1. With effect 16 September 1946 applications in respect of all nationals desiring to travel to Germany will be handled by the American and British Embassies in Rome.
2. Applications for the United States zone of Germany will be dealt with by the Military Attache's office of the American Embassy, and for the British zone by the Travel section of the Visa Department of the British Embassy; applications for the French zone of Germany, as in the past are dealt with by the Commandement Militaire Francaise, (Securite Militaire) at Palazzo Guidoni, Rome. However, if a person desires to visit the United States and French, or the British and French zones, the American or British Embassy will make application for the French zone clearance at the same time as they refer the case for their respective zone clearance.
3. It is the policy of the occupying powers to restrict travel into and out of Germany to the minimum. The following categories of travel to Germany are specifically not permitted at the present time.
 - (a) Travel for private reasons, including travel to bring back the body or visit the grave of a relative killed in Germany.
(Visits by French nationals to graves in the French zone are now allowed by the French authorities).
 - (b) Travel to repossess or locate property looted by the Germans.
(Repatriation, Repatriation and Deliveries Section of the French, British and United States Control Commissions have been established to arrange for the restitution and location of property looted by the Germans. The work of these sections cannot be accomplished if individuals are allowed to enter Germany to locate and remove such property on their own account. All necessary descriptive detail should be forwarded by the Government concerned to the Reparations, Restitutions and Deliveries Section of the Control Commission Council of the zone concerned).
 - (c) Travel to Germany of businessmen, except those travelling under a scheme of sponsorship arranged by the Government of the occupying powers of the zone to which they are proceeding. (The policy to be adopted with regard to private trading is still under review, and, pending a decision, journeys of this nature cannot be approved).
4. All other applications, other than Allied Military personnel travelling on duty, should be forwarded to the respective Embassy for decision; and in the cases of approval the necessary Military entry permit will be issued.
5. The categories of travel for transiting Germany are of a far more lenient nature, though transit of Germany is only allowed for essential journeys and when petrol, oil, lubricants, transport, food or accommodation requirements are desired in Germany; in all cases the valid passport or visa for the country of destination is also required before an application can be considered.

However, if a person desires to visit the United States and French, or the British and French zones, the American or British Embassy will make application for the French zone clearance at the same time as they refer the case for their respective zone clearance.

3. It is the policy of the occupying powers to restrict travel into and out of Germany to the minimum. The following categories of travel to Germany are specifically not permitted at the present time.

6. Here again all applications complying with the above requirements should be forwarded to the respective Embassy for decision; and the issue of a Military entry permit for the approved cases.

7. The above is passed for information, and attention is drawn to the necessity of all applicants being in possession of passports validated for travel in Germany.

1. This Division's letter CHI. 389-506/10-J dated 12 July 1946 is cancelled with effect 16 September 1946 from which date the following procedure will be in force for travel between Italy and Austria.

2. Travel from Italy to Austria:

All persons desiring to go to or transit Austria, with the exception of the following two categories, should make application to the Austrian Political Representative, Viale Trullo Monti, 113, Rome, for an Austrian visa.

- (a) American, British, French and Russian nationals.
- (b) Any national sponsored by one of the four occupying powers to go into its own zone.

The Military Attache's Office at the American Embassy will handle applicants of (a) and (b) above, desiring to go to the U.S. Zone of Austria and the travel section of the Visa Department of the British Embassy will handle applicants of (a) and (b) above desiring to go to the British Zone of Austria; applications for the French Zone of Austria, as in the past are dealt with by the Commandant Militaire Francaise, (Securite Militaire) at Palazzo Guidoni, Rome. However if a person desires to visit the United States and French or the British and French Zones, the American or British Embassy will make application for the French Zone clearance at the same time as they refer the case for their respective zone clearance.

3. Travel from Austria to Italy.

All applicants other than American, British or Polish Service personnel, must make application to the Italian Consulate in Vienna, or to his representative in Washington, for an Italian entry visa. American, British and Polish service personnel are the only exceptions from Italian visas and may enter Italy on valid travel orders.

It is pointed out that before it is possible to leave Austria, an exit permit is required by all nationals except American, British, French or Russian; this is obtained by making application to the local Austrian Police Headquarters.

4. The above is passed for information and it is pointed out that the Public Safety Sub-Commission, Allied Commission, and C-2 (CI) A.P.C., will no longer be concerned with applications for visas or permits for travel between Italy and Austria.

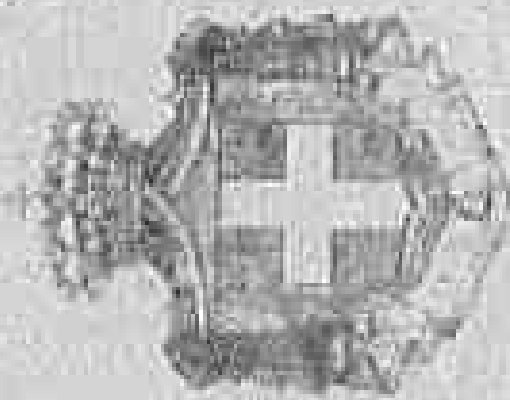

1. With effect 25 March 1946 the responsibility of the Italian frontier, airport, and airport custody was handed back to the Italian Government, at request of AFM, by this H. letter CEN. 589-506/40 dated 15 March 1946.

2. AFM reserved for themselves the right of exemption from the Italian visa requirements for American and British service and para-military personnel; the following is a list of units which AFM deemed were to be considered para-military personnel as far as this ruling was concerned.

Recently however the Supreme Allied Commander found it necessary that Polish Military personnel should be added to the above exemptions for a limited period only when entering Italy from the Middle East or Allied occupied territory; the Italian Government agreement to this was obtained on the condition that particulars of the Polish personnel, who were permitted entry, be supplied the Italian Government.

4. It is pointed out that French military personnel have required Italian entry visas since 25 March 1946 and up till now no disagreement to this procedure has been made. However, should it be considered necessary to make representation to have French military personnel added to this exemption, it will be necessary to obtain AFHQ concurrence and the agreement of the Italian Government.

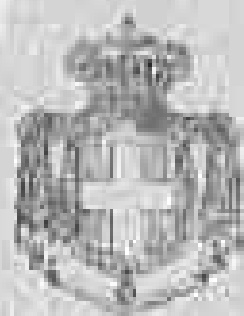

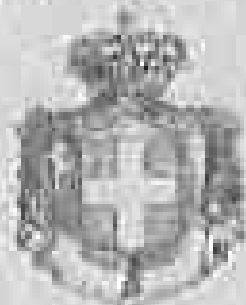

2. The control of the Italian frontiers, seaports and airports except that part which lies in U.S. XIII Corps territory, was given back your Government with effect 15 March 1946.

3. Therefore in the case of the frontiers and all air and seaports, not in XIII Corps territory, your Ministry is entitled to place your Pubblica Sicurezza agents wherever you deem it necessary to enforce your immigration regulations; and should they hampered by any Allied Military personnel in the performance of their duties, full reports should be submitted this Sub-Commission to prevent recurrence.

4. As regards that part of the Austrian frontier which falls within XIII Corps territory, your controls which are operating there should enforce the immigration controls exactly in accordance as per the instructions given all your other Pubblica Sicurezza agents.

SUBJECT: Central service at the Frontiers.

Reference is made to the a/m note.

We beg to point out that on the 15th March last, the Italian Government took over the control of the land borders, the Yugoslav frontier (Venetia Giulia) exception. As far as the Austrian frontier is concerned, owing to the particular local situation, the Italian Police service are still under the influence of the various Allied Commanders-in-Chief in Austria, and thus not always in the position to apply the Italian dispositions regarding the travels. This situation is however improving, both owing to the agreements taken and to the kind assistance given by your Commission.

The non Police services were also generally taken over by the Italian Administration; but here again, as we repeatedly pointed out, a complete liberty of action is not always possible owing to the interventions of the A.R. Organs, which some times do not suit the service exigencies.

Only in 4 airports (Bari, Capodichino, Foggia, L'Aquila and Ciampino), on request by your Commission, the Italian Police is co-operating in the frontier service. The results of such co-operation are more or less efficient, depending on the limitations on power prescribed by the various Allied Commands, which however do not always follow the same rules.

Consequently, our Ministry has not yet been in the position to fully acknowledge your note Nr. G.B.I. 309-506-40 dated 15th March last concerning the hand-over of the aforesaid services. Anyway, the following correspondence showed that, whenever the handover in question appeared to be complete, the Italian Government was but pleased to take the complete responsibility.

Moreover, we beg to point out that, owing to the re-organization achieved by our dependent police forces, we are to-day in the position, provided the full necessary liberty of action is granted to us, of assuring the regularity of the frontier traffic, in the land, sea and air branch - excepted the Yugoslav frontier, about which your Commission expressed its reserve.

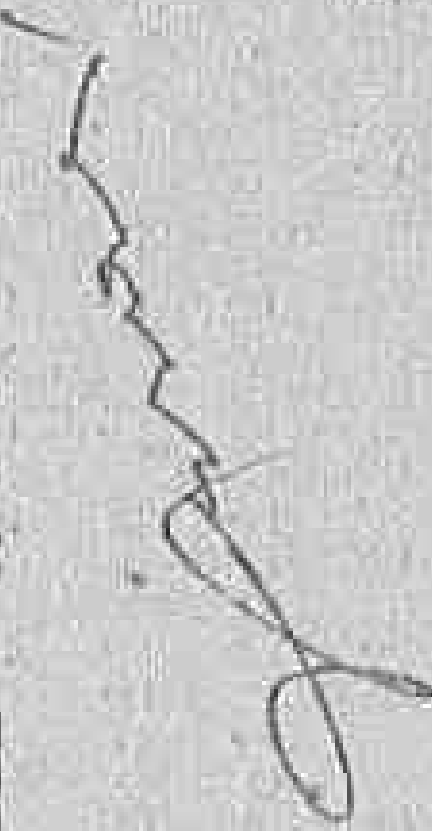

1. On 9/7/46 I saw subject at this office and asked him why he had given the explanation, when found without proper documents in Austria, that he was told by PSO Udine that, as he was dressed in battle dress, employed by a British Unit and in possession of a pass, he needed no other papers for entry into Austria. Dr. Brozek stated that, although in the first instance he had been told at this office that he would need an Allied Forces permit, he was later told by someone else in uniform that if he produced the documents in his possession to the RTO Udine he might be permitted to make the journey and was in fact allowed to do so.
2. Subject, a former captain in the Army of Czecho-Slovakia, is a good type and I believe his story, but have not been able to trace who gave him the latter advice and this may be due to changes of personnel on release.
3. I have now informed Dr. Brozek in no uncertain terms that in spite of the fact that he has been working for three years with Allied Units and appears to have been afforded privileges leading him to assume some Allied Military Status, he is a Czecho-Slovakian civilian for travel purposes and must in all respects comply with civilian movement regulations.
4. In view of the various Army officers approached by Dr. Brozek I am satisfied that there was no deliberate attempt on his part to evade travel restrictions and having warned him to comply with civilian movement regulations in the future, I recommend no further action. All personnel of this office have also been suitably instructed as to current regulations governing travel to Austria.

Nr. 54/94/445/45837. Since the 25th of March last, the Allied control on the Italian frontiers was put an end to. Consequently, all the foreigners belonging to the various States, in which Italy has diplomatic or consular representatives, must be provided, in order to entry into Italy, with a passport bearing a visa by the same representatives. For what pertaining the foreigners belonging to States, in which Italy has no representatives, the permits eventually granted by Allied Authorities before the 25th of March will be valid until the 30th of June next, while the permits to entry into Italy released after the 25th of March must also bear the authorization by our Ministry. For what pertaining the entry into Italy from Austria and Germany, no changes are being made to the previous rules, and consequently the permits released by the Allied Authorities in conformity with the terms we reserve to forward will be valid, but, if issued after the 30th of the current month, must bear also the authorization by our Ministry. We have no representatives in Albania, Algeria, Ethiopia, Greece, Yugoslavia, Kenya, Morocco, Palestine, Transjordan and Hungary, while negotiations are in course for the constitution of representations in Australia, Egypt, India, Liban and Syria. The entry into Italy is allowed to the British and American military personnel in service provided with regular travel orders. Please acknowledge receipt.

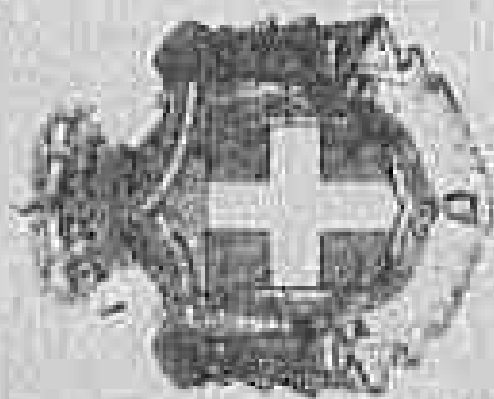

With reference to note C.B.I. 389-506/18, and G.B.I. 389/506/40 dated 8 and 27/6/46, we communicate that the Milan Questura, answering to requests, reports that that Office issued a pass for Trieste on 2/4/46 to Carminati Giselda (un Fredolini, fu Domenico) in order to give her a chance to visit and assist her 85 year mother residing there and recovered in an hospital in very delicate health as proved by a telegram exhibited by the concerned.

Carminati was accompanied to the Questura by an American Officer who solicited the concession for the permit.

Besides, when the Command of the Allied Police left that residence, it authorised that Questura to grant passes immediately only to very exceptional cases such as that of Carminati without awaiting the necessary 20 or more days for the usual concession of the Allied Military Authorities of Trieste. On the basis of such authorisation the Commander of the Allied Military Police of Milan issued the order for the relative forms to be stamped.

The Milan Questura has given the assurance that in the future, no matter how exceptional or urgent a case may be, the "no objection" will be requested to the Allied Military Authorities of Trieste.

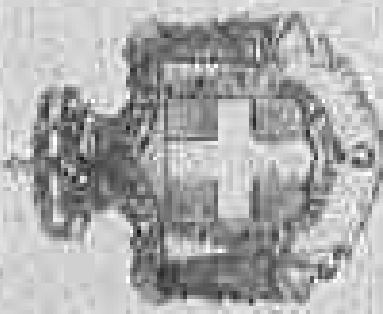

1. The above named Czech civilian was stopped at AMMOEDSTEIN when returning to Italy on 7 May 46.
2. He is employed by 61 Staging Post RAF as a clerk.
3. He was given leave by them to proceed to Prague, and was issued with a leave pass.
4. He claims that he was told by FSO Udine that as was dressed in battledress, employed by a British unit and in possession of a pass he needed no other papers for entry into Austria.
5. He travelled up from Udine on 15 Apr 46, spent three days in the Oz Embassy in Vienna, and on 19 Apr 46 he went to Prague. Returned from Prague on 4 May and stayed at Oz Embassy until 6 May 46.
6. He was informed by RTO Vienna that his leave pass was not sufficient authority for him to be given a seat on the train, and that he must obtain a Movement Order.
7. He obtained attached Mov. Order from HQ Vienna Area, who retained his leave pass and came down to Willach on 6 May 46.
8. He was ordered to return to 61 Staging Post RAF and allowed to proceed at discretion.

1. With further reference to your letter of the 13th of June 1946 under the above mentioned reference number, addressed to the Executive Commissioner, HQ, Allied Commission, Rome, and HQ's reply thereto under reference number GBI.389-506/108-C respecting the same matter.

2. I have made further enquiries in this matter and despite the statement in paragraph 2 of the letter from Rome, I repeat, that Capt. Clarke was not in possession of all the facts when he wrote his letter of the 29th of May 1946 to the Questura of Bolzano. In the first place he mixed up two types of frontier control. The first part of his letter deals with the Tessera di Frontiera, which is a form of frontier control on every frontier in Europe.

3. Under this form of frontier control persons living within a certain distance of the frontier, usually about 15 Km, whose business takes them across the frontier for a distance of 15 Km, are issued with a Tessera di Frontiera.

4. Types of persons usually concerned are local landowners, farmers, doctors, midwives, priests and the like, and the time for which the Tessera di Frontiera is issued, depends on the status and work of the individual, but in no case the Tessera di Frontiera is issued for longer than 12 months.

5. It needs no detailed explanation as to why this procedure is adopted.

6. The second type of frontier control Capt. Clarke dealt with, without indicating that it is a different matter, is the issue of passas in accordance with the agreement made between the French Military Government Authorities in Innsbruck, the acting Prefect of Bolzano and yourself. This matter is dealt with in paragraph 4 of Capt. Clarke's letter.

7. There have been several complaints from the FSS in this Province that they have received complaints from the FSS in the British Occupied Zone of Austria that passes issued under this agreement are being illegally used by the recipients.

8. In each case I have pointed out that the Prefect and the Questore of Bolzano cannot be held responsible for this, as in each case the pass has only been issued to enable the person to travel to Innsbruck and if such persons have abused it, it is the responsibility of that persons who should be dealt with accordingly when caught.

9. It was stated on one occasion that a person found in the British Occupied Zone of Austria was in possession of a pass issued by the Questore of Bolzano authorizing him to proceed to Vienna.

10. I then pointed out to the FSS that they received copies of all such passes issued and should have been able to check this matter before the man crossed the Brenner. But it would appear that no such pass has been issued from Bolzano, but may-be the holder of the pass had altered it.

11. I requested the FSS to furnish me with the particulars of this pass and promised to take the matter up with the Questura, but to-date no such particulars have been received at this Office.

12. I have ascertained that there is a working agreement between the Italian and the French Military Government for the issue of Tessere di Frontiera as mentioned in the first part of this report.

13. It is reported that this agreement is working quite satisfactorily and no suggestion is made that it is a danger to security at this stage of the game.

14. There is a frontier of some 300 Km in the area of San Candido (Sillian Pass) which is controlled by the British FSS from the British Occupied Zone in Austria.

15. There are two FSS NCOs who cover the whole of these 300 kilometres. They have informed me that their instructions from Vienne are that the system of Tessere di Frontiera is not to be allowed to operate within their zone.

16. They informed me there are some 50 persons (Austrians) in their area who prior to the war came within the category of persons to be issued with Tessere di Frontiera, and how they are carrying on their business

at the present time is not known officially, although it is the opinion of the FSS NCOs that they are carrying on their business by clandestinely crossing the frontier. These FSS NCOs informed me that they have taken it up with their O.C. who in turn has taken it up with Vienna, but to-date with no success.

17. Appreciating how these instructions are upsetting economic life on the frontier, these two FSS NCOs have taken it upon themselves to work out a friendly agreement between themselves and the Italian Authorities on the frontier to issue a form of Tessera di Frontiera. They informed me that this is not even known by their O.C., but from their own observation it was quite obvious that some such agreement had to be worked out immediately to enable life to revert to as much normality as possible under the existing conditions.

18. Another instance of Capt. Clarke not being in possession of all the facts is that during July 1945, when I was the Security Officer, HQ Region XII, A.M.G., I was approached by the Agricultural Sub-Commission and asked if there would be any security objection to the practice of farmers on the frontiers taking their cattle to the mountains during the summer months, as they have done for generations.

19. The Agricultural Sub-Commission pointed out that this was a matter affecting Austrians and Italians, as in some cases it was the question of cattle in Italian valleys going to the Austrian mountains and vice-versa.

20. I took this matter up with GSI(b), 13th Corps, who in turn took it up with GSI(b) British Troops in Austria, and no objection was raised.

21. In fact this agreement worked quite well during the whole of the summer 1945, and it is rather strange that in the summer of 1946 security objections should be raised to this procedure.

22. I would point out that the document forwarded to this Office from AC.HQ, Rome, on the subject International Travel from, to and through Austria, is dated 29 May 1946 and nowhere in this document do they deal with the question of residents on the frontier being allowed to cross the frontier within 15 kilometres either side to carry out their normal affairs. 2817

23. With reference to the telegram received by the acting Prefect of Bolzano, alleging that there is laxity on the part of the Italian Authorities operating frontier control.

24. I communicated direct with the Travel Control Division, Public Safety Sub-Commission, HQ.AC, Rome, and there spoke to Mlt.It. BAKER, who informed me that a Capt. STENTON of GSI(b), British Troops in Austria, had called at Rome and made some complaint that the frontiers were not being properly controlled by the Italian Authorities.

25. It was rather difficult to get a complete story from Capt. Baker on this matter, as he was not even sure whether Stenton was in fact a Captain or a Major, and he appeared to have no record of the particular place on the frontier of which Stenton was complaining.

26. I think it fair to say that with the type of men at their disposal, and bearing in mind that they are only just beginning to stand on their own feet again, the Italian frontier control authorities are not doing a bad job.

27. Information has reached this Office that it is an easy matter to buy one's way through the frontier, but this is a matter for the Italian Authorities.

28. It must be remembered that the sight of an Allied military uniform has the effect of opening the frontier for the wearer.

29. It will be appreciated if in future such complaints could be reduced to writing, giving all particulars, when the matter could be taken up with the Italian Authorities in a proper manner. Then only, if such laxity interfered with the security or lines of communication of the Allied Armies in Europe.

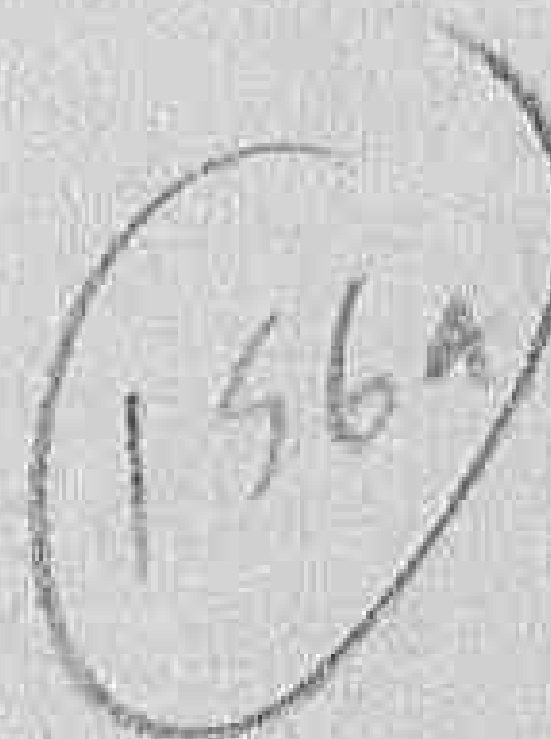

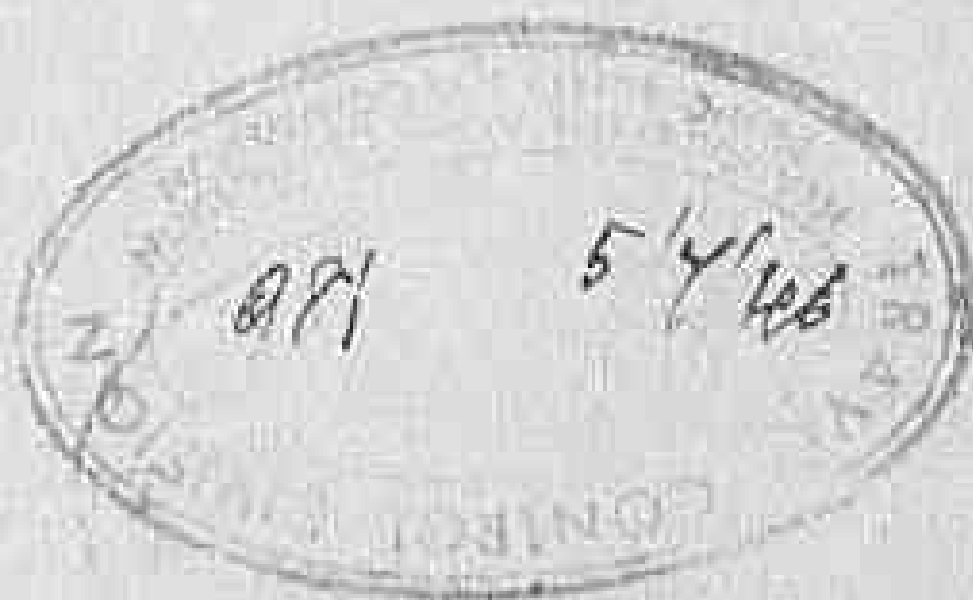

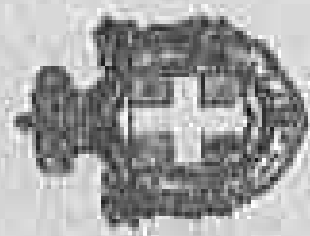

Referring to your letter GBI 389.506/18-K, of the 24/5/46, this Ministry communicates that there is no objection that the Italian Liaison Office in Germany be given the powers almost identical to those of a Consular Representative, concerning the granting of visas of entry to Italy to foreigners.

Thus, this Ministry considers that the steps to be followed should be the following:

1. The interested parties present their requests for entry, on the special forms, to the Liaison Office, which, with its own opinion, sends them to this Ministry and to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.
2. In favourable cases, the Office applies the visa on the passport, with the indication of the particulars of the authorisation granted by this Ministry (date - ref.N.443.....)
3. The Liaison Office, at the moment, cannot grant visas directly, i.e. without the prior ministerial authorisation.
4. Those permits already issued by the Allied Forces (Allied Force Permit) are still effective until the date of expiration, which seems to be of ninety days from the date of issue.
5. The authorisation of the Italian authorities for the entry of American and British military personnel, is not necessary, as long as they are in service and in possession of regular travel orders.

1. Reference previous conversations, attached herewith is a suggested draft to the U.S. and British POLADS.
2. It is realized that points have been omitted but this presents the situation as far as this office is concerned.
3. Even with the acceptance of these duties by the Embassies and the closing of this office it would mean we would have to clear up the 250 applications outstanding with the Italian Government.
4. The question also arises if A.F.H.Q. still desires to be advised by the Italian Government of all people to whom visas have been issued, for card checks.
5. Furthermore the U.S. POLAD, A.F.H.Q., has still to give his Government's agreement to the system whereby the U.S. Embassies would obtain clearance for people desiring to visit the Anglo-American zone of Trieste and having obtained the clearance endorse the passport accordingly; the British POLAD has agreed to this, as far as the British Embassies are concerned.
6. Final concurrence from Germany has yet to be obtained whereby all applications to enter Italy are sent the Italian Mission, accredited to USFET at Frankfurt, who will have certain discretionary powers to grant Italian clearance; it is hoped to have this system in effect by 30 June however.
7. At present this office has also been obtaining clearance and issuing permits for persons sponsored by American or British Military organizations travelling to Trieste on behalf of these organizations, and though this work is small it may also be desired to ask the Embassies to take this on too, on behalf of their respective nationals, if no more.

1. Due to the closing down of the Allied Commission in Rome and the redeployment of American and British Army personnel it will be no longer possible to carry out the remaining travel control duties with effect 30 June 1946.

2. These duties will only consist of the following:

(a) Travel to Austria.

Obtain clearance and issue permits for

- (1) American, British, French and Russian nationals.
- (ii) Any national sponsored by one of the four occupying powers for travel into its own zone.

(All other categories should be referred to Dr. ROTTEN, the Austrian representative).

(b) Travel to Germany.

Obtain clearance and issue permits for any nationals, other than the exempted categories, desiring to go to Germany.

3. Though these duties appear a military commitment, they are normally under peace time conditions carried out by the Embassies. And it is therefore felt that as they are so slight, and will no doubt in the near future being going back to normal diplomatic channels, that it would be advantageous for the U.S. and British Embassies to perform these

functions; in this respect it is pointed out that the Military Attaches of the U.S. and British Embassies in Belgrade, Moscow, Prague and Warsaw and the British Consulate in Algiers have been doing these and other permit issuing duties for those respective countries for sometime.

4. It is therefore desired that your offices make strong representation to your respective Embassies with a view to them taking on these duties. Attention is drawn to the fact that due to the stringent regulations in force for travel to Austria and particularly Germany, this volume of traffic is small and would not consist of many applications. e.g. in the month of May this office, and the one in Rome, had 40 applications for entry and transit of Austria and 10 for Germany, therefore divided between the two Embassies this would only consist of a total of 25 applications.

1. This Commission has given further consideration to the question of control of aliens in the country referred to in your letter of 16/00358/47 dated 5 January and my reply reference AQ/14756/375 dated 5 February.

2. Subject to the conditions mentioned in my letter, it is felt that energetic measures can be taken to bring about an improvement in a situation which is at present extremely confused.

3. Your consideration is therefore invited to the suggestion that the Italian Authorities should proceed to the documentation of all aliens in the country with a view to classifying them and arranging for the disposal of undesirable elements. This should include aliens inside as well as outside D.F. camps.

4. It has been suggested that this procedure might take the following form:

- a. Require all aliens to register their presence at Questura. (So far as aliens in Allied camps are concerned facilities for this purpose will be arranged).
- b. Record particulars of all such aliens including personal data: time, date, place and authority for entering the country, present activity, original domicile, reason for presence in country.
- c. Provide aliens with document showing that they have registered.
- d. Form central index by nationalities and classify cases into groups indicating the action the Italian Authorities wish to take, i.e. "undesirable-for deportation", "acceptable", "sojourn to be limited to 2 months", etc.

- e. Organize transit camps into which undesirable aliens illegally in the country and whose deportation is desired by the Italian Government could be placed pending their disposal.
- f. Reintroduce all normal alien control measures, i.e. registration at hotels, requirement to report to Questura at intervals, etc.
5. The Italian Police could then proceed to the arrest of these aliens who failed to register.
6. By these means, it is felt that a proper appreciation of the situation could be made and, when the necessary information had been collected, the Italian Authorities could approach this Commission regarding the disposal of undesirable groups.
7. Your comments on the above suggestion would be appreciated.

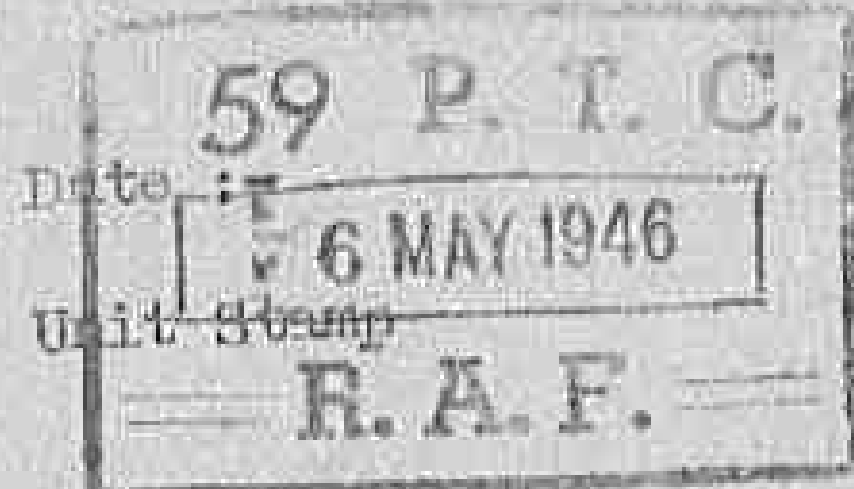

1. Arrangements have now been completed for the cessation of the majority of the activities formerly carried out by G.I.III Section and personnel no longer required are being released during the course of the week.

2. There are a few outstanding matters which will be dealt with by remaining staff and it is desired to point out that a certain number of problems will arise as a result of the closing of this organization.

3. The position of the various facets of the work is approximately as follows.

a) Allied Forces Permit System

There are quite a large number of outstanding applications from countries in which the Italian Government is not represented. These will be completed by Capt. HAZEL and P/Lt BAKER who are remaining in the Allied Commission office. It is also inevitable that, until the new procedure becomes generally known, certain permit agencies will continue to submit applications. These cases will have to be examined and replies made explaining what action is necessary. In certain cases which are strongly supported by Allied authorities it may be considered propitious to have them passed to the British or American Ambassadors in ROME for submission to the Italian Government.

Certain negotiations may also be necessary between the ROME office and the Italian Government regarding the installation of Italian representatives in various countries. This will be done in conjunction with the two Ambassadors.

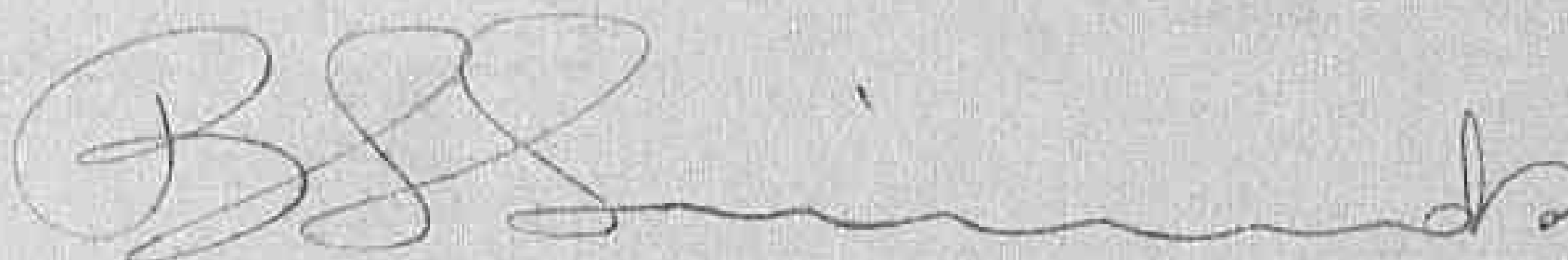

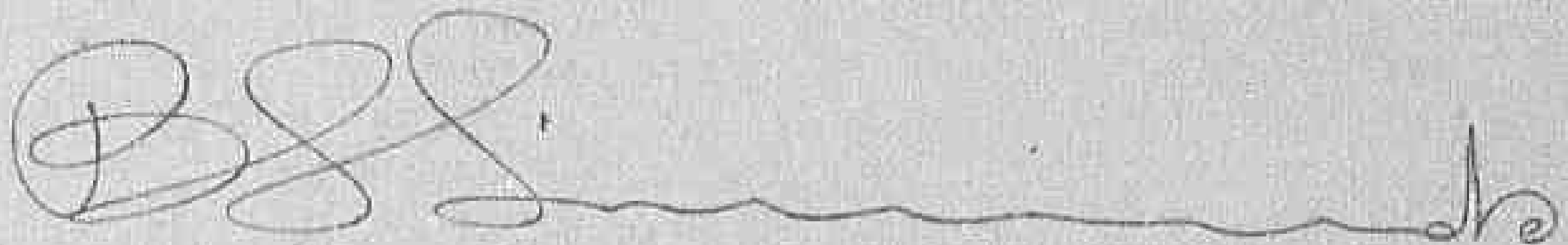

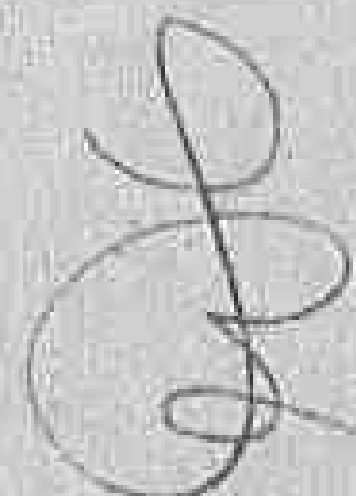

For entry from Austria ^{and} Germany, preceding regulations remain good, and consequently all those permits (Allied), as from models which this Ministry reserves to forward, are valid, but should these be issued after 30 inst, they must bear this Ministry's authorization.

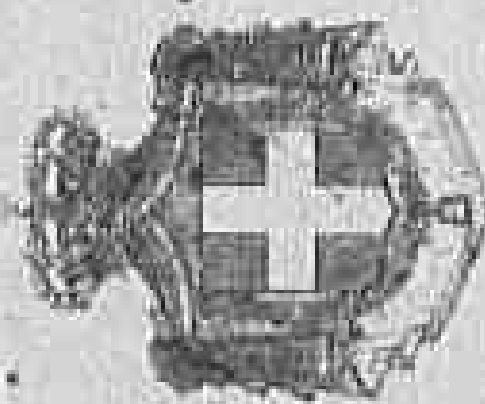
Those countries which are not represented by us are: Albania, Ethiopia, Greece, Jugoslavia, Kenia, Marocco, Palestine, Hungary, Tunisia; while agreements are in course for their institution in Australia, Egypt, India, Libano and Syria.

SUBJECT: Control of Aliens in ITALY.

TO : Allied Commission for ITALY. ✓

1. Attached is the final draft of a letter on the subject of the control of aliens in ITALY which it is proposed should be dispatched by the Allied Commission to the Italian Ministry of the Interior.

2. This letter authorizes the Italian Government to proceed with the registration of all aliens and to organize transit camps for the reception of undesirable aliens whose deportation is desired by the Italian Government.

3. The letter does not authorize the Italian authorities to deport aliens as yet as the policy as to who may be repatriated is still under discussion. It is suggested that you discuss with the embassies the possibility of a procedure whereby cases proposed by the Italian authorities for repatriation should be reviewed by a joint board consisting of representatives of the U.S., BRITAIN and ITALY. Such a board, whose members would preferably be A.C. or Civilian, could be invested with authority to decide, in accordance with the policy decision when made, which aliens should be repatriated as undesirable and which should be regarded as political refugees not to be repatriated.

4. It is also pointed out that the letter authorizes the Italian authorities to register aliens living in

Displaced Persons and Refugee Camps. It is clearly undesirable that the thousands of inmates of Allied Camps should have to leave those camps in order to report to the Questura. It is therefore recommended that the Italian Government should obtain from UNRRA and AC facilities for its officials to enter camps for the purpose of carrying out the registration of aliens. 118

5. Finally it is considered desirable in the interest of the Displaced Persons or Refugees themselves that they should be warned that if they leave the camp to live elsewhere and fail to notify the Questura or otherwise fail to comply with Italian Law, they render themselves liable to prosecution by the Italian authorities resulting possibly in imprisonment and/or their being recommended for deportation. In addition to warning persons now in camps or on later admission, it is recommended that notices to this effect should be conspicuously displayed in all camps. 118

6. It is accordingly requested that the attached draft letter and the above points be brought to the notice of the U.S. and British Embassies in ROME for their final concurrence and then forwarded to the Acting Chief Commissioner, Allied Commission, for his approval and signature. 2791

SUBJECT: Internal security measures

TO : Ministry of the Interior.

1. This Commission has given further consideration to the question of control of aliens in the country referred to in your letter of 16/00368/47 dated 5 Jan. and my reply reference AC/14756/SPS dated 5 February.

2. Subject to the conditions mentioned in my letter, it is felt that energetic measures can be taken to bring about an improvement in a situation which is at present extremely confused.

3. Your consideration is therefore invited to the suggestion that the Italian Authorities should proceed to the documentation of all aliens in the country with a view to classifying them and arranging for the disposal of undesirable elements. This should include aliens inside as well as outside D.P. camps.

4. It has been suggested that this procedure might take the following form:

- a. Require all aliens to register their presence at Questura. (So far as aliens in Allied camps are concerned facilities for this purpose will be arranged).
- b. Record particulars of all such aliens including personal data: time, date, place and authority for

CONFIDENTIAL

entering the country, present activity, original domicile, reason for presence in country.

c. Provide aliens with document showing that they have registered.

d. Form central index by nationalities and classify cases into groups indicating the action the Italian Authorities wish to take, i.e. "undesirable-for deportation", "acceptable", "sojourn to be limited to 2 months", etc.

e. Organise transit camps into which undesirable aliens illegally in the country and whose deportation is desired by the Italian Government could be placed pending their disposal.

f. Reintroduce all normal alien control measures, i.e. registration at hotels, requirement to report to Questure at intervals, etc.

5. The Italian Police could then proceed to the arrest of those aliens who failed to register.

6. By these means, it is felt that a proper appreciation of the situation could be made and, when the necessary information had been collected, the Italian Authorities could approach this Commission regarding the disposal of undesirable groups.

7. Your comments on the above suggestions would be appreciated.

1. Reference your letter DPR/11/EA dated 6 April 1946.
2. The points put forward in your letter are entirely agreed with by this section though it is pointed out that the responsibility for the controls of the Italian frontiers, sea and airports has already been handed back to the Italian Government with effect 25 March 1946, by this Headquarters letter of even reference dated 15 March 1946.
3. At the same time a letter was sent the Italian Government recommending that, with their resumption of full responsibility for these controls, they should increase the vigilance, reorganise and give clear instructions to their Immigration, Customs and Coastguard Services.
4. It is felt that paragraph 6 of your letter should be incorporated in this office's draft, which is at present being concurred in by AFHQ, without causing too much delay. Therefore our draft is being amended accordingly by phone to AFHQ and will be resubmitted the staff sections, of that H.Q., for their approval; the American and British Embassies will be approached personally by officers from this section for their concurrence.
5. However it is thought that ~~the~~ the other points brought forward in your letter should be raised separately as they may delay AFHQ's concurrence considerably; it is suggested that your letter when agreed upon by all the necessary offices could be a follow up on ours, as it contains suggestions more of the practical method of how this registration should be carried out.
6. The comments of your Sub-Commission, which it is hoped agree with these recommendations, would be appreciated.

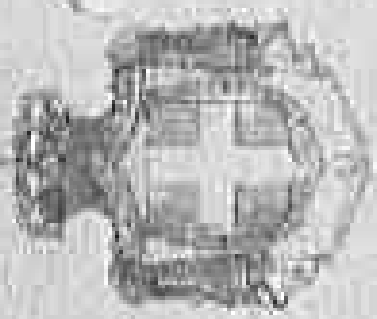

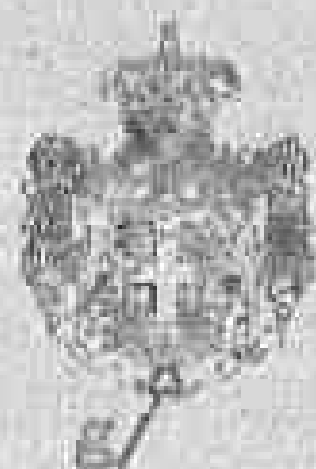
