. Also other guns disappeared, according to members of the staff. After the arrival of the Allies a local firm decided for philanthropic motives to place on sale, with the assistance of the Comune, a quantity of textile goods which they had hidden from the Germans, to be sold practically at cost price to refugees and those who had suffered war damages, exclusively. Before the day appointed for the opening of the sale, Mrs. Moscattello insisted that by right of her husband's position she should have her pick of the stock. The manager of the firm protested but finally did not dare refuse and the lady bought 23,000 lire's worth. The populace did not fail to notice the bulky packages being taken from the closed shop to her house and commented

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Confronted with this story Moscatello at first denied that any purchases had been made by his family at the firm named, but the next day, having heard of the interrogation of the firm's manager, he said that he had asked his wife and that she had admitted having bought some things for a few thousands of lire.

From the point of view of the conduct of Moscatello in regard to the Germans, Mercasciallo Chiariotti says that at

the time when this functionary was directing the Questura, as many of the agents were going into hiding to avoid having to work for the Germans, he introduced a register of daily presence on duty.

The foregoing and confidential information gathered goes to show that Moscatello is a functionary who does not enjoy the public esteem and is much discussed for his incorrect dealings even within the office itself.

LUCRETTE Salvatore - Archivist - Acting Auxiliary Commissario.

Assumed into service as a cadet in March, 1927 at Turin.

In January, 1930, was nominated Archivist. Between 1931 and 1942 he was transferred 9 times. He has been in Macerata since August, 1942.

These continual transfers are not a good sign. He is a disturbing element obviously not easily tolerated and foremost among the reasons for this opinion is his moral conduct. He separated from his wife in 1942 legally and had been separated from her in fact since 1939. He has four children, three girls and a boy. He lives with and supports his own mother. Lucretti declares that his separation from his wife was brought about by vague and generic suspicions of infidelity on his part, but in fact he has been living for some time with a certain Antonia Perovich of Zara, who he presents sometimes as his wife and sometimes as his servant according to circumstances and the persons to whom he is presenting her. The Carabinieri report that there are often violent scenes between this woman and Lucretti's mother the noise of which disturbs the whole neighborhood and attracts the attention of the people passing in the street. Antonia Perovich, born in 1907, is herself married to a certain Tacchetti from whom she separated a few days after the wedding. She is reported to be addicted to drugs.

It is reported that Lucretti belongs to the Socialist Party and caused some scandal, by sitting on the platform at a Socialist meeting, in view of the supposed non-political character of P.S. Officers and Agents. The Socialists themselves are said not to think much of him. All the worthy citizens consulted did not hide their disapproval of him and

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valuable help to, and an excellent collaborator with, AUG, in his quality of Head of the Political Section. It is my opinion that he is worthy of promotion. Lucretti was performing the duties of an acting Commissario and as, in your opinion, he is a capable officer, I nominate him as from the 1st October, 1944, Acting Commissario to fill the vacant post."

Therefore the Allied Police Command really did not more than adhere to the request of the Prefecture, ratifying with administrative decree a measure already adopted by the Italian Authorities.

At the end of the writer's investigation Lucretti asked him, evidently with the idea of obtaining indulgence in regard to his moral conduct, to use his influence with Antonia Petrovich to put an end to their relationship, as he wished to be reconciled with his wife and once more united to his family. The writer interviewed Petrovich and found her to be hysterical and amoral. He afterwards told Lucretti that it would not be easy to solve his problem.

MEROLA Dr. Raffaele - Acting Commissario - Head of the 2nd Division (Criminal).

This functionary was transferred on the 23rd February, 1944, for political reasons from Ravenna to Macerata, as he was threatened, so he affirms, by the Prefect and the Questore of Ravenna, with arrest if he did not leave the place. He says that he joined the Fascist Party in 1932 after the measure which obliged all members of the Police Force to belong to the party. After that he says he never renewed his "stessers".

He stayed at his post during the German occupation and confirms that the Germans did not trouble the P.S. Also that such round-ups as took place were carried out by Fascists and Fascist militia and that only on one or two occasions Agents were added, who however, were reluctant and remained passive. He further confirms that Lucretti's nomination as Head of the Political Section, with the relative rank was proposed by Moscatello to the Prefecture, who at once adhered to it.

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There is no comment to be made of the moral or political conduct of this functionary, who is, however, held to be an extravagant type whose work gives a poor yield while he could do much more if he were guided with firmness and energy.

FERRIGNO Dr. Carmine - Acting Commissario.

Ferrigno although depending as regards administration and discipline on the Macerata Questura, cannot be considered as forming part of that Questura on account of the special duties which he performed. He first directed the concentration camps at Treja and Petriolo, then he was entrusted with the Communal Administration of Civitanova Marche and afterwards that of Macerata and finally he was head of the Price Control Office of the Macerata Prefecture.

Many and serious are the charges brought against this functionary, however, thorough investigation reveals that he

was definitely an anti-Fascist, did not cooperate with the Nazi-Fascists, was good to the internees, was known to be a reliable, energetic and good functionary and that the stories put about and anonymous reports made were mere fabrications to get him put out of the way. The following pages treat of the individual accusations against Terrigno, disproving them. The reports sent to the Ministry were compiled by Moscatello and Lucretti for the purpose of obtaining his removal from service at Macerata.

MISERENDINO Vincenzo - Acting Commissario.

As regards this functionary who on paper, appears to have been transferred to Littoria on the 20th February, 1944, but who is actually still on service at the Macerata Questura, there is no criticism to be made, also because he was not on service at the office during the German occupation. He is most correct and disciplined and discharges his duties accurately and well in connection with the repression of rationing evasions.

GRADUATES and AUXILIARY AGENTS.

There are actually on service at the Questura at the present time 16 auxiliary agents. Three of them, Tombesi Goivanni, Tinei Mario, and Rucci Eno, who profess Communist sentiments more or less openly, are not considered suitable for the charge entrusted to them, that is to say the assumption of information on those who are to be expropriated.

As regards the 49 Auxiliaries assumed by Moscatello on the arrival of the Allied troops at Macerata, for the purpose, according to himself, of protecting the Questura from fire and the "effective" Agents from assassination, part of these have been drafted to other occupations through the direct intervention of the Prefect, and in order to adhere to his desire, I think it would be opportune to proceed to their dismissal gradually.

However, the Questore has pointed out to me the possibility of incidents between the Auxiliaries and the effective Agents because the former are nearly all armed and Communist political sentiments and the effective

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However, the Questore has pointed out to me the possibility of incidents between the Auxiliaries and the effective Agents because the former are nearly all armed and of Communist political sentiments and the effective Agents are completely unarmed. The relations between the two groups are bad because the Auxiliaries have superiority over the effectives.

It is not out of place to report here the spontaneous declaration of the Head of the local Patriots on the presumed patriotic merits of the Auxiliary Agents: "During the period of German occupation I was commander of the Patriots Battalion in the Sarnano District, and I can declare, without fear of being contradicted, that in the rolls of fighting partisans not one of the auxiliary P.S. Agents figures, in spite of the fact that to-day they are all furnished with a red 'tessera'."

CONCLUSIONS AND PROPOSALS.

From all the foregoing it is clear that a most abnormal situation has arisen in the functioning of the Macerata Questura.

Even before all the territory of the Province of Macerata was liberated, we find the Archivist, Lucretti, returning to Macerata in the guise of a hero and insisting in a most energetic manner to the President of the National Liberation Committee, Avv. Ciaffi, that he should be nominated Questore; not only this, but he feels that he has the right to insist on the nomination of Avv. Hollender as the new Prefect.

Only the firm and resolute attitude of Avv. Ciaffi induced Lucretti to return to his post with the Patriots. But Lucretti had a plan of assault on the Questura in order to gain domination and impose his will there.

There is no doubt that to this end he took the necessary steps with Moscatello, preferring to turn to this functionary instead of to Ferrigno, in the certainty that with the physical conditions of Moscatello, his scanty energy and slight capacity as regards his service, he would have been able, as in fact he was, to assume the direction of the Questura. Meantime, to gain his end, he had himself nominated Head of the Political section which is the centre from which emanates the direction of the Questura. Therefore, we find Ferrigno arrested on the same day that the Allies entered Macerata at the request of the National Liberation Committee, to whom, according to Carabinieri Captain Vetrano, commander of the Internal Group, a certain Mezzalana had presented himself, to repeat the old accusations against Ferrigno with regard to the management of the Concentration Camps.

It is evident that the accuser or the accusers had not any other accusations ready to attack Ferrigno more efficaciously, especially from the political point of view, which they managed to produce later.

So that the management of the Questura passed at once into the hands of Lucretti, assisted and upheld by the nucleus of auxiliary agents, selected from among the patriots, or rather the seditious patriots, according to Corradini Lucio, the

the present representative of the Patriots at Mocerata.

Moscatello counts for very little, being, according to the General voice, completely in Lucretti's hands.

Lucretti's only preoccupation and to a certain extent Moscatello's, is the complete elimination of Ferrigno, and in fact we find that the accusation of Mezzalana having failed, a report is drawn up by Lucretti in which he asserts that Moscatello withdrew his accusations against Ferrigno because he was intimidated by the Carabinieri officer in charge of the investigations.

Carabinieri Captain Vetreno thought fit also to tell us that besides the reasons given above which influenced these two functionaries to attack Ferrigno, a sense of personal revenge on the part of Moscatello may also be included, because he lost financially on the appointment of Ferrigno as Director of the Camps, as up to then the Direction of the Camps was assumed in turn by the Questura functionaries, and because Ferrigno, on his assumption of the directorship of the Camp at Treja, was preceded by Moscatello, and reported many abuses and irregularities on the part of the personnel and caterers, which had been tolerated by Moscatello.

The prestige and authority of the Questura has been undermined in public opinion both because the activities of Moscatello and Lucretti are known, the one to avenge his lack of promotion and the other to create for himself a predominant moral and financial position, and because unfavourable comments are made on the precedence of the auxiliary agents, who are perfectly armed, in relation to the effective agents who are still disarmed.

With the recent assignment to the Direction of the Questura of Questore Oreste Malone, the situation has changed, but not sufficiently. He is in a very difficult position, and this is confirmed by the various authorities of the C.C.P.P. Force, on account of the fact that the two functionaries have the support of the Allied Police Command, which in the first moments was only assisted by Lucretti and Moscatello, both of whom, there is no doubt, gave this Command a maximum of collaboration.

Carabinieri Captain Vetrano thought fit also to tell me that besides the reasons given above which influenced these two functionaries to attack Ferrigno, a sense of personal rancour on the part of Moscatello may also be included, because he lost financially on the appointment of Ferrigno as Director of the Camps, as up to then the Direction of the Camps was assumed in turn by the Questura functionaries, and because Ferrigno, on his assumption of the directorship of the Camp at Treja, was preceded by Moscatello, and reported many abuses and irregularities on the part of the personnel and caterers, which had been tolerated by Moscatello.

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To complete the result of the investigations and in the interests of truth it must be said that there is really nothing from the political angle to be brought against Ferrigno for activities carried out during the German occupation, but I must point out that this functionary does not enjoy the esteem or sympathy of the Authorities or of the public, both on account of his temperament and character and because he sustained the commune. For this fact alone it is desired to cite him as a collaborator with the enemy, collaboration which, as has been seen, was strictly within administrative limits, while meanwhile he was acting in favour of the Allies and of persons who professed anti-Fascist sentiments.

It must be added, however, that according to the opinion of many persons public judgment of Ferrigno has been much influenced by Moscatello and Lucretti for reasons which are easily guessed.

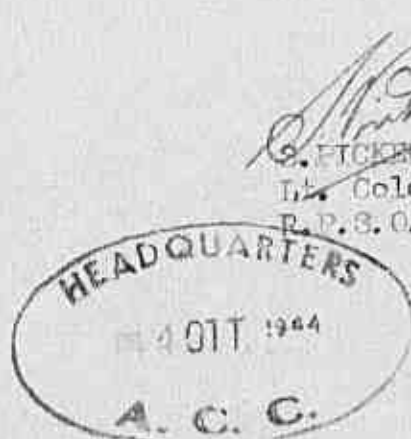
