About twenty years ago a German firm, with German capitals was established in Milan. This firm acted under the name of ARCA and her purpose was the trade, the representation and warehousing of chemical dyes.

Messrs. ARCA had been in business two years ^{when} ~~with~~ Messrs. Kalle & Co. of Biebrich(Germany) invented a special type of paper, to be used for drawings reproduction, which was to be developed by ammonia gas. This invention had a great success; the patent for Italy was granted to Messrs. ARCA who made large profits having had the chance to sell the paper at a very high price.

Then the war burst out and later we had to undergo the detestable join of Italy to the German fighter. Of course Germany immediately acquired a great influence in our Country and she made up new offices and organized Italy as a German colony. She put her trustful agents in every office. The same thing happened at ARCA where a German Director was appointed; this director was Mr. Hans Haberlandt who superintended the main office of chemical products and paper for drawings reproduction. Mr. Haberlandt kept the rough paper, and the inherent chemical products, only for the three German firms and precisely :Messrs. ARCA, Messrs. OTTO GERSTUNG of Milan, and Messrs LUCE of Genoa whose owner is Mr. Schojnenberg. Mr. Haberlandt cancelled with intention any allowance to the Italian Firms who has ^{always} been working more and better than the German Firms who came last. 1374

Many direct and indirect claims were made to all the Committee and to the Government but with no result whatsoever. All the Italian manufacturers were excluded from the Contingency so they lost the customers who were taken up by the Germans.

Then came the 25th of April and the collapse of the German organization. The paper, that under the German control was sold at 49 lires per Kilo, after the arrival of the Allied, and could be sold free, the price went up to 500 lires per kilo. Now the Italian firms, which wish to take up their work and get back their habitual place which was stolen by the Germans with their brutal and unjust ways, are compelled to buy the rough paper at a price ten times

higher than the one paid by Messrs. ARCA. It is therefore impossible for the Italian firms to make competition with them. I have to add that Messrs ARCA, a typical German firm with German capitals have always worked for German people and should therefore be sequestered and her collaborators should be arrested.

On the contrary nothing of all this. Messrs. ARCA calmly continue their work for the Allied and the private Italian customers. There is no epuration for ARCA and it seems that this question does not concern Messrs. ARCA.

On July the 5th, I have presented regular denunciation to the Police Station in Milan asking that the paper illegally stored shall be distributed, against payment, among the Italian Manufacturers who have no raw material. I have also requested the collaborators' arrest which is contemplated by the law.

I greatly hope in your intervention in order to let me have justice at last.

SUBJECT : Use of Industrial Facilities for Civil Requirements.

1. This letter is written with reference to Administrative Memorandum No. 14 dated 7 March 1945 issued on the above subject by Allied Force Headquarters, a copy of which has previously been forwarded to you.

2. Attention is directed to the provisions of paragraph 4 of Administrative Memorandum No. 14. It will be noted that cases presented under paragraph 4a to the responsible Area, District, Base Section or Army Commander, or other responsible military authority, whether presented by this Section, a Sub-Commission, a Regional or Provincial Commissioner, must be accompanied with a complete and factual justification. Likewise under paragraph 4c cases submitted by this Section to an investigating sub-committee appointed by the Industrial Co-ordination Committee of the Allied Force Local Resources (Italian) Board, through AFIRS must be accompanied with a complete and factual justification.

3. There is attached hereto a form prepared for use by this Section in submitting cases under paragraph 4c. The form will serve to indicate the type of information which constitutes a complete and factual justification whether the case is to be submitted under paragraph 4a or 4c. Sub-Commissions, Regional and Provincial Commissioners will furnish all such information whether presenting a case directly to the responsible Area, District, Base

Section or Army Commander or other responsible military authority under paragraph 4a or transmitting information to this Section with a request that a case be presented under paragraph 4a or 4c.

4. A detailed technical instruction is being issued by the Director of the Industry Sub-Commission to AC/AMG Industry Officers for their guidance on this subject.

1. Reference your AG/336/Tn 4 dated 23 April 1945.
2. It is clear from the correspondence that the firm of Solazzi worked for the Todt Organisation but the degree of pressure applied to this firm is not known.
3. The Committee of Liberation make no specific complaints against any member of the firm on the grounds of collaboration with the enemy, nor is there any mention of any member being arrested or interned on suspicion of being a threat to military security.
4. The retention of MANCINI appears to be a matter of urgent military necessity and it seems that his firm is irreplaceable, and it is therefore recommended that the firm be allowed to proceed with its contracts, provided military security is not endangered.

The Italian company "FERROBENTON" has its central office in ROME, Via Catania No. 9.

It was one of the most important industrial societies, with interests, activities, plants and offices in various Italian cities.

It was constituted on the 3 April 1908 with social capital of sixteen million lire in 1,000 lire shares.

It was engaged, for the most part, in maritime, civil, industrial and hydraulic undertakings in ferroconcrete.

It had, and still has today, offices and enterprises in important centres in Italy, among which the following cities and neighbouring localities:-

GENOVA, Via San Matteo 14.

TORINO

MILANO, Via Rugguesi 3.

VENEZIA, Calle Carmello S. Candiano 5521.

NAPLES, Via S. Brigida 51.

PALERMO, Via Mouel 4.

In ROME, at Via Catania 9, it has an experimental laboratory.

It had, in recent years, a vast industrial network, but lost a large part of its material as a consequence of events during the war.

It has not been possible to establish whether it undertook work directly for the Germans after the 8 Sept 43. In ROME, however, its industrial activity is very small.

Vice-President of the Italian Society for Maritime Works, head office: Via Catania 9.

It has not been possible to establish whether it undertook work directly for the Germans after the 8 Sept 43. In ROME, however, its industrial activity is very small.

Among the directors of the FABBROTONI Society are found to be:-

President: TULLIO FRANCESCHI in Antonio, born 1911 (Savona) 23.3.1869, living here at 12, Via Monte Pavicelli.

In ROME, too, he held important posts in public and private firms, among which:-

Member of the Higher Council of the Bank of Italy.
President of the Financial Society of the Edilizia Calabro-Sicula (Building Society covering Calabria and Sicily), with chief office at Via Catania 9.
President of the Meridian Institute for Integral Bonds, 10313
office: Via Catania 9.
President of the Limited Company for Colonial Works in Africa, office: Via Catania 9.
Vice-President of the Italian Society for Maritime Works, head offices: Via Catania 9.

It would not appear that he indulged in fascist political activity nor that he was personally in contact with the Germans.

Vice-President: BIANCONI Giuseppe, born CREMONA, 15.2.1876, who lived here in Via Bellini 10 and transferred about 7 years ago to MILAN, Via C. Grassi 5. In ROME he held, among others, the following posts:

Deputy to Parliament before the creation of the Chamber of the Fascists and the Corporations.

President of State at the Ministry of Finance until 1937.

Senator of the Realm (nominated 1/39).

He held the title (apparently through fascist interest) of Count of LIGGIO.

He was quite well-known in ROME and enjoyed the friendship of various high personages, among whom were BOTTAI and SUVICH.
