MEMORANDUM:

TO : Lord STANSGATE

While I appreciate the point of view of Mr. Butcher, I find it difficult to justify in my own mind any more in the direction suggested at the present time. Horses are undernourished; so are the people. Transportation is at a premium. If humane considerations dictate the destruction of horses, a heavier burden will fall upon the people.

In view of the generally sad state with respect to human beings, it seems to me incongruous formally to make representations to the Italian Government about animals, however much we feel for them. Unless directed by you to the contrary, I should like to let the matter rest with the acknowledgement already made to Mr. Butcher.

Dear Mr. Butcher,

General MacFarlane has forwarded to me your letter to him of the 9th March. I deplore as much as you do, the condition of animals in this country and their treatment.

The problem is not easy. First, Italian public opinion is quite indifferent; second, Italian law is by British standards quite inadequate, and last, we have not the staff to do all that we can wish even for the people many of whom are diseased, undernourished and insufficiently clad.

I fear that while we will do our best that that will be nothing like what we would wish.

I am however asking the appropriate Sub Commissions to see that the law, such as it is, is enforced.

Sir,

Since I have been in Italy, I have noticed, especially in the Naples district, where I was stationed for a short period, the terrible condition of the Italian horses. Generally they are in very poor condition, mostly suffering from malnutrition, and it quite common to see these horses worked acutely lame, covered in some form of skin disease, and with bad harness sores. The Italian drivers do use bits or snaffles apparently, but a kind of curb chain, at the back of the lower jaw, so when this is pulled and some have metal pieces for extra leverage, bad sores occur and injure the jaw. In spite of all this, most of the drivers still urge their lifeless beasts along by means of hips or sticks. The Italian Police do not seem to take any notice at all, and our own Military Authorities do not appear to have any power to intervene. I know how difficult all this is, as I am working myself on human and refugee problems, to give much time to the animal side in this country. I have heard both Officers and Men comment rather bitterly about the condition of these horses, and may I ask please, as one who has spent a lifetime with horses, if anything can be done to improve the conditions under which these horses are compelled to work.

PENAL CODE OF THE KINGDOM OF ITALY.

ARTICLE 727.

(III-treatment of Animals.)

Whoever uses cruelty to animals or, without necessity, subjects them to excessive labour or to torture, or employs them in work for which they are unsuitable owing to illness or age, shall be punished with a fine from 100 to 3,000 lire.

Any person, who, even though solely for scientific or education purposes, in a public place or a place open or exposed to the public, subjects living animals to experiments of such a nature as to arouse disgust, shall be liable to the same punishment.

The penalty, shall be increased if the animals are employed in games or public shows entailing torture or cruelty.

In the case contemplated in the first paragraph of the present Article, if the guilty person is a driver of animals, conviction shall entail suspension from the exercise of his calling, when the person is a habitual or professional contravener.
