SUBJECT : Sicilian Public Opinion.
TO : Chief of Staff, Q. and I.
Copies to Chief Political Officer, A.G.C.,
Brindisi.

1. There are indications that Public Opinion in Sicily is tending to find expression through the various Political Groups which exist. These views are in general moderate in character and should give no cause for Allied anxiety. The main parties have already issued manifestos calling upon the people to remain calm and to assist the allied war effort.

2. The Separationists are a party of special significance since they are anxious for an independent Sicily largely for the gratification of their personal interests. There are definite signs however that this party has already lost the support of its rank and file.

3. At the present time Sicilian public opinion is very much concerned with the possibility of the handing over of the administration of this island to the Italian Government. This is viewed with some concern by the Sicilians and it is anticipated that no individual Italian Commissioner could be found who would command anything approaching a substantial degree of loyalty from the Sicilians. It is however considered desirable that such a Commissioner should not be Sicilian since he would be even more unpopular.

4. The King of Italy and Marshall Bedoglio command no respect in Sicily and beyond doubt the handing over of the island to their representatives will create a situation which might have very serious consequences unless it is very firmly reinforced by Allied support.

5. It is important that the Sicilians should appreciate that the handing over of Sicily does not mean that the ~~Allied~~ ^{British} Administration is no longer concerned with their interests.

6. One persistent rumor which is firmly entrenched in public opinion is that the British Empire will extend its post war control over Sicily as the "Key to the Mediterranean". Such a suggestion is generally vigorously opposed, but at the same time a minority is strongly in favor, particularly on account of the consequent separation from Italy.

The general effect of this imagination has been to weaken the regard for Great Britain and for British personnel.

7. There is no doubt that the critical period immediately consequent upon the handing over of Sicily will be one which will need the closest attention and firmness.

SUBJECT : Resolution of the Comunal Giunta regarding food distribution.

(The Comunal Council)

Taking into account: The system put into effect by the Comunal Administration which was to avoid fraud and embezzlement in the distribution of flour to the bakeries and bread to the people, has failed to provide the people regularly because:

1. Since the 1st of November when the Comune took over the distribution, only about 1,000 quintals of domestic flour, that is less than a 2 days requirement, in 25 days was supplied.

2. The Allied-furnished flour, which alone made the small ration to the people possible, was delivered with delay by the intermediary offices and in such a manner as to compromise the good functioning of the service.

3. No explanation about these delays and no information, as to even the limited supply of Sicilian grain, was given by said organization. Therefore - the result was:

(a) The Communal Administration could not warn ~~the~~ the people of distribution delays or give advice to ease the sacrifice.

(b). The published regulations concerning days of distribution and amount of ration could not be enforced.

(c). The facts observed by the people have appeared in ridiculous contrast to the regulations published by the press.

The foregoing has caused a well founded discontent and a misunderstanding of the sacrifices which the necessities of the situation have imposed on them.

Likewise in the distribution of other products, regulations contradictory to those of this Communal Administration, were issued, making a normal food distribution difficult and sometimes impossible.

The facts then complained of above demonstrate the inadvisability of the co-existence of several offices to each of which is assigned in-part the provision and distribution to the consumers of food products.

RESOLVES

That there be taken under consideration the urgent necessity for abolishing the provincial offices to which at the present time the provision of food products is entrusted.

La Giunta Comunale constatando:

Che il sistema di distribuzione della farina ai forni e del pane ai Cittadini ideato ed attuato dall'Amministrazione Comunale si è rivelato il solo idoneo ad evitare le frodi e le dispersioni, ma che di fatto non si è potuta raggiungere la regolarità del servizio e tanto meno il reale approvvigionamento della popolazione per i seguenti motivi:

I) perchè dal 1° novembre, cioè dal momento in cui il servizio di distribuzione è stato devoluto al Comune, non sono stati forniti, in 25 giorni, che 1000 Quintali circa di farina nostrale, cioè meno del fabbisogno di due soli giorni.

2) Perchè gli stessi quantitativi di farina forniti dagli Alleati, cioè i soli che hanno permesso di distribuire una scarsa razione di pane ai Cittadini, sono stati consegnati dagli Uffici intermedi quasi sempre con ritardo e in modo tale da compromettere il buon andamento del servizio, determinando, fra l'altro, gravi ritardi nella panificazione e quindi nella distribuzione del pane.

3) Perchè in conseguenza dei su lamentati inconvenienti e del fatto che gli stessi Organi non hanno nemmeno curato di dare all'Amministrazione Comunale alcuna fondata informazione circa la possibilità di approvvigionamento della Città, sia pure limitatamente al grano siciliano, nè sui previsti ritardi nella consegna delle farine fornite dagli Alleati, è avvenuto :

a) che l'Amministrazione Comunale non ha potuto tempestivamente avvertire la Cittadinanza dei ritardi di distribuzione, nè di disposizioni che comportavano per questa sacrifici e disagi;

b) che non è stato possibile far rispettare le disposizioni pubblicate in precedenza circa i giorni di distribuzione del pane e l'ammontare della razione;

c) che i fatti constatati dalla Cittadinanza sono risultati spesso in doloroso contrasto con le disposizioni in precedenza enunciate e pubblicate dalla Stampa.

Constatando che tutto ciò ha determinato nella popolazione di questa Città

tà un malcontento ben fondato e l'incomprensione, talvolta, dei sacerdoti che le necessità contingenti le hanno imposto.

Constatando altresì che anche nel servizio di distribuzione di altre derrate sono stati emessi talvolta provvedimenti contrastanti con quelli di questa Amministrazione Comunale e tali da rendere difficile e talvolta impossibile il normale servizio annonario.

Considerando, infine, che i fatti sopra lamentati costituiscono una dimostrazione della inopportunità della coesistenza di più uffici fra i quali è ripartito l'approvvigionamento e la distribuzione ai consumatori delle derrate alimentari.

1. There are indications that Public Opinion in Sicily is tending to find expression through the various Political Groups which now exist. These views are in general, moderate in character and need give no cause for anxiety. The main parties have already issued manifestos calling upon the people to remain calm and to assist the Allied war effort.

2. The Separationists are a party of special significance since they are anxious for an independent Sicily largely for the gratification of their personal interests. There are definite signs however that this party has already lost popular support.

3. At the present time Sicilian public opinion is very much concerned with the possibility of the handing over of the administration of this island to the Italian Government. This is viewed with some concern by the Sicilians and it is anticipated that no individual Italian as Sicilian Commissioner could be found who would command a substantial degree of loyalty from the Sicilians.

4. The King of Italy and Marshall Badoglio are shown little respect in Sicily and beyond doubt the handing over of the island to their representatives will create a situation which might have very serious consequences unless it is very firmly reinforced by Allied support.

5. It is important that the Sicilians should appreciate that the handing over of Sicily means neither that the Allied Administration is no longer concerned with their interests nor that they are being left entirely to their own resources. 333?

6. One persistent rumor which is entrenched in public opinion is that the British Empire will extend its post-war control over Sicily as the "Key to the Mediterranean". Such a suggestion is generally vigorously opposed by Sicilians, but at the same time a minority is strongly in favor, particularly on account of the personal advantages to themselves consequent upon such separation from Italy.

7. There is no doubt that the critical period immediately consequent upon the handing over of Sicily will be one which will need the closest attention and firmness.
