I'm sure it needs no words of mine to explain that INFORMATION is the very life blood of any Security Organization - under whatever heading of security the Organization may come.

If we are agreed on this point then the next point comes automatically and that is, all information should be used to its best advantage to get any value from it all.

It is only by practice that one knows how to assess the value of information. It is impossible to teach anyone how to do this, but the following are a few points to be considered when dealing with information that either comes to you, or you go out and get for yourself.

You will find that most information will come to your office and that quite a lot of this information will be false, or rumour. It may be that someone will come in the office and ask to see whoever is in charge - refusing to speak to anyone else. Having gained access to the Chief - which they usually do - they first of all ask that the matter of which they are going to speak shall be dealt with very confidentially and their name not disclosed.

This is the most difficult type of informant to deal with, and if you are going to hear anything you are bound to provide this type of informant what he asks - *ANY* BUT THE INFORMATION DO THE TALKING and show an interest in what is being said. By this means you will gain the confidence of the informant and should he, or she, be false you have more chance of lulling them into a sense of confidence that - should they be false - they will overstep the mark and you will be able to assess the value of the information given.

In any case get his name and as much of his - or her - history as you can, and you will usually find this is of value in assessing the value and reliability of the information. Do not ask about these things until the informant has told his story.

With practice you will soon find you are able to decide on the spot that certain informants are unreliable.

It is as well to keep a record of information received, including the date, time and place it was given, and who the informant was. Even if you are of the opinion it is not true, or worth following up,

This is the most difficult type of informant to deal with, and if you are going to hear anything you are bound to promise this type of informant what he asks - *NOT LET THE INFORMANT DO THE TALKING* and show an interest in what is being said. By this means you will gain the confidence of the informant and should he, or she, be false you have more chances of pulling them into a sense of confidence that - should they be false - they will overstep the mark and you will be able to assess the value of the information given.

In any case get his name and as much of his - or her - history as you can, and you will usually find this is of value in assessing the value and reliability of the information. Do not ask about these things until the informant has told his story.

With practice you will soon find you are able to decide on the spot that certain informants are unreliable.

It is as well to keep a record of information received, including the date, time and place it was given, and who the informant was. Even if you are of the opinion it is not true, or worth following up, a brief note will not do any harm, and may come in useful in the most unexpected way later on.

The type of informant I am dealing with at the moment invariably has an axe to grind, or is engaged in some activity which you are interested, but in order to avoid suspicion pretends to act as informant.

You will find, after having been in a place for a short time, that the reliable information will be corroborated by other informants, or facts that come to your knowledge, and by this means you can arrange your work on lines that will show the most profit.

I know there are many cases that can be quoted that do not fall in line with the above, and as previously stated only experience, and the exercise of the initiative of the individual, will get the best results.

The other type of informant who calls at your office is the one who calls quite openly and does not ask for confidential cover but tells his story right out. These people are usually easy to deal with and the information usually reliable, but not always.

When you are going out to get information there are two ways of doing this. The first is to go to someone you know and can trust and ask him right out what you want to know. This needs no enlarging on, but I deal with it because anyone who tells you something is an informant.

The second is where you want information and you don't want the person from whom you are expecting to get it to know that he is giving you something that you hope will prove the undoing of someone.

You can get this type of information by "planting" someone with the person you believe has the information, or you can associate with the person yourself and get the person to talk without arousing his suspicion.

I will not try to tell you how to do the latter, as each case depends on its particular circumstances.

One thing you must avoid doing and that is, when you think a person knows something, you must not encourage him to say what you think he knows, because he may not know it, but will agree with what you suggest he knows. The person may do this for several reasons. One, knowing who you are, desires to appear knowledgeable to you personally for some reason. CHARGES UNDER AND PROCLAMATIONS

Having decided which paragraph etc. under which you intend to prefer the charge, include on the charge - time, date, place and where offence was committed and what you allege the prisoner was doing. The full particulars of the proclamation, action and paragraph you allege have been contravened, should be inserted below the charge.

Never prefer "Criminal Charges". That is a charge containing several offences under different paragraphs of the proclamation. Set out each offence separately as shown above.

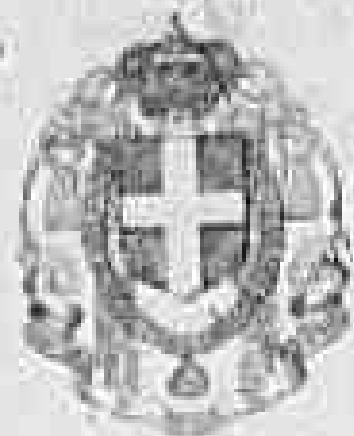

1. On 5th, NOVEMBER, 1943 a registered postal packet (No. 4736 BIRCHHEAD) addressed to No. 14573732 Driver. A. W. STANDISH, was received at the Headquarters of No. 634 Composite Div. Coy., R.A.S.C. The package was delivered to the Postal Corporal who entered the necessary particulars in the Unit postal receipt book, and later the same day the package was collected by some person who signed himself "A. STANDISH".

2. It was later discovered that the rightful owner, Dvr. STANDISH, had not received the package and as a result of enquiries it was learned that No. 14426561 Driver H. W. STANDISH (now serving with "C" Platoon, 345 Coy., R.A.S.C. C.M.F.) was serving with No. 634 Composite Div. Coy., R.A.S.C. on the date in question; that he was familiar with the procedure within the Unit regarding registered postal packages, and also that he did have the opportunity of taking the postal package addressed to STANDISH.

3. Accordingly, on 14th MAY, 1944, Dvr. STANDISH was interviewed regarding the package in question. He denied all knowledge and signed a certificate to this effect. (Attached) On 20th AUGUST, 1944, STANDISH was again interviewed by S.M. JONES of 77 Section, S.I.B. He still denied all knowledge of the package and made a written statement outlining the procedure within the Unit regarding registered packages. This statement (attached) bears three signatures of Dvr. STANDISH.

4. It will be seen from the entry in column 5 of the original postal receipt book (attached) that the signature "A. STANDISH" compares

STANDING (now serving with "C" Platoon, 345 Coy., R.A.S.C. C.M.P.) was serving with No. 634 Composite Div. Coy., R.A.S.C. on the date in question; that he was familiar with the procedure within the Unit regarding registered postal packages, and also that he did have the opportunity of taking the postal package addressed to STANDISH.

3. Accordingly, on 14th MAY, 1944, Dr. STANDING was interviewed regarding the package in question. He denied all knowledge and signed a certificate to this effect. (Attached) On 20th AUGUST, 1944, STANDING was again interviewed by SGT. JONES of 77 Section, S.I.B. He still denied all knowledge of the package and made a written statement outlining the procedure within the Unit regarding registered packages. This statement (attached) bears three signatures of Dr. STANDING.

4. It will be seen from the entry in column 5 of the original postal receipt book (attached) that the signature "M. STANDING" compares very favourably with Standing's signature on the certificate dated 14th MAY and his statement of 20th AUGUST, 1944. It would be greatly appreciated therefore if the services of a handwriting expert could be obtained to determine whether, or not, the signature "M. STANDING" on all above quoted documents were written by the same individual.

5. When the examination has been completed, will you please return all correspondence to this office, together with report by handwriting expert.

1. During the afternoon of 28th August, 1944, information was received that a "machine" thought to be the property of the Italian War Ministry was concealed in the basement of the block of apartments at No. 16 Via S. Angela Merici, Roma.
2. A search of this basement revealed a machine in the form of a double typewriter driven by electricity and containing devices for constantly variable ciphering.
3. This machine was taken to the basement sometime in September, 1943, by a Lieutenant Giorgio Pasqualucci of the Italian Artillery, a short statement of whose history is attached.
4. The machine is now in the Security Branch awaiting collection by your representatives.

1. PASQUALUCCI, Giorgio, previous address 16 Via S. Angela Merici, Roma, was a Lieutenant in the Italian Artillery, is married and has two children. Wife and children presently residing at Barbarano, Vicenza. His brother was Fedale of Rome and was one of the last Republican officials to leave. Pasqualucci's whereabouts are unknown although it is believed he is hiding in the vicinity of Rome.
2. From July, 1943, until February, 1944, he worked along with the German SS at the Via Tasso, Roma, where his work was to denounce Jews to the Germans. It is thought, however, that he had been taking bribes from the Jews in order to prevent their arrest. As a consequence he was arrested by the German SS in February or March and spent almost two months in the prison at Via Tasso and subsequently at Regina Coeli, where on June 4th he was liberated along with the other prisoners.
3. The apartment on the ground floor at No. 16 Via S. Angela Merici where he and his family previously resided was rented by him and the furniture presently there is the property of his wife.
4. The ciphering machine found in the basement of his house was taken there by him in September, 1943, and is thought to be the property of the Italian War Ministry.

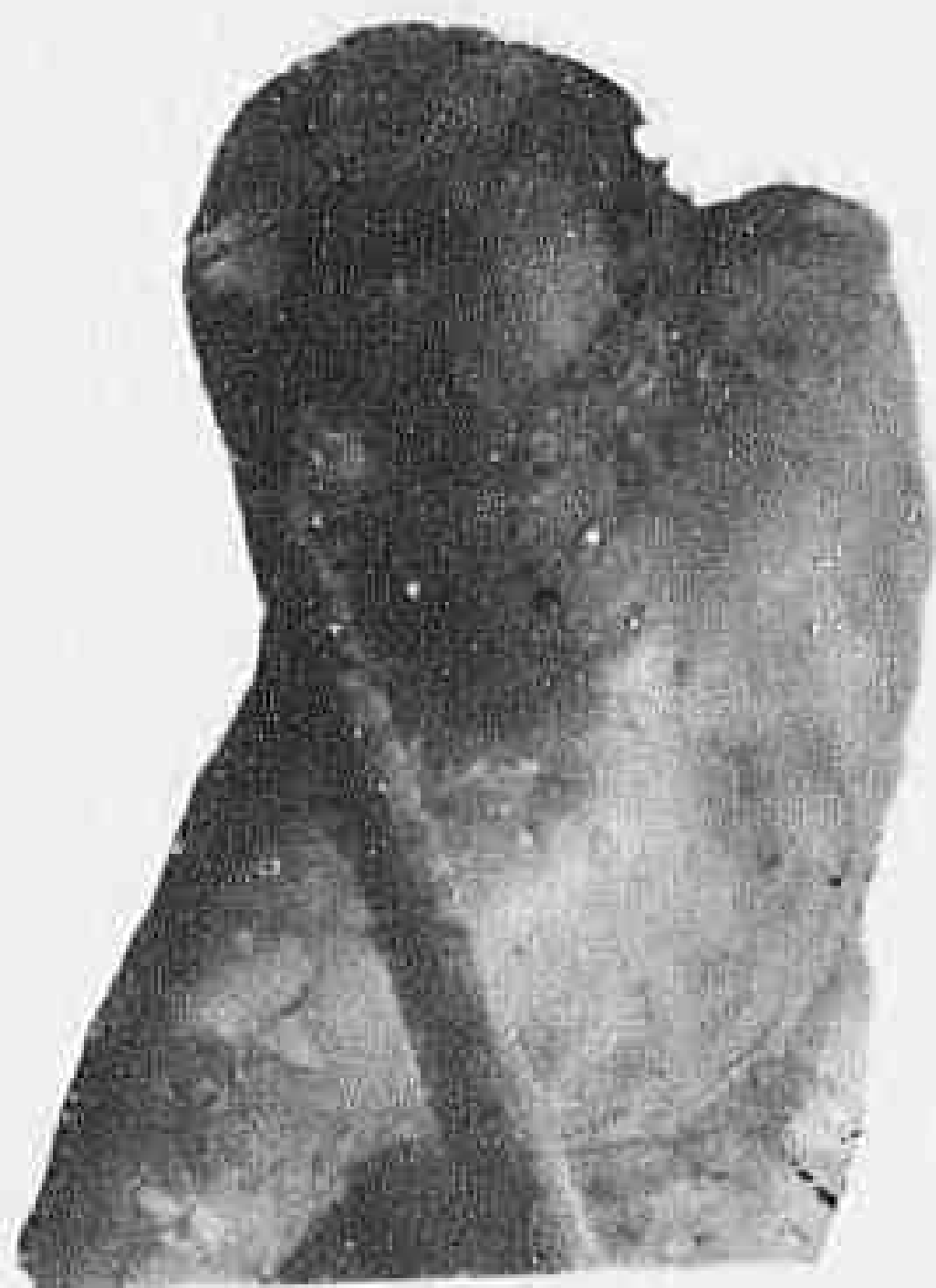

Sir,

I have to report that at about 1730 hours on the 9th August 1944, Carabinieri Mario MARILLI, Stazione Di Bivio Decima, Rome, reported to this office that a body had been taken from the River Tiber, it was thought that the body was that of a soldier.

DAPM. SECTION.

I at once went to the scene in company with the Carabinieri and found that the body had been brought to the bank. The position of the body would be about 10 kilos from Rome on the Ostiense road, the body had been brought to the bank nearest the Ostiense road.

DISTRIBUTION.

The body was in an advanced stage of decomposition. A pair of swimming trunks secured by a white belt was the only item of clothing on the body.

A search of both sides of the river banks, failed to reveal anything that might have assisted in the identification of the body.

Antonio EUCCI, Via Magliana 173, Rome, a fisherman was the first person to see the body, that was floating face downwards, drifting out towards the sea. He secured the body to the bank and notified the local police.

Owing to the fact that it was impossible to identify the body, photographs were taken by a member of the Istituto Di Medicina Legale e Delle Assicurazioni, Rome. (Copies attached)

STATEMENTS.

On the 10th August 1944, the body was removed to the 30th Indian General Hospital, where Major LAHRI, D.I.M.S. carried out a post-mortem on the body. It will be seen from this report that the apparent cause of

Who states:-

Yesterday, August 9th, about 0830 hours as I was in my boat on the River Tiber, I saw at a distance of about nine or ten kilometers from Rome on the Via Ostiense road, a body floating in the water which had been driven by the current to one of the river banks. The body was floating face downwards.

I at once informed CRISTOFANELLI Candido of what I had seen and asked him to go to the Carabinieri Police Station and report what I had seen.

A little later CRISTOFANELLI together with the Brigadier CENTANONE Francesco, and we went to the spot where the body was and secured it to the ground with wire.

I have read over the above statement, it is true and correct.

(2) enclosures in mail, possessions of suspects etc, for hidden secret ink materials, microphotographs etc.

3. The laboratory can provide, when required, an expert in secret ink methods, to assist in the interrogation of enemy agents trained in the use of secret ink, or provided with such inks.

4. In order that the laboratory staff may be kept informed of any new developments with regard to methods of secret writing in use by the enemy, any information obtained on this subject should be forwarded to this HQ for transmission to the laboratory.

5. This HQ letter of even reference dated 18 Jul 44 notified the existence of the Italian laboratories in Rome which could provide security agencies with scientific aids to investigation, including the "detection and development of writing in invisible inks".

In future any tests for secret writing will be referred to the Allied Laboratory Detachment described in para 4 above, but the two Italian laboratories will continue to be available in respect of the other scientific aids and tests described in our letter of 18 Jul 44.

The first of these deals with the aspects of examination and investigation where expert medical knowledge is required i.e. Forensic medicine.

The second deals with scientific investigation from a purely police point of view i.e. by fingerprints and other such means of personal identification.

While it is not possible to give a comprehensive list, the following indicates the kind of work which can be undertaken:

- (a) Analysis of powder, liquids etc
- (b) Identification by fingerprints.
- (c) Detection and development of writing in invisible inks.
- (d) Microscopic examination of all types.
- (e) Helixistis.
- (f) Expert examination of handwriting.
- (g) Identification of typewritten documents.

In order that the best use may be made of these laboratories, it is important that all security agencies should bear in mind the following points before enlisting their help.

(a) Science cannot take the place of the investigator; it is only after the preliminary investigations have been made that the aid of Science can be of solicited. Scientific aids can be best employed to connect the links in a chain of evidence.

(b) In order to obtain the best probative value from scientific evidence (i.e. if such evidence is likely to be required for trial) the following principles should be followed as far as circumstances permit.

(i) As few people as possible should handle the exhibit and they in turn should handle the exhibits as little as possible.

(ii) A detailed record should be kept of all persons through whose hands the exhibits pass, and the following information should be obtained from such persons:

- (1) Time, date and place on which they first handled the exhibit.
- Circumstances under which the exhibit first came into their possession.

Time, date and place on which they first handled the exhibit.

Classification of all information : TOP SECRET

condition of the exhibit at the time of finding or receipt, and, in the case of the first person to find it, the exact position and location of the exhibit. It is desirable but not essential that a photograph be taken of the exhibit before it is moved from the place in which it was originally found.

The circumstances in which the exhibit was handed to the next person, giving the name of the person by whom handed and the time, date and place of handling or method of dispatch.

(iii) Any person having custody of an exhibit should keep it under his direct personal control and/or under lock and key.

7. Applications for examination of exhibits may be made by any Security Agency to Security Branch, HQ. A.C.C. All such applications must be accompanied by a brief report relevant to the facts which it is desired to establish by scientific means. It is not necessary to submit the full facts of the case (see para 9 below).

8. A hypothetical case is quoted below to illustrate the foregoing:

A spy is landed by parachute and manages to get out of his harness and proceed some distance from his landing place before being arrested. He is examined and interrogated, and, although he bears marks on his body consistent with having worn parachute harness, and is cut and bruised from the fall, he denies being the person who came down in the parachute. While the circumstantial evidence against him is strong, it is not conclusive and would not alone be accepted by a court. It however the parachute helmet and harness are carefully preserved together with the clothing of the suspect, microscopic examination would undoubtedly reveal that some of the fabric from the parachute had worn its way into the suspect's clothing and vice versa. A sample of the hair from the head of the suspect should also be taken, as it is almost certain that some of his hair would be found in the helmet.

9. In a case such as the above it would only be necessary to state when submitting the exhibits for examination: "Herewith parachute harness and clothing of person suspected of having descended by parachute. Please examine for evidence to prove suspect did use parachute."

Similarly were it desired to have a paper examined for invisible ink writing, it would only be necessary to submit the paper with a request that it be examined for writing in invisible ink, without giving full details of the case.

house on the outskirts of KUTS VALLE GUEI village, near KUMILLA.

I immediately proceeded to the scene of the crime
and commenced investigations, finding the facts of the case to be
as follow:-

At about 23.30 hours on the 27th June, 1944, two
Indian soldiers, one being a Corporal, are alleged to have called
at a lonely farm-house near KUTS VALLE GUEI. The civilian
occupants had retired for the night.

An aged male member of the household, KUSUMI
Ginsappe, heard knockings at the door and so lit a lamp and got
out of bed to open the door. As he did so, two Indian soldiers
forced him back into the room at the point of a Winchester
Machine Gun. KUSUMI immediately recognized the two Indians
as being the same two who had been to the farm during the day
and on other previous occasions asking for eggs and wine.

The Indian soldiers then forced KUSUMI to
lead them to the bed-rooms of the house. In these three bed-rooms
were sleeping at the time four different families, consisting of
several female members. These persons although disturbed, did not

The intention of the two soldiers appeared to be

Sir,

On the 20th June, 1944, at about 0600 hours, a case of alleged murder was reported to this Office, by O.C., 8th Indian Div. Brownist Coy., C.M. Police, having occurred at about 23.30 hours on the 27th June 1944, at an isolated farmhouse on the outskirts of JOMIE VALLE CANT Village, near PANAMA.

I immediately proceeded to the scene of the crime and commenced investigations, finding the facts of the case to be as follows:-

DESCRIPTION:

Report.

At about 23.30 hours on the 27th June, 1944, two Indian soldiers, one being a Corporal, are alleged to have called at a lonely farmhouse near JOMIE VALLE CANT. The civilian occupants had retired for the night.

An aged male member of the household, FRANCIS GIUSEPPE, heard knockings at the door and so lit a lamp and got out of bed to open the door. As he did so, two Indian soldiers forced him back into the room at the point of a Thompson sub-machine gun. FRANCIS immediately recognized the two Indians as being the same two who had been to the farm during the day and on other previous occasions asking for eggs and vino.

The Indian soldiers then forced FRANCIS to lead them to the bedrooms of the house. In these three bedrooms were sleeping at the time four different families, consisting of several female members. These persons although disturbed, did not get out of bed, the rooms being illuminated by oil-lamps.

The intention of the two soldiers appeared to be to commit rape, for they attempted to seize the women in bed. As each woman resisted assisted by their husbands and the Indians were unable to achieve their intentions, the Corporal fired a short burst of bullets from the machine-gun at each woman in turn as they were lying in their beds, killing two of them.

The firing caused panic among six other civilians present in the room, and they all rushed to jump out of the windows. The Indian Corporal then entered the room with bullets, wounding five of the civilians. The two soldiers then escaped from the house.

On my arrival at the scene of the crime at about 0700 hours on the 28th June, 1944, the wounded persons had been removed to hospital, but the bodies of the two dead women were left for my examination.

The two bodies of GIUSEPPE MAIR, (unmarried) aged 45 years, and LA SIGORNA DEBELLIA, (married) aged 35 years, were found to have two bullet wounds in each. In the case of GIUSEPPE MAIR both bullets had passed right through her body, but in the case of LA SIGORNA DEBELLIA no exit wound was visible for a shoulder wound.

In view of this a Post-Mortem examination was carried out on the bodies at the No. 2 Indian Mobile ODS., resulting in the examination of an undamaged copper-coated bullet of .45 calibre, from the strainer-stand in the body of LA SIERPORA MONTILLA. I took possession of this bullet.

A close search was carried out of the bed-room in the Farm-house at the scene of the crime. This resulted in the finding of 3 discharged cartridge cases of .45 calibre, and 4 (four) .45 spent bullets. This examination is Service type fired in T.S.M.Cs..

On examining the cartridge cases, I found six of them to be of the new type of transition now in use, i.e. Land-coloured cases, but two of the cases were of the old type, i.e. brass cases. I also found six bullet holes in the walls of the bed-room, in groups of two and singly.

As a result of further enquiries on identification parade was held of all Natives (Opia) in the Flat Indian Infantry Bde., at 20.00 hours on the 29th June, 1944. On this parade a civilian witness, GUILBERTO MINUNIER, identified No. 11625 Mdk. ERIC HAZ, "P" Coy., 1/19th PUNJAB REGT., 2nd Indian Div., as being the Indian Corporal who had visited his farm (situated approx. 40 yards from scene of crime) at about 17.00 hours on the 27th June, 1944.

This Corporal's description and dress fitted the description of the Corporal alleged to have done the shooting, and the wounded persons state that they are certain that the Corporal who shot them on the night in question, is the same Corporal who had visited their farm at about 17.30 hours on the 27th June, 1944, shortly after he had left GUILBERTO MINUNIER's farm.

Mdk. ERIC HAZ was arrested by me on suspicion of having committed the crime and placed in close arrest on a 'holding charge'. He denied having anything to do with the crime, with the defense that as he was N.C.O. 1/c Guard on the night in question, in his Platoon area (situated approx 800 yards from scene of crime), he did not leave the camp that night.

However I found him to have a Thompson sub-machine gun (No. 1169504.) on his charge. I examined this weapon and found the barrel-muzzle to be jagged with a piece of flannel. The weapon had been cleaned and oiled, each Platoon of the unit holding its own arms inspection almost daily. The weapon in question had been inspected on the morning of the 28th June, 1944.

I further learned that Mdk. ERIC HAZ should be in possession of 200 rounds of .45 ammunition for the

On examining the cartridge cases, I found six of them to be of the new type of ammunition now in use, i.e. lead-coloured cases, but two of the cases were of the old type, i.e. brass cases. I also found six bullet holes in the walls of the bed-room, in groups of two and singly.

As a result of further enquiries an identification parade was held of all Sailors (Qals) in the 21st Indian Infantry Bn., at 26.00 hours on the 28th June, 1944. On this parade a civilian witness, GURJIT SINGH, identified No. 11625 Malik. SER 142, "Y" Coy., 1/15th AVIATION BATT., 8th Indian Div., as being the Indian Corporal who had visited his farm (situated approx. 40 yards from scene of crime) at about 17.00 hours on the 27th June, 1944.

This Corporal's description and dress fitted the description of the Corporal alleged to have done the shooting, and the wounded persons state that they are certain that the Corporal who shot them on the night in question, is the same Corporal who had visited their farm at about 17.30 hours on the 27th June, 1944, shortly after he had left GURJIT SINGH's farm.

Malik, SER 142 was arrested by me on suspicion of having committed the crime and placed in close arrest on a 'holding charge'. He denied having anything to do with the crime, with the defence that as he was H.O.O. 1/c Guard on the night in question, in his Platoon area (situated approx. 800 yards from scene of crime), he did not leave the camp that night.

However I found him to have a Thompson sub-machine gun (No. 116234) on his charge. I examined this weapon and found the barrel-muzzle to be plugged with a piece of flannel. The weapon had been cleaned and oiled, each Platoon of the unit holding its own arms inspection almost daily. The weapon in question had been inspected on the morning of the 28th June, 1944.

I further learned that Malik, SER 142 should be in possession of a full complement of 200 rounds of .45 ammunition for the weapon (battle scale). SER 142 had been in the firing line on the night of the 26th June, 1944, (night before crime), but had no occasion to fire a single shot.

Therefore I examined his ammunition. I found him to be in possession of 10 box type T.S.M.O., magazines, each sealed to hold 20 rounds of ammunition. These ten magazines were emptied by me. I found 18 rounds in some magazines and 19 in others. I counted the rounds and found them to total 186. SER 142 was not in possession of any other T.S.M.O. ammunition.

A point of interest arising at this stage, is that among SER 142's 186 rounds of .45 ammunition, 186 rounds are of the new type, i.e. lead coloured cartridge cases, and 2 rounds are of the old type, i.e. brass cases, and further that the lot markings on the base of these two rounds are identical to the two discharged brass cases found by me at the scene of the crime.

In view of this and with the permission of Mr. Gal. R. N. Neo NAMPA, C.O. 3/15th PHILADELPHIA, I took possession of the T.S.M.S., No. 116004, and all ammunition on charge to Mr. Neo NAMPA, with the object of arranging a ballistic examination by competent experts, of the weapon, together with ammunition, and bullet extracted from the body of CHANDRI ZALIA, to compare and ascertain whether this bullet and others found at the scene of the crime were fired through the T.S.M.S., possessed by Mr. Neo NAMPA.

As the weight of evidence against the accused up to the present is chiefly of a circumstantial nature, a successful ballistic test will strengthen the case on additional evidence or even conclusive evidence, therefore the result of the test is awaited with interest.

The following exhibits were forwarded for ballistic examination on the 14th July, 1944:-

1. One .45 Bullet. (found in body of CHANDRI ZALIA).

Report

On the 27th June 44, a request was received from the A.P.M. 43 Corps, for two cases of murder which had occurred in an area occupied by South African Forces to be investigated. Sgt MORRIS and Sgt. VIKERS were instructed to conduct the enquiries.

Both cases proved to be of a very sad nature. The full wing being the brief facts in each case:-

1st Case.

Double murder and an attempted murder, investigated by Sgt. MORRIS. On the 25th June 44 at 0830 hours, as a result of shots being heard, three persons were immediately found suffering from bullet wounds. One male and two females. On arrival of a civilian doctor, life was pronounced extinct in the case of one of the females. The male person died whilst being conveyed to the Civil Hospital, CAPE TOWN. An undamaged .38 bullet referred to as exhibit 'A', a damaged .38 bullet referred to as exhibit 'B' and five .38 empty cartridge cases referred to as exhibit 'C' were found at the scene of the crime. Extensive enquiries in this case resulted in the arrest of a soldier on the 4th July 44. The case has now proved to be very strong and the accused has admitted being responsible. He was found to be in possession of a .38 pistol which was impounded and is referred to as exhibit 'D'.

2nd Case.

Triple murder investigated by Sgt. VIKERS. One male and two females, the sole occupants of an isolated farmhouse were found to have been murdered on 25th June 44. A Post Mortem on the bodies was held on the 26th June 44, which revealed that death in all cases had occurred three or four days previously and were due to .38 bullet wounds. In this case two slightly damaged bullet .38 cal. were found at the scene of the crime. These are referred to as exhibits 'E' and 'F'. Extensive enquiries were carried out in this case, but without success.

On the 27th June 44, a request was received from the A.Z.M. 13 Corps, for two cases of murder which had occurred in an area occupied by South African Forces to be investigated. Sgt MORRIS and Sgt. VICKERS were instructed to conduct the enquiries.

Both cases proved to be of a very serious nature. The following being the brief facts in each case:-

1st Case.

Double murder and an attempted murder, investigated by Sgt. MORRIS. On the 25th June 44 at 0230 hours, as a result of shots being heard, three persons were immediately found suffering from bullet wounds. One male and two females. On arrival of a civilian doctor, life was pronounced extinct in the case of one of the females. The male person died whilst being conveyed to the Civil Hospital, MONTRO. An undamaged .38 bullet referred to as exhibit 'A', a damaged .38 bullet referred to as exhibit 'B' and five .38 empty cartridge cases referred to as exhibit 'C' were found at the scene of the crime. Extensive enquiries in this case resulted in the arrest of a soldier on the 4th July 44. This case has now proved to be very strong and the accused has admitted being responsible. He was found to be in possession of a .38 pistol which was lap unded and is referred to as exhibit 'D'.

2nd Case.

Triple murder investigated by Sgt. VICKERS. One male and two females, the sole occupants of an isolated farmhouse were found to have been murdered on 25th June 44. A Post Mortem on the bodies was held on the 26th June 44, which revealed that death in all cases had occurred three or four days previously and were due to .38 bullet wounds. In this case two slightly damaged bullet .38 cal. were found at the scene of the crime. These are referred to as exhibits 'E' and 'F'. Extensive enquiries were carried out in this case, but without success.

As the two cases were identical in many factors, the accused in the first case was examined in respect of the latter, but he denied all knowledge of same.

The following are the reasons why the accused is suspected of both crimes:-

It is known that the accused is a good shot with a pistol. In the first case six shots hit and penetrated the two deceased and injured persons, whilst in the second case four shots hit and penetrated the three deceased persons. Two persons in each case died as a result of bullet wounds in the head. This would indicate that the person responsible for both crimes was a good shot, unless the wounds were fired at a very short distance. Medical evidence has not established the distance the bullets were fired.

SHEET TWO.

In both cases the crimes were committed at isolated farmhouses, both being within a reasonable distance of the accused's Unit.

On the 25th June, date of the first case, the accused was absent from his Unit. It is also known that the accused was absent from his Unit from early morning to late in the evening on the 23rd June 44. In the latter case medical evidence states that death occurred three or four days previous to the 26th June. It is known that the deceased family were alive at 1500 hours on the 22nd June 44. In view of this there is every possibility that the accused also committed this crime when absent from his Unit on the 23rd June.

The object in submitting the exhibits for a ballistic examination is:-

- a. To prove or disprove that the accused was responsible for the second case, i.e. whether the bullets marked 'E' and 'F' were fired from the pistol marked 'D'.
- b. To further strengthen the first case in proving that the exhibits 'A', 'B' and 'C' were fired from the pistol marked 'D'.
