

TO : Commanding Officer, 204th M. P. Company, APO #758.

While driving down Via Marqueda on patrol I came upon a car driven by an Italian said to be waiting for British Major who supposedly to be in canteen. I warned him to move as no parking was permitted there. Driver willfully refused to move after being warned once. After leaving him to continue my duty belieiving him to move. After going a small distance I looked around to see if he had moved. He still stood beside his car and hadn't moved. I then spoke to him in Italian to follow me as to keep from blocking traffic in the street. I escorted him to parking lot off Via Marqueda, one block on Via Victoria Emanuele and proceeded to write ticket designed for that purpose. He refused to sign his name on said ticket however I finally took his hand and pushed it down to designated line nad he then signed his name.



- (c) No extra compensation shall be paid for Sunday or Holiday work.
- (d) Civilian labor shall be employed at minimum rates for a probationary period of one week. Thereafter, the rates of pay may be revised within the maximum limit at the discretion of the employing Army or Service.
- (e) Wage rates in existing services, e.g. railroad, public utilities, etc., shall be continued unchanged until further notice. In cases where such services are actually taken over by the Armed Forces, civilian personnel of the particular organization involved shall not be placed on the military payroll.
- (f) All branches of the Allied Armed Forces, and all civilian contractors engaged to work for the Armed Forces, shall be bound by the provisions contained herein.




