MINUTES OF THIRTYSECOND SECURITY CONFERENCE

Held in the Conference Room, 59 Via Sicilia  
1415 hrs, 7 May 45

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1. Col FISCHER opened the meeting by proposing that the regular security conferences should be discontinued, to be held only if called together for special reasons. The proposition met with unanimous approval.
2. Col YOUNG then brought up the question of the Rear Army Boundary. He informed the meeting of the recent alteration of the Boundary, and outlined once more the regulations governing movement in this country. If any civilian wishes to go forward of the Rear Army Boundary a permit must be obtained from AIG of the Armies. Movement between the Rear Army Boundary and the Restricted Line, which remained unchanged, was subject to permit from the Questura. Movement South of the Restricted Line was free. Members of the Allied Forces require official movement orders to travel forward of the Rear Army Boundary.
3. Capt ROSS then asked if any intimation had been received that there might be unrest among Italian civilians employed by the Allies. Col YOUNG replied that there had already been some strikes and that there would probably be more. The reason for this, he said, was that personnel employed by the Italians had been granted a daily cost of living increase of 128 lire, which had not yet been authorised for Allied-employed civilians. He understood that the matter was under consideration, and Col FISCHER suggested that any further information on the situation could be obtained from Col. BOSTOCK, DIL (Br), RAAC, or Major TOLIVER, G-4 (Am), RAAC..
4. Capt HAYES then informed the meeting that he frequently had indications from telephone intercepts that unauthorised persons were crossing the Rear Army Boundary into Northern ITALY. He also said that he often gleaned information of criminal activities from these intercepts and asked for instructions as to what action he should take with such information. Col FISCHER ruled that such matter should be passed to the Questura, in the form of a plain report, without stating the source, i.e. telephone censorship.

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/5. Major THEUNISSEN...

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5. Major THEUNISSEN then asked for a ruling from Col FISCHER on the matter of intervention by personnel under his command in civilian disturbances. Col FISCHER said that discretion must be used, but that the policy to be followed was that Allied police and security personnel were not to intervene in purely Italian civilian affairs until and unless Allied operations or installations seemed to be threatened. Major THEUNISSEN then asked for a further ruling on the matter of black market information obtained by his personnel while investigating other matters. To this Col FISCHER replied that any such information should be passed immediately to the nearest local military Police for necessary action.
6. Major THEUNISSEN then proposed a vote of thanks to the chair and the meeting closed at 1435 hrs.

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1. Col FISCHER opened the meeting by expressing his appreciation of the efficient way in which Capt GARDNER, of CIC, had taken temporary command of 426th Detachment, CIC, in the absence of Lt. Col. SMITH and Major MCKEE.
2. Col FISCHER then referred to the recent successes in ITALY, and the effect these might have on the strengths of the various intelligence agencies in ROME. He said that he anticipated a reduction in the number of CIC personnel available and Col YOUNG said that it was also possible that there might be some reduction in FS personnel. Col FISCHER asked Capt KER if he could say what the future of No. 1 SCI Unit in ROME might be, but Capt KER was not in a position to give a definite estimate. Major THEUNISSEN said that as far as South African FS was concerned he considered that his section would be at the disposal of the Command as long as there was work for it to do. In this connection Col FISCHER remarked that if the anticipated reductions in other sections took place, he might be very glad to ask for more help from Major THEUNISSEN.
3. Col FISCHER then asked Major THEUNISSEN to relate the circumstances whereby two NCOs of his section had arrested two suspicious persons who had turned out to be members of the Lane Gang. Major THEUNISSEN thereupon told the story of two of his NCOs who had been on the look out for parachutists expected to be dropped in their area. They had picked up two suspicious persons in Allied uniforms and one of the NCOs had proceeded to bring them in a truck. During the journey he was fiercely attacked by his charges, but succeeded in overpowering them. On discovering that they had possible connections with the Lane Gang, he reported the matter to the Military Police. Col FISCHER said that he wished to quote this as an example of the way in which security agencies can often be of help to the Provost. He said that the Provost Marshal had expressed his appreciation of the promptness with which such matters were reported to him by the SA FS.

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4. Col FISCHER then referred to a JICA report that he had received, which indicated the possibility of disturbances on 1 May, and asked if agencies had any information on the subject; Mr. ZULLO said that so far he had no information of anything of this nature, but was investigating. Capt RAFTER said that he had heard that the Communists intended to stage some sort of demonstration when the Western Allies and the Russians met in GERMANY. Col FISCHER remarked that he considered it likely that May Day might be used as an occasion to stage the usual demonstration at the Quirinalc.
5. Major THEUNISSEN then referred to the recent leakage of secret information from the PRACCIANO area, and in that connection emphatically denounced the lack of co-operation and even obstructionism received by security personnel at the hands of O&C of units. He asked if something could not be done to impress once more on all personnel the necessity not only for security but for co-operation with security personnel. He remarked that it was most discouraging for PS personnel to spend long hours to safeguard specific security targets, only to have all their work undone by careless talk and behaviour on the part of responsible officers. Col FISCHER said that he would look into the matter and see what could be done to ensure more security mindedness on the part of troops and particularly of officers in possession of secret information.
6. There being nothing further to discuss the meeting closed at 1455 hrs.

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1. Col FISCHER opened the meeting by referring to certain letters which had been received in his office since the last conference. They were
  - (a) A letter from AFHQ, subject "Withdrawal of Allied Commission personnel from Italian Government Territory". Col FISCHER gave the meeting the gist of this letter and elaborated 103:4 to some extent on its implications.
  - (b) A letter from MOUSA on the subject of "Japanese Directories". This letter had been distributed to all agencies, but Col FISCHER wished to stress the importance of compliance, and the need for any documents of the nature referred to in the letter being forwarded to the correct authority if found.
  - (c) A letter from AFHQ, subject "Allied Assistance to Epuration Committees". This letter also had been distributed to all agencies, but Col FISCHER again wished to stress the importance of adhering to its provisions.
2. Col FISCHER then produced an article which appeared in the "Stars and Stripes" for 9 Apr, bearing the heading "Bomb on Tito's Office". The article told a story of a bomb being thrown at the office of Marshal Tito's representative in Rome. Col FISCHER said that he did not consider the matter of great importance, but expressed his dissatisfaction at a state of affairs whereby the first intimation he received of such an incident was by reading a newspaper report. He instructed agencies to check up on their system of contacts and informants with a view to making certain that the whole of the city area was covered by them. In passing, he also stressed, as he had done on previous occasions, the necessity for contacts and informants being drawn from all strata of society. Capt. RAFTER said that he had completed a manuscript report of the incident, which would be forwarded immediately to this office.
3. There being nothing further to discuss the meeting closed at 1455 hrs.



1. Col YOUNG opened the meeting by introducing Major MATTEI to the representatives present. He then brought up the question of security in 201 Sub Area, explaining to the meeting that with the withdrawal of 8 Cdn FS Res Det the responsibility for security in that area had fallen upon No. 1 (SA) L of C FS Section. Col YOUNG then instructed Major TEUMISSEN that copies of all reports on matters concerning security in 201 Sub area should be passed to GSI 2 District as well as to G-2, RAAC. Copies of all periodical reports were also to be forwarded to 2 District. Major MATTEI then explained that 0 J 3 : 2 all action on policy matters in respect of cases originating in 201 Sub Area should be taken through HQ 2 District, quoting as an example the necessity for any internment orders for such cases being signed by GOC, 2 District.
2. Col YOUNG then told the meeting that there had been reports of fishing going on off the coast of the LIDO DI ROMA. He had checked with the Senior Staff Officer, Security, who had informed him that at the moment fishing was allowed in the vicinity of the LIDO, up to four miles from the coast, at night. Col YOUNG intimated that there was a possibility of a change in this regulation.
3. Col YOUNG then said that he had been informed that a number of civilian subscribers in ROME had been using the long distance telephone service for calls to the North. He understood, he said, that Allied Commission would be getting a list of the names of such persons in order that appropriate action might be taken, and he had asked for a list for G-2, RAAC, so that enquiries might be made from a security point of view. He informed Major HARVEY that GSO, 2 District had requested prompt action in the matter.

/4. Major HARVEY....

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4. Major HARVEY then referred to the question of the Fascists recently arrested in ROME, and suggested that when the cases were closed it would be better, for a number of pertinent reasons, that they should be interned at TERNI in preference to PADULA. Col YOUNG agreed with Major HARVEY and said that he would bear the matter in mind when the necessity for internment arose.
5. In this connection a number of questions were raised concerning the Fascist Organisation at present under investigation. Major HARVEY asked whether there had been any confirmation of the report that there was a Fascist cell at PADULA. Mr. GUERRINI said that he had had some confirmation of this from a person recently released from PADULA and that he was taking steps to have this person questioned on the matter. Major HARVEY then referred to the system of camp leaders at PADULA and deplored it on the grounds that it lent itself easily to the organisation of such cells. Col YOUNG requested Capt GARDNER to inform Mr. ZULLO of CIC of this, for use in his interrogations of the persons connected with the Fascist Organisation under investigation.
6. Major GREEN then informed the meeting that he had moved his office to that of Col WHITE, DPM, and that in future his telephone number would be 473895.
7. There being no further business to discuss the meeting closed at 1445 hrs.

1. In order to insure that the cooperation between 808 C.S. Bn., C.I.C., S.C.I. (Z) and other American intelligence agencies continues throughout the war and during the immediate post-hostilities period, a representative of this Section, Major Mario Brod, has been appointed American 808 C.S. Bn. liaison officer to work with Captain Stanhope-Wright (Br).

2. Major Brod's duties involve such American assistance as may be given the 808 C.S. Bn. in matters relating to transport, rations, etc.; acting as the channel for communications between American intelligence agencies and the 808 C.S. Bn., and acting as the coordinator of all matters affecting 808 C.S. Bn. operations in Rome originated by American intelligence agencies.

3. As a liaison officer it will be necessary for Major Brod to visit certain C.S. centers after consultation with the local C.I. staffs concerned. It is requested that C.I. staffs in this connection give Major Brod such assistance as may be required.

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MINUTES OF TWENTYEIGHTH SECURITY CONFERENCE

Held in the Conference Room, 59 Via Sicilia  
1415 hrs, 5 Mar 45

1. Col FISCHER opened the meeting by alluding to the regulations concerning propaganda exhibitions by Allied organisations in ROME. He pointed out that the CG, RAAC had put out an order, on instructions from AFHQ, that no such exhibitions or shows were to be given by any Allied organisation without prior permission from HQ, RAAC. Col. FISCHER then referred more specifically to the exhibition at present going on in the art gallery of the Teatro Delle Arti. He was not aware, he said, that any permission for this exhibition had been applied for or given, and he instructed Capt RAFTER to look into the matter. He further charged Capt RAPTER with the responsibility of editing all such applications that might be received in future.
2. Col FISCHER then referred briefly to the investigations now in progress into certain subversive political activity in ROME and asked that any relevant information held by any of the representatives present should be communicated immediately to No. 1 SCI Unit, CIC, or 276 FS Section.
3. Col FISCHER then asked Major GREEN to give the meeting any available information on the escape of General ROATTA. Major GREEN replied that he had little information beyond the facts that General ROATTA escaped between 2200 and 2300 hrs on Sunday, 4 Mar., and that 10 CC.RR personnel and one hospital orderly had been placed under arrest. The possibility of the escape having political inferences was discussed.
4. Col FISCHER then asked for details of the incident of the evening of Friday, 2 Mar., in which a British Paratrooper was shot and killed in the Via XX Settembre, ROME. Major GREEN gave the following details. Apparently a group of paratroopers, probably under the influence of drink, assaulted a CC.RR and another who came to his assistance. The latter called for help and further CC.RR arrived. Some shooting occurred in the course of which one of the Paratroopers was fatally injured. Major GREEN was of the opinion that there was no sinister implication in this incident, which seemed to be simply a drunken brawl. A full report was in the hands of the Provost.

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Major GREEN .....

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5. Major GREEN then informed the meeting that when AG, LAZIO-U-BRIA Region closed down, he would be left in ROME as Liaison Officer. He requested however, that any contact required with the Civil Police on routine matters should be made direct, matters of policy only being handled through his office.
  6. Major GREEN then produced a blank application form for membership of an organisation known as the "Movimento Unionista Italiano". Col FISCHER passed the document to Capt RAFTER with instructions to investigate.
  7. Major HARVEY then asked for guidance in the matter of a certain CATANI Ernesto, who had been serving a life sentence on the Island of PROCIDA. This man's sentence, he said, had just been remitted and he had been released, subject to his periodically reporting to the authorities. Major HARVEY asked for a ruling as to what authorities this man should report. The matter was discussed and it was finally decided that CATANI should report regularly to the Questura, also reporting in the first instance to 808 CS Bn.
  8. Capt O'KEEFE then brought up the matter of a woman who had been working in the hotel occupied by officers employed at CIAMPINO Airport. On screening this woman, he had not been satisfied that she was suitable for employment by an Allied organisation and had accordingly discharged her. He had since received representations from Political Section, AC, but reaffirmed his determination not to employ this woman, unless it could be shown that the information he had against her was unfounded. He said that Political Section, AC, had suggested that it was a case of mistaken identity, and Col FISCHER instructed Lt. BRANCH to look into the matter and give a final ruling.
  9. The meeting closed at 1505 hrs.

1. Col FISCHER opened the meeting by informing representatives of the departure of Capt GOLD from G-2 R/MC, and introducing his successor, Capt LIB.
  2. Col FISCHER then told the meeting that he had received a communication from Major HARVEY, concerning hours of visiting at "R" Civilian Internee Camp, TERNI. It was suggested that the body of the communication be reproduced in these minutes, as follows:-

"Visitors will be allowed on Tuesdays, between 0900 hrs - 1200 hrs and 1400 hrs - 1600 hrs, as follows:-

- (a) Visitors will only be allowed to stay 20 minutes.
  - (b) Visitors will only be husbands or wives, brothers and sisters, parents, parents-in-law, children, first cousins and fiancees.
  - (c) Name, address, Identity Card No., and relationship of visitor to internee will be given.
  - (d) Visitors will be searched on entering; if they refuse they will not be allowed to enter the camp. Visitors will be researched on leaving.
  - (e) Private conversations with visitors will not be allowed. Security personnel will be present at all times during visiting hours.
  - (f) Each individual internee is only permitted one visitor per month, and not more than two persons at that one visit.
  - (g) Visitors bringing parcels, will hand them in when being searched ensuring that they are properly and clearly marked. These will be searched and handed to the internee after the visitors have left.

### 1(h) Internees...

- (h) Interneces will not be allowed to accept spaghetti, macaroni, bread or other foods that will need special cooking.
- (i) Visitors will be taken into the visiting room first, and when seated, the internee will be brought in."

Col YOUNG asked Major HARVEY whether similar rules were contemplated in respect of "A" Civilian Internee Camp, PADULA, but Major HARVEY was not able to give an answer.

3. Col FISCHER then informed the meeting that the Deputy Commander was concerned at the number of accidents occurring to Allied personnel in the city. There were numerous cases on record, he said, of soldiers falling over the banks in Trajan's Forum, and in each case they were suffering from wounds at the back of the head, which gave rise to suspicions that they had been assaulted before falling or being thrown over the parapet. Major COXHEAD again reiterated his confidence that foul-play was not to be suspected, but other representatives disagreed and gave examples of cases which could scarcely be explained away as accidents. The matter was discussed at considerable length, and Col FISCHER said that, although direct action in this connection was the responsibility of Provost and the Civil Police, agencies were in a position to help in the way of information, and he instructed that any such information should be reported immediately to him.
  4. Col FISCHER then brought up the question of the status of the Royal Yugoslav military mission in ROME. The matter was subjected to some discussion.
  5. The matter of the reactions of Polish troops to the decisions of the last Three Power Conference was then raised by Col FISCHER. Various isolated instances were cited and some discussion followed.
  6. The meeting closed at 1455 hrs.

1. Col YOUNG opened the meeting, saying that he had no particular points for discussion, and then calling on Major COXHEAD to give an account of the arrest of Umberto SALVAREZZA, leader of the Unione Proletaria.
2. Major COXHEAD thereupon gave the following account: after the raid a week ago on the headquarters of the Unione Proletaria, when a quantity of arms was recovered, SALVAREZZA disappeared. There were considerable allegations in the press against SALVAREZZA, and, whether these were true or not, a warrant for his arrest was issued by the High Commissioner for Sanctions against Fascism. At 0200 hrs on Sunday 4 Feb, a woman informed two journalists of "Avanti" and "L'Unita" that SALVAREZZA was in the bath at her home. The two journalists went and held SALVAREZZA at the point of a pistol, and notified the Carabinieri who came to arrest him and took him to Regina Coeli Prison. Since 0800 hrs this morning (5 Feb) he had been at the headquarters of the Epuration Committee undergoing questioning. Major COXHEAD also said that he understood that the incriminating documents said to be in SALVAREZZA's possession were now in the hands of Signor BERLINGUER of the Epuration Committee. He would endeavour to find out the nature of these documents and report in due course.
3. Major COXHEAD then informed the meeting that on Sunday, 11 Feb the Republicans were planning to have a procession lasting from the morning until the afternoon. They proposed, he said, to meet outside the Campidoglio and march in the direction of the Quirinale. Information so far indicated that the Communists and Socialists would support the meeting and that the Patriots and Partisans would not. It was possible that the latter were going to hold a meeting of their own later in the week, when decorations might be distributed by the Lieutenant General. Major COXHEAD assured the meeting that all necessary measures would be taken to preserve order.

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4. Major HARVEY then mentioned the matter of Allied troops carrying arms in ROME, and in this connection Major COXHEAD was moved to a spirited defence of civil conditions in ROME. He said that he deplored the false impression gained by so many people that it was unsafe to go out unarmed in ROME after dark, and said that since 4 Jun recorded cases of assault on Allied personnel were very few. He quoted the following figures. Since 4 Jun there had been only 20 cases of assault on women accompanied by Allied troops, and only 1 Allied soldier had been killed, and he in the execution of his duty and by persons who could not be classed as ordinary citizens, but who were members of an organised gang of thieves. These figures, Major COXHEAD said, compared very favourably with those for LONDON in peace time.
5. Major HARVEY then told the meeting that an order had been issued by AFHQ stating that no visitors are to be allowed to see internees who have been interned for reasons of espionage or sabotage contacts or suspicions. Persons interned for other reasons were to be allowed one visit a month when two relatives would be allowed to see them. Special arrangements were to be made for solicitors etc.
6. Capt GOLD then drew the attention of the meeting to an article which appeared in "Memento", issue of 4 Feb, about a visit to "A" Civilian Internec Camp at PADULA, describing conditions there and mentioning the names of many of the persons interned there. He said that he did not consider that there was anything exceptional in the article, but asked Major HARVEY if he would find out if the article had been authorised by the Camp authorities. Major HARVEY agreed to look into this.
7. Capt GOLD then asked if Major HARVEY or Major COXHEAD had any information about the various political parties sending representatives across the lines to contact their counterparts in the North. Various specific cases of this kind were quoted as examples and the matter discussed at some length.
8. The meeting then closed at 1450 hrs.

1. Col FISCHER opened the meeting by giving the information that, as a result of certain criticism of the handling of security prisoners by this Command, he had initiated an investigation to determine the average length of time security prisoners were held in custody by RAAC. He told the meeting that to date 835 arrests had been made by this Command, 736 of which had been processed and cleared. The average number of days spent in custody by these 736 persons was 47.7. The average for the theatre, Col FISCHER said, was considered by competent authorities to be somewhere in the region of 70, which shows the average figure for this Command to be distinctly satisfactory.
2. Col FISCHER then referred to the ever recurring question of the property of civilian internees. He said that although no doubt everyone present was quite aware of their responsibilities, he wished to stress the necessity for correct procedure, in particular as regards houses or apartments of internees. He instructed that when a person is arrested the local authorities should be contacted and requested to ensure that such premises are not looted or otherwise molested.
3. At Col FISCHER's request, Major LEE then gave the meeting a brief account of certain aspects of the work of his section. 00003
4. Major COXHEAD then drew attention to an article in "L'Unita" concerning the Giuseppe ALBANO ("Il Gobbo") affair. He said that the account of the shooting of ALBANO and the arrest of his adherents was completely misrepresented by this newspaper, and that he considered that this and other misrepresentations published by "L'Unita" could be deemed definitely subversive in intent.
5. Col FISCHER then suggested to the meeting that the necessity for weekly conferences had decreased and asked the meeting's opinion on the matter of holding conferences less frequently. After some discussion it was agreed that meetings should be held twice monthly, the next meeting to be on Monday, 5 Feb. at 1415 hrs.
6. The meeting then closed at 1440 hrs.

- Col FISCHER opened the meeting by giving a brief account of the situation in ROME concerning the various Yugoslav "missions" operating in the area. The matter was discussed at some length.

- Major HARVEY then informed the meeting that the Ministry of the Interior in ROME had issued certain instructions concerning the treatment of German nationals in SICILY, with the result that persons who were quite acceptable from the point of view of Allied security had been evacuated from SICILY. Major HARVEY also stated that the Italian Government was using the plan of military security to shift people from one part of Allied occupied ITALY to another. He asked if anyone had any information concerning any concentration camp run by the Italians, and whether it was known if the Italians were holding any persons on security grounds as distinct from imprisonment. Capt GOLD answered his enquiry and informed him that there was definitely no such establishment run by the Italians.

- Major HARVEY then said that while reviewing cases at No. 2 Internment Camp he had come across cases where the information at hand at the camp was very scanty. Col YOUNG pointed out that such cases as were interned at the camp by RAAC had originally been routed to "A" Internment at the camp by RAAC had originally been routed to "A" Civilian Internment Camp, and suggested that the papers concerning such internees were most probably in the hands of the Commandant there. He assured Major HARVEY that all necessary information was supplied to the Commandant of the Camp to which an internee was sent, in accordance with established procedure, and suggested that Major HARVEY write to "A" Civilian Internment Camp in cases where the information held by No. 2 Camp was insufficient.

/h. Major COXHEAD....

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4. Major COXHEAD then referred to the recent shooting of a British soldier in the QUADRATO district of ROME. He considered that this affair could possibly be linked up with the political shootings in the Via Pronestino on night 16/17 Dec. The leader of the gang suspected was said to be a certain "Il Cocco" - the Hunchback - reported to be living in a grotto very near the scene of the crime. He stated that action was being taken by the Civil Police and that results would to be expected shortly. Major COXHEAD gave an explanation of the situation in the QUADRATO district, where, he said, the Germans had considerable trouble during their occupation. As a result of this trouble they drafted all the men of the district, leaving the women with large families and no means of subsistence. The children had grown up into young gangsters, many of whom, though young in years were considerably older in criminal experience. These gangs had armed themselves and were committing disturbances in the name of Communism.
5. In connection with the foregoing, Major COXHEAD then referred to the recent recurrence of hair-cutting incidents - i attacks on women accompanied by Allied soldiers, which had occurred notably in the area of Via Col. di Nienzo and Via dei Filisie. Col. FISCHER asked if it was thought that these incidents were subversive incidents and Col YOUNG expressed the opinion that they were not, which was endorsed by the opinions of other representatives at the meeting. The matter was discussed at considerable length, and Col FISCHER said that though such disturbances were, taken separately, a matter for the Civil Authorities, the whole question presented a subversive aspect and as such called for careful watching on the part of all agencies. He pointed out that Allied countries were authorised to take action when such incidents could be considered to come under the heading of subversion. He added that he thought that the recent incidents could be so considered.
6. The meeting then closed at 1450 hrs.

1. Col YOUNG opened the meeting by drawing the attention of agencies to an AFHQ directive on "Interrogation Procedure". The main points of this directive, he said, were as follows: All prisoners for interrogation by CSDIC will be sent to the custody of C-2, RAAC, to be withdrawn from that custody by CSDIC as and when required. Col. YOUNG remarked that though this might have the effect of increasing the prison population to some extent, this would probably be offset by the recent augmentation of CSDIC staff. The directive also ruled that CSDIC priorities should be reviewed each fortnight by SCI, and that cases which were given priority 3 on arrival should not remain so for more than a month. If a month elapses without interrogation, the priority should then be raised to 2, and if a further month elapses, priority 1. Such changes in priority were, however, the responsibility of SCI only.
2. Col YOUNG then told the meeting that according to the PBS Summary for the month of December, there had been a large number of sabotage incidents in PBS Area, mainly in the nature of placing of phosphorous bombs and attempts to destroy petrol dumps etc. In this connection Col YOUNG referred the meeting to HQ, 15 Army Group's "Notes on Counter Intelligence in ITALY" dated 29 Dec 44. In these notes, he said, there was a small extract from SHAEF which stated that the German offensive of 16 Dec was accompanied by the dropping of agents on a large scale; the agents are Germans, speaking English, including dialects, wearing Allied uniforms, carrying Allied weapons and ~~00023~~ instructions to obtain Allied transport. Their task in general was to cause confusion, and in particular to assassinate higher commanders, ambush staff-cars etc, and commit acts of sabotage. Col YOUNG pointed out that if an offensive were to start on this front, it would in all probability be accompanied by the same sort of thing and, stressing the importance of ROE as cover for such agents, he requested maximum alertness on the part of all agencies.
3. Col YOUNG then drew the attention of the meeting to another paragraph of the Counter Intelligence Notes mentioned in para 2 above, which /dealt ....

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dealt with "Trend of Enemy Propaganda to Allied Troops". He recommended this to agencies as a guide for tracing the source of any rumours which might come to notice.

4. Major HARVEY then said that he too had read the PBS Summary referred to above and stated that he considered it to be a very serious one, he pointed out that it tallied with the situation in SICILY where there was at present a very serious outbreak. He remarked on the general unrest caused by the Greek affair and considered that there was a definite probability of the same sort of thing happening in this area as has happened in SICILY, but on a much larger scale.
5. Major HARVEY then referred to a report he had received that a quantity of arms at BARI, sent by the Russians for the Yugoslavs, were getting into the hands of the local Italians. On Col YOUNG's request, he said that he would obtain full information for transmission by G-2, RAAC to higher headquarters.
6. Major HARVEY then said that he paid regular visits to No. 2 Internec Camp, TERVI, every Wednesday. He was willing to accept any correspondence for the camp if agencies so desired. Col YOUNG then requested that Major HARVEY should ask the Commandant of the Camp to provide G-2, RAAC with a weekly list of releases from the Camp, for record purposes, as had already been arranged with "A" Civilian Internec Camp, PADUA. Major HARVEY agreed to do so.
7. Mr. ROCCA then brought up the question of the security of the building at 59 Via Sicilia. The matter was discussed at some length and Col YOUNG instructed Capt RAPTER to look into the question and report to him.
8. The meeting closed at 1440 hrs.

1. Col FISCHER opened the meeting and once again referred to the matter of the property of persons arrested on security grounds, drawing the attention of agencies to a recent memorandum on the subject which had been circulated by G-2, RAAC. He again stressed the necessity for care in this matter.
2. Col FISCHER then read to the meeting a letter from AFHQ (reference CBI-389.701-B of 12 Dec) on the subject of "Photographing of Enemy Agents". Although this letter had been circulated to all agencies, Col FISCHER referred to it in asking what agencies could help in taking photographs. Lt.Col. SNOWDEN said that his agency had used the services of the U.S. Army Photographic Service and Mr. ROCCA said that his unit had the necessary apparatus to take such photographs. Col FISCHER thereupon asked these two agencies to arrange the necessary routine between them, and instructed other agencies to apply to G-2, RAAC when the question of taking such photographs of enemy agents arose. He would then arrange for this to be done by one of the two agencies mentioned above. 00020
3. Major HARVEY then gave the meeting some information of the hours of visiting at No. 2 Internec Camp. Visiting hours, he said, would be from 1000 - 1200 hrs and from 1400 - 1600 hrs, on Tuesdays and Fridays for male internees and on Wednesdays for female internees.
4. Major HARVEY then brought up the matter of persons released from prison in ROME being returned to their homes in distant parts of ITALY (see para 3, minutes of last meeting). He said that he had spoken to IDPSC, Allied Commission, and that they, owing to lack of necessary transport, were unable to help in these cases. Major HARVEY therefore suggested that when such cases arose he should be informed and that he would take steps to see that such people obtained means of returning to their homes.

1. Col FISCHER opened the meeting by showing representatives a special pass form to be issued to interrogators who required access to the Security Jail. He would distribute these to agencies after the meeting, he said, the number required by each agency being then filled out and returned to G-2, RAAC, for signature either by AC of S, G-2 or GSO 1(I).
2. Col FISCHER then asked Capt HARRIS for information on the vetting situation. Capt HARRIS said that his section was still turning out something in the region of 60 names per day. He explained that there was a "bottle-neck" where names had to be circulated to other agencies. There were at the moment, he said, some 1,500 names in circulation. He pointed out, however, that the output now exceeded the income. The most work was caused by vetting applicants for M.T.A. as these required interrogation. The proportion of black-listed persons was about one in every 100 hundred vetted.
3. Col FISCHER then brought up the matter of released persons being returned to their homes. He pointed out that some of these persons lived in remote parts of the country and, on release, had no means of returning to their homes and no means of living unless they did so return. He suggested that IDPSC, Allied Commission could give some help in cases of this kind, and asked Major HARVEY to take up the matter with them.
4. The meeting then discussed matters of domestic interest and closed at 1450 hrs.

1. Col FISCHER opened the meeting by requesting that representatives be more punctual in their attendance. There were certain regular offenders in this matter, he said, and he asked that these give their attention to the matter.
2. Col FISCHER then again brought up the question of the property of internees. He referred to two aspects of the matter. Firstly, he reiterated the necessity of ensuring that persons sent for internment were allowed to provide themselves with adequate clothing to satisfy the need for warmth and hygiene. Secondly, he stressed the importance of accurate records being kept of any valuables taken from persons when arrested. Cases of wilful misappropriation of such property, he said, occur rarely, if at all, but cases of careless handling of valuables are frequent, and incur much unnecessary work and correspondence to put matters right. All such valuables, he instructed, should be turned over immediately on arrest to the officer in charge of the prison, and a receipt obtained.
3. Col FISCHER then read to the meeting an AFHQ directive on the subject of "Internment of German and Japanese Nationals". (AG 383.01/215 GBI-O dated 28 Nov 44). Having read this, he pointed out that German nationals still residing in the city should not be allowed to know of the possible change in their status occasioned by this directive.
4. Col FISCHER then read a further AFHQ directive (GBI-389.701-H dated 25 Nov 44) on the subject of "Counter-Intelligence Reports". This directive was being distributed to all agencies.
5. Col YOUNG then told the meeting of a directive that had been received from AFHQ on "Detailed interrogation of Espionage Agents". He gave the meeting the gist of this directive, as there were insufficient copies available for distribution to all agencies. Copies would be distributed, he said, to the executive agencies, i.e. CIC and the FS Sections.

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6. The matter of the health of security prisoners was then brought up by Col FISCHER. He pointed out that this command was now fully responsible for the Security Prison, since the move from Regina Coeli, and that it may become necessary to expedite clearance on certain cases on account of the health of the prisoner concerned. The reason for this he said, apart from the question of equity, was that prisons are notorious sources of epidemic, and that in view of this it was the responsibility of this command to keep the health standard of the prison as high as possible. He instructed therefore that on receipt of a request to expedite a case of this kind, agencies should take all possible steps to see that this was done.
7. Capt GOLD then told the meeting of a request from AFHQ for a report giving full details of the numbers of persons still detained in the Security Prison, showing categories, time of and reasons for detention, and what steps had been taken towards clearance of their cases. The report, which had been forwarded to AFHQ, showed that of 792 arrests made in this Command since the liberation of ROME, 117 persons remained in the Security Prison as at 1200 hrs, 1 Dec. The average time of detention of these 117 persons was 77 days, and Capt GOLD expressed the opinion, endorsed by Col FISCHER, that this period was too long. Though in almost every case the reasons for continued detention were sound, the need for rapid clearance of cases wherever possible was again stressed.
8. Certain matters of purely domestic interest were then discussed and the meeting closed at 1455 hrs.

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





2. Col FISCHER then drew the attention of the meeting to the instructions which were given at the last meeting (see para 3, minutes of fourteenth weekly conference). There had not, he said, been any appreciable change in the policy of our agencies as a result of these instructions, and he impressed on the meeting the importance of observing strictly to them.
3. Col FISCHER then said that he had received a telephone call from the 00011 Signal Officer, MAC, informing that there was a report that the employees of MAC and the Postal Service were going to stage a "visit-dam" strike for half an hour on the morning of 31 Oct. He asked Special Agent TULLO of CIO, who had attended the meeting for this purpose, to give this information if he could on this matter. Mr. ZULLO told the meeting that this strike was apparently being held in protest against the withdrawal of cost of living allowances. The representatives of the two companies were contemplated, and it was no such intention of these allowances to close. However,

He said that he suggested that a large number of "dead" cars should be planted at a arranged time in the streets of the city. Col PISCHER, however, was unwilling the feelings of Capt HELLER, considered that such a plan should be left in the hands of the Military Police, and that no action should be taken by Intelligence agencies, until requested by the Military Police. Category "B" Arrests: Operation or possession of a W/T transmitting set. Sabotage: the act of cutting or damage wire lines and pipelines.

All other arrests in Category "A" will be made only upon order of the Commanding Officer of the DIO, FSS or SCI unit. Before ordering any arrest the Commanding Officer concerned will satisfy himself that No. 1 S. or SCI "Z" considers that the evidence on hand is sufficiently accurate to warrant at least interim if further investigation substantiates the preliminary information.

Category "B" arrests: Offenses not triable, but warranting  
arrestment as a "Security Threat".

In view of the fact that emergency conditions no longer prevail in the Rome area, no Category "B" arrests will be made without the consent of the CO or S, C-2, T, G, or CSO 1(I), RAIC. In the event that the person is considered to be connected with espionage, sabotage, or some form of crime and rules apply as to category "B" arrests. In no case will an arrest be made if the investigation can be made with the person concerned retaining his liberty.

Arrests in general: All arrests ordered by this and higher headquarters will be made by the agency selected by this headquarters. Any requests for arrests originating through other than command channels will be referred to this section. (Example: CIC, IBS requests CIO, RAIC, to arrest a person. CIC chief, RAIC will not act unless consent of this section is obtained).

CIC and RSS can reinforce or previous orders concerning collaboration with Italian police agencies.

All arrests must be made in conformity with the foregoing instructions receiving the support of the CO, S, G. Any persons arrested without reference to these instructions will not be accommodated in Security Jail, and officers responsible for negligence will be reported to CO, RAIC.



It appeared that there were over four hundred such in Rome, more than half the total number of German nationals in the city. He requested that CIC and FS should make enquiries into the status of such persons, in order to establish that they were, in fact, entitled to treatment as clergy.

6. Major COXHEAD then brought up the question of arrests and internments made by AMG shortly after the Allied entry into ROME. Among these persons were some 200 who came into the category of PW, being members of the Fascist Republican Army. The matter was discussed at some length and it was decided that list of these persons should be provided to agencies. It was agreed that there would be no change in the present policy concerning such persons.





2. Col FISCHER then mentioned the recent disturbances in the Common Wing of Berlin Coeli Prison, and informed the meeting that RAAC had been asked to use NC, 3 Wing only, instead of Nos. 3 and 4. The transfer, he said, had been made that morning and he called on Capt COOL, who had supervised the transfer, to confirm that it had been satisfactorily completed.
3. Major THURSEN then asked for instructions regarding persons arrested by his Section in the area outlying parts of the Area, and their disposition. Col FISCHER instructed that all such persons must be registered with CIC and then passed, with arrest slips, to Berlin Coeli Prison, subsequent report being sent to G-2, RAAC. Exceptions could only be made, he said, in cases where a person had been arrested merely for interrogation and probable release. These persons could be put into local jails, but report should still be sent to G-2, RAAC, for record purposes.
4. Capt RITTER then asked that a list of all German Nationals who had registered (see para 1) should be forwarded to 418 RS Soc for the purpose of reference. He considered that any German National whose name came to notice and who was found not to have registered would be worthy of investigation. Col FISCHER agreed to have such a list distributed.
5. Capt HARRIS then brought up the matter of an individual in ROME who was wanted by 418 RS Soc (not in NOE file) as having information relevant to their sphere of operations. Two NCOS of this Section were now in ROME and Capt HARRIS asked Col FISCHER's authority for this man to be taken out of the Area by 418 RS Soc. Col FISCHER gave this authority, with the proviso that a report be furnished to him, with a copy to ACC.
6. There being no further business to discuss, the meeting closed at 1440 hrs.

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
