2. A comparison with the original letter submitted (A) will show that the approach to the subject has been little changed, but your detailed criticisms have been met with the exception of paras 3 (a) and (b) of your minute.

3. Minute 13, signed by Director of P.S. S/C, is a lengthy history of the delays etc. which have occurred in the submission of this letter, but strangely, the second and third pages of this minute develop the thoughts and lines of argument which, in my opinion, should have appeared in the letter. However, so much time has been lost that you may consider submitting the present letter to Chief Commissioner to save further delay.

4. The last paragraph of above-mentioned minute suggests a meeting between Chief of Staff, VP Civil Affairs Section and the Sub-Commission, and this is supported by minute 14 from VP Civil Affairs Sec. The purpose of this meeting appears to be to discuss still further the form in which this letter will be submitted.

MEMORANDUM No. 12.

V.E. C.A. Sec.

In view of the consideration which this subject has received not only by this Sub-Commission but also by the Chief of Staff and the Vice President, I think that a review of the situation is now necessary.

The letter from the Inter-Service and Political Secretariat of the 7th December last, requested a report from the Chief Commissioner, the terms of reference being: "the feasibility of increasing the strength and improving the conditions of service of the Carabinieri". This request followed a political discussion on the current situation and had particular reference to apprehensions which had been expressed as to the state of security in Rome. The only ambiguity possible in interpreting this request was whether by "strengthening of Carabinieri" was meant an increase in the authorized establishment or provision of a recruiting program which would bring the Carabinieri to their full strength. The latter, of course, gives us an opportunity to mention either and also to express any views which we may have on improving the conditions of service of the Carabinieri which would then be considered on the highest level.

With these facts in mind a draft was prepared by this Sub-Commission, dated 16th December. By Minute No. 1, the Civil Affairs Section suggested the inclusion of a reference to the Italian troops who were augmenting the Carabinieri and at the same time referred to the draft itself as "excellent". The modification suggested was incorporated, it was re-submitted and approved by the Civil Affairs Officer, C.A. Section, for submission to the Chief of Staff. By Minute No. 7, the Chief of Staff detailed various criticisms (his paragraph 3) and asked for a "really good draft" to be submitted, so as to avail ourselves of the opportunity to improve the lot of the Carabinieri. The Chief of Staff states: "we know that neither in strength nor in quality are the Carabinieri up to standard. We know that much could be done by the Allied authorities and by the Italian Government to improve matters".

The letter from the Inter-Service and Political Secretariat of the 7th December last, requested a report from the Chief Commissioner, the terms of reference being: "the feasibility of increasing the strength and improving the conditions of service of the Carabinieri". This request followed a political discussion on the current situation and had particular reference to apprehensions which had been expressed as to the state of security in Rome. The only ambiguity possible in interpreting this request was whether by "strength of Carabinieri" was meant an increase in the authorized establishment or provision of a recruiting programme which would bring the Carabinieri to their full strength. The letter, of course, gives us an opportunity to mention either and also to express any views which we may have on improving the conditions of service of the Carabinieri which would then be considered on the highest level.

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This file was returned to this Sub-Commission by the Civil Affairs Section and in the light of the criticisms of the Chief of Staff the draft letter was amended and subsequently re-submitted to the Civil Affairs Section. The note above the signature of Lt. Col. Wilcox indicates the difficulty of this Sub-Commission in appreciating the direction of the Chief of Staff.

By Minute No. 12 of the 7th January, the draft was again returned, on this occasion by the V.M. C.A. Sec., with a similar comment to that of the Chief of Staff, that this is an excellent opportunity to make out a case for the Carabinieri.

The views of this Sub-Commission are expressed in the draft letter which has been submitted. It is true, of course, that the Carabinieri are suffering in respect of efficiency, morale and equipment from conditions all of which are in need of substantial improvement. Nevertheless, when one looks back over the last 12 months, one sees that a great deal has already been accomplished. Their pay has been increased, their rations have been stabilized on a military scale and clothing and boots are forthcoming so far as existing supplies and transport facilities will permit. There is still much to be done but in the considered judgment of this Sub-Commission results can now be achieved only by effecting a proper long term policy and by a programme of progressive reforms improving the standard not only of the Carabinieri but of all Italian Police Services. This it must be clearly understood must be the responsibility of the Italian Government and it is a matter mainly for them to design the future police service for Italy; although a great deal of advice and suggestion will be available from this Commission, nevertheless, it is for the Italians to use their own judgment as to the architecture of this new plan which will have to suit the Italian background and temperament and need not necessarily follow Anglo-American practice.

This recommendation has already been put before the Prime Minister in a letter from the Chief Commissioner, and a reply has been forthcoming indicating that this matter is already receiving serious consideration and that it is the intention of H.E. Signor Bonomi to appoint a special Commission to examine this matter and to report fully to him. The Prime Minister has also indicated that when this machinery is set up he will be glad to avail himself of the technical advice and help which this Sub-Commission has offered. It is my intention to see that this goodwill on the part of the Italian Government is not allowed to evaporate, and that material will be prepared to serve as a basis for discussion should their own ideas be at all vague.

It must be remembered that although, of course, it is essential to have a contented and properly cared for Police Service, it is equally important that they should not be treated as a preferential class or be given advantages which are beyond those of the average citizen. This Sub-Commission feels that substantially the Carabinieri have those conditions of service which are as high as the Carabinieri have a right to expect because, if this standard is to be increased then not only must one consider the improvement of the conditions of all other Police Agencies, but also of the Italian Army of which the Carabinieri are a part. Indeed, to avoid just resentment this improvement of circumstances would have to go a lot further and include civil servants and so on indefinitely. If, without regard to the claims of others, the Carabinieri

are to receive undue consideration. This will not only in itself be unjust to their fellow Italians, but will eventually react to their own disadvantage by putting them in a class apart from the Italian people and their unpopularity and isolation will be as certain as it will be swift.

Let us not forget the fact that the real reason why the Carabinieri are in need is because they are part of the Italian nation, which itself, for causes which are only too well known, is in a perilous economic, political and social position.

The matter of paramount importance at the present time is the necessity for the increase in the authorized establishment of the Carabinieri strength from 55,000 to 65,000. This matter is already referred to in the draft letter which is under consideration.

This Sub-Commission, therefore, considers that, on technical grounds which affect the efficiency of the police, it would be wrong to make an application by means of this letter which would be substantially different from the one which has been submitted. We are quite aware, however, that conclusions of technical experience need frequently to be re-directed by over-riding or political factors which embrace wider considerations. If this is so in the present case, then we do need more specific instructions than those we have received and a much fuller and clearer direction than that to "re-submit a good draft".

In the meantime the letter of the Inter-Service and Political Section of the 7th December, remains unanswered. It may be considered advisable for a meeting to be arranged between the Chief of Staff, the U.I. C.A. Section and representatives of this Sub-Commission to discuss this matter.

I am not sure what line you would like to take in this matter.

As regards the detailed criticism:

a) The specific question raised by the political committee was the strength of police in ROME. Paragraph 3 is the answer. The strength of Carabinieri all over Italy was dealt with in paragraphs 9 and 10.

b) Carabinieri clothing comes out of Italian Army stocks. The Minister of War has placed at the disposal of the Carabinieri sufficient clothing to equip all Carabinieri up to a ceiling of 55,000. That clothing is now being distributed.

I am at a loss to know what more can be done by the proper Authorities, apart from supplying the Carabinieri with more transport, tyres, petrol etc., to leten it and distribute it.

c) It is true that there has been occasion to complain of two articles, one published on the 1st November, in the "Avanti" and the other on the 2nd November in the "Unità". These could be mentioned in our paragraph 7.

Nevertheless, it is not an unfair generalisation (and we are dealing with the Italian Press as a whole) that a much more moderate tone has been observed recently.

d) When this Sub-Commission first objected to the ceiling of the Carabinieri being fixed at 55,000 some nine months ago, we stated that the figure should be at least 65,000, or "70,000 if circumstances warranted". We have not departed from that view, though in correspondence with AFHQ the latter figure has been omitted.

e) Sub-Paragraph b. As a very rough estimate, 3,500 men by the 1st March, 1945.

Sub-Paragraph d. The Piceno Group is included in the Carabinieri ceiling.

Sub-Paragraph e. We have estimated the strength of the Carabinieri we expect to re-enlist north of the Pisa-Minini line on the basis of a demand on the rate of Allied advance.

a) The specific question raised by the political committee was the strength of police in ROME. Paragraph 2 is the answer. The strength of Carabinieri all over Italy was dealt with in paragraphs 9 and 10.

b) Carabinieri clothing comes out of Italian Army stocks. The Minister of War has placed at the disposal of the Carabinieri sufficient clothing to equip all Carabinieri up to a ceiling of 55,000. That clothing is now being distributed.

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e) Sub-Paragraph b. As a very rough estimate, 3,500 men by the 1st March, 1945.

Sub-Paragraph d. The Ticino Group is included in the Carabinieri ceiling.

Sub-Paragraph e. We have estimated the strength of the Carabinieri we expect to re-enlist north of the Pisa-Rimini line at 10,000 men. This is dependent on the rate of Allied advance.

I am not sure that we should welcome the political committee dealing in the reform of the Carabinieri. Any worth while reform of the Carabinieri must involve the whole organization of the Italian Police system. We have already approached the Italian Government as to the ultimate responsibility must be theirs.

TO : JCS, CA Section.

1. The AFHQ letter gave us a first rate opportunity of submitting the case of the CC.RR for consideration at the highest level. We know that neither in strength nor in quality are the CC.RR up to standard: we know that much could be done by the Allied authorities and by the Italian Government to improve matters.

2. But the draft submitted fails to seize that opportunity to make a case for assisting and improving the conditions of the Carabinieri. Rather does it appear to say that all is as well as can be.

3. My detailed criticisms are:

(a) Para 2 refers to ROME only - although the original subject referred to CC.RR in ROME we are directed to write about CC.RR all over Italy.

(b) Para 5 dismisses out of hand the great problem of clothing the Carabinieri. Reports from all over the country say how bad is the morale of the police force on this score.

(c) Para 7 concludes by saying that since 30 Oct a more moderate tone has been observed in the press, yet on 25 Nov (Folio 31, File 3606/COS) the Chief Commissioner found it necessary to write letter (on PS File) threatening repressive measures against newspapers.

(d) Para 9. The case for increasing the ceiling of the Carabinieri was put up in Public Safety letter dated 28 Nov (Folio 37, File 3606/COS). In this the ceiling figure demanded is 65,000: I consider it is only confusing the issue to talk now of 70,000.

(e) Para 10. sub-para (b) gives a figure of 3,500 - over what period?
sub-para (d) - I do not think this should be mentioned.
sub-para (e) - we have estimates of the strengths we shall find in the North.
sub-para (f) - the numbers of PW for repatriation have been estimated by PS.

4. Let us make another attempt to send a full, accurate and convincing statement and record our recommendations as to the reform of the CC.RR, their conditions, the approach to them of public and government.

5. Please resubmit a really good draft.

1. Reference is made to your letter 3D/28 dated 5 Jan. 1945 addressed to the Ministry of War.
2. It is noted that the Ministry of War has been authorised to employ 1865 CC.RR. on Military Duty as shown in Part 7 of the Army bi-monthly strength return dated 9th Dec. 1944.
3. It is pointed out that in the Army strength return dated 24th Dec. 1944, the figure has been increased to 2578, apparently without authority.
4. Further the Commanding General of the Carabinieri is not in agreement with the Ministry of War figures. As far as he is concerned the number of CC.RR. employed on Military duties is 1750. Attached is a list of the numbers of men employed surplus to the authorised limit of 1865.
5. It would therefore appear that if 1865 men are unauthorised the Commanding General of the CC.RR. must be instructed to arrange for their immediate return to territorial police duties.
6. May it please be confirmed that any increase of mobilised CC.RR. beyond the limit of 1865 is unauthorised and that men so employed must be returned to their territorial police duties.

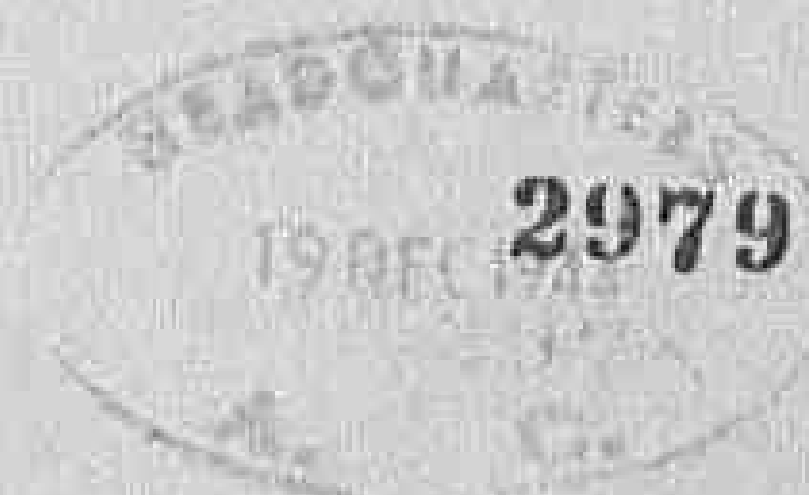

SUBJECT: Provision of Personnel for Italian Army Units

TO : All Concerned.

Ref. this HQ letter, file ref. 922.2 dated 20 November 1944.

1. The Italian Army is now practically all employed either by the Allies or in its own authorised administration. It would appear that the provision of reinforcements (replacements) for existing units and the forming of new units can only be carried out by:

- (a) Disbandment of non-essential units now in existence.
- (b) Formation of Base Rft. and Trg. Depots for the absorption of men enlisted from the civil population.

2. The Base Rft. and Trg. Depots are now being planned, but the intake of recruits must be postponed until early in 1945 when stocks of clothing and equipment are expected to become available. Recruits will require at least one month of basic training, while tradesmen will require not less than two months of specialist training in addition. It is thus apparent that the application of para. 1 (a) above is the only means of meeting vitally important calls upon the Italian Army for the next three months.

3. Priority for the provision and reinforcement of units will be allotted as follows; subject to subsequent review:-

- (a) Units required in direct support of operations
- (b) Units employed in Dock Clearance and Railway Construction.
- (c) Units employed on road construction and maintenance.
- (d) Other service units.
- (e) Guard Bns.

4. To provide for requirements under para 3 (a) above, there is an immediate demand for 2,000 men of good physique, fully equipped and well disciplined.

The above proposals are designed to cover a temporary dearth of manpower and will not affect the long term plan for the formation of new units when the reinforcement (replacement) Depots are established. SUBJECT : Carabinieri efficiency and strength.

TO : Allied Force Headquarters, Inter Service
and Political Secretariat.

1. Reference is made to your letter of the 7th December, 1944, asking for a report in regard to Conclusion 4 (b) of PC (44) 33rd Meeting.

2. It is considered that the strength of the various police forces in Rome (513 officers and 21,024 men) is adequate to deal with any contingency which can reasonably be foreseen.

3. Improvements in the pay and conditions of service of the Carabinieri have been constantly under review. Small increases in pay have been granted since Allied occupation, but they have been insignificant in comparison with the soaring cost of living. Any further increase in Carabinieri pay will inevitably raise the question of increasing the pay of the Italian Army (of which the Carabinieri are a part), of other police services and ultimately of all State and Municipal employees. In any case, money can do little to improve conditions of service in present circumstances; food and clothing are of paramount importance.

4. Carabinieri receive the Italian Army scale of rations, which is considerably higher than the normal civilian and even the heavy workers scale. With the present shortage of foodstuffs in Italy, it would be unfair to demand an increased ration scale for the Carabinieri, especially as this would give them preferential treatment to the Italian Army.

5. In the past, uniforms, boots, underclothing and blankets have been badly needed by the Carabinieri but these are now forthcoming through the Ministry of War, though the usual difficulties of distribution have to be overcome.

6. Lack of transport, which is common to all services in Italy, is a serious handicap to the police and at present no solution is in sight.

7. In order to counteract unwarranted criticism of the police in the Italian Press, which was tending to shake the public confidence in the police, Colonel Young, of the Public Safety Sub-Commission, addressed a gathering of newspapers editors in Rome on the 30th October, 1944. This matter has repeatedly been raised with G-5, AFHQ, but no authorisation has yet been given to increase the ceiling to 65,000, which is considered the minimum strength necessary to preserve public order in Italy. If the limit of 55,000 is maintained then when northern Italy is occupied large numbers of Carabinieri must be withdrawn from Rome thus endangering the security of the capital.

10. The latest returns of Carabinieri strength, dated 9th December, 1944, give the total figure as 54,836, but there is no doubt that the ceiling 55,000 has now been exceeded. Nevertheless, the measures already adopted for raising the strength of the Carabinieri have not been discontinued. These measures are :

(a) Normal voluntary recruiting from civilians (estimated at 300 monthly).

(b) Transfers of volunteers from the Italian Army (estimated at a total of 3,500 by 1st March, 1945).

(c) Allotment of 4% of the Italian Army call-up (originally estimated at a total of 1,000 by January, 1945, but now uncertain owing to the poor response to the call-up).

(d) Re-enlistment of disbanded Carabinieri from the north (estimated at 12,000 when the whole of northern Italy is occupied).

(e) Repatriation of Carabinieri prisoners of war in North and East Africa (estimated at 1,250 men). 2972

TO : MINISTRY OF WAR

1. The current regulations which govern leave for Italian Military Personnel are set out below:-

2. PRIVILEGE LEAVE.

(a) Where Italian Military Personnel are under Allied Command, leave will not be granted without the prior consent of the Allied Commander who will decide whether the Military situation permits the granting of leave.

(b) Leave may be granted for a period of 7 days, excluding travelling time, not more than once in six months.

3. COMPASSIONATE LEAVE.

Compassionate leave may be granted in deserving cases subject to approval by an officer of the Italian Army of rank of Colonel or above, for 14 days excl travelling time. Recipients of compassionate leave will on return be placed at the bottom of the roster for ordinary leave.

4. LEAVE QUOTA.

Not more than 5% of a unit may be away on privilege and compassionate leave at any one time. Personnel who fail to return from leave on the due date will continue to count against the 5% quota until they either return or are struck off the strength of the Italian Army after 30-days absence.

5. CONVALESCENT LEAVE.

(a) Convalescent leave will only be granted to Military Personnel who are already patients in a Territorial Military Hospital, and will be authorised by the Commanding Officer of the rank of Lt Col or above.

(b) The maximum period of Convalescent leave will be 14 days. All cases requiring longer periods will be referred to the Director General Services of the Territorial Command concerned.

(c) Convalescent leave plus time in Hospital may be authorised up to 60-days, after which the patient will be struck off the strength of the Italian Army.

(d) Personnel on Convalescent leave are considered as patients and

6. PERMITTED AREAS.

(b) Troops stationed fwd of Army Security Control Line.

(4) Anywhere in rear of Army Security Control Line.

The discretion of Army, District or Base Section will not be exercised in favour of any person who cannot give good reasons for spending leave in the area in question by reason of location of his home, family or business.

(c) Troops of the Italian Combat Groups.

Anywhere south of the Italian Leave Forward Limit Line. This line will be adjusted from time to time; the following is the present line:

LUCCA - PISTOIA - RIMINI. The towns defining the boundary are inclusive to the permitted leave area.

7. The Army Security Control Line referred to in para 6 above has been established for the specific purpose of restricting and controlling movement of personnel into fwd operational areas.

This line consists of a series of check posts, which are manned continuously to prevent access to fwd areas by persons not in possession of a pass.

(A) be responsible for obtaining sufficient blank AUG yellow movement passes from HQ A.G. 6.

(B) complete the permits in respect of all personnel within the Group proceeding on leave.

(C) forward the completed permits for signature and stamping as follows :-

(i) where Group is located North of Near Army Security Control Line, to the nearest AAG Officer.

(ii) where Group is located South of Near Army Security Control Line, to Army SCAG, or Provincial Commissioner of the Area in which the soldiers home is situated.

11. RESTRICTED ZONES.

Personnel granted leave to places within the area bounded on the NORTH by the Army Security line (as defined in para 7 above), and on the SOUTH by the northern boundaries of the Provinces of TERAMO - RIMINI and ANCONA, or to places in the province of BOLOGNA, must be in possession of A.C. passes, or in the case of troops of the Combat Groups, must receive authorisation from the BEU attached to the Group.

12. TRANSPORT.

Except as provided in paras 8 (b) and 9 above, no demand on Allied Military sea, rail or road facilities will be made for personnel going on leave. The movement of personnel going on leave will be carried out by the Italian Army. There is no objection to existing Allied military transport facilities being used for the purpose, providing such use is not to the exclusion of any Allied military personnel or stores, as decided by the appropriate Movements Officer.

Transport belonging to Combat Groups may be authorised for transport of Combat Group leave personnel, providing that the Allied Commander's concurrence is first obtained, and that such use is not to the exclusion of operational or administrative commitments.

13. RATIONS.

SUBJECT : Transfer of Italian Military to CC.RR.
TO : Regional Commissioner Sicily (Att: R.P.S.O.).

1. It has been agreed to transfer units of the Piceno Group. Italian Army to the CC.RR. These men will be dressed in CC.RR uniform and will perform duty with regular CC.RR. The usual patrol of two will consist of one CC.RR and one soldier in CC.RR uniform.
2. The Montegranaro Battalion has been allotted to Sicily and consists of 36 officers 736 men. They will arrive in Palermo on 23rd December 44. On arrival they will be dressed in Italian Army uniform. They will be inspected and requests for the necessary clothing will be forwarded to this Headquarters through the CC.RR. HQ. Arrangements will then be made for the supply of the clothing by Land Forces Sub-Commission (MFA) direct to the soldiers in Sicily.
3. The transfer of these soldiers is a temporary measure pending the increase in strength of the CC.RR by recruiting.
4. The object of the transfer of Italian military to the CC.RR is to release an equal number of trained CC.RR for the north. However, as far as Sicily is concerned, it is not proposed to interfere with the present CC.RR strength.

Reference is made to paragraphs 7 and 8 of your 10/14622/13
(undated) received here 13 December. The position is as follows:-

1. So far as Carabinieri ex East Africa are concerned, authority was obtained some time ago for approximately 1665 Carabinieri in East Africa to be shipped to Italy. Owing to shipping difficulties however only the first instalment of these have arrived. The number to have been included in that shipment was approximately 750 and the 500 to which you refer presumably formed part of the first instalment. A further 600 should arrive with you about 4 Jan and the balance at a later date dependent on shipping availability. When this balance arrive no more can be expected from East Africa (see G-5 Memo to you 014.12 of 15 Sep last).

2. No Carabinieri can be expected from Mideast.

3. So far as North Africa is concerned the numbers of Carabinieri there have been checked and are as follows:-

In U.S. care 247
In British care 135

All these have stated to be employed on essential duties but if any particular persons are known to be included in that number and are wanted specially for particular duties, efforts will be made to release them.

4. So far as ex-Carabinieri in Switzerland are concerned their position is being studied to ascertain whether it is possible to obtain them.

TO : AFHQ (G-5) ✓

1. Reference our letter of even number dated 9th November 1944 wherein it is asked that the provision of 5000 soldiers to assist the Carabinieri be approved for an indefinite period.
2. The present release date for the Ficeno Group of the Italian Army transferred to Carabinieri is 28 February 1945. It is considered that these soldiers should remain on Carabinieri duty at least until the ceiling reaches 55,000, and then be released gradually as the strength increases.
3. The exact number of soldiers concerned in the transfer to Carabinieri is 4,141. 786 of these men form the Montegrano Battalion which is composed of over age personnel scheduled for discharge when their homes in Northern Italy are liberated. In your letter C-5:091.711-1 (Italy) dated 9th November 1944 it was pointed out that these men were available for employment and assignment with CC.RR. Accordingly it is assumed that it will not be necessary to return the Montegrano Battalion to the Italian Army on 28th February 1944.
4. The actual number of soldiers thus left for return is 3,355. It had been hoped to replace this number by men recruited from the 4% of the Italian Army call up allotted to CC.RR. However, the recent failure of the "call up" in Sicily, where only 1,600 men reported instead of 8,000 as expected indicates that the necessary increase in strength from this source will not be forthcoming.
5. Accordingly it is desired to advise you that in due course, and prior to 28th February 1945, application will have to be made to you to permit the attachment of 3,355 soldiers to the Carabinieri for an indefinite period.

1. Reference is made to your letter of 7th December, 1944, asking for a report in regard to Conclusion 4 (b) of PC (14) 33rd Meeting.
2. It is considered that the strength of the various Police Forces in Rome (513 officers and 21,024 men) is adequate to deal with any contingencies which can reasonably be foreseen.
3. Improvements in the pay and conditions of service of the Carabinieri have been constantly under review. Small increases in pay have been granted since Allied occupation, but they have been insignificant in comparison with the soaring cost of living. Any further increase in Carabinieri pay will inevitably raise the question of increasing the pay of the Italian Army (of which the Carabinieri are a part), of other Police Services and ultimately of all State and Municipal employees. In any case, money can do little to improve conditions of service in present circumstances; food and clothing are of paramount importance.
4. The Carabinieri receive the Italian Army scale of rations, which is considerably higher than the normal civilian and even the Heavy Worker's scale. With the present shortage of foodstuffs in Italy, it would be unfair to demand an increased ration scale for the Carabinieri especially as this would give them preferential treatment to the Italian Army.
5. In the past, uniforms, boots, underclothing and blankets have been badly needed by the Carabinieri but these are now forthcoming, though the usual difficulties of distribution have to be overcome.
6. Lack of transport, which is common to all services in Italy, is a serious handicap to the Police and at present no solution is in sight.
7. In order to counteract unwarranted criticisms of the Police in the Italian Press, which was tending to shake public

confidence in the Police. Colonel Young of the Public Safety Sub-Commission addressed a gathering of newspaper editors in Rome on 30th October, 1944. Since then a much more moderate tone has been observed.

8. It can be said, therefore, that all practical measures for improving the conditions of service of the Police are being actively pursued.

9. Although as stated above the strength of Carabinieri at present in Rome is considered ample, this Commission has for some months past expressed the opinion that the ceiling of 55,000 Carabinieri to police the whole of Italy will be totally inadequate. This matter has repeatedly been raised with G-5, A.F.H.Q., but no authorisation has yet been given to increase the ceiling to 65,000 (or 70,000 if circumstances warrant). If the limit of 55,000 is maintained, then when northern Italy is occupied large numbers of Carabinieri must be withdrawn from Rome, thus endangering the security of the capital.

10. In the meanwhile, the strength of Carabinieri, which now totals 46,000, is being raised by every means in our power, including :

- (a) Normal voluntary recruiting from civilians (estimated at 300 monthly)
- (b) Transfers of volunteers from the Italian Army (estimated at a total of 3,500)
- (c) Allotment of 4 percent of the Italian Army call-up (estimated at a total of 1,000 by January, 1945)
- (d) Temporary transfer of the Piceno Group of the Italian Army (4,000 men).
- (e) Re-enlistment of disbanded Carabinieri from the north (dependent on the Allied advances)
- (f) Repatriation of Carabinieri Prisoners of War (number unknown)
- (g) Repatriation of Carabinieri from Switzerland (1,500 men).

1. The following summary has been taken to indicate the strength of Carabinieri. The present rolling approved is 55,000 and the actual strength on 1st December 1944 is 45,000.

- a) Recruiting.
- b) Withdrawal of volunteers from the Italian Army.
- c) Allotment of 4 per cent of the Italian Army roll-up.
- d) Temporary transfer of the P.O. group, Italian Army.
- e) Re-enlistment of disbanded G.S. from the north.
- f) Re-enlistment of G.S. prisoners of war.
- g) Re-enlistment of G.S. from Switzerland.

2. Breakdown.

condition of service are not attractive. Disservice in service, the men are liable for transfer to any part of the country, including forward operational areas where they are exposed to war service conditions. In fact, 22nd service in military service, as an such offers a limited appeal. The poor response of the Italian to the military call-up is well known. However, it may be noted in this connection that a high standard of physique and character is demanded, and any relaxation of this standard will result in deterioration of the morale of the service.

The improvement of G.C.R. morale is receiving the constant attention of this Commission, and every effort is made to increase their prestige in the eyes of the public. Allowances of clothing have been made from the Ministry of War and these are sufficient properly to clothe the whole Force. The men are already fed on the Italian Army scale and receive a special War bonus of 15 lire per day when working in forward areas.

At the present time 1500 recruits are under training in schools at Bari and Rome. They will complete their course in February 1945. The normal course is 5 months, but as a temporary measure this has been cut to 4 months.

3. Transfer of Volunteers from the Italian Army.

Arrangements have been made to transfer 2 per cent of the Italian Army to the G.C.R. These men will be volunteers and will be selected by G.C.R. Staff Officers visiting various units. The proposal has been agreed by the Ministry of War and Land Forces Sub-Commission (M.L.F.). The number of men involved is 1,500. The selection of these men is going forward at the present time and everything possible is being done by Land Forces Sub-Commission (M.L.F.) to expedite the transfer.

4. Allotment of 4 per cent of Italian Army Call-Up.

It has been agreed with Land Forces Sub-Commission (M.L.F.) that 4 per cent of the men adopted into the Italian Army, in each District will be enrolled as Carabinieri. It is planned that a representative officer of the G.C.R. will be present at each District and will have the option of selecting the most suitable men. Priority will be after the Combat Groups and Specialists, but before other categories of re-inforcements: this is provided the recruit volunteers for enlistment into the G.C.R. It is anticipated that 1000 recruits for G.C.R. will be obtained by this

achieved in the period December/January.

5. Temporary Transfer of Piacenza Group, Italian Army.

Arrangements have been completed for the temporary transfer of the Piacenza Group, Italian Army, to the G.C.M. The numbers are 181 officers and 4,141 men. The soldiers will be dressed in G.C.M. uniform and attached to various G.C.M. Legions. A.I.I. have agreed to the attachment of the Montegrone Battalion to the Ancona Legion. Most of the necessary movements have already taken place and the transfer should be completed by 15th December 1944.

The effect of these transfers will be to make an equivalent number of G.C.M. available for the north. It is not proposed to transfer the G.C.M. then made available until they are required by the liberation of territory in the north.

The release date of the Piacenza Group for return to military service is at present 15th February 1945, but it is hoped that this will be extended.

6. Re-enlistment of Discharged G.C.M.

Replacement Centres have been established in forward areas for screening and rehabilitating G.C.M. who report for duty in newly-liberated territory. During November a record number of men reported for duty and more than 1,500 G.C.M. were accepted.

7. Registration of Prisoners of War. 2952

Efforts are being made to repatriate G.C.M. Prisoners of War. Large numbers are believed to be in North and East Africa. Lieut-Col. Jackling, G.S. AFHQ, is heading this matter and the position has also been fully explained for War Materials Disposal and Prisoners of War Sub-Commission, Allied

Commission, who are co-operating.

During October 1944, 500 CC.RR returned to Italy from East Africa; and during November 1944, 150 arrived from Greece.

8. Repatriation of CC.RR from Switzerland.

1,500 CC.RR are interned in Switzerland. At the request of Public Safety Sub-Commission, Political Section have recommended to G.5 AFHQ. that these men be repatriated as soon as possible as their presence is urgently required to increase CC.RR strength in Italy.

9. It is confidently anticipated that within the next few months the CC.RR strength will exceed the present approved ceiling of 55,000. Therefore a decision should be taken now to increase the ceiling to 65,000 (or 70,000 if circumstances warrant), a measure repeatedly urged by this Commission.
