SUBJECT : Control of Brenner Pass.

TO : AC of S, Gen., GI;
Travel Section, Public Safety, Allied Sub-Comm.

1. The attached report was sent in by Special Agent Lawton of the Brenner Sub-section and is forwarded for your information and action.

2. At present, DP convoys entering Italy (see 2 in attached report) are checked by US personnel on duty at the Brenner Pass. All convoys other than Italian repatriates which seek passage through Italy in transit to their respective homelands are referred either to GSI (b) & District, APHO, or Travel Section-Rome. It would be appreciated if clear cut instructions as to responsible parties handling repatriation in Austria and Germany be issued and distributed. It is also advisable that APHO be advised and approval sent to the Brenner control post before a DP convoy (other than Italian repatriates) is to cross the Brenner Pass in transit through Italy.

3. International passenger train service will be initiated on orders from AC of S.G.-Z. At present all train travel is either military or freight. If train travel is resumed additional US personnel must be sent to the Brenner control post.

4. At present frontier traffic is limited and the "Ladissoz Passer" agreement between ACO, Bolzano, and the French authorities in Innsbruck to allow frontier crossing for commercial purposes beneficial to Bolzano Province has been suspended with the termination of ACO control in that area. 413

5. Repatriation of German POW's is proceeding satisfactorily. The trains are sealed, and responsible officers are in charge of the convoys.

6. The verbal agreement between General Anders regarding Polish nationals and Travel Section-Rome has been terminated since the 30 day period has expired. All Polish nationals must now have APHO.

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7. Special Agent Lewton is being re-deployed this week to the United States and arrangements have been instituted with OSI(b) to replace him with one or two FSS agents who will act as observers and continue to supervise travel over the Brenner Pass according to AFHQ instructions and directives. This arrangement was made on verbal instructions from Travel Section - Rome.

SUBJECT - Information requested for Control of Brenner Pass.

1 - INDIVIDUAL THROUGH TRAFFIC AS OF 1 JANUARY 1946

AFCI Directive of late November (providing generally for Passport and Visa control) was not applicable to Brenner Pass, Bolzano Province being under AIG control. Therefore, AFCI Directive of 15 October 1945 is still being followed, APP's being generally required for travel both ways.

As of 1 Jan. 1946, AIG in Bolzano Province ceased administrative functions. Pubblica Sicurezza have been sent instructions for Passport and Visa control at Brenner to be instituted when further orders are received. A request (hereinafter mentioned) for messenger train service has been made.

Please advise what, if any, changes are to be made in regulation.

2 - DP CONVYS RETURNING ITALY

Per recent verbal instructions, only Italian Repatriates are accounted in convoy-pass lists and are checked by Pubblica Sicurezza, except by special permission to be obtained by telephone. This procedure is impractical because (1) non-Italian convoys frequently originate far from the Brenner where advance notice requirement is unknown, and there are no facilities in Innsbruck for care of personnel while waiting for permission (2) advance notice requirement is not always observed, resulting in rejection of convoy and much suffering and administrative inconvenience.

There is a demand for passage of Jews (Polish and otherwise) thru Italy to Palestine, and, occasionally, for repatriation of Greeks, Yugoslavs etc. thru Italy.

WRSO at Brenner will handle DP's only in regularly constituted convoys, under responsible sponsorship. They will not handle Italians, stragglers, or persons who have been previously repatriated by them and desire to return. WRSO is vague as to who are "Responsible Sponsors", but, for example, USRA is; "Refugee Joint Liaison Committee Innsbruck" is not. WRSO is also vague as to guarding necessary convoys. In this Agent's opinion, they will not do so.

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Please advise if Jewish Refugees are currently being accepted in Palestine. May convoys acceptable to UNRRC be accepted and turned over to them under above conditions? If not, what arrangements, if any, may be made for handling non-Italian convoys?

3 - INTERNATIONAL PASSENGER TRAIN SERVICE

This Agent is advised by Austrian and Italian R.R. Officials that at an "International Conference" held in Verona in mid-November 1945 arrangements were made, which have now been completed in detail, for passenger trains across the Brenner. Permission has been requested of this Agent to permit inauguration of this service 7 Jan. 1946. Such permission has not been given pending further developments.

Under current regulations, traffic would be infinitesimal; for practical purposes, ATP holders only. However, such trains would bring a flood of would-be crossers to be turned back, thus placing additional strain on limited personnel at the Brenner. However, if Passport control is instituted, some justification would exist.

Please advise (1) of what importance was the "International Railroad Conference" at Verona? (2) should strains be allowed under present regulations? Please discourage. (3) should strains be allowed if and when Passport control is instituted? (4) If so, may responsibility of British Patrol be extended to cover the Railroad for Military personnel?

4 - LAISSEZ-PASSER TRAFFIC

With the closure of ADO Bolzano Province, the laissez-passer arrangement between it and Securite Militaire in Innsbruck is automatically terminated. French authorities have proved beyond doubt their unwillingness to abide by limitations laid down under the old arrangement, and this Agent would have little confidence in the responsibility of Italian authorities in this regard. If present UNRRC policy of restricting traffic to a minimum is to be followed, no such arrangement should, in the opinion of this Agent be made in the future, as it is in any event impossible for Brenner Control authorities to determine the importance of commercial ventures involved.

Please advise whether, if this Agent is approached for such a new arrangement (almost a certainty), it should be made. What degree of "discretion" should be employed?

5 - OWNED PW CONVOYS LEAVING ITALY

Recently, truck convoys by road, averaging perhaps 75 trucks, 200 PW's, and 15 American GI guards, under the control of one or two American Officers have been crossing en route to Bad Aibling, Germany.

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More recently, similar convoys of about 1000 PW's with the same number of Officers and guards in charge, have been crossing by train with the same destination. These PW's are all discharges, and most are anxious to get to Germany. Names and identity documents have been checked against lists, and with surprisingly satisfactory results.

The few PW's who could board the convoys would be apprehended at once in Germany, having no discharge papers. The few who do not want to go, and jump off would shortly wind up in Italian PW camps. Weather and personnel conditions make such checks arduous and time consuming, particularly when convoys arrive at night, as trains frequently do.

Permitting is requested to allow such convoys through without check, except to see that no non-PW's are included.

6 - POLISH PERSONNEL

The 20 day period mentioned in verbal instructions under which Polish Civilians could enter Italy on orders from General Anders, has expired. Recent memorandum clarified the status of Polish Military and Red Cross. However, Polish Military being under British control, and British Red Cross being permitted to travel on military orders, please advise whether Polish Red Cross can (like American and British) travel on military orders. Advantages could easily be taken of such a situation. Do Polish civilians now need APP's, or are General Anders' orders still good?

SUBJECT : Alleged Closing of French Frontier Zone.

TO : Chief Liaison Officer. LIGURIA.

1. "With reference to telegram 948 from A.C. Hq date 6 February 46, received in this Office on 10th February 46, in company with myself I visited the VENTIMIGLIA French-Italian Frontier Zone, on Friday the 2nd and found that the Frontier had NOT been closed and only normal Frontier restrictions were in force.
2. The press announcements to the effect that the Frontier had been closed were apparently due to an order from C.I.C. to the Italian - French Police Agencies on the Frontier to "tighten" the existing regulations.
3. This has been fully reported upon by C.I.C. to No. 2 District and A.F.H.Q.
4. The incidents which have been the subject of press comment and stated to have caused tension in various communes on the Frontier Zone, have been separately reported to you, and consist mainly of writings on walls perpetrated during the night. No demonstrations or political tension is evident.
