



2. Attached herewith is compilation (In Italian Language) of record furnished by Questura from their files. Upon our receipt of this compilation, we re-checked with Questura in order to attempt to clarify all possible points, especially as to your mention of "Believed 36 Months Imprisonment for Falsification of Germans Stamps, and 4 Years Confinement for Murder"; and our results (in English) are as follows:

20-December-1918,--Sentenced to 6 months in prison, for Fraudulent Bankruptcy.

2-November-1922,-- Took Bankruptcy in legal manner; No criminal charge involved.

31-May- 1924,-- Sentenced to 1 year & 2 months in Prison (reclusion, or close confinement) for Embezzlement of Property entrusted to his care.

5-October- 1925,-- While in prison for Embezzlement as shown in above notation, subject was sentenced to 5 additional months in prison on an additional case of identical nature.

8-October- 1927,--Charged with Fraud(Chest); Acquitted on Insufficient Evidence.

25-January- 1928,--Filed another Declaration of Bankruptcy No criminal charge.

15-October- 1930,--Charged with Murder.Charge dropped, dismissed without trial.Reason not shown.

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5-October- 1925,---While in prison for Embezzlement as shown in above notation, subject was sentenced to 5 additional months in prison on an additional case of identical nature.

8-October- 1927,---Charged with Fraud(Cheat); Acquitted on Insufficient Evidence.

25-January- 1928,---Filed another Declaration of Bankruptcy No criminal charge.

15-October- 1930,---Charged with Murder.Charge dropped, dismissed without trial.Reason not shown.

3 -December-1930,--Sentenced to 9 months prison, (refus^oton or close confinement) for violation of laws governing Commerce; Falsifying German Trade-mark on commercial products.

Unknown date, 1932,--Arrested for Falsification of Commercial Trade-mark; Case not carried forward, no conviction

24-September 1932,--Sentenced to 3 months prison, for violation of certain restrictions previously placed upon him for admonition and probation as a dangerous and undesirable character.

13-December-1932,--Was "denounced" for offense similar to that under date of 31-May-1924, but case was "settled out of court".

15-March- 1933,- Sentenced to 3 months,prison, for violation similar to that under date of 24-September-1932.

Unknown date in 1928--,-Arrested for Adultery. Case settled out of court.

3. Records show that this subject left for Eretria in 1935, so nothing further is known about him in the files of Questura here. Questura states that from 1933 to 1935, subject was evidently on better conduct and did not run afoul the law.



From : George L. Batchelder retired Navy Lieut.
Subject : urgent need of rescue

Ref. letter from 1st Naval District Boston 24 March 1933
Ref. letter Secnav 2 March 1933

A reign of terror has existed here since April 21. No one has been allowed to communicate with the outside world for help, and the people are starving for want of food. Many respectable people have been put in prison on the flimsiest offence. I myself was in jail 4 days. No reason given. I have tried several times to reach the American armed forces for help but have been unsuccessful. Nor am I allowed to leave here. If this letter reaches you will you please dispatch at once a seaplane or fast patrol boat or destroyer in charge of a ranking officer to rescue me and afterwards to proceed to Pola to rescue my wife who was taken there May 17 and is now in prison. She has been seriously ill with nephritis since Nov. 10, due to the continuous bombardment, and was just recovering when they took her away. I am very much alarmed for her health and safety and feel that we are entitled to the protection of U.S.A. She should have been taken to a hospital not jail. Come quickly before she is spirited away to the interior. I know this gang.

When we are both rescued I want to be taken to Trieste for questioning and vindication. I give my word of honour as naval officer and gentleman that we are innocent ~~and~~ of any dishonourable act or deed.

It is vital however that we be rescued first. In my opinion the only trouble with us is envy and jealousy of the lower classes against the upper. So please act quickly.

I have some very interesting and valuable information which I have gathered during 4 years, stay here.

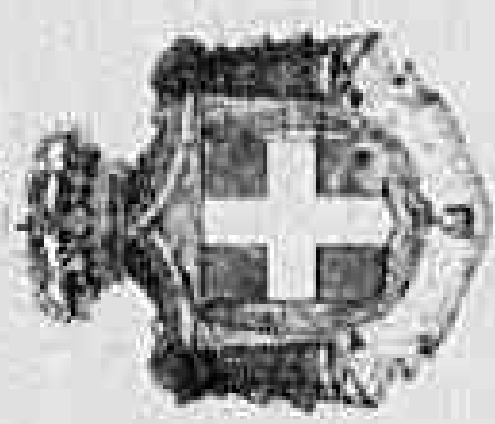

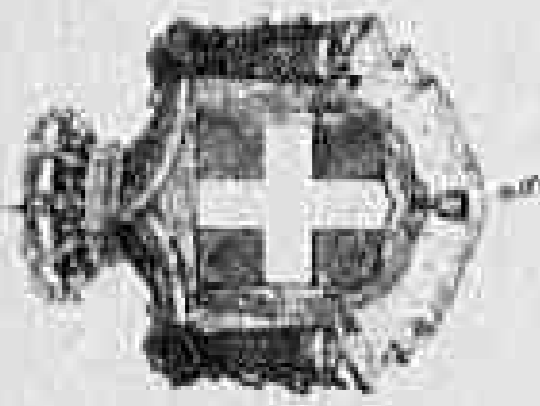

SUBJECT : Rail Movement of Goods for Export

TO : See Distribution

1. Bids for shipping since for export of goods from Italy are accepted once consignments are known to be ready for movement from point of origin. Shipping is not allocated, however, until goods are actually in warehouse or transit area at Port of shipment.
2. The normal bidding procedure for movement of stores by rail is causing some delay in bringing such traffic forward to the ports, especially where shortage of wagons prevents loading within the specified dates and entails a second bid being made.
3. The export trade is important to the Allied war effort and to Italian economy. To ensure prompt movement of this traffic the following exceptional procedure will be adopted in the case of bids placed by I.C.E. for rail carriage to ports of goods for shipment :-
 - (a) I.C.E. will tender bids for rail movement of goods for export to this Sub-Commission, or to the I.S.R. in the Compartimento in which the stores are to be loaded on rail.
 - (b) Bids will be accepted for the Compartimento loading programme for movement in the earliest possible period.
 - (c) If the stores, or any part, do not move within the period, due to failure of the railway to provide transportation, the balance to be railed will be treated as an emergency bid.
 - (d) I.C.E. will be responsible for advising I.S.R. Compartimento of the tonnage which has failed to move and which must be treated as emergency bid.
4. The regulations governing bid numbers, labelling and use of Forms XE will apply to this traffic whether moving as normal or emergency bid.
5. Wagon labels must show clearly the warehouse to which stores are consigned as well as the destination station.

2. The normal bidding procedure for movement of stores by rail is causing some delay in bringing such traffic forward to the ports, especially where shortage of wagons prevents loading within the specified dates and entails a second bid being made.
3. The export trade is important to the Allied war effort and to Italian economy. To ensure prompt movement of this traffic the following exceptional procedure will be adopted in the case of bids placed by I.C.E. for rail carriage to ports of goods for shipment :-

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- (b) Bids will be accepted for the Compartimento loading programme for movement in the earliest possible period.
- (c) If the stores, or any part, do not move within the period, due to failure of the railway to provide transportation, the balance to be railed will be treated as an emergency bid.
- (d) I.C.E. will be responsible for advising I.S.R. Compartimento of the tonnage which has failed to move and which must be treated as emergency bid.

4. The regulations governing bid numbers, labelling and use of Forms 2B will apply to this traffic whether moving as normal or emergency bid.

5. Wagon labels must show clearly the warehouse to which stores are consigned as well as the destination station. **6620**

Translation.Situation in the Bologna Province.*File 1000 66A 14057*

Such situation has not only local importance, given that - obviously - the movement which has spread during the last period of the German occupation and which has increased after the liberation, shows a tendency to spread out systematically into the neighbouring zones. Much more, according to a statement made by a liable person, this movement would be in connection with an eventual uprising, apparently social, but armed and not independent from political actions of greater importance.

The Bologna Province has been selected by the Communists as Centre of the agrarian movement, such as Milan and Turin should be the centres of the industrial labour movement.

Since August 1944 the Communists caused in several Communes an agreement to be made regarding the transformation of the crop-share system. Such agreement is absolutely anti-economic and has evidently a political background, as it turns to the crop sharers' class advantage, which has not suffered at all until a few days before the liberation and which on the contrary has speculated notoriously, selling food supplies to always more increased prices. This manoeuvre was made with a view to deduce from the other parties of the people (especially from the Socialists and the Christian Democrats) the crop-sharers and small tenants, who were not and are not attracted to the known Communist principles.

These contracts have not been discussed, but have been ^{with} threats and several proprietors, who did not want to sign, have been killed. The Authorities of the so-called Mussolini's Republic and those of the German occupants let them do as they wanted and in certain cases the Germans joined this propaganda.

In the Bologna plain the partisans were organised by the Communists into the Gap and Sap, who never took actively part in the struggle against the Germans, while the regular partisan formations, who were in the hilly zone, frequently carried out useful activities in the back of the German Troops. Infact, the first armed formations never caused a bridge to be blown up, even when specifically ordered, and to-day they transformed themselves into the guards of the infinite Committees, which abusively call themselves Committees of National Liberation.

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The liberal parties, democratic Christian and republican entered into the Regional Liberation Committee of Bologna only during the month of August 1944, thus completing the six parties, of which it is composed, but had opportunity to carry out but very little propaganda, at first, in consequence of the activity of the Germans and the Fascist Black Brigades and then as a result of the activity of the a/m Communist partisans.

After the liberation of Bologna, which took place on the 21st April, the socialist Prefect appointed by the Regional Liberation Committee, assured the population that justice would be made against the criminals and those who took advantage from the Fascist regime, but told them to be calm and to return to normal civil life. In spite of this, on the same day murders took place, especially in the city, and the victims continued to be many, not only during the first days but for entire weeks.

Up-to-now (a month later) arrests of persons have been continued, illegal prisons in different points of the city have been opened, and when by order of the Allied Authorities all prisoners had to be transferred to the S. Giovanni in Monte prison, the partisans moved only half of them; the others (to the greater part not fighting Fascists) have been found and continue to be found dead in different localities.

The particulars of these incidents have been reported to the Allied Public Safety Officer, Major Way and to the Officer in charge of the partisans Major Gillette. Just the last week (20th of May) an Allied Officer has noticed completely armed partisans run around the city in a bar. It is to be pointed out, that the Commander of the partisans, on the 21st April, during a meeting of the Liberation Committee, declared that the arms would not be surrendered to the Allies, since he had made arrangements for the gathering-up of all "old stuff of the Province" to be given up, to the effect that the efficient arms would remain at the disposal of the Communist formations to be used in the revolution to come. However, the greater part of these arms are not in the city, but in the country, where it is very difficult to find a considerable number of them collected in one place.

It is to be pointed out, that who has been in the country has been able to notice that during the last weeks of their stay, the same Germans have delivered arms (especially hand-grenades) to the population, i.e. to the partisans of to-day, who then co-operated with the Germans.

Evidently this has been made with a view to create disorders among the Italians in the back of the advancing Allied troops.

After the arrival of the Allies, there was a pause of the violent actions in the country, in order to impose the a/m agricultural agreements. But, seen the different procedure of the Allied troops from that of the Germans, soon murders started again, not only of Fascists but also of proprietors, farm managers, their families and of other persons, also for personal revenges, but more often according to a fixed scheme and an exclusive directive.

In many Communes, besides the forced imposition of the agricultural agreements, which are said to be approved by the National Liberation Committee - but which has never discussed the matter - sums are demanded, which vary from 50.000 Lire to 6.000.000 Lire, to be paid within four or five days under the threat to "undergo the justice of the patriots".

It is said that "all those who do not comply with the request of the National Liberation Committee and are deaf to the needs of the working classes, place themselves definitely outside the national community and against the patriotic front, to the effect that they will be considered traitors by all working organisations and as such denounced to the masses in order to undergo the same treatment as the traitors of the Country".

In other Communes letters have been written to the proprietors stating that in view of the fact that they have earned too much during the Fascist period, they should give up to the local Liberation Committee, by order of the Central Committee (. . . which of course knew nothing at all) the 2,50% of the area in their possession, valuing it 250.000 Lire per hectare.

In many Communes, the armed members of the Local Committees have prohibited to transport the absolutely necessary food-supplies to town, where there still are thousands of peasants and workmen without work and income.

In the economical field, tariffs have been fixed, which vary from 38 Lire per hour for ordinary works to 95 Lire per hour for the fertilisation of the fields. With such prices the corn production cost would amount to at least 1.200 Lire per quintal and that of the rice, in the few zones where it is grown, to at least 1.800 Lire before polishing: which would mean misery for all consumers.

The Provincial Commissioner has issued an ordinance against all these abuses, which has brought about a standstill lasting a few days; but then the promoters took up courage again and the impositions became more and more

frequent, with many murders, even of members of the working class and sometimes with methods copied from the German S.S. (hangings in the presence of the families, digging of their graves by those who were about to be killed etc.)

The Provincial Commissioner, Col. Thomas, has then invited the Regional Liberation Committee to declare itself contrary - with a public poster - to such methods and facts, while the Democratic Christian Party sent out a protest to all other parties and to the Regional Liberation Committee, with a view to re-enforce the prestige and the authority of the Committee itself, separating its own responsibility from the a/m incidents, which are contrary to every Democratic conception and to every criterion of order and justice.

The Regional Liberation Committee, in consequence of the weakness of the presidency and the obstructionism of the Communist members, who have violently attacked the intervention of the Allies, has not yet complied, after 15 days, with the request made by the Provincial Commissioner, and on the contrary its Communist members are against the publication of a statement, which is necessary, both to give back confidence to the Italians and to assure the prestige of the Allied Authorities.

I - A re-enforcement of the Allied Police is necessary, especially in the country, where a few men would be sufficient to cop with an entire Commune.

II - To oblige the Regional Liberation Committee - under the threat of its dissolution - to declare itself not 'particeps criminis' in the a/m incidents and to comply with the just requests of the Provincial Commissioner.

III - Control of the members of the Italian Questura (where Communist partisans are put in).

IV - Appointment of career Prefect and Questore by the Italian Government, with the authorisation of the Allied Authorities, eliminating from such positions any party action whatsoever (so as it has always been in democratic Italy before the transformation of the State administration by the Fascist party.

If these measures will not be immediately put into effect, the complained criminal activity, which has already spread out into many Communes and especially into the Bologna plain, would overstep the Province boundaries and spread over the neighbouring Provinces, as on the other hand it has been already noticed (Ravenna, Forli, Ferrara..) which would also represent the actuation of a fixed ^{U.S.} scheme, both to create new situations in the Northern

Regions and to facilitate the destructive and alarming activity of armed bands with the same political idea, eventhough if of different nationality.

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L. SITUAZIONE NELLA PROVINCIA DI BOLOGNA

Tale situazione non ha soltanto importanza locale, dato che - evidente- mente - il movimento che in essa si è svolto durante l'ultimo periodo dell'occupazione tedesca ed intensificatosi dopo la liberazione, tende ad irradarsi sistematicamente ed in forma organica nelle zone viciniori. Anzi, per dichiarazione udita fare da persona degna di fede, sarebbe collegato ad un'eventuale movimento di sollevazione, apparentemente sociale, ma pronto e non indipendente da azioni politiche di maggiore importanza.

La provincia di Bologna è stata scelta dai comunisti come il centro del movimento agrario, così come Milano e Torino dovrebbero essere i centri del movimento operaio industriale.

Fino dall'agosto 1944 i comunisti fecero presentare in alcuni comuni un patto di trasformazione delle mezzadrie nettamente antieconomico e con finalità chiaramente politiche perché rivolta a dare vantaggio proprio alla classe dei contadini mezzadri che non aveva affatto sofferto fino agli ultimi giorni prima della liberazione e che anzi aveva notoriamente speculato vendendo i generi a prezzi sempre più elevati. Questa manovra era diretta a sottrarre agli altri partiti di massa (specialmente ai socialisti e ai dem. cristiani) i mezzadri ed i piccoli affittuari i quali non erano e non sono di per sé affatto attratti verso i noti concetti del comunismo.

Questi contratti venivano, non discussi, ma imposti con le minacce e con l'uccisione di parecchi proprietari che non volevano sottoscrivere. Le autorità della cosiddetta repubblica di Mussolini e quelle tedesche occupanti, lasciarono fare ed in certi casi i tedeschi si unirono alla propaganda stessa.

Nella pianura bolognese i partigiani furono organizzati dai comunisti nella Cap e nella Sap che non presero mai attiva parte alla lotta contro i tedeschi, mentre le vere formazioni partigiane regolari che si trovavano nella zona di montagna ebbero spesso da svolgere opera utile a tergo delle truppe germaniche. Infatti le prime formazioni armate non fecero mai saltare un ponte anche quando fu indicato specificatamente, ed oggi si sono trasformate nelle guardie degli infiniti Comitati che si intitolano abusivamente come Comitati di Liberazione Nazionale.

I partiti liberali, dem. cristiano e repubblicano entrarono nel Comitato Liberazione Regionale di Bologna solamente nel mese di agosto 1944, comportando così i sei partiti che lo formano, ma non hanno avuto la possibilità di svolgere che pochissime propaganda, prima, per l'opera tedeschi e delle brigate nere fasciste e poi per l'opera dei sindacati partigiani comunisti.

Avvenuta la liberazione di Bologna il 21 aprile il Prefetto socialista nominato dal Comitato di Liberazione Regionale assicurava la popolazione che sarebbe stata fatta giustizia contro i criminali ed i profittatori del fascismo, ma invitava alle calze ed al ritorno alle forme del vivere civile. Nonostante ciò cominciarono, il giorno stesso, omicidi di tutti i generi,

specialmente in città, e le vittime seguirono ad essere numerosissime non solo nei primi giorni ma per intere settimane.

Si seguì fino ad ora (un mese dopo) a fare arresti di persone, si aprirono carceri clandestine in diversi punti della città, e quando per ordine delle autorità alleate tutti i prigionieri dovevano essere trasferiti alle carceri di S. Giovanni in Monte, i partigiani ne trasferirono solo la metà: degli altri (in grande maggioranza non militanti fascisti) si sono trovati e si vanno ritrovando i cadaveri in diverse località.

I particolari di questi fatti sono stati resi noti all'Ufficiale alleato del Reg. Pub. Safety. Maj. Wey, ed anche all'Ufficiale edetto dei partigiani Maj. Gillette. Ancora la settimana scorsa (20 maggio) un Ufficiale Alleato ha veduto dei partigiani girare in auto, completamente armati, per le vie della città. E' da notarsi che il Comandante dei partigiani, il giorno 21 aprile, nella sala dove si era riunito il Comitato di Liberazione, aveva dichiarato che le armi non si sarebbero consegnate agli Alleati perché egli aveva fatto raccogliere tutti "i ferri vecchi della provincia" per consegnarli, in modo che le armi efficienti sarebbero rimaste alle formazioni comuniste per adoperarle nella rivoluzione che ancora doveva iniziarsi. La maggioranza di queste armi dei partigiani non si trova però in città, ma nella campagna, dove è assai difficile ritrovarle riunite in numero sufficiente in un'unica località.

Ma, visto il diverso modo di agire delle truppe Alleate da quella tedesca, ricominciarono ben presto e andarono aumentando le uccisioni non solo di fascisti ma di proprietari, di dirigenti di aziende agricole, di loro familiari e di altre persone, anche per vedette personali, ma il più spesso secondo un piano ordinato ed un'unica direttiva.

In molti comuni, oltre all'imposizione con minacce dei patti agricoli che ora si discuteranno approvati dal Comitato di Liberazione Nazionale - il quale non ha mai discusso la questione - si impongono teglie ^(che) ⁸ scollano della somma di L. 50.000 ai sei milioni, da pagare entro quattro ^{16,8} cinque giorni sotto pena di "subire la giustizia dei partigiani".

alle carceri di S. Giovanni in Conso, i partigiani (in grande maggioranza non militanti fascisti) si sono trovati e si vanno ritrovando i cadaveri in diverse località.

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"Tutti quelli che restano sorde agli inviti del Comitato di Liberazione Nazionale - continuare le committoria - e ai bisogni delle masse lavoratrici, si immetteranno definitivamente fuori della comunità nazionale e contro il fronte patriottico, sicché da tutti gli organismi di massa saranno considera- ruti traditori e come tali denunciati alle masse per essere trattati alla stregua dei traditori della Patria."

1. The object of the writer's visit to Bolzano was to interview a Dr. Hothop, stated to be in possession of valuable industrial information and in particular to have knowledge of industrial machinery hidden in the Bolzano area and which had been brought there from plants in the North of Italy. SUBJECT: Report on Lt. Col. W. J. Maskrey's Visit to Bolzano on 17 May 1945.

1. The object of the writer's visit to Bolzano was to interview a Dr. Hothop, stated to be in possession of valuable industrial information and in particular to have knowledge of industrial machinery hidden in the Bolzano area and which had been brought there from plants in the North of Italy. Upon arrival by air at Bolzano, I reported to Colonel Fiske, whose Headquarters are at Merano.

2. On Friday, 18 May 1945, I attempted to ascertain the whereabouts of Dr. Hothop and after considerable enquiry, found that this gentleman did not exist. During the course of the morning, however, I discovered at HQ German Army Group "C" a Major von Reichel, head of the Rustungskommando, Bolzano. This officer is an official of the organisation R.W.K. (Rustung und Kriegsproduktion), and had charge of the whole of the industrial productive capacity of the provinces of Bolzano, Trento and Belluno. Major von Reichel is an Austrian and speaks no English. He struck me as an extremely wide-awake and efficient officer and proved to be most cooperative. He had exact knowledge of the whole of the munitions and weapons plants concentrated in this area ⁶⁶¹ and of the disposition of a great number of machine tools brought to the Bolzano area. These machines had been concentrated in Bolzano for (a) productive purposes, (b) to escape Allied bombing and (c) as representing the remains of plants which had been partly destroyed by Allied air attack. There are stated to be 91 factories around the area in 17 of which and in tunnels in the mountain-sides, 4,000 machines are installed or are standing, of these von Reichel stated that about 3,000 are not single purpose machines and could be used for production of civilian goods. The value of the machines is stated to be between two and three billion lire. A full report on these machines is attached.

3. During the afternoon of Friday, 18 May 1945, I was accompanied by von Reichel and his assistant, 1st Lt. Sment (who was formerly secretary to the German Embassy in Italy) to the Headquarters of R.C.G.E.S. (Rohstoff-Handels Gesellschaft m.b.H.) at St. Ulrich, where I interviewed a number of the officials of this concern. Separate reports are attached.
4. During the course of the day I also interrogated two officials of the Organisation Todt; Regierungsrat Wagner, who is head of the OT Regiment, Bolzano, and his assistant, Herr Kahr. Report is attached.
5. I also had a conversation with Lt. Gen. Holfeld, Chief Administrative Officer, German Army Group "C", whose Headquarters are at Bolzano. Gen. Holfeld was much exercised about the question of obtaining a supply of lire for the payment of his troops. Major Curtis, of Finance Sub-Commission was due in Bolzano and I recommended that Gen. Holfeld should speak with him. I imagine that it would be inadvisable to put any further money in the hands of the German troops, as this would only result in their stripping the surrounding countryside by purchase of any portable articles in order to take back solid assets to Germany rather than paper lire.
6. On Saturday, 19 May 1945, I made the journey to Cortina d'Ampezzo to the Headquarters of the German 10th Army. I had been given the name of Lt. Forstreuther, 10 ACK 10, of 10th Army. This officer was alleged to be well-informed on matters of production by Italian firms for the German Armed Forces. The journey to Cortina d'Ampezzo and back involved a trip of 200 Kms. over mountain roads and turned out to be hardly worthwhile, as Lt. Forstreuther had acted in much the same capacity as a British Local Purchase and Production Officer of the Ordnance Services, and had merely purchased and paid for items necessary for the German Armed Forces by way of ordinary contract. Conversation with this officer, however, elicited the interesting fact that the contracts placed in Italy by the German Army went through ordinary commercial procedure. In other words, German, Austrian, French and Italian firms were requested to tender and the cheapest price, quality considered, got the order. Payment was made on a gold basis. Lt. Forstreuther

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Tarchi had interceded in vain with Rahn, the German Ambassador in Italy, on many occasions where German destruction of industrial capacity was contemplated.

7. Attached for information is a list of German superior officers and their formations in Italy, together with a list of telephone numbers which may possibly be of interest. The telephone exchange of the German Army Group "C" is "Lichtenfels". Attached also is a note of the locations of the 3rd German Army Group provided for me by Major Hothorn, who is personal assistant to Lt. Gen. Holfeld. Major Hothorn is probably the "Dr. Hothop" referred to in the first paragraph of this letter, and knows nothing of industrial matters.

The object of my visit was to obtain information as to the transfer of complete and partial industrial installations from Italy to Germany. Attached is a first list of such transfers; others I have instructed the German Officials to forward through AMC Regional Commissioner Bolzano. Attached to the list is a note of the status of the transfer of industrial plants from Italy to Germany as of 28 Feb. 45, from which it will be noted that the value in Italian currency of the transferred plants is Lit. 28,125,075,990.70. I was informed that these transfers were correctly carried out as an ordinary business transaction.

There exist in St. Ulrich 150 cases containing 24,000 documents, including detailed despatch notes relating to machinery and plant exported to Germany. I have suggested to Lt. Col. McMatney, the Provincial Commissioner, that these cases of documents should be seized and the German staff of R.O.P.E.S. be put to work abstracting information as to the destinations of the exported equipment. Some of this equipment is not yet out of the country, some has been destroyed or damaged by Allied bombing of the railways en route, but a great deal can be recovered. COAL AND COKE REPORTS FOR ITALIAN INDUSTRY:

AT ST. ULRICH ON 19 May 1945

Accompanying this report is Folder II which contains a note of the bids and allotments of imported and domestically produced industrial coal and coke for January 1945, a note of the German/Italian organization of coal distribution, a list of allotments of coal with indication of the German firms making the deliveries; these covering the months from August 1944 to March 1945 inclusive. Also included is a note on the mining of Italian coal.

The officer of R.O.G.E.S. concerned with coal importation into Italy is It. Lange, Reichsbeauftragter fuer Kohale. This officer was formerly employed by the important German coal concern PLEIGER, Berlin. The chief of the German organization for coal distribution in Italy is Herr Wunderlich, who is located in Milan. The officer concerned with the bidding on German sources for coal for Italian industry was Herr Franz Kossak who was previously located in Salzburg and who is now apparently living with his wife and family at Lanegg, just over the Italian/Austrian border. I would have visited Herr Kossak had it been possible to get air clearance from 5 Army in the short time at my disposal. Herr Kossak was previously with the Rheinische-Westfalische Kohlenindustrie, Essen. The bids for coal for Italian industry were received at the Pleiger coal concern in Berlin, Herr Pleiger being head of the allotting committee. The Italian organization collecting coal bids for presentation to the Germans was the Ministero dell'Economia (ex Ministero delle Corporazioni). The Minister had the duty of receiving demands from consumers of coal for the whole of the Italian industry. These demands were made at three-monthly intervals by the statal Unione Industriale, who were also concerned with distribution of the coal on arrival. The bids for the three-monthly quantities were collected by the Unione Industriale and passed through the German channels mentioned above. Certain industries received priority for hard Upper Silesian and Ruhr coals, these included foundries and metallurgical industries and cement plants. Coke came from Lower

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It was explained to me by Lt. Lange that Italian requirements of coal are never fully met and this for a number of reasons. For instance, the bids for January 1945 totalled 600,000 tons, which included coke, and coal of Italian domestic production. The deliver-

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ies of German coal totalled only 81,000 tons as against a demand of 350,000 tons. The figures below are self-complementary :

The status of coal when in transit from Germany to Italy was clearly defined. Frequently Allied bombings destroyed train-loads of coal and in such cases, the Army, the State Railways or other concerns holding high priorities, would intercept and divert coal on rail. It was not permitted, however, for any organization to divert Army or Railway coal, but coal for German civilian needs or for Italian industrial or civil needs could be cut off often was intercepted and diverted for other purposes. When coal entered Italy and was stockpiled for distribution, this was one of the German-controlled portions of the Railway Line Bremen/Vienna.

to their homes and families and a decision must immediately be reached as to whether the plants should continue to operate where they are, or whether the machinery and workpeople to be returned. Electric power is available in Bolzano in abundance; sufficient coal is on hand for three months' work. This coal consists of the following:

ORGANIZATION TODT

The information contained in this report was obtained on 18 May 45 from the following officers of the Organization:

- a. Regierungsrat Wagner, Head of the Todt organization in Bolzano.
- b. Herr Kehr, of the Finance Department of the Todt organization, who was previously employed by the Dredner bank at Frankfurt a/M.

The organization Todt, as is of course well known, concerns itself with the building of roads and fortifications and with any other construction work found necessary by the German armed forces. The headquarters of Wagner is 1 Einsatzgruppe, at Cortina, N.E. of Bolzano, and his organization covered the whole of Northern Italy, and part of Austria, from Landegg to Klagenfurt. Wagner is at present running an office in Bolzano at Runkelsteinerstr. 14. His telephone address is Standort OT Organization, Todt Regt. 40. The organization is divided into 19 groups, the chiefs of which are officers loaned by the Army.

The Todt organization recruited volunteer Italian labour and Wagner assured me that compulsion was never used in Italy.

The Todt organization let out contracts to Italian firms and in this respect, Wagner wished to know how he was to discharge his present obligations to them. He stated that the Todt organization at the moment owed between 400 and 500 millions of lire to Italian concerns. Normally the funds for payment were obtained in the case of contracts of a general nature from the German Embassy, and where work was done for any particular German Army group, from the Army paymaster. I left the headache of this payment question for the attention of Maj. Curtis, of Finance Sub-Commission and left word with Wagner that he should get in touch with Maj. Curtis upon his arrival.

Sir,

I beg to apply for a position as journalist or as bank-official under the Allied Military Government in Germany.

I was born on 17.10.09 at Frankfurt a. Main-Freungesheim, Homburgerlandstr. 164 as only child of the bank-official Georg Kehr and his wife. On 1.4.1927 I was engaged by the Darmstädter und Nationalbank at Frankfurt (I have visited two years Volksschule und ten years Oberrealschule with success) and became well versed in all branches of banking and economy. There I was employed until 31.3.1938, when I was transferred against my will to the Westwall as official (cashier) of the OT. I have knowledge of English, French, Italian and Spanish which I used in advising the foreign customers of the bank.

I never was member of the NSDAP and was much handicapped in my career for this reason. On the other hand I was a member of Pastor Niemöllers "Confessional Church" (at Frankfurt a.M. with Pastor Prof. K. Veidt and Pastor Schumacher from the "Inneren Mission) until it was prohibited by the government. Further I was member of the German Social-Democratic Party until it was dissolved. I contributed occasionally to the Frankfurter Zeitung and on account of my opinions I was informed by my relations in the NSDAP that I was on the "Black List" of the Party.

On 3.8.1940 I married Johanna Westenberger and have one son.

On the Westwall I was first employed as accountant at Kehl am Rhein; later I directed various financial branches and finally I work in the above mentioned Verbindungsstelle.

Owing to my knowledge of political and social conditions abroad I was never deceived by NSDAP propaganda. Before the war I travelled frequently to England, France, Italy, Belgium, Holland, etc. My Christian faith also forbid me for instance to take any part in anti-semitic activities. For this reason I was unable to publish any article after 1933 and since then I have kept a journal in which I attempt to give a frank description of German life in my opinion; it also contains many secret orders, speeches, newspaper articles etc. as documents of the real state of affairs in Nazi-Germany.

I wish now in accordance with the publications given by the Soldatensender-West (Atlantic-Sender) and Radio London to take

Veidt and Pastor Schumacher from the "Innere Mission") until it was prohibited by the government. Further I was member of the German Social-Democratic Party until it was dissolved. I contributed occasionally to the Frankfurter Zeitung and on account of my opinions I was informed by my relations in the NSDAP that I was on the "Black List" of the Party.

On 3.8.1940 I married Johanna Westenberger and have one son.

On the Westwall I was first employed as accountant at Kehl am Rhein; later I directed various financial branches and finally I work in the above mentioned Verbindungsstelle.

Owing to my knowledge of political and social conditions abroad I was never deceived by NSDAP propaganda. Before the war I travelled frequently to England, France, Italy, Belgium, Holland, etc. My Christian faith also forbid me for instance to take any part in anti-semitic activities. For this reason I was unable to publish any article after 1933 and since then I have kept a journal in which I attempt to give a frank description of German life in my opinion; it also contains many secret orders, speeches, newspaper articles etc. as documents of the real state of affairs in Nazi-Germany.

I wish now in accordance with the publications given by the Soldatensender-West (Atlantik-Sender) and Radio London to take part in the reconstruction of the new Germany and the absolute removal of Nazism, which has brought my country and myself so much misery.

I am prepared to show at any time evidence of my work as well as the original copy of the above mentioned journal and various other documents.

It will be automatically reimposed on all individuals and units to be shipped direct from this theater to the Pacific-Far East area when such individuals and units are alerted for movement to a port of embarkation. Base censorship will continue in force."

"of the war against Japan and the military occupation of Germany and Austria".

3. Paragraph 5, Section II, is rescinded and the following substituted therefor:

"5. Locations, identities, and movements of all individuals and units may be stated in letters, except when individuals or units to be shipped direct from this theater to the Pacific-Far East area are alerted for movement to a port of embarkation."

II - OFFENSES, CONFINEMENT AND COURTS-MARTIAL

Paragraph 4, Section I, Circular Number 9, this headquarters, 1945, is rescinded and the following substituted therefor:

"4. Discontinuance of Allotments and Family Allowances (Class "F" Deduction) - At the expiration of 15 days absence request for discontinuance of allotments will be made in accordance with paragraph 22a (7) and 24b, AR 35-5520, 30 September 1944, with the exception of Family Allowances for enlisted men. In the case of Family Allowances, notification will be submitted to the Office of Dependency Benefits, immediately after the 15th day of absence (paragraphs 11d, e, 15f, and 36, AR 35-5540, 5 January 1944, as changed by Change 5, AR 35-5540, 7 April 1945)."

III - COUNTERMORTAR MEASURES

Training Memorandum Number 8, Headquarters MTOUSA, dated 22 October 1944, subject: "Countermortar Measures", is hereby rescinded. Current instructions regarding countermortar measures are contained in War Department Training Circular Number 7, dated 21 February 1945, subject, "Countermortar Organization and Technique", now in the process of distribution. 6554

IV - IMPORTATION AND SALE OF COMMODITIES

Section II, Circular Number 55, this headquarters, 1944, is rescinded and the following substituted therefor:

2. The term "importation" as used herein includes, but is not limited to, bringing, carrying, mailing, or otherwise transporting in any manner, or causing to be brought, carried, mailed or otherwise transported in any manner.

V -- GRATUITOUS ISSUES

Section I, Circular Number 91, this headquarters, 1944, is rescinded and the following substituted therefor:

1. Gratuitous issues of items listed in paragraph 4d (2), AR 30-2210, as amended, will be made only during periods when it is impracticable to provide Army Exchange sales facilities for those items. This policy applies to combat and non-combat conditions.

2. Gratuitous issues and sales of the items referred to above will not be made in the same area. Gratuitous issues will be discontinued in an area as early as it is possible for exchange facilities to provide those items for sale. In areas where gratuitous issues are being made, sales of items not included in the gratuitous issue list may be made if items are available.

3. Items gratuitously issued will be requested with ration requisitions in daily telegrams. Requests will indicate strengths authorized to receive the issue and will call only for those components that may be required, taking into consideration supplies on hand. Each request will constitute a certificate that no sales facilities for these items are available in the area or that troops requisitioning these supplies have no access to sales facilities.

4. Tactical and base section commanders will be responsible for enforcement of these instructions within their respective commands.

5. The instructions above apply to issues to United States troops only.

SUBJECT : Movement of Civilian Freight by Rail

The re-construction and re-opening of various Railway lines is resulting in not only increased hauls but in considerably increased loadings. This, coupled with delays in loading and unloading of many consignments, is causing a critical wagon position.

The cessation of hostilities does not mean that there will be a prime facie reduction in military demands for Rail Movement; very considerable capacity is already required for redeployment of Allied Forces and stores. Movement of freed P.O.W. etc. This is likely to increase. In addition the quantity of rolling stock so far found in the North is not commensurate with the area liberated; therefore, the available supply of rolling stock will have to cover a relatively larger area.

It is emphasized that every instance of excessive wagon detention, waiting loading or unloading, means one less wagon in circulation. This not only hinders the overall redeployment plan, but results in there being fewer wagons available for the movement of essential civilian supplies.

Addressees are requested to take following action :-

- a - Ensure that all bids for rail movement, so far as it lies within their authority, are carefully screened and **ascertain** that movement is really necessary.
- b - Impress on all concerned the need for constant attention and supervision of the arrangements for loading and unloading Railway wagons, in order to reduce to a minimum the time occupied in these operations.
- c - Impress on all concerned the vital necessity of ensuring that capacity allocated is always utilised. At the same time care must be taken to ensure that wagons are not overloaded, as over-

- c - Impress on all concerned the vital necessity of ensuring that capacity allocated is always utilised. At the same time care must always be taken to see that wagons are not overloaded, as over-loading only results in damage and delay.

5. Valuable transportation is frequently wasted because consignors are not ready or willing to load when wagons are made available. Such wastage can never be recovered. All consignors must be prepared to load at the time and on the day that wagons are available. Constant liaison with Station Masters at despatching point is essential.

1. The Mediterranean Shipping Authorities have agreed to establish a certain number of liner sailings for the carriage of civil cargoes coastwise as well as between the Islands and the Mainland of Italy.

2. Attached is a copy of a schedule showing the names of vessels allocated to these sailings together with ports and estimated dates of readiness of these vessels. This schedule is purely provisional and after trial voyages have been completed itineraries or voyage durations may prove to require adjustment. It is emphasised that information relative to the sailing dates or movement of vessels within the Mediterranean is still "secret", and information contained within this schedule is solely for your information and must not therefore be revealed to unauthorized persons.

3. All vessels allocated to these Coastwise Liner Sallings will be operated under the control of the "Comitato Gestione Navv" (Co-Ge-Nav), but remain subject to the overall supervision of the Mediterranean Shipping Authorities in a manner similar to that under which "LIGNA" and "LIGNO" are operating at present.

4. Cargoes for shipment on these services will continue to be bid for in the normal way based on current shipping instructions.

5. Shipping agencies nominated by Co-Ge-Nav to control these vessels are being permitted to accept cargo for shipment if specific permits, only after all cargo against bids nominated by this Commission have been loaded.

For your information, we transcribe the following cable received from the Ancona Prefecture, dated 16 April 1945:

" Yesterday at about 21.15 hours, at Giulianova Beach, an Allied aeroplane dropped two or three sumps against the Port, causing slight damages to several civil boats .

The alarmed population fled immediately towards the country, while the aeroplane continued to fly over the zone for roughly 1 hour dropping rockets with a parachute.

Neither victims nor wounded are complained.

From investigations made it appears that the aeroplane under discussion was looking after an enemy submarine sighted in the vicinity of the Port. Another submarine, sighted in the vicinity of the Ancona Port, would have been hit by another Allied aeroplane.

It is presumed that the two submarines approached the Adriatic coast in order to land men for the execution of sabotage activity."

""In the morning of the 2nd instant the British merchant ship Neuralia coming from Splett (Yugoslavia) bound for Taranto with a crew of 271 men when arriving in the vicinity of Torre Cesarea run against a mine and sank. A lifeboat brought 87 men to Torre Cesarea, while ships of the Italian Navy saved further 82 men, of whom 32 have been brought to the civil Hospital of Gallipoli as some had been wounded and some were suffering from congelation.

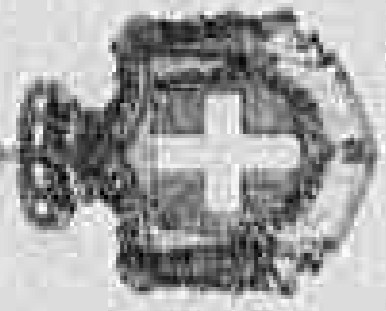

Subject : Baghiera (Palermo) - Fire in an ammunition depot.

I transcribe the following cable n. 3291/1 received from the Baghiera (Palermo) CC.RR. Section:

" " " At Baghiera (Palermo) on the 4th May 1945 at 13,45 hours in the vicinity of Villa Parisi at the collection store of artillery munitions, stored following recovery, while the military squad and civilians were working for the removal of projectiles, for unknown reasons, fire broke out, which caused the explosion of several ammunition piles. 2 soldiers and 1 civilian were slightly injured. The fire was quenched at 16,30 hours of the same day. Sabotage excluded." "



2. Records of this office show that GARAVELLI EMMA holds U.S. Passport No. 431/E 217089, issued at FLORENCE and valid until 29 March 41. Subject was therefore treated by FS with the consideration due to an Allied National.
3. Subject was expelled by this Section from this area because "she was considered to be an undesirable element in Eighth Army Area in view of her past connection with Republican leaders", (Security Instruction 78 Para II Serial 6, dated 6 Nov 44. referre)
4. Major KITCHEN HARRIS, C.A.C. (and not Town Major) of Cesena came to this office on 15 Jan 45, and when the nature of the case was explained to him, agreed that it fell entirely within the Province of Field Security. He added that he had not intended his letter to SA GARAVELLI to be used to prevent normal security measures being carried out.
5. SA GARAVELLI was given ample warning to evacuate all her personal effects, and the fact that she was able to remove all her furniture from her house in Cesena tends to disprove her allegation that she had only 24 hours notice to move. She was, in fact, warned three times over a period of three weeks.
6. SA GARAVELLI was given the opportunity to evacuate herself from Eighth Army Area at her leisure. She refused to do this, and was therefore evacuated through normal Refugee channels.
7. The Evacuation Camps at CSESINA and PIMINI are an AMC responsibility and it is not known what special arrangements are made to accommodate SA GARAVELLI.
8. No responsibility can be accepted by FS for any article which she may have lost when in Evacuation Camps or in transit under AMC administration.
9. The security reasons for which SA GARAVELLI was expelled are still valid, and any request for permission to reenter Eighth Army Area should be addressed to OSI (b) Main HQ Eighth Army.

Monsignor Giuseppe Nogara, Archbishop of Udine, underdate
of May 4 reports as follows:

"I have just learned that His Excellency Monsignor Carlo Margotti, Archbishop of Gorizia, was arrested some days ago and that there are grounds for fearing that he will be executed by the Communist Partisans at Gorizia, who have for some time been acting as masters there and who are temporarily in command of that city. I am doing all I can with the Allied Command. At the same time I am informed that religious persecution against the Catholic Church and Clergy always on the part of the Communists is becoming more acute there. The enlistment of men of the classes from 1896 to 1927 included has already started and no exceptions are being made, which means that priests and seminarists will also be included. I am bringing these matters to the urgent attention of the Holy See, feeling confident that everything possible will be done to prevent this new accumulation of misfortune."

The foregoing most painful news have profoundly alarmed the Holy See which is therefore making this urgent appeal to His Excellency Myron C. Taylor, Personal Representative of the President of the United States of America near His Holiness, in order that the Allies may urgently intervene with all the weight of their authority to save the life of the Archbishop of Gorizia, Monsignor Carlo Margotti, and to prevent the misfortunes which are threatening the Church and the faithful in those territories.

SUBJECT: Counter Intelligence Corps

TO: All Concerned

1. ~~MEMO~~ letters, both file AG 359.09/530 8-0, subject as above, dated 24 February 1944 and 25 April 1944, have been rescinded and the following substituted therefor.

2. The following instructions pertaining to the organization and function of Counter Intelligence Corps detachments, this theater, are based upon policies set forth in War Department letter, file AG 322 CIC (31 Oct 44) 0800-5-3, dated 13 November 1944, subject as above, together with experiences gained in overseas counter intelligence corps operations.

3. ORGANIZATION

a. CIC personnel within the jurisdiction of this headquarters are assigned to CIC detachments, organized in accordance with T/O and AG 30-500 and are under the operational control of the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, this headquarters. Detachments are assigned to Headquarters MTOUSA, and attached to tactical units, base sections and other commands as required.

b. The procurement, transfer and promotion of personnel in CIC, subject to theater policy and the limitations set forth in this letter, will be handled by the Office of the Chief, CIC, this headquarters (128th CIC Detachment) which functions as the administrative headquarters for all CIC Detachments in this theater.

c. CIC detachment commanders may place their personnel on temporary duty with other detachments for limited periods of time. The approval of the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2 or A-2, of the organization concerned, is necessary in each case. Personnel thus temporarily transferred will be returned to their permanent detachments immediately upon completion of their missions.

d. The employment of CIC detachments is a basic function of command and is an operational rather than a staff intelligence activity. Immediate directional authority of CIC activities consistent with the general policies established by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, this headquarters, is delegated to the commanding officers of the organizations to which CIC detachments are attached. The detailed planning and execution of CIC duties are the responsibilities of the detachment commanders.

e. In the case of a command served by more than one individual CIC detachment, the senior detachment commander will assume operational command and administrative supervision of all personnel of the detachments.

- f. (1) Recommendations for the promotions of CIC enlisted personnel will be made by detachment commanders to the commanders of the organizations to which the detachments are attached.
- (2) Recommendations for the commissioning of enlisted personnel will be made by detachment commanders to the commanders of the organizations to which the detachments are attached. All such recommendations must be approved by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, this headquarters, prior to the issuance of appointment orders.
- (3) Promotions of CIC officers will be initiated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, this headquarters.

4. MISSION

a. The mission of the CIC is to furnish appropriate commanders with personnel carefully selected and trained for investigative functions incident to the prevention or neutralization of the activities of enemy agents.

b. These trained specialists will be used only for counter intelligence purposes including activities connected with counter espionage, counter sabotage and counter subversion.

c. CIC personnel will not be used for combat intelligence missions, staff functions, traffic checks, routine PW interrogations, or for work which is properly a function of the Provost Marshal or Headquarters Commandant. Investigations of the black market and traffic in blue seal currency will not be undertaken by the CIC unless there is definite reason to believe counter intelligence implications exist.

5. OPERATIONS

a. All CIC detachments normally have the following duties and responsibilities:

- (1) Investigation of reports of enemy espionage, sabotage and subversive activity
- (2) Investigation of harmful rumors and suspected enemy propaganda
- (3) Investigation of disaffection and subversive causes and security violation within the armed forces
- (4) Arrest of known enemy agents and dangerous enemy sympathizers

- (5) Performance of security surveys of military headquarters and installations and recommendation of proper security measures. However, CIC personnel will not be used to accomplish the actual protection of such installations or the implementation of the recommendations made. The function of the Corps in this connection is advisory.
- (6) Maintenance of contact with Allied and local military and civil security officials.
- (7) Establishment of informant nets through all levels of society and endeavor.
- (8) Observation of civilian morals and relations between civilian and military personnel.
- (9) Observation of local political and economic conditions. In this connection, it is emphasized that while the CIC must be aware at all times of local political and economic conditions, it will confine its role to that of observer. Any personage in the civil and economic life of an occupied area will not be arrested by the CIC without the concurrence of local Allied Military Government or Allied Control Commission representatives, except in emergency cases requiring immediate action.
- (10) Delivery of security lectures to troop units

b. CIC detachments serving with commands whose jurisdiction includes security will undertake such investigative security duties and functions in respect thereto as are assigned them by the commanders of the responsible organizations. In this connection, care will be exercised that the responsibilities of existing United States or Allied security agencies do not overlap, and that the demarcation is clearly established.

c. CIC personnel serving with the Air Forces will normally confine their activities to the security of Air Force personnel and installations, and will not concern themselves directly with territorial security matters. An exception to this is when no other CIC detachment or Allied security agency has been delegated territorial security responsibility, in which event the Air Force detachment will assume its usual activities as deemed necessary. In areas where another CIC detachment or an Allied security agency exercises territorial control, close liaison will be maintained and counter intelligence information freely exchanged through direct channels of communication.

d. In addition to the duties and functions of all CIC detachments enumerated above, tactical detachments serving with field armies, corps and divisions will perform special tactical functions:

- (1) Tactical CIC detachments will:
 - (a) Search evacuated enemy headquarters and seize significant documents.
 - (b) Inspect public utilities, enemy supply dumps and all other installations requiring protection and arrange for an adequate guard.
 - (c) Seize the telephone exchanges and/or radio stations and arrange for their protection against sabotage until they are turned over to authorized signal or communications personnel as provided in operational orders. Personnel from the nearest Signal Corps unit should be called in to assist and to perform such rehabilitation as may be needed without delay. The records of such installations are of prime importance and should be secured, carefully guarded and turned over to the Signal Corps personnel.
 - (d) Stop all civil communications by mail, radio, telegraph and telephone except those of a local, emergency nature, such as calls for medical assistance. In halting civil communications, no damage should be done to any telephone, telegraph or radio equipment.
 - (e) Insure that all mail in civilian post boxes and drop boxes is impounded and returned as soon as practicable to field censor teams for examination.
 - (f) Transmit to the Provost Marshal or Military Police Commander all information coming within his purview, such as civilian controls, adequacy and extent of cooperation of civilian police, and the extent of disorder, looting and sabotage.
 - (g) Advise concerning the seizure of all civilian arms.
 - (h) Stop publication of newspapers and other periodicals.
 - (i) Take necessary measures to prevent looting and destruction of enemy documents and material by our own troops.
- (2) Commanding officers of tactical CIC detachments attached to higher echelons will coordinate the activities of detachments serving with lower echelons to the end that proper CIC coverage is maintained at all times throughout the area.
- (3) When establishing offices in towns and cities, tactical CIC detachments will clearly identify them by posting signs bearing the letters "CIC".

(4) Tactical detachments will take steps to inform all troops, especially the Military Police, of the existence, purpose and functions of the detachments to the end that full and immediate cooperation will be forthcoming from all when needed.

Specialized CIC detachments will be formed from time to time whose duties and functions will be enumerated by the commands with which they are serving.

8. GENERAL

a. Freedom of Action. It is essential to the effective accomplishment of the CIC mission that the personnel of the Corps be encouraged to exercise their initiative to the fullest extent and that they be permitted to operate with minimum restrictions upon their movements or channels of communication. In the accomplishment of their missions, CIC personnel will not be delayed by the observance of standard customs and prohibitions. The freedom of movement of this personnel when on assigned missions will not be hindered at any time of day or night by the Military Police or other military agency. CIC credentials and badges will be honored at all times.

b. Assistance to CIC. Members of the CIC are authorized to call on all military and civilian personnel within this command for any assistance they require in the performance of their assigned duties.

c. Civilian Clothes. CIC personnel are authorized to wear civilian clothes or the uniforms appropriate to their actual officer or enlisted status prescribed for civilians serving with the armed forces, upon written approval of the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, this Headquarters. At all other times the appropriate prescribed service uniform will be worn.

d. Protection of Identities. It is deemed essential that CIC personnel wearing civilian clothes or the civilian uniform be addressed and referred to as "Mister" or "Special Agent", as the case may be, and not by military title, except for necessary administrative purposes. CIC personnel, while wearing civilian clothes or the civilian uniform, will be extended the same facilities and afforded the same treatment as civilians of the appropriate assimilated officer or enlisted status who are serving with the armed forces. Unless unavoidable under combat conditions, such personnel, while wearing civilian clothes or the civilian uniform, will be billeted, messed, hospitalized, and will draw post exchange supplies under the same conditions prescribed for civilians of the corresponding assimilated officer or enlisted status.

e. Office Space. In order to facilitate the closest possible contact with informants, it is essential that CIC detachments have office space apart from the headquarters to which they are attached.

f. Coordination. Successful operations of the CIC frequently depend upon the rapid and concerted action of several detachments or elements thereof. Such teamwork can only be properly developed by close and constant liaison between the commanding officers of detachments and individual contacts, where feasible, between other personnel of such detachments. To accomplish this coordination, the Chief, CIC, this headquarters, will maintain close contact with the officers in charge of detachments of his command and will require those officers to maintain close liaison among themselves at all times.

g. Channels of Communication and Reports

- (1) CIC intelligence and operational reports will be forwarded through G-2 channels. Information copies of such reports will be forwarded directly to the Chief, CIC, this headquarters, as required.
- (2) CIC monthly Information Reports, as required by War Department Memorandum No. 330-44, will be prepared by each CIC detachment.
- (3) A consolidated CIC monthly Administrative Report, as required by War Department Memorandum No. 330-44, will be prepared by the Office of the Chief, CIC, this headquarters, and is not required from individual detachments.
- (4) Weekly strength reports will be submitted by each detachment to the Chief, CIC, this headquarters, as of 2400 hours on Saturday of each week. The weekly strength report will reflect all changes in assignment or attachment and all promotions or demotions. Copies of all promotion or appointment orders will accompany the weekly strength report.

h. Confidential Expenses. CIC detachment commanders will draw from the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2 or A-2, of the unit to which attached, funds necessary for the defrayment of confidential expenses. The following are examples of confidential expenditures, payable from G-2 funds: purchase of information; hire of informants; purchase of civilian clothes when necessary beyond the amounts provided for in paragraph 13, War Department letter, file AG 322 CIC (31 Oct 44) CG-3-3-4, subject as this letter, dated 13 November 1944; hire of automobiles; travel expenses on confidential missions; expenses of investigations; expenses incident to protection of identities of agents; etc.

i. Commutation of Rations and Quarters. In all cases where CIC enlisted personnel are on official duty of a nature that requires expenditures of personal funds for meals and/or billets, commutation of rations and/or quarters is authorized in accordance with provisions of Table II, AR 58-1520, dated 24 February 1945, as amended. Appropriate orders to accomplish this purpose will be issued by the commands to which CIC detachments are attached. This will not be construed

as authority for computation of rations and/or quarters where requisitioned billets or regularly organized messes are available, and which may be utilized without interference with the performance of official duties.

4. War Diet. CIC personnel may be placed on per diem status when necessary in the performance of assigned duties or to avoid compromising them. The determination of such necessity will be made by the commanding officer of the headquarters concerned.

5. Civilian Clothing Allowance. Payment of civilian clothing allowances to CIC enlisted personnel is provided for in paragraph 15, War Department letter, file AG 322 CIC (31 Oct 44) OB-4-3-4, dated 13 November 1944, subject as this letter.

6. The standard form of CIC reports will not be altered except on authority of the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, or the Chief, CIC, this headquarters.

7. EQUIPMENT AND SUPPLIES

a. Equipment and supplies for CIC detachments, other than investigative, will be requisitioned by them on authority of, and in accordance with, War Department T/O and S 30-500, CIC Detachments, dated 24 January 1944.

b. Requests from CIC detachments for investigative equipment and supplies coming within the terms of War Department letter, file AG 400 (27 Nov 43) OB-3-37DD-44, dated 29 November 1943, subject: "Special List of Investigative Equipment and Supplies for Counter Intelligence Corps", will be forwarded to the Chief, CIC, this headquarters.

c. The Chief, CIC, this headquarters, will be the issuing authority for CIC credentials and badges.

My dear Mr. Prime Minister:

The Minister for occupied Italy has approached the psychological warfare Branch and this Commission with a view to initiating a series of daily broadcasts addressed to Northern Italy. The matter has been referred to the Supreme Allied Commander, who has given his approval subject to the conditions which are set out hereunder:

(a) The subject of broadcasts will be confined to:

- (i) Activities of the Italian Government.
- (ii) Information from people in Liberated Italy to relatives in the North. This will be worded to avoid exposing relatives to reprisals.
- (iii) Appeals for unity among patriots.
- (iv) General appeals for action against the enemy.
- (v) Reviews of the Italian press.
- (vi) Criticisms of Fascist and German propaganda.
- (vii) News of patriots.
- (viii) Reviews of the events of the week.

(b) The script, which will be strictly adhered to in the broadcast, will be subject to the approval of the Military Censor, Psychological Warfare Branch and this Commission.

(c) If the psychological warfare Branch are unable to agree to a particular broadcast which your departments wish to make, the broadcast will be withheld and the point at issue will be referred to this Commission for the decision of the Supreme Allied Commander.

The Supreme Allied Commander further considers that the broadcasts to occupied Italy should not be confined to the Ministry for occupied Italy, but should be made by various Ministers representing the four parties in the Government. The Supreme Allied Commander also considers it desirable that Your Excellency, as Prime Minister, should personally open the series.

I shall be glad to hear that you are in agreement with these proposals and to be advised in good time of the date on which your Excellency proposes that the series should start in order that the necessary arrangements for the approval of the scripts may be organized.

4. Such correspondence will not bear the unit censor stamp and will be sent under official cover to Chief Base Censor, C.M.F. A slip of paper giving writer's military address should be enclosed inside the envelope containing the letters.
