PART I

INTRODUCTION

1. This directive is applicable to all arrests, detentions and disposals of persons, effected by United States and British CI/I (b) agencies. No other non-Italian agency may carry out arrests for security reasons in ITALY, even of their own nationals, except the Polish Security authorities who, within areas occupied by their troops, may arrest persons considered a danger to the security of the personnel or installations. (For essential co-operation with Italian Police authorities see paragraph 4, Part IV).

2. Previous Allied Force Headquarters instructions governing security arrests, with the exception of those parts of instructions applicable to the arrests of Prisoners of War and War Criminals or the guarding, segregation, administration, documentation and welfare of military or civil internees, are superseded and hereby cancelled. CI/I(b) instructions issued by Formations or Districts now defunct are invalid, being automatically superseded by those issued by the relative Formation or District accepting hand-over.

3. Appropriate modifications should be made to this directive by subordinate Districts or Formations for territory within Allied Military Government jurisdiction or territory declared a Military Zone under the terms of current Operational Instructions.

PART II.

CLASSIFICATION OF ARRESTABLE PERSONS

The classifications of persons who should normally be arrested are:

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Ltr, AFHQ, file AG 371.2 GBI-O, dtd 6 Dec 46 (Cont'd)

1. GENERAL CLASSIFICATION.

- a. Any person who appears to constitute a threat to the security of the Allied Armed Forces or Allied Military Government. (For special consideration see part III).
- b. Any non-Italian national, who, while acting as an agent of the NSDAP or Nazi Government, has held in German occupied territory a rank or appointment of equal status with any of those listed as specific classifications of arrestable persons. (For specific classifications see paragraphs 2 and 7 of Part II).
- c. War Criminals. (For special procedure see paragraph 7, part IV).

2. THE GERMAN INTELLIGENCE SERVICES.

- a. All personnel of Amt (Departments) I, II, III, IV, VI Militarischesamt (formerly Abwehr) and VII of the Reichssicherheitschauptamt (RSHA, or National Department of Security), together with the outstations and organizations dependent on or controlled by any of these departments.

(NOTE: "All personnel" is not intended to include typists, messengers, chauffeurs, charwomen, V leute, etc., though these are liable to be important sources of information and should be exploited as such).

- b. All personnel of the Geheime Feldpolizei (GFP, or Secret Field Police).
- c. All personnel of the Reichssicherheitsdienst (Reich Security Service).

3. THE SICHERHEITSPOLIZEI (Sipo, or Security Police)

- a. All personnel of the Geheime Staatspolizei (Gestapo, or Secret State Police, including the Grenzpolizei (Grepo, or Frontier Police)).
- b. All officials down to and including the rank of Regierungs and Kriminaldirektor, or their equivalent, in the Kriminalpolizei (Kripo, Criminal Police).

4. HIGHER POLICE OFFICIALS.

- a. All Government officials in the Police Hierarchy, down to and including Regierungs and Kriminaldirektoren.
- b. All Polizeipräsidenten in Polizeidirektoren.
- c. All Oberpräsidenten in Prussia.
- d. All Regierungspräsidenten.

- c. All Landrate.
- f. All Hohere SS and Polizeiführer.
- g. All Befehlshaber der Ordnungspolizei.
- h. All Befehlshaber der Sicherheitspolizei.

5. THE ORDNUNGSPOLIZEI (Orpo, or Regular Uniformed Police)

All officers down to and including the rank of Oberst (Colonel) or equivalent in these branches:

- a. Schutzpolizei (Schupo, or Protection Police).
- b. Feuerschutzpolizei (F Schupo, or Fire Protection Police).
- c. Gendarmerie (Gen, or Rural Police).
- d. Wasserschutzpolizei (SW, or Waterways Protection Police).
- e. Luftschutzpolizei (L Schupo, or Air Raid Protection Police).
- f. Technische Nothilfe (Teno, or Technical Emergency Corps).
- g. Verwaltungspolizei (Administrative Police).

6. PARA MILITARY ORGANIZATIONS

a. Waffen SS (Armed SS) - All Officers and NCO's down to and including the rank of Scharführer and all ranks of the Totenkopfverbände (TV, or Death's Head Formations).

b. Allgemeine SS (General SS) - All Officers and NCO's (except those who claim only nominal rank by reason of their being in the Orpo or Kirpo, and not to have taken any active part in SS work), down to and including the rank of Unterscharführer.

c. Sturmabteilung (SA, or Storm Troops) - All Officers down to and including the rank of Sturmbannführer.

d. Hitler Jugend (HJ, or Hitler Youth) - All leaders (Führer) to and including the rank of Gefolgenschaftsführer, and all personnel of the HJ Streifendienst.

e. Nationalsozialistisches Kraftfahrkorps (NSKK, or National Socialist Motor Corps) - All Officers down to and including the rank of Staffelführer.

f. Nationalsozialistisches Fliegerkorps (NSFK, or National Socialist Aviation Corps) - All Officers down to and including the rank of Sturmbannführer.

g. Reichsarbeitsdienst (RAD, or Compulsory National Labor Service) - All Officers down to and including the rank of Arbeitsführer.

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Ltr, AFHQ, file AG 371.2 GBI-O, dtd 6 Dec 46 (Cont'd)

7. NAZI PARTY OFFICIALS.

a. All administrative officials of the Party down to Kreis level and all Ortsgruppenleiter.

b. All members of the Party down to and including the rank of Abschnittsleiter.

c. Nazi Party officials of Italian Nationality who hold office in the S. TIROL will not be regarded as being in a compulsory arrest category.

8. PRISONERS OF WAR, SURRENDERED ENEMY PERSONNEL.

a. All Prisoners of War listed in the U.N.W.C.C. Lists.

b. All General Officers and other officers down to and including Divisional Commanders and equivalent officers in other services.

c. All General Staff officers of Army, Navy and Air Force and officers seconded to the General Staff after passing through a staff course.

d. All other officers of rank of Lieutenant Colonel and above and equivalent in other services.

(NOTE: All recalcitrant PW at present in custody will be reclassified in accordance with this directive. Those who are not recalcitrant (in arrest categories) within the meaning of this directive will be reclassified as normal PW/SEP. This reclassification will apply to ALL nationalities.)

PART III.SPECIAL CONSIDERATIONS1. GERMAN AND AUSTRIAN NATIONALS.

German and Austrian nationals should not be arrested merely on the grounds of their nationality, but only if they are considered to be a threat to Allied Security or fall within one of the classifications of arrestable persons.

2. DISCHARGED AND DISCHARGED PERSONNEL OF THE FASCIST REPUBLICAN ARMED FORCES.

Italian members of the Fascist Republican Armed forces who are able to prove that, either by dismissal or desertion, they had ceased to serve the enemy armed forces at the time when they were overrun by the Allies will only be arrested if they are considered to be a danger to security or fall within one of the classifications of arrestable persons. If arrested they are accorded PW status.

3. FASCIST AND FASCIST SYNPATIZERS.

Italian nationals of Fascist sympathies or background fall within the jurisdiction of the Italian coperation authorities and should therefore be dealt with by them unless they present a threat to the security of the Allied Armed Forces.

4. ANTI-ALLIED PROPAGANDA.

The reasonable expression of anti-Allied sentiment by Italians within the bounds of free speech now accorded to the Italian people should not be accepted categorically as a threat to the security of the Allied Armed Forces. Cases of persistent propaganda should normally be referred to Allied Force Headquarters for consideration before arrest is made.

5. PUBLIC DISORDERS, DEMONSTRATIONS, etc.

In the event of a public disorder constituting a threat to the security of the Allied Armed Forces, the case should be handled in accordance with extant policy expressed in separate operational instructions.

PART IV CATEGORIES OF ARREST, DOCUMENTATION PROCEDURE, etc.

1. The three categories of security arrests are:

- a. Category A for trial by Allied Military Government (applicable only to persons arrested in territory under the jurisdiction of Allied Military Government).
- b. Category B for internment by the Allies.
- c. Category C for temporary detention while investigations are proceeding.

2. Documentation required by Allied Force Headquarters for each category of arrest is:

- a. For Category A arrests NO reports are required other than the usual analysis of arrests given in routine security summaries.
- b. For Category B arrests the proforma AFIB/1 (specimen at Appendix A) is required.
- c. For Category C arrests NO reports are required unless detention exceeds a period of 14 days. As soon as possible after the 14th day notification is required of these particulars:

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Category of Arrest, Name, Christian names and paternity, home address (including province or gau), date of original detention, designation of present prison or other detention center where held, District/Formation responsible for arrest.

If, after such notification, a detained person is arbitrarily released or transferred to another detention center, Allied Force Headquarters must be informed accordingly.

The proforma AFIB/1 must only be used for civilians in Category B and NOT for Prisoners of War, Surrendered Enemy Armed Forces or civilians in Categories A or C.

3. No committal to an approved civilian internee camp may take place without the authority of Allied Force Headquarters. This authority must always be quoted on the relative committal proforma (AFIB/1).

4. Except in special circumstances, arrests should be made with the close co-operation of the Italian police in such a manner that in the event of the arrested person being transferred to Italian jurisdiction, acquittal would not be caused by incorrect arrest procedure or failure to present essential evidence connected with the arrest.

5. An arrested person should be given the opportunity to pack essential personal effects such as clothes, washing kits, etc. These effects should be checked before departure to insure that there are not included any arms or instruments of escape.

6. Money and valuables will NOT be taken from an arrested person unless considered necessary in the interest of security or unless special instructions have been given. In all such cases the owner must be given a detailed receipt, a copy of which will be sent to Allied Force Headquarters.

7. War Criminals arrested by FSS (British) should be transferred as soon as possible to the custody of SIB (War Crimes).

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

In view of conflicting instructions previously issued, directive, this headquarters, file and subject as above, dated 13 August 1946, is cancelled. The policy and procedure that will become effective forthwith are:

PART I

INTRODUCTION

1. This directive is applicable to all arrests, detentions and disposals of persons, effected by United States and British CI/I (b) agencies. No other non-Italian agency may carry out arrests for security reasons in ITALY, even of their own nationals, except the Police Security authorities who, within areas occupied by their troops, may arrest persons considered a danger to the security of the personnel or installations. (For essential co-operation with Italian Police authorities see paragraph 4, Part IV).

2. Previous Allied Force Headquarters instructions governing security arrests, with the exception of those parts of instructions 30 J 51 applicable to the arrests of Prisoners of War and War Criminals or the guarding, segregation, administration, documentation and welfare of military or civil internees, are superseded and hereby cancelled. CI/I(b) Instructions issued by Formations or Districts now defunct are invalid, being automatically superseded by those issued by the relative Formation or District accepting hand-over.

3. Appropriate modifications should be made to this directive by subordinate Districts or Formations for territory within Allied Military Government jurisdiction or territory declared a Military Zone under the terms of current Operational Instructions.

PART II.

CLASSIFICATION OF ARRESTABLE PERSONS

The classifications of persons who should normally be arrested are:

c. All General Staff officers of Army, Navy and Air Force and officers seconded to the General Staff after passing through a staff course.

d. All other officers of rank of Lieutenant Colonel and above and equivalent in other services.

(NOTE: All recalcitrant PW at present in custody will be reclassified in accordance with this directive. Those who are not recalcitrant (in arrest categories) within the meaning of this directive will be reclassified as normal PW/SEP. This reclassification will apply to ALL nationalities.)

PART III.SPECIAL CONSIDERATIONS1. GERMAN AND AUSTRIAN NATIONALS.

German and Austrian nationals should not be arrested merely on the grounds of their nationality, but only if they are considered to be a threat to Allied Security or fall within one of the classifications of arrestable persons.

2. DISMISSED AND DISCHARGED PERSONNEL OF THE FASCIST REPUBLICAN ARMED FORCES.

Italian members of the Fascist Republican Armed forces who are able to prove that, either by dismissal or desertion, they had ceased to serve the enemy armed forces at the time when they were overrun by the Allies will only be arrested if they are considered to be a danger to security or fall within one of the classifications of arrestable persons. If arrested they are accorded PW status.

3. FASCIST AND FASCIST SYNPATIZERS.

Italian nationals of Fascist sympathies or background fall within the jurisdiction of the Italian operation authorities and should therefore be dealt with by them unless they present a threat to the security of the Allied Armed Forces.



b. For Category B arrests the proforma AFIB/1 (specimen at Appendix A) is required.

c. For Category C arrests NO reports are required unless detention exceeds a period of 14 days. As soon as possible after the 14th day notification is required of these particulars:

Category of Arrest, Name, Christian names and paternity, home address (including province or gau), date of original detention, designation of present prison or other detention center where held, District/Formition responsible for arrest.

If, after such notification, a detained person is arbitrarily released or transferred to another detention center, Allied Force Headquarters must be informed accordingly.

The proforma AFIB/1 must only be used for civilians in Category B and NOT for Prisoners of War, Surrendered Enemy Armed Forces or civilians in Categories A or C.



Except in special circumstances, arrests should be made with the close co-operation of the Italian police in such a manner that in the event of the arrested person being transferred to Italian jurisdiction, acquittal would not be caused by incorrect arrest procedure or failure to present essential evidence connected with the arrest.

5. An arrested person should be given the opportunity to pack essential personal effects such as clothes, washing kits, etc. These effects should be checked before departure to insure that there are not included any arms or instruments of escape.

6. Money and valuables will NOT be taken from an arrested person unless considered necessary in the interest of security or unless special instructions have been given. In all such cases the owner must be given a detailed receipt, a copy of which will be sent to Allied Force Headquarters.

7. War Criminals arrested by FSS (British) should be transferred as soon as possible to the custody of STB (War Crimes).

Directive, this headquarters, file as above, dated 13 March 1946, and amendments thereto dated 19 March 1946 and 17 June 1946, are cancelled. The policy and procedure that will become effective forthwith are:

PART I.**INTRODUCTION**

1. This directive is applicable to all arrests, detentions and disposals of persons, effected by United States and British CI/I(b) agencies. No other non-Italian agency may carry out arrests for security reasons in ITALY, even of their own nationals, except the Polish Security authorities who, within areas occupied by their troops, may arrest persons considered a danger to the security of their personnel or installations. (For essential co-operation with Italian Police authorities see paragraph 4, Part IV).

2. Previous Allied Force Headquarters instructions governing security arrests, with the exception of those parts of instructions applicable to the arrests of Prisoners of War and War Criminals or the guarding, segregation, administration, documentation and welfare of military or civil internees, are superseded and hereby cancelled. CI/I(b) instructions issued by Formations or Districts now defunct are invalid, being automatically superseded by those issued by the relative Formation or District accepting hand-over.

3. Appropriate modifications should be made to this directive by subordinate Districts or Formations for territory within Allied Military Government jurisdiction or territory declared a Military Zone under the terms of current Operational Instructions.

PART II.**CLASSIFICATION OF ARRESTABLE PERSONS**

The classifications of persons who should normally be arrested are:

(For specific classifications see paragraphs 2 and 7 of Part II).
- c. War Criminals. (For special procedure see paragraph 7, part IV).

2. THE GERMAN INTELLIGENCE SERVICES.

- a. All personnel of Amter (Departments) I, II, III, IV, VI Militarischesamt (formerly Abwehr) and VII of the Reichssicherheitschauptamt (RSHA, or National Department of Security), together with the outstations and organizations dependent on or controlled by any of these departments.

(NOTE: "All personnel" is not intended to include typists, messengers, chauffeurs, charwomen, V leute, etc., though these are liable to be important sources of information and should be exploited as such).

- b. All personnel of the Geheime Feldpolizei (GFP, or Secret Field Police).
- c. All personnel of the Reichssicherheitsdienst (Reich Security Service).

3. THE SICHERHEITSPOLIZEI (Sipo, or Security Police)

- a. All personnel of the Geheime Staatspolizei (Gestapo, or Secret State Police, including the Grenzpolizei (Grepo, or Frontier Police)).
- b. All officials down to and including the rank of Regierungs and Kriminaldirektor, or their equivalent, in the Kriminalpolizei (Kripo, Criminal Police).

4. HIGHER POLICE OFFICIALS.

- a. All Government officials in the Police Hierarchy, down to and including Regierungs and Kriminaldirekteron.
- b. All Polizeipräsidenten in Polizeidirekteron.
- c. All Oberpräsidenten in Prussia.
- d. All Regierungspräsidenten.

- f. Technische Nothilfe (Teno, or Technical Emergency Corps).
- g. Verwaltungspolizei (Administrative Police).

6. PARA MILITARY ORGANIZATIONS.

a. Waffen SS (Armed SS) - All Officers and NCO's down to and including the rank of Scharführer and all ranks of the Totenkopfverbände (TV, or Death's Head Formations).

b. Allgemeine SS (General SS) - All Officers and NCO's (except those who claim only nominal rank by reason of their being in the Orpo or Kirpo, and not to have taken any active part in SS work), down to and including the rank of Unterscharführer.

c. Sturmabteilung (SA, or Storm Troops) - All Officers down to ~~06052~~ including the rank of Sturmbannführer.

d. Hitler Jugend (HJ, or Hitler Youth) - All leaders (Führer) to and including the rank of Gefolgschaftsführer, and all personnel of the HJ Streifendienst.

e. Nationalsozialistisches Kraftfahrkorps (NSKK, or National Socialist Motor Corps) - All Officers down to and including the rank of Staffelführer.

f. Nationalsozialistisches Fliegorkorps (NSFK, or National Socialist Aviation Corps) - All Officers down to and including the rank of Sturmbannführer.

g. Reichsarbeitsdienst (RAD, or Compulsory National Labor Service) - All Officers down to and including the rank of Arbeitsführer.

c. Nazi Party officials of Italian Nationality who hold office in the S. TIROL will not be regarded as being in a compulsory arrest category.

8. PRISONERS OF WAR, SURRENDERED ENEMY PERSONNEL.

a. All Prisoners of War listed in the U.N.W.C.C. Lists.

b. All General Officers and other officers down to and including Divisional Commanders and equivalent officers in other services.

c. All General Staff officers of Army, Navy and Air Force and officers seconded to the General Staff after passing through a staff course.

d. All other officers of rank of Lieutenant Colonel and above and equivalent in other services.

(NOTE: All recalcitrant PW at present in custody will be reclassified in accordance with this directive. Those who are not recalcitrant (in arrest categories) within the meaning of this directive will be reclassified as normal PW/SEP. This reclassification will apply to ALL nationalities.)

SPECIAL CONSIDERATIONS

PART III.

1. GERMAN AND AUSTRIAN NATIONALS.

German and Austrian nationals should not be arrested merely on the grounds of their nationality, but only if they are considered to be a threat to Allied Security or fall within one of the classifications of arrestable persons.

2. DESERTERS AND DISCHARGED PERSONNEL OF THE FASCIST REPUBLICAN ARMED FORCES.

Italian members of the Fascist Republican Armed Forces who are able to prove that, either by dismissal or desertion, they had ceased to serve the enemy armed forces at the time when they were overrun by the Allies will only be arrested if they are considered to be a danger to security or fall within one of the classifications of arrestable persons. If arrested they are accorded PW status.

3. FASCIST AND FASCIST SYNPATIZERS.

Italian nationals of Fascist sympathy or background fall within the jurisdiction of the Italian operation authorities and should therefore be dealt with by them unless they present a threat to the security of the Allied Armed Forces.

4. ANTI-ALLIED PROPAGANDA.

Cases of persistent propaganda should normally be referred to Allied Force Headquarters for consideration before arrest is made.

5. PUBLIC DISORDERS, DEMONSTRATIONS, etc.

In the event of a public disorder constituting a threat to the security of the Allied Armed Forces, the case should be handled in accordance with extant policy expressed in separate operational instructions.

PART IV CATEGORIES OF ARREST, DOCUMENTATION PROCEDURE etc.**1. The three categories of security arrests are:**

- a. Category A for trial by Allied Military Government (applicable only to persons arrested in territory under the jurisdiction of Allied Military Government).
- b. Category B for internment by the Allies.
- c. Category C for temporary detention while investigations are proceeding.

2. Documentation required by Allied Force Headquarters for each category of arrest is:

- a. For Category A arrests NO reports are required other than the usual analysis of arrests given in routine security summaries.
- b. For Category B arrests the proforma AFIB/1 (specimen at Appendix A) is required.
- c. For Category C arrests NO reports are required unless detention exceeds a period of 14 days. As soon as possible after the 14th day notification is required of these particulars:

7. (h) Aliens.

The number of aliens coming into the territory is still increasing, during the month an increase of 230 over the preceding month. From 3582 to 3812, this is comprised of mostly Jugoslav and also a slight increase in Swiss (11 persons).

These figures of course only refer to registered aliens the true number is difficult to assess in view of the difficulty of controlling the Morgan Line. Police are constantly finding aliens illegally entering from zone "B".

Conduct of Allied Personnel.

Allied personnel have been on the whole well conducted, the usual number of cases of drunkenness has remained fairly constant in spite of a large increase in Allied Naval personnel in the city due to the visit of British and American cruisers. One Pro-Italian attack on Allied Personnel occurred during the month due to a growth of pro-National Italian feelings at the announcement of the proposed International zone of the territory. The response of troops to provocations was not on a large or serious scale, and the situation calmed down after two evening clashes.

The General strike can be described as a failure it was breaking down fast when it was "suspended".

21. Public morale.

Italian morale is very low due to the rumoured decision of the international boundary, it is thought that the Jugoslav elements are brought so close to the City of Trieste that trade will be impossible with an increase of kidnappings and terrorism. Pro-Jugoslav are also bitter over the recent Court decision acquitting the Civil Police of the Sarvola shootings. The Paris conference is still over shadowing the region.

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



2. a. It must be clearly understood that the safeguarding of information is the personal concern of all officers, warrant officers, and enlisted men and women of the Army of the United States. The procedure for the safeguarding of military information is set forth in AR 380-5. Commanding officers and section chiefs must insure that their personnel comply. This can be accomplished by education and example. Cases of negligence or misconduct must be dealt with by disciplinary action. (see Par. 5)

b. US Article of War 2 states that US civilians serving with the Army of the United States without the territorial jurisdiction of the United States in time of war are persons subject to military law. In addition many of them have officer status. It must be made clear to them by supervising military personnel that the responsibility of a U.S. civilian concerning classified information is the same as that of a soldier.

c. Commanding officers and section chiefs are also responsible for the actions of their non-citizen civilian employees. Upon receipt of this order, they will insure that the necessary screening of their civilian employees by security agencies has been accomplished or is in progress. Assuming that screening has provided a clearance, the responsible officer must also satisfy himself that the employee is truly trustworthy. In cases

o2 doubt, discharge is indicated.

In this connection, a civilian employee who violates our confidence by wrongfully revealing classified information may be considered dangerous enough to warrant interment proceedings or trial by military court. Any such cases must be referred to S-2, G-2, or A-2 for investigation.

3. News Releases.

a. Information coming from military and civilian personnel of the War Department must be cleared by the appropriate military agency. This headquarters has a Public Relations Officer, who is the only person authorized to deal with newspapers, military or civil. No other person will issue any official statements whatsoever to any reporter, agent, or agents of newspapers, magazines, or information gathering and disseminating organizations.

b. Assigned and attached organizations will utilize PRO or RAAC for news releases, unless the organization is itself an authorized news releasing agency.

4. Escaped Prisoners of War and Evaders of Capture.

a. Publication or communication to unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, interment in a neutral country or release from interment not only furnishes useful information to the enemy but jeopardizes future escapes, evasions, and releases. Although such information is "Secret", Military and civilian personnel under the War Department have made releases which appeared in the press and was broadcast on the radio.

b. In the Rome Area this type of information may largely concern the Vatican, a Neutral country, therefore, no information regarding Allied personnel who were in Vatican City before and during German occupation of Rome will be divulged except through official channels.

5. a. All cases of unauthorized disclosures of information by military or civilian personnel will be investigated by the commanding officers concerned, and necessary disciplinary action taken.





STATEMENT - After finishing school at Institute Luigi Rizzi, Bologna, left Aug. 25, 1943, worked about farm jobs, and other odd jobs; also acted intermittently as interpreter for the German Labor organization. While in Verona, bringing wood into the German military tank school, he saw 65 Panther Tanks (without belts for traction) used for instruction purposes. It was not intended to place upon CIC the duty of preparing the evidence in each case, but they would do the actual physical arrest upon presentation to them of the facts warranting the apprehension. In urgent cases any agency can arrest and report to CIC.

- Those people originally arrested by "S" Force and detained in Regina Coeli were held pending instructions from AMI or "S" Force as to their disposition, and any recommended for internment were evacuated through P.W. Channels to SFI P.D.W. Camp. All other persons detained were also to be investigated by SIC and recommendation as to their disposition.

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- Seventeen persons had been arrested by order of Brig. Gen. Rome in compliance from a directive from this HQ 313/106/08 dated 2 June 1944. This nominated certain classes of individuals and indicated how they should be treated e.g. arrested and retained for disposal by the Italian Government; dealt with as P.W. etc.

5. Most of the persons already arrested had been taken from a list of names of M.V.S.M. Personalities 1942 and no details concerning each man had been obtained. In some cases obvious injustices were apparent, and it was decided to withhold further arrests, whilst those already in custody were dealt with as in para 3 above.

6. To put into effect the order quoted in para 4, would involve the arrest and detainer of thousands of persons and the subsequent enquiries into each case would necessitate the employment of many times the staff that is at present available engaged in vital Military Security matters. There is also no accommodation to detain such large numbers and it is suggested that, unless an individual is a distinct threat to military security, this order should not apply to Rome Area pending the completion of a more detailed scheme to deal with their cases in conjunction with Italian Government.

FASCIST REPUBLICAN ARMY

7. Instructions were received from MAI that these persons were to be dealt with as P.O.W. and passed through normal P.O.W. channels.

Major DOTIL (S.I.M.) has a list of some 1,000 names and assistance was provided by the Questura and Carabinieri to apprehend. By 30 June 137 arrests of this nature were effected.

GERMAN MILITARY PERSONNEL

8. Certain items of information respecting the above have been received and passed on to G-2, Rome Area Command for apprehension. In addition CIC have arrested about 30 such individuals incident to their other enquiries.

GERMAN AND ALIEN CIVILIAN PERSONNEL

9. All aliens were called upon to register at the Questura in the early days of the occupation. No policy as to arrest and internment had laid down beyond that of dealing with individuals on their merits from a security point of view. Extracted figures of interest are:

SCREENING OF INDIVIDUALS AND COMPANIES

10. Machinery has been established under Capt Harris 97 FSS for individuals and companies to be screened as to their suitability for contacts with the Allies. A circular has been sent to all Sub-Commissions inviting them to use Security Branch for ob-

training this information especially before contacts are placed with firms who might have a bad Fascist background. Already many hundreds of persons have been screened but to avoid overloading the machinery it is necessary to give priority to

- (1) distinct military or civil security threat
- (2) high Government officials, Prefects etc.

(3) other parastatal positions clerks typists etc, cannot be screened unless there is some definite reason for suspecting their loyalty.

BUILDING SECURITY MEASURES

II. These are in hand by Capt. Kearin HQ Commandant's office. A scheme has been worked out between this Branch and Capt. Kearin for permanent and temporary passes and is working satisfactorily.

SECURITY ARRESTS

12. At the moment 208 persons, of whom 29 are women, have been detained on Security Grounds, and their cases are being considered by G-2 Rome Area Command in conjunction with this office. Numerous other enquiries are in hand concerning future arrests.

DEFACCTIZATION

13. In Rome Region a scheme has been put into operation by the Regional Commissioner for the removal from office of Fascist personnel and many thousand Scheda Personale have been issued in this connection.

INDIVIDUAL ENQUIRIES

14. A great deal of information is received daily at this office concerning suspects, and enquiries are instituted on the information. Very close liaison is maintained with the other security organisations in this respect to avoid overlapping. This Branch can only deal with a limited number of important cases owing to the shortage of personnel.

COLONEL ROCKE

15. This man, a former officer in the Irish Guards, and a broadcaster from Italy before and after the War, was located in Perugia where he "welcomed" the Allies. On his return to Rome he was arrested and is at present detained pending completion of enquiries into the case. Directions will be sought as his disposal.

SABOTAGE AND ENEMY AGENTS

16. A sabotage organisation has been revealed by GTC, acting under Major Snowden. 14 men have been arrested and 3/4 ton of sabotage material has been recovered. Two additional arrests and the recovery of sabotage material buried some distance from Rome,

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have also been effected by this organisation before orders had been received by the suspects as to the tasks they were to left behind by the Germans have also been apprehended and await trial or imprisonment.

Sir,
On the 1st. July 1944 at about 1230hrs. I received a telephone message from Major R.A.Whitby A.P.M. Rome Area Command instructing me to warn all my patrols to keep a close watch on ROUTES 6 and 7 as it was suspected that an Italian Colonel travelling in a Fiat Car accompanied with Italian Army Colour and accompanied by two lorries came along with approx 0300hrs. in the direction of HOME. which had left Ayerse at approx 0300hrs. carrying stolen W.D. property. The vehicles it was believed were carrying stolen W.D. property.

Patrols were duly despatched to the above mentioned route.

At about 1630hrs. same day I received a telephone message from the Station Sergeant at PORTA MAGGIORE STATION saying that the Colonel in question was now held at his station.

I immediately left for Porta Maggiore accompanied by R.S.M. A.R. Graham where I saw Lt.Col. SCHIRRU and Col.GALPA of the Italian Army, who were seated in the above mentioned car.

I then questioned the car had been picked up by the patrols on ROUTE 7 but the lorries in question were not accompanying owing to a mechanical breakdown. As the lorries were yet to come in Capt.PARASI had been sent out with the patrol to identify the lorries and bring them into the station.

R.S.M. Graham returned to Porta Maggiore with Lt.Col.SCHIRRU and with instructions that all personnel would be held until MAJOR HARE gave other instructions.

At about 1950hrs. Major HARE arrived at the Porta Maggiore Station where he proceeded to take statements from COL.TAIKA, Lt.COL.SCHIRRU

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were situated in the above mentioned car.

Sgt. Farr Porta Maggiore Station then informed me that the car had been picked up by the patrols on ROUTE 7 but the lorries in question were not accompanying owing to a Mechanical breakdown. As the lorries were yet to come in Capt. PARASI had been sent out with the patrol to identify the lorries and bring them into the station.

I then questioned Lt.COL.SCHIRRU with the aid of an interpreter, he stated that he had no written authority to travel but had been given verbal authority by the Commander of NAPLES whose name he did not know. He then went on to say that he was accompanied by two other lorries which had broken down en route, I then asked him what the other lorries contained and he said "Officers Baggage".

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R.S.M. Graham returned to Porta Maggiore with Lt.COL.SCHIRRU and with instructions that all personnel would be held until MAJOR HARE gave other instructions.

At about 1950hrs. Major HARE arrived at the Porta Maggiore Station where he proceeded to take statements from COL.GALPA, Lt.COL.SCHIRRU and CAPT.PARASI.

After this MAJOR HARE gave orders for the lorry which by that time had arrived to be unloaded and the contents placed in the Station.

On the completion of all this MAJOR HARE then allowed all the personnel to proceed to their destination. Before they departed all personnel except Lt.COL.SCHIRRU were informed that they must report to the PORTA MAGGIORE STATION at 1000hrs. on the 2nd.July for the purpose of having their baggage searched.

Patrols remained out till 2300hrs. waiting for the second lorry but this did not appear.

On the 2nd.July at about 1000hrs. Col.GALPA, CAPT.PARASI and the other Italian personnel accompanied by CAPT.HENRY CPT S.ALPER of the AUS reported in readiness for the search.

At 1000hrs. Major Hare arrived and the search commenced, under his supervision. After about half an hour Major Hare requested me to continue with the search as he had to leave on urgent business.

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I continued with the search. I commenced to search the baggage of COL. GATPA and found large quantities of Allied Military cigarettes and foodstuffs.

On finding these goods Col. GATPA was asked by me with the aid of Capt. Alper interpreting where he obtained these goods and to what use he was putting them and he wrote a statement which is attached, in Capt. Alper's report and shows a list of the property.

Col. GATPA was then asked if he had any letters for friends and he produced 10 from a writing case and made a statement as shown on Capt. Alper's report.

Capt. PARASI'S and the other baggage was searched by Sgt. PARR but revealed no W.D. property or unauthorised goods.

The search having been completed personnel were allowed to proceed to their destinations. The latter instruction was issued by Major Hare.

Subject: General Security Report, 1-29 February 1944.

To: Brigadier General Staff (1), HQ. Allied Central Mediterranean Force.

I. GENERAL APPRECIATION OF MILITARY AND CIVIL SECURITY.

This period was characterized by a static condition on the Gustav Line, defensive operations at the beach-head and heavy movement of troops from one sector to another. These factors bore directly on the security picture.

Security personnel have been operating for so many weeks in the static southern front that most civilians dangerous to security have been removed. In addition, a situation has been created whereby any newcomers to the area, such as refugees from enemy-held territory or civilians moving northward across the Volturro-Olore control line are promptly spotted. A number of suspected enemy agents have consequently been apprehended immediately upon entering the area.

In the beach-head sector, a limited area and a tight front line have permitted security personnel to sift carefully all civilians, of whom a large number have been evacuated, and the remainder kept under close supervision.

The movement of troops in view of the rigid control of civilians has in itself been facilitated, and it is felt that this reshuffling of positions has been accomplished with a maximum amount of security.

II. PARTICULAR CASES AND INCIDENTS.**00012****1. Military Security.****a. Security of Information.**

Evacuation of civilians in the areas immediately adjacent to the front lines by corps has measurably improved the security of information, though at the same time the heavy movement of troops and reshuffling of units has led to much speculation both by military personnel and civilians. A substantial number of opinions are voiced as to the nature and date of renewed operations in the Cassino sector, and among civilians, there seems widespread the belief that the Allies may be in retreat. However, despite the prevalence of comment in many Allied and Italian quarters, the wide divergence of views indicates that there are no serious breaches in the security of information.

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A thorough check has been made of the prostitution in Gargia and
Maria C.V., and although the conditions were found to be highly dangerous
from the stand-point of health, no cases investigated indicated danger to
security.

b. Security of Material and Installations.

A survey has been made of the U.S. Army gasoline pipelines and installations running from the outskirts of Naples to the Rapido River. Very few breaks have occurred during the day because of tampering, but for the entire period about three breaks a week have been found. The greatest number occur at night, generally when there is a moon, and are caused by civilians obtaining gas. These acts of sabotage, or thefts constituting sabotage, are committed either by punching holes in the pipe, or more often by loosening the couplings of the pipe joints. In several instances after the line is broken, the gasoline has been set on fire, constituting definite sabotage. Due to the lack of guards, the guilty persons have escaped by the time the line-walker or repair party arrived, or apprehensions have been supported by insufficient evidence to prove conclusively that subject stole or intended to steal gasoline. A decided improvement in the situation is now expected as a result of the assignment of 175 Carabinieri to patrol the line from Naples to the Tora Railhead.

Although frequent cases of wire cutting are reported, investigations have led to the conclusion that in few instances is it a question of sabotage, the causes generally being breaks caused by vehicles or other comparable accidents. However, the cutting of the telephone lines running parallel to the gasoline pipe line indicates the possibility of sabotage, for sections as long as 100 feet have been removed, and in some instances the lines have been cut and the ends twisted together, effectively shorting the line in such a way that it has been difficult to trace the break by ordinary testing methods.

An investigation of a fire in a steel coach used as a bunk car by members of a Railway Operating Battalion revealed no sabotage. From an examination of other bunk cars in the railroad yards it was discovered that the occupants had salvaged old airplane wheels, and had used them as bases for their stoves. These wheels were duralumin, containing 80-90% magnesium, and are therefore highly inflammable. It is believed that heat from the stove ignited the oil-soaked floor of the coach in the first place, and that in turn set off the magnesium in the wheel, thus accounting for the peculiar white color and extreme heat of the blaze which had occasioned suspicion. The other wheels used as bases for stoves in bunk cars were removed, and it was recommended that the inflammable character of these wheels and similar duralumin parts of aircraft be noted, and their use in connection with heating units or in places where they are exposed to flame be discontinued.

During the night of 12-13 February 1944, suspected enemy activity by what appeared to be flares dropped from planes together with answering lights from the hills, was seen in an area along the Calore River south of

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3. Lorenzo Maggiore, Province of Benevento. A combined night and day investigation by GIC agents, SIS and Carabinieri, lasting for a period of over a week, and covering the entire area, was made. All police and military units in the area were alerted and informed, and control points at road blocks, bridges and ferries were instructed to examine carefully all persons passing these points. Civilians in widely separated vicinities, and also American military personnel, claimed to have seen the flares. What appeared to be the remains of a flare were discovered, but examination showed these to be parts of an American incendiary bomb. The fact that the night of 12-13 February was a bright moonlit night seems to obviate the possibility of flares for parachutists, and from all indications the lights which were seen were burning on the ground. The area contains few military installations of interest, and the country is hilly and sparsely inhabited.

Incidents have been reported to security personnel of the theft by civilians of military clothing and equipment. Any such cases, if apprehension is safe, are turned over to AMG for trial, and units are warned that such thefts are likely to occur as long as civilians are permitted to enter military installations.

4. Security of Access to Military Installations.

Security of access in forward areas has been satisfactory in view of the policy of removing civilians living in proximity to the front lines, and constant vigilance on the sea coast by units briefed by security personnel for possible landings of individuals has reduced this access to a minimum. In other areas pass systems have proved effective in maintaining control of movement in and out of military areas.

At the rear Fifth Army U.P. twelve persons were apprehended for misuse of passes. Of these, three Italians, Francesco Fornati, Vincenzo Santonastasio and Pasquale Feola, were arrested and tried by AMG. The three men, employees in a barber shop at the Royal Palace had exchanged passes issued to two of them to gain entry. Since in this case there was a deliberate conspiracy originated and carried out, it was deemed necessary to have charges placed against these men in an AMG court for violations of provisions of AMG Proclamation No. 2. Fornati and Santonastasio were sentenced to three months in prison, while Feola was freed.

5. Security of Personnel.

Investigation of an incident involving the firing of shots at American military personnel is proceeding. At 1700 hours on 24 February 1944, four shots were fired by unknown persons, apparently on the tents of the gun position No. 2, Battery "A", 201st AA Bn. One of the bullets passed through a tent wall striking the stock of a rifle hanging in the tent and ricochetting to strike a soldier U.S., however, was unhit. A building in San Marco, Fraction of Caserta, determined as being in the line of fire was searched, but nothing was discovered. Some time before, during a red alert, men of the same position had been fired on from the same general direction. The bullet

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used in the latest incident was tentatively identified as that fitting a Steyr pistol (German).

The explosion of a land mine was reported, when an American soldier, walking across a cultivated field, struck an object, which exploded, tearing off part of his right foot. Two Italian girls who had witnessed the incident stated that there were more of the same objects in the field. These were picked up and identified as Italian offensive grenades, commonly known as "Red Devils". It was further learned that at the time the field was plowed, eight other grenades had been found and removed, and boys in the neighborhood stated that there had been many of these grenades left lying in the fields by the Italians and the Germans. It is the opinion that some unknown person found the grenade in question in the neighborhood and either placed or threw it on the ground where the soldier came in contact with it. There appears to have been no plan to injure any one.

5. Individual Suspects.

Among the more interesting cases are:

Gepuzzo, considered dangerous to security. Lieutenant of the M.V.S.N. Ex-agent of OVRA (PMF). Friend of, and collaborated with the Germans.

Cipriani, officer of the Officio Informazione with Italian Army in Balkans until 9 September 1943. Volunteered for service with Blackshirts in Spain and Abyssinia. Suspected of former association with Italian Counter-espionage unit. Considered dangerous and adventurous, and consequently interned for security reasons.

Collavini, active member of the MWSN for many years. Left Campobasso to cross into enemy territory carrying MWSN officer's ration card.

Curreri, was appointed Podesta of Minturno by the German Military Authority. According to reliable information, he collaborated with the Germans during his three months tenure of office far beyond the minimum required of him by his position. After entering British occupied territory he made in the presence of a witness remarks derogatory to the Allied Forces and to the Allied cause.

Mascitti, connected with German parachute company, apparently voluntarily. Possible connection with German counter-intelligence. Worked with German battery near Anzio. Partly dressed in German uniform.

Mina, active member of the MWSN for many years. Left Campobasso to cross into enemy territory carrying MWSN officer's ration card.

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Magnoni, active member of the MVSN for many years. Left Campobasso to cross into enemy territory carrying MVSN officer's ration card. Russo, considered dangerous to security. Capo Squadra (Sergente), MVSN. Collaborated with Germans and was promoted by them to rank of Bersagliere.

b. Subversive Movements and Organizations.

An investigation has been made of the Provincial Association of Industrialists, Artisans, Merchants, Farmers, Professional Men, and Artists (APICAP). Preliminary steps toward the organization, at Caserta, were taken last month by Mario Biggerio, local lawyer and Fascist opportunist who represented Fascist syndicate in his professional capacity; Nicola Fusco, described as a person without political principle, an opportunist Fascist and lawyer for the local Fascis; and other local active Fascists. The stated purpose of the organization is that of economic development of Caserta and the provincial region. An association similar to APICAP existed prior to and during the Fascist regime.

b. Relations between Troops and Civilians.

Relations between troops and civilians are on the whole, most friendly, though a certain amount of apprehension is indicated by the civilians toward the North African native troops. No unusual incidents have been reported.

b. Civilian Morale and Reaction.

Public reaction to the bombing of the Abbey of Monte Cassino is overwhelmingly of the belief that the action was a military necessity, and all blame is placed squarely on the shoulders of the German command which countenanced the use of the Abbey as a military installation. The consensus is that the most important present interest of the Italian is the ending of the war rather than the preservation of artistic monuments.

The various political parties in anticipation of the liberation of Rome are anxious to get rid of their present state of indecision. The prestige of the King is considerably shaken, and there are not a few monarchists who recognize the usefulness of his abdication in order to avoid something worse. It is considered by many that the King and Badoglio cannot be reinstated in Rome by the Anglo-American forces, since their administration has not adopted a single measure adequate to the grave crisis subsequent to the armistice. In addition to this is the unrest of the working classes, the dissatisfaction of the middle-class salaried people who are unable to provide for their families because of the dizzy spiral in prices, the chaotic economic condition, and the disorder in the distribution of food itself. Consequently, dissatisfaction in the populace increases daily. Leaflets are frequently found in the street demanding bread and work, and sometimes they point to the past regime with regret.

The above factors, i.e., political dissension arising from the continuation in power of the same King who supported the Fascist regime,

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Other than German-inspired propaganda, appears to be responsible for the low morale of the Italian troops. This is inherent in the present situation. The anti-monarchical propaganda of the Liberals and anti-Fascists serves to accentuate the confusion and disorientation of these soldiers and their bewilderment as to what, if anything, they are fighting for. In addition, the low morale of the Italian service personnel, is attributed by many to be caused by lack of faith in their officers. Many express a desire to be given an unconditional discharge, and even those who wish to continue in the service indicate that they have no desire to serve any longer under the leadership of Italian officers, although they say that they would gladly fight under Allied leadership. The Italian officer has shown himself to have little concern for those under him, lack of sufficient rations for instance, is reported to be not due to the lack of available rations, but rather because their superiors disposed of some for their own profit or use. However, despite the poor showing of the Italian soldiers, Italians feel that they can apply a great deal of manpower. As an illustration of the willingness of the Italians to fight, they point to guerrilla activity in German-occupied Italy.

The food situation remains bad. Almost anything can be obtained for a price on the Black Market, especially American material and rations. A large quantity of American cigarettes have been selling in legal civilian markets at a price of 50 lire for twenty. Many Italian civilians are of the opinion that Black Markets in food are largely the result of the doings of the Badoglio government forbidding the transportation of foodstuffs from one region to another. They argue that ANG is at fault for countenancing such a situation and refusing to grant permission to force the "blockade".

Liberal elements are deeply disturbed at the news that the Carabinieri are to be greatly increased. Members of the former Fascist militia have been entering the Carabinieri and progressive elements are unable to understand why the Allied policy of removing Fascists from public administrative offices does not extend to excluding them from the Carabinieri, an organization which they believe is greatly compromised with Fascism, reaction, and Monarchism. It is felt by many Italians that such infiltration is in the process of forming a fifth column of neo-Fascism within these ranks. It has been reported that Roberto La Nave, former official of the Kurt Milizia of Naples, ousted by ANG action and La Rosa, a former active Fascist of Naples, have both recently entered the Carabinieri as Colonels of that organization. Recently thirteen members of the Caserta Milizia Accademia entered the ranks of the Carabinieri.

a. Rumor.**1. Non-military Personnel.**

Most rumors current at the present time center on the forthcoming attack on Cassino. Most troops believe that an attack is about to be launched, but it is not thought that this knowledge involves any leakage of information. There is no evidence of details of the attack having reached unauthorized ears.

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A week ago General Clark in person stopped the evacuation of heavy equipment off the Anzio beach-head by giving telephone orders to the various commanders to hold their ground.

General Clark recently asked the War Department for 10,000 infantry replacements. He received an answer stating that he had activated some units in Fifth Army without higher authority, and would not get any replacements until he had dissolved those units and used the personnel as replacements.

British soldiers stated that the British 10 Corps was pulling out for England soon to participate in the big Invasion.

Four percent of combat troops with 18 months or over in foreign service, two percent non-combatants with the same length of service, and one percent combat troops with one year up to 18 months' foreign service will be rotated to the U.S.

Five thousand planes from England and 3000 from Italy will be operating daily over German occupied territory beginning 1 March.

Fifth Army's command will be limited to the beach-head. Fifth Army is to command a Franco-American invasion of Southern France, is going to England as a reserve army, is going to India.

2. Among Civilians.

Enthusiasm for the Russian battle successes has resulted in the rumor that Russian troops are soon to be brought to Italy to land a hand in the fighting at Cassino.

Some disturbance has been created in the minds of many civilians in Caserta by a rumor to the effect that Caserta is to become in the near future a center of distribution for Russian troops which will be concentrated here initially and then sent out to various posts and stations.

The Germans are too strong for the Allies in Cassino and a strong Allied defense line has been established while awaiting relief from the beach-head.

A British attack on Cassino was awaiting a "blockbuster" raid.

Allied troops have recently been forced, because of German pressure to retreat more than 10 kilometers from the front line of fire in the Cassino area. Cassino Airbase has been recaptured by the Germans.

The increase of the bread and vermicelli ration already granted by the allied government, and future increases which are to be granted are only the results of the diplomatic activities of Russia upon the American and British governments in behalf of the liberated population.

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Mussolini had been handed over by the Germans to the Vatican City as a political prisoner is rumored by Italian soldiers who have recently escaped from the Germans into our lines.

4. Other Matters of General Security Interest.

The problem of a control of civilian movement across the Volturno and Calore Rivers still receives considerable attention. The bridge at Cancello Arnone which is the only crossing over the Volturno for an extensive area is effectively controlled, but since permits to cross the bridge are issued by AMG at Caserta or Averse, the distance required to travel in order to obtain one of these permits is an encouragement to the unauthorized crossing of the river.

Other checks along the rivers revealed the following: Crossings of the Volturno were being carried out by Pietro and Giovanni Iagnessa, Giovanni and Antonio Marotta and Biagio Aragossa who operated boats over the river. It was recommended that these men be prosecuted by AMG for violations of the proclamation of 18 December 1943 relating to the Army Control line along the Volturno and Calore Rivers. At the road block known as the Ford across the Calore River in the vicinity of the Maria Cristina, both the Military Police and the Carabinieri stated that they are experiencing no difficulties. However, the owner of a barge at that point stated that disgruntled persons who had been refused passage without a permit threatened to sabotage the raft.

Train guards have been experiencing some difficulty with Italian civilians attempting to ride the freight trains between Caserta and Benevento, and on the branch line between Telesio and Maddaloni. It has been noted that the civilian employees on the trains have been aiding these persons to secret themselves on the trains and speaking in their behalf when they are found and ordered off the cars. A large number have attempted to cross the Calore River at the Amerosi bridge in both directions in this manner. Of those who have been found and removed, it was revealed that a majority have permits to cross the river, but about 10% do not. To date all persons have been released with just a warning. When it was pointed out that those persons without passes were attempting to evade the control system along the rivers, it was agreed to instruct the crews that all without permits to cross the river and others who appeared suspicious would be turned over to the MP's at Amerosi.

Civilians in Mondragone are under the impression that it is now possible to forward letters to the Red Cross in London inquiring concerning missing relatives. They base this on a radio announcement. Consequently a substantial number of such letters have been handed over to security personnel for delivery. Similarly, an Italian unit with 10 Corps has made known to its personnel that it is possible to communicate with persons in Northern Italy by communicating with the archbishop of Naples, who in turn uses the Vatican as the intermediary. It is considered that this chain of communication offers potentialities to enemy intelligence dangerous to the security of the Allied operations.

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The number of individuals screened and processed at the WIP, for the period totals 290, a decrease inasmuch as displaced persons were handled separately. The disposition of those processed is as follows:
