SUBJECT : Colonel Benedetto de Giorgio.
TO : Ministry of Interior, the Chief of Police.

1. The above mentioned Italian Army officer has been reported missing since immediately after the liberation of Northern Italy.

When that area fell, he presented himself to the Allied Military Authorities for disposal and was told he could return to his home at Riva del Garda. After a few days a group of Partisans called at his home and took him away. No trace of him has been found since.

To the Admiral Stone - Chief Commander
of the Allies - Rome -

Dear Sir,

I here undersigned, Vincent de Giorgio, resident in Lunada Mariana,
five miles from Trezzano, beg respectfully of you to take notice
of the following most important facts:

I emigrated in Australia in the year 1890 and lived there all
the time being one of the very first in the musical profession.
I was naturalised. I resided in Sydney and during the previous
great war (1914-1918) I worked very hard for recruiting funds
for Red Cross, Soldiers Homes and other funds. Besides I
subscribed all my money to the "Loan for the Honor of the Flag" for
which thing they gave me a certificate. In the 1938 I came to
Italy to see my relations, and, because of my health, I was
compelled to stay more time than I expected, and when I was
ready to go back to Sydney the war unfortunately broke out
and there were no steamers to go. It would be useless to
relate here all the sad experiences I went through during the war
time. The scope of this letter is to relate you that a nephew of
mine Col. Benedetto de Giorgio (son of my dead brother) who was

 great war (1914-1918) I worked very hard for recruiting funds

 relate here all the sad experiences I went through during the war
 time. The scope of this letter is to relate you that a nephew of
 mine Col. Benedetto de Giorgio (son of my dead brother) who was
 in the military career and had distinguished himself in Libya,
 etc. in this last unfortunate war was compelled to follow the
 current but, because of his affection for me and his great
 sense of humanity, before starting for northern Italy, and

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just before the arrival of the Germans troops, secretly gave orders to let free about five thousand British prisoners who were in the concentration camp of Avezzano. I am the only person besides my nephew himself to know of this because we planned it together and we kept it a secret because of the many spies -

In northern Italy, about six months before the surrender, he resigned his position as an officer. When the Allied troops arrived he presented himself to the commanding officers (I suppose in Verona) who told him that he could go home at Quiva del Garda and stay with his family, but to be at their disposal. After some days a group of partisans went to his home and took him away with them. We have not heard of him since, and we have not been able to get to know in what concentration camp he is. His poor wife has been to Modena and other concentration camps in Northern Italy but has not been able to trace him. Therefore we entreat you to help us to find him and, for the good that he has done, have him released at once -
