SUBJECT : Unauthorised travel to Venezia Giulia

TO : Ministry of Marine

1. Recently a certain 2 Capo MASSA Giuseppe attended at the offices of a F.S. Section. He had entered VENEZIA GIULIA in civilian clothes and was in possession of an Italia Naval pass purporting to authorise him to enter that restricted area.

2. The pass in question was O.C. R.N. "Colombo", at the time docked at Taranto.

3. Such pass is not a valid substitute for AMG authority to enter VENEZIA GIULIA.

4. It is understood that MASSA is by no means the first case of a naval rating being issued with such a pass from Taranto.

5. This case is brought to your notice so that appropriate instructions can be passed to the authorities concerned. The issue of such passes can only result in hardship unless they are accompanied with instructions to report to AC/AMG before entry into Zone "A".

- 2) He had entered Venezia Giulia in civilian clothes, and was in possession of an Italian Naval pass purporting to authorise him to enter Venezia Giulia.
- 3) The pass was signed the OC R.N. "Colombo", now in dock at Taranto.
- 4) May the Italian Naval Officer concerned please be informed through appropriate authorities that such passes are not a valid substitute for AMG authority to enter Venezia Giulia and that their issue, (unless accompanied by instructions to report to AC/AMG before entry into Zone "A") can only result in hardships to the man concerned.
- 5) It is understood from the sailor concerned that this is by no means the first case of such a leave pass being issued from Taranto.

1. On 24th January 1946 JOSANOVIC Josan a Yugoslav national, called at Security Office and requested a travel pass to enable him to return to Rome by autobus. He was accompanied by an Italian civilian named RUSSIAN Rodolfo, who stated he was acting as a guide to JOSANOVIC whom he had met in Milan, and by whom he had been given a lift to Trieste.
2. Asked for further particulars of himself, JOSANOVIC stated he was employed as a driver to the members of the Yugoslav Delegation to the Advisory Council for Italy and that he was travelling on a movement order (copy attached - original held at this Office). He alleged his car had broken down and that he was instructed to return to Rome by autobus. On applying for a bus ticket, he had been informed by the bus company he must first be in possession of a travel pass - hence his call at Security Office.
3. Further pressed, he stated he had been accompanied by a Colonel he believed to be a Colonel MICOLIC and the Colonels Belgrade soldiers driver - that the Colonel was in possession of a valid permit and would vouch for him.
4. In consequence JOSANOVIC'S papers were held and he was instructed to contact his Colonel in order the position could

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5. JOSANOVIC failed to return, and immediate enquiries were instituted with the result shown in the attached copy translated report of Sergeant Gillardone, Venezia Giulia Police.

6. In the interim a signal was sent to Public Safety Sub-Commission Travel Control Division A.O. Headquarters, Rome, requesting verification of JOSANOVIC's "travel orders", and the following reply received :

" Secret. 682. Your SEC 62 of 25 Jan. Yugoslav "
" Delegation inform us. one. Josanovic is "
" Driver Rome Delegation Yugoslav Delegation "
" who was sent to Trieste driving Antunac "
" Yugoslav Counsellor. Two. Antunac held AFP "

" aware that Josanovic needed permit. Three. "
" Colonel is thought to be Colonel Fehacek head "
" of Yugoslav HM to 13 Corps. Four. Lancia 4532 "

7. By this time JOSANOVIC had found his way to the Yugoslav Military Mission at 13 Corps, and application was made for his return to Rome, which was approved and permitted.

8. Before going, JOSANOVIC was again interviewed and amended his original story, stating he had in fact been sent to Trieste to take m/car J.D. 09 to Rome. The car was not ready when he arrived, and in consequence he was told to make his way to Rome by autobus. JOSANOVIC had no knowledge of any diplomatic mail, denied all knowledge of Counsellor Antunac and Colonel Fehacek, and admitted the car in which he had travelled from Rome was the car bearing Swiss markings. He could not remember the number of this car.

9. The hotel bill incurred by the party mentioned in the attached report was settled, but no member of the party, or the cars mentioned has since been seen in this area.

10. This HQ. has no record of the issue of a travel pass to any of the persons named except to RUSSIAN Rodolfo; and to JOSANOVIC Josan for return to Rome.

Report of Sergeant Gilardone Luigi

In pursuance of your instructions and enquiries on your behalf, I am able to report as follows:

- On the 21 instant in Milano, in a restaurant the name and address of which is not known, a certain Russian Rodolfo of Antonio and Cecilia Sticotti, born in Trieste 18.10.1901, driver, and here living in Via Annunziata N° 1/2 floor, met a man with whom he agreed in exchange to travel without paying, to drive to Trieste one of the motor cars which at that moment was stopped before the restaurant. Russian believed that the car belonged to the unknown man and to the other people who were in his company.

The departure was made from Milano in the evening of the same day about 22 hrs. The travel owing to two mishaps to one of the cars and the frozen roads, was long and they arrived at Trieste at 14 hr on the following day. Crossing the boundary line between Italy and Zone "A" (at Pieris on the 22 inst. 13 hr) where Italian soldiers at the check post, asked the necessary permit in order to proceed to Trieste. The party showed some documents (Russian does not know which) which have been judged right enough to permit travel.

During the travel Russian heard that they spoke Jugoslav or Croat and called the presumptive owner of the car, "Colonel". After the arrival at Trieste, Russian has been asked to indicate an hotel; he advised the hotel "Posta" in Piazza Oberdan, where the company received three rooms, which have been at the moment occupied. The travellers have been identified as follows:

- 1) Josonovic Josan of Rade and of Milka Durnakovic, born at Niksic (Jugoslavia) on the 2.9.1920, driver.
- 2) Colonel Nicolic Nikola of Ivan and of Corinna Zelic, born at Borzoja (Jugoslavia) on 15.9.1896, delegated of the Jugoslav Red Cross at Geneva, diplomatic pass issued at Belgrado on 18.4.1945, N° 70.

- 3) Antonaz Ivan of Nicolj and Marianovic Saka, born at Sebenico 27.7.1910, member of the Yugoslav Delegation in Roma, diplomatic passport N° 230 issued at Belgrade on 7.6.1945.
- 4) Flaybon Vinko of Vinko and Persoglia Carolina, born at Koisco (Jugoslavia) on 8.12.1928, identity card of Yugoslav Delegation, issued at Bari, N° 4392; driver.
- 5) Guberina Peter of Giacomo and Caterina Bumber, born at Sebenico on 22.5.1913, member of Yugoslav Red Cross at Geneva, diplomatic pass N° 207 issued at Belgrade on 30.5.1945.
- 6) Chamorel Jean Pierre of John and Olga Milosevic, born at Belgrade on 15.2.1925, Swiss citizen, secretary of Yugoslav Red Cross at Geneva. Swiss pass issued by the Swiss Consul at Belgrade on the 16.10.1942 N° 972337-156.
- 7) Hume Olga of Manilo and Sgomena Milosevic, born at Belgrade on 27.5.1919, professor, Yugoslav pass N° 2010 issued at Belgrade on 7.11.1945.
- 8) A little girl, about 6 years old, probably daughter of Hume Olga.

After above-named took accommodation in the hotel, Russian has been asked to put the car in a garage. He, together with Chamorel and Josonovic, went to the garage "Esperia", Via S. Francesco 4, where he left the car Lancia-Artens, target Roma 4532, color dark-blue, circulation permit N° 33610 issued Roma. The other two cars (one Hudson J. DO 9, put-grey, American tires, big, target Swiss Red Cross in white field with initial GE- Geneva, and the other car mark Auto Union, cabriolet, color dark grey, 4 places) he directed to the Garage "RACI", Via Manzoni 9. Russian left there the two drivers and went home. I find that the night guard refused to accept the cars because it was so late (22 hrs). A little later the drivers come back with same V.G. Police men and the cars were accepted under charge after the drivers delivered their identity documents. The garage's chief says that the documents were provided with Yugoslav stamps and he understood that both men were members of the Yugoslav Red Cross. He noticed also that in the "Hudson" car was a discreet quantity of coffee-tins. The car's target bore the armorial bearings of the Helvetica Republique.

On the 24. Chamorel took back the Auto Union, but after a short time, came back saying that he needed chains because of the ice. After having bought such tools he set off definitely for Lubiana. The same day Josanovic said that he also went into the city to buy chains for the "Hudson" car considering the garage RACI was not provided with them. The "Hudson" was taken away by Josanovic the next day (25th Jan.) about 13 hr.

At the hotel Posta the 7 persons kept very intimate relation and spoke to Nikolic with deference calling him "Colonel".

As they arrived at the hotel, Nikolic, Guberina and Chamorel said they had come from Ginevra, while Humo Olga stated from Lusanne; Josanovic from Roma as well as Antonaz and Flybon.

Some of them left the hotel on 24 and the rest on 25 as follows:

- 1) Col. Nicolic and Chamorrel on the 24 directed Lubiana (they stated beforeleft the hotel)
- 2) Humo Olga with the girle and probably with a driver on 25th for Lubiana (departure before 12hr).
- 3) Josanovic, Antonaz, Flybon and Guberina set off in the afternoon of the same day directed for Milano, exept Guberina who stated he was to go to Ginevra.

The car Lancia Artera target Roma 4532 was withdrawn from garage Esperia on the 24 probably by Flybon. It follows that the last one car and the Auto Union, also withdrawn from garage Raci on the 24, were directed into Jugoslavia. On the contrary, the "Hudson", withdrawn from garage Raci on the 25, 13 hr, was probably directed to Italy.

The identity of Josanovic as driver of the "Hudson" and of Chamorrel as driver of Auto union is confirmed by the descriptions of the garage-chief Raci and by Russian as well as by the information of the hotel Posta.

I find also that in the evening of 22, day of the arrival into Trieste of above-cars, the Swiss consul rang up the hotel Posta asking to whom belonged the car with Swiss target he

perceived a short time ago before the hotel, which thought belonged to an acquaintance of his recently arrived.

I deem it advisable to let be known the penal precedents of Russian who appear prejudiced as follows:

- 23.11.1929 - Condemned by the praetor of Palmanova to pay a fine of Lire 125.- for infraction of the road circulation.
- 3.12.1931 - Arrested and denounced by carabinieri of Sesana because together with two other fellows, in locality S. Maria (Sesana) at 22.30 hr of the preceeding day has done violent and obscene libidinousness acts against 3 under aged women. On the 18.1.1932 he has been condemned by the Tribunale of Trieste for above-crime at 6 months prison.
- 1.4.1932 he received the conditional freedom for 5 years.
- 1.6.1942 - Condemned by the Tribunale of Trieste of 7 months reclusion, 15 days arrest, Lire 1000.- fine and Lire 500.- amends because black market crime.

If it is opportune to stop some of the persons in question, who probably will come back from Jugoslavia, it would be possible to take the opportune police measures.

On the 27.1.1946 before me, sergeant of Police on duty at the V.G.P. - C.I.D., Via 30 Ottobre 2, is present Russian Rodolfo, of Anton and Cecilia Sticotti, born in Trieste 18.10.1901 and here living in Via Annunziata 1, driver, who interrogated has stated as follows:

- On the 21 instant I was in Milano in a restaurant where I saw 2 cars stopping and I knew by the owner (at least I thought he was the owner) that the cars were directed to Trieste. As I also have had to go to Trieste I asked above-named, who was called "Colonel" to permit me to travel on the car and I offered myself to drive.

We set off from Milano in the evening 21.1. about 22hr and arrived Trieste next day 22 Jan. about 14 hr. At the question of the Colonel to guide him to an hotel I indicate him the hotel Posta in Piazza Dalmazia. All component of the party, who have also travelled on a third car mark Auto Union settled down.

I do not remember the number of the persons travelling on the three cars, but I think it was 6 or 7.

I attended the car Auto Union and the Hudson with respective drivers at the garage Raci, Via Manzoni and left the driver to think about the recovery of the cars. I myself took one of the cars (Artina Lancia target Roma 4532) to the garage Esperia Via S. Francesco 4. The next day on invitation of one of the drivers I went back to the hotel Posta from where I have gone to the C.I.T. Office in Piazza Unità in order to book a place on the pullman setting off for Roma. As the employe of the Agency refused to make out the ticket because Josanovic was not in possession of the necessary travel permit, I have been asked by Josanovic to accompany him next day (24 Jan.) in the room 92 of the Palast of Justice in order to receive the document. After Josanovic has spoken to capt. Bolt, he came with myself out the room and we went to the hotel Posta in order to fetch the believed Colonel. As we arrived there I have been told that the Colonel has set off. I make an appointment for 15hr in the afternoon before Palast of Justice, where I awaited useless untill 16hr. After I went along to Capt. Bolt's office, where I have been interrogated and at the moment released.

The Hudson car was color silver-grey and was target Swiss (as I have verified with security) Red Cross in white field with writing GE-Cinevra.

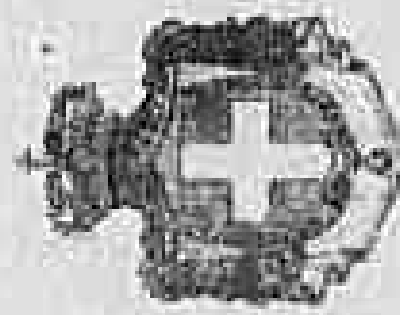

MEMORANDUM FOR THE ALLIED COMMISSION

Subject: Italian Commission to Yugoslavia.

1. Reference is made to the Allied Commission's note n.505/EO/EC(L), dated 30 October 1945.
2. The persons mentioned in para n.2 of note under reference had informed the Ministry for Foreign Affairs of their intention of travelling to Yugoslavia.
3. Their proposed journey had the nature of a relief and compassionate mission, intended to facilitate, in agreement with the Yugoslav authorities, the repatriation of Italian prisoners and civilian internees now in Yugoslavia.
4. It was quite natural for the Ministry for Foreign Affairs to approve said initiative, having a private character, and the members of the mission were supplied by this Ministry with a statement, the copy of which is herewith enclosed.
5. The Ministry for Foreign Affairs would appreciate it greatly if the Allied Authorities could extend every possible facility for the journey in question in view of the humanitarian aspect of the mission. *Yves*

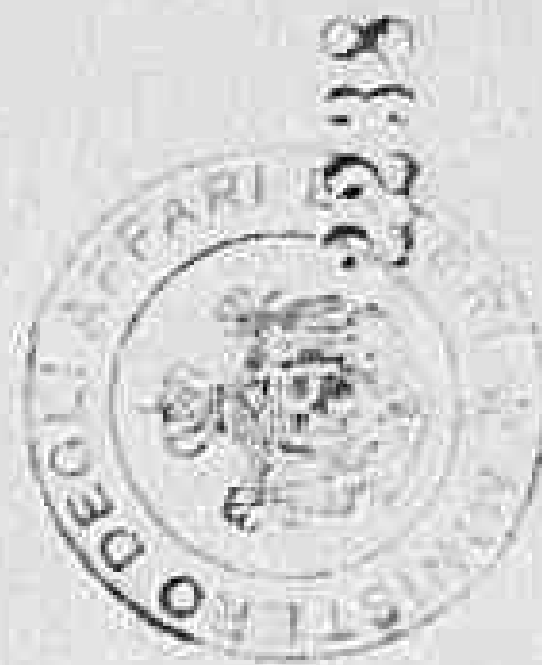

SUBJECT : Italian Commission to Yugoslavia

TO : Liaison Division Hq., A.C.

1. On the 13 October 1945, the persons named below were questioned by FSS at Gorizia.

2. They produced an Italian Foreign Ministry letter to show that they formed a Commission to enter Yugoslavia to negotiate the release of Italians deported by the Yugo Slavs. They were all members of the Brescia C.L.N.

3. Their names are:-

(Prof. BONI Bruno
Signora FACCHINELLI Delfina
Dott. MARINI Aniceto
Signora OSCAR ABBIATI Antonia.

4. None of the four members was in possession of AMG travel permits for Venezia Giulia.

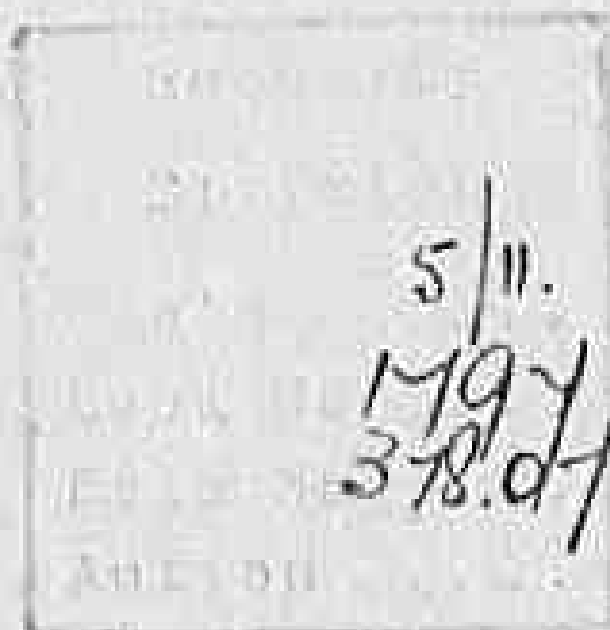

1. Herewith copies of results of two interrogations by this Sec. Report "A" deals with subject's curious story of wishing to go to Turkey in order to recover some buried treasure. It is noted in para 5 of this report that the photostat copy of a document purporting to show that subject had already undertaken excavations of this nature in Turkey cannot in reality be proved to have any connection with his present scheme.
2. Report "B", made after subject had paid a visit to NAPLES in order to try to arrange some financial backing for the plan, deals more fully with subject's life history, particularly during the German occupation of Belgium & France. In this it can be seen that after the German occupation of BRUSSELS, subject worked as an interpreter for the German Army billeting office and subsequently as an interpreter guide for Germans, principally a Dr TIMOFF in PARIS. His commercial activity in this capacity and his work at REMDAYE on the Franco-Spanish border may have been a cover for other activities, though this can not be proved at the moment.
3. During the interval between reports "A" & "B", subject made application to the Turkish Consul, ROMEL, for an entry visa to Turkey (see copy att "C").
4. It is the opinion of this Sec that subject is at best an adventurer and may be something more sinister. In any case he should not be allowed to proceed on his intended journey until more is known about him from Police records in both PARIS and BRUSSELS.

2. DE TRESAINE Serge.

Born RIGA 11 Sep 1893

Present address: Via Siacci, 9B, ROME. Tel. 870220.

Subject states that until 1919 he was a Cavalry Officer in the Russian Army under the Czar. Thanks to the help of a British Intelligence Officer, whose name he does not remember, he fled from Russia in 1919 and after journeying through Bulgaria, Serbia and Germany he eventually reached PARIS where he settled down. He became a commercial publicity agent and later publicity agent for Russian Ballet companies. In June 1938, along with many other ex-Russian officers, he was expelled from France as a result of incidents which occurred in France after the disappearance of two Russian Generals: KOTTEPOFF and MULLER. He went to Belgium where he remained until 13 Jul 1939 when he travelled to Turkey in search of his alleged hidden treasure. He states that the venture was cut short by the declaration of war.

3. Interrogated regarding the source of his information in respect of the treasure hidden in Turkey, subject stated that the secret and the plans of its location had been confided to him by a Capt André TCHERNIAVSKY of the Cossacks who actually interred it.

In 1916 the Russian Army was on the far eastern borders of Turkey, east of Lake VAN, whilst the British Army, marching presumably from Syria, was south of the Turkish border. TCHERNIAVSKY with his squadron of Cossacks was ordered to march south and contact the British. Whilst on his mission he reached MUCH in Armenian Turkey where on 20 May 1916 he took possession of the Turkish Army treasury (? coffer-fort). He was then ordered to evacuate it: on his way back he was approached by monks or local monasteries who sought his aid in the evacuation of their own treasures as the Turkish Army was approaching the district. He acceded to their request and, laden with his loot, he attempted to reach his HQ, but having reached the NE banks of Lake VAN, and not being in a position to face the Turkish Army with his mere squadron of Cossacks, he took the Turkish coffer-fort and the monasteries' treasures to a hidden spot in the rugged mountains SE of Lake VAN. Asked whether the Soviet Govt had ever laid a claim to the treasure he stated that in 1916 TCHERNIAVSKY's information was given to the Czarist Govt and that the Soviet know nothing about it. Nor do the monks know the location of their property. Subject appears convinced of the whole affair and at present, apart from being very keen to obtain permission to travel, his main worry seems to be the finding of financial backing.

5. Subject has submitted as proof of previous attempts (1939) to discover the treasure, photostat copies of correspondence with Turkish Authorities in TRABZON allowing him to carry on excavations in certain districts of Turkey. One of them carries a newspaper cutting which refers, however, to excavations in districts other than the Lake VAN district and mentions the fact of valuable historical objects having been found. In other words, there is no connection between a contemporary treasure and the matter contained in the photostat copy which he is submitting as proof of a previous attempt to obtain this treasure. Moreover, all documents produced are dated 1939, and at present he cannot show any document from Turkish authorities which would favour his entry to Turkey for the purpose stated. He has been asked to obtain such a document for our guidance.

6. Subject has gone to NAPLES for a few days to contact someone who may be inclined to finance his venture. He himself is almost destitute.

He took the documents to the Portuguese Ambassador who asked for time to check on the facts and paid him 10,000 francs for the information. The French police later learned of this but declared the documents to be false. This was at the time when Leon Blum was President and Soviet influence was felt in France.

2 Jun - He was expelled from France under pressure by Soviets, together with a group of 500 Russian officers and sent to the Belgian Frontier. At the time he belonged to an association of Russian officers in France (Rue du Colisée) whose chiefs of Gen. Boutepoff and Gen. Muller disappeared or were murdered. He arrived at Bruxelles without documents and was obliged to live there without informing the police but when in he obtained a visa for Asia, a r Costamans of the Foreign Office, in view of Subject's irreproachable conduct, granted him a Russian Refugee passport which would allow him to return to Belgium. Subject still has this passport which is the only identity document he can produce. He left Bruxelles and travelled by air via Frankfurt, Milano and Rome and on he embarked at Naples on the "Città di Bari".

1-8-38 - He embarked at Naples on the "Città di Bari". He arrived at Istanbul. He spent much time at Ankara trying to organise his expedition to Lake Van. He reached Diarbekir but the authorities there could not guarantee his safe passage as the area was considered a "war zone". He returned to Ankara and attended to formalities to ensure a later visit after the war and after a long stay in Ankara and Istanbul he returned to Belgium.

Not being able to return to Paris he stayed in Belgium until the arrival of the Germans. When they occupied Belgium, the German authorities asked the Comité des Réfugiés Belges to whom Subject belonged, having been born in Riga - for a list of German speakers for eventual employment. Subject was employed by the Quartier Int which controlled billeting in hotels etc. He worked in their offices at Place Rogier, Bruxelles where he issued billeting chits to German military personnel. After a time, foreigners were replaced in these jobs by Germans. At this period Subject met a Dr Tayroff of Union whom he met in 1917 at Moscow. Tayroff was at the German Embassy when the German Ambassador, Mirbach was killed.

Thyroff was employed as medical officer with the WMD (Wehrmacht Werkers Direction) of the Railways and he had been posted to Paris. He suggested that he could employ Subject as an interpreter with him in Paris thus giving him the possibility of returning there. He proceeded to Paris about two months after German occupation. He resided at the Hotel Daniel, 18 Rue Caulaincourt and he obtained from Dr Thyroff a new French (German occupation) identity card which allowed him to obtain a ration book. He took up his employment with the Railways at the "Gail" Buildings in Rue de Berry as interpreter but he was only used as a guide on shopping expeditions to the many friends of Dr Thyroff. When Germans requisitioned the Hotel Daniel, Subject obtained a billeting unit from Dr Thyroff for the Hotel Terrace which was partly occupied by German civilians. As a result of connections made during this employment, he started dabbling in business himself dealing mainly in liquors: cognac, armagnac etc. He met buyers mainly from Hamburg who supplied the Army. For this reason he travelled frequently to Belgium to supply one particular unit. At this time he met a gentleman called Rapp, proprietor and Managing Director of the Union Brewery "Salvator" who resided at 4, Place Capucines. He also met a Herr Paulaner Brauerin, friend of Thyroff who was looking for an agent in France for his beer.

Subject's activities were strictly commercial at this time as his position with the French Police - who had expelled him in 1938 - had become critical and more so because when the Germans declared war against Russia the French Police were asked for the names of communist suspects. As a result, many Russian officers were detained, including Subject, and interned at Compiègne. Thanks to Dr Thyroff he was released immediately but he was interrogated by the Gestapo by a Mr. Dole through whom, however, Subject managed to obtain the release of other Russian Officers. His French identity card was taken away from him by the Germans, who had issued it to him, but notwithstanding the possession of a passport for foreigners, he was called up for duty as a Baltic citizen in the German Army and when the "Volk Sturmen" were being formed he was submitted to a medical exam. Owing to wounds and a partial paralysis due to the 1915-17 war he was let free.

He then tried to obtain permission to travel to Prague where he had a cousin George Dimont-Ivanoff, who had been arrested by the Gestapo and who had died in prison, and a niece Nina who had been interned in the Ancrath Prison in Prague. In February he obtained permission and on 15-45 he arrived at Prague and went to live with his relatives Dimont-Ivanoff at 4, Zemedelska ul, Prague XIX.

He stayed there two months and tried to get to Italy where he intended seeking the protection of Marshal Alexander, who

who in 1939 was well known to his relatives in Riga and Latvia. Subject states that an uncle of his, on his deathbed, advised him to reach southern Italy and get in touch with Marshal Alexander who would protect White Russians and especially Baltic people from the Soviets. Through the "Comité des Kosas" of Prague (Bernacht face) he obtained a travel permit for Bolmezzo and, via Munich, on he arrived at Bolzano by the "auto-stop" system of travelling. At the Brennero they took away all his documents except his Belgian Refugee passport issued in 1939, which he had well hidden, and so he proceeded to Milan where he arrived on with a letter of introduction from the Albergo Citta of Bolzano to Sig. Koska, manager of the Albergo Ambasciatori in Milan. This hotel was at the time occupied partly by Germans and Italians, but they left overnight and Subject was alone there when partisans arrived. He showed them what documents he had and explained his case: their chief Capt Luigi Bianchi gave him permission to stay. He wrote direct to Marshal Alexander and received an answer through AFHQ (see GAI-389-506/RW/Treskine dated 25 May 45). He then proceeded to Rome.

5. Tcherniavsky's address:

Subject cannot remember the full name of the road in which Tcherniavsky lives but he has supplied a sketch which is attached.

Apparently he lives at a N° 5, Rue ...Hussin...., between Rue Fontaine and some well known tennis courts.

6. Opinion:

It is difficult to assess De Tresaine's conduct in his past movements and activities without reference to enquiries on the spot in places where he lived during the years of war.

He would appear to be an adventurer and his mode of life even with the Germans is consistent with that class of people.

He is quite open and sincere regarding his dislike of the French police and he stated that any enquiries made in those quarters would result in nothing but an adverse report against him. But he attributes that to his anti socialist and anti communist tendencies and activities and to the fact that his initial persecution by the French police started at a time when Soviet influence was very strong even with the Government of France.

But he is adamant about his treasure in Turkey and he deeply believes in the story given to him by Tcherniavsky even if he does admit the possibility of the treasure not being there now.

He may even succeed in interesting the Turkish Ambassador in Rome in the affair, because the Ambassador is a well placed personality of the Lake Van district. He has produced a document from the Embassy stating that he has applied for a permit to return to Turkey.

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He may even succeed in interesting the Turkish Ambassador in Rome in the affair, because the Ambassador is a well placed personality of the Lake Van district. He has produced a document from the Embassy stating that he has applied for a permit to return to Turkey.

He has also found a financial backer for his venture in the person of Ing. Maglioni of Naples who, apparently, intends travelling with him. Furthermore, he has offered his service to Intelligence if his presence in Turkey, while searching for his treasure in a district where political intrigue is rife, may be considered of value. He has many connections throughout Turkey.

He admits having been approached regarding SD work, but, apart from his physical disabilities - wounds and partial paralysis - which would not allow him to accept, he never considered accepting any such commitments.

Pending further enquiries, De Treskine is at our disposal and is still at the address given in my previous report.

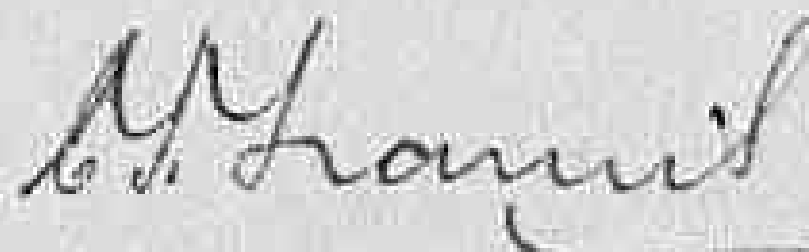

Referring to HQ AC's letter concerning Capt. Serge De Treskine I make the following declaration :

In compliance with orders received from Major Coxhead on the 5th June 1945 I called the Russian Capt Serge De Treskine to my office in order to communicate to him the contents of a letter from HQ AC which concerned him.

De Treskine came to my office in the afternoon of the 6th June and I informed him of the contents of the letter in question. Immediately after I had made this communication to him, I had momentarily to leave the room because I was called on the telephone in the adjacent office, and, among a number of other letters, I left De Treskine's letter on my writing table.

When I returned a few seconds later De Treskine took leave of me.

Some hours later, when I was putting my papers in order, I was unable, in spite of diligent search, to find the letter regarding De Treskine; I continued to search for it during the next two days, but without any result. Thereupon I sent an order through a Vigile Urbano to De Treskine - who was staying at the Hotel Ambasciatori - to come to my office immediately. The Vigile returned in a few minutes with the information that that very morning, at 5 o'clock, De Treskine had left Milan for Rome.

As I did not give him the letter and as I cannot think that an Officer would ever take away a document not belonging to him, I suspect that perhaps De Treskine may have thought the letter was meant for him and may consequently have taken it away in good faith.

7. Where special information of security or political interest arises in the case of an application, such information should be forwarded with the application.

8. Urgent cases may be dealt with by cable, but application forms should be forwarded in order to complete records of this headquarters.

9. Persons other than American and British military personnel who are exempted under paragraph 2 above from the requirements of a permit, will be cleared with this headquarters by cable before despatch, American and British military personnel however, may travel without telegraphic clearance.

10. Every civilian entering Austrian territory must hold a national passport and must comply with the exit permit regulations in force in the territory he is leaving. 2199

11. Unless otherwise ordered permits will be valid for a return journey.

12. Persons, other than the exempted categories, who arrive in AUSTRIA by water, land or air without Allied Force Permits are liable to detention and subsequent deportation to the country from which they start their journey.

13. The provisions of this instruction do not apply to the movement of displaced persons in parties authorized by the Displaced Persons Branch in consultation with the appropriate CI staffs.
