(3) The real needs of RAF will not be known until after May 1st and it may therefore be possible to leave the school all three rooms. This is very essential for the proper conservation of school equipment stored in these rooms.

(4) The O.C. detachment RAF is most cooperative and no further problem should arise.

SUBJECT : Release of Scrap Paper  
for School.

TO : Quarter Master, PBS, APO 732.

1. This is to confirm telephone conversation of 27 March.
2. The Villaggio del Fanciullo, near Civitavecchia, is an educational project, privately organized by a Catholic priest, to remove youths from Rome streets, especially those given to pilfering from allied vehicles, and to re-educate them. The Director of Education, AC, has personally inspected the project and known it to be well conducted and of very considerable value.
3. An aspect of this project is the issuing of a small camp newspaper by the boys. To raise additional funds, the camp also wishes to print some publicity. A request has therefore been made to the Education Subcommission for paper.
4. The Stars and Stripes has available scrap and unsalable flat sheets of newsprint cut to 32"x43" which it will gladly turn over to the Education Subcommission for the above named purpose if authorized by you to do so.
5. You are therefore requested to authorize the release to the Education Subcommission for disposal to the Villaggio del Fanciullo one ton of scrap or salvage paper, preferably the flat sheets of cut newsprint which the Stars and Stripes is unable to use and which, because of its form, size and quality, is of negligible commercial value.



SUBJECT: Scientific supplies left from UTC.

TO: : G-4, AFHQUSA

1. The University Training Command used the laboratories of the University of Florence for instructional purposes. At the end of the course a considerable amount of scientific material was left over, much of it in partly emptied containers of chemicals, medical supplies, etc., not suitable for return to the United States.

2. The University of Florence has great need of these supplies and would be most appreciative if they could be made available to it.

3. Colonel HARMONY of the UTC states that an inventory of this material has been made, but that the valuation, being the book valuations based on original price of full containers, are, in aggregate, high. The University of Florence states that they are prohibitively high - that the University does not have funds with which to purchase them.

4. While it is conceivable that private concerns in Italy would take advantage of the existing shortage of drugs and chemicals in Italy to speculate by buying up this stock and reselling to individuals at greatly augmented prices, this use of the material would be most undesirable. Returned to the United States the material would be of little or no value, consisting of broken packages and partly used bottles of chemicals, medicines, etc.

5. It is suggested therefore that in return for the hospitality given to American troops by the University of Florence, these materials be declared worthless and left to the university.

6. If this cannot be done, it is requested that a nominal price be placed upon them so that the university will be able to buy them without financial sacrifice.

7. Colonel HARMONY of the UTC is in full accord with these recommendations.

Equipment.

TO : RAAC, Real Estate Section.

1. The industrial lower trade school "Francesco Baracca", because of its vicinity to the airport, moved in the spring of 1944 to the premises of the lower trade school (scuola di avviamento professionale) "P. della Valle" on Viale Mansoni. Toward the end of June 1944 French Moroccan troops occupied the building without giving any formal requisition papers, inventory, or receipt, and forbade ingress. The commanding officer promised not to touch the equipment.
2. Contrary to this promise, and again without receipt, much of the industrial equipment was removed. I have a list of this equipment.
3. The troops left the school without notice. The sole means of identifying the unit are (a) that a truck No. 450513 was used in taking away a forge, an anvil and a sewing machine and (b) the French officer who took responsibility for any damage done had his office on the first floor of the Palazzo Vialoni.
4. With this meager information is it possible to locate the unit and obtain the return of the equipment taken? A list of the equipment will be furnished on request.

SUBJECT : Wage rates of female professional workers.

19 July, 1945

TO : Labor & Wages Control Committee,  
A/C Local Resources Bd.

1. The purpose of this communication is to request that the differential between salaries of male and female civilian employees be not applied at the level of professional workers.

2. The study of wage rates in industry, leading to the establishment of differential pay for men and women, was necessarily confined to workers below the professional level, and to apply the results upward to include professional workers is not justifiable.

3. Since women are rarely or never employed in industry in Italy for top administrative or professional jobs comparable to those of professional assistants in A.C., it is not possible to base pay rates for them on industrial rates. Since they are doing work identical to what a man would do in the same position, the only sound base for determining rate of pay is that used for determining the pay of men of the same category.

4. Professional women are employed by the Italian Government, particularly in the educational field. There is no differential in pay between such women and men holding similar positions with comparable qualifications. \*

women

5. Since there are only about three or four professional workers employed by A.C., it is justifiable to consider specifically one of them as an illustration of the injustice of the application of the present regulation to women professional assistants.

6. Dr. Gabriella Rosso has the degree of Doctor of Philosophy from the University of London. For seven years she taught in Bedford College of the University of London. Later, she taught in the Oriental Institute of the University of Naples.

7. She was asked in the spring of 1944 to come into the Allied Commission as professional assistant in the Education Subcommission. At that time she was teaching in the University of Naples. But salaries of University professors are notoriously small: they teach only six hours per weekly and unless they have an independent income, they supplement their university salaries by giving private lessons, writing text books for sale to their students, etc. In the case of Dr. Rosso, she supplemented her income by private lessons and by conduct-

ing a private Language Institute, organized by herself. Her monthly earnings from all sources at the time we engaged her were from 17,000 to 18,000 lire per month. At that time the maximum pay for professional workers, male or female, in the A.C. was 9,600 lire per month. Dr. Rosso nevertheless consented to come to us because of a keen, idealistic interest in the constructive work the A.C. was doing for Italy.

8. While living costs have risen markedly since the spring of 1944 and male professional workers have had their incomes increased proportionately, Dr. Rosso's salary, with all augmentations, is still only about 11,000 lire per month.

9. The Education Subcommission driver, a man with only elementary education, informs me that his average monthly earnings, including overtime, are 12,000 lire per month.

10. Dr. Rosso is absolutely invaluable to the Education Subcommission. She handles most contacts with the Ministry of Public Instruction, works closely with high Italian officials, contributes expert advice to the Subcommission from her intimate knowledge of the Italians and their educational system, has personal contacts with many highly influential Italians (she is, for example, a family friend of the Minister of Public Instruction), is socially accepted by all classes (her father was Admiral of the Fleet during the first world war), and is a woman of the highest intelligence and judgment. She works loyally and devotedly, and puts in overtime daily and Sunday.

11. In terms of responsibility, her work is comparable to that of a field-grade officer; but no such Allied officer could contribute what she contributes to the Education Subcommission.

12. She is the sole support of her widowed mother. She has lost her business (the Language Institute) in Naples, through coming to us. During the few months left of the Allied Commission she should receive compensation more nearly approaching the worth of the services she is rendering to us and the responsibility she is carrying.

13. The number of women professional assistants is so small that to make the differential between the maximum pay of male and female workers insignificant at the professional level would not establish any general precedent or cause any complications.

14. You are therefore requested to authorize the payment of women professional workers on the same basis as men.

Your Command is informed that in Italian legislation for state employees there exists no regulation which authorizes differences in salary between employees of different sexes; only as regards family allowances, the extra indemnity provided solely for married persons, differs according to the size of the family, and this is granted to women in the same measure as to men only when the woman is head of the family (widow with children) or when she is married to a man not in public employment nor in employment which carries the right of family allowance.

SUBJECT : Disparity in salaries of male and female employees.

TO : Education Sub-Commission.

1. You have requested an opinion as to whether or not there is any Italian legislation setting up the disparity in salaries of male and female employees.

2. There is no legislative provision of general character establishing any such disparity in respect of public or private employees.

3. The salaries of public employees are fixed by "organici" and by the tables of the individual departments. As a rule the male and female employees performing the same duties in identical categories receive equal remunerations. The law No. 1176 of 17 July 1919 on juridical status of women whilst establishing with certain limitations the equality of men and women in respect of the admissibility to public employment, does not directly affect the question of remunerations.

4. As for private employees in prefascist days the salaries of women were usually inferior to those of men. This disparity has been maintained to a certain extent in collective contracts concluded during the fascist regime and can be said to prevail even at the present time; it is estimated to amount to 10 to 15%. Certain companies have established special categories for women (typists and telephonists) in which the remuneration is inferior to that paid in other categories. A woman, however, may be employed in higher categories and in such case receives a salary equal to that paid to male employees of the same category.

1. The Armed Forces Institute entered the University of Rome on 1 August 1944 on a rental basis, having secured the space through the Education Section, Allied Commission (Colonel Rowell). This space amounted to about 8000 sq. ft.

2. Because of increased activities of the Institute, additional space was needed and negotiations were initiated with the University of Rome to this end. After some preliminary investigations and discussions, the University authorities agreed to let the Institute have the necessary space, but time went on and the space was never provided. After repeated requests, the Institute took the matter up with your Commission for assistance. Captain Vella did all he could to assist the representatives of the Institute, but the only results was a promise that the space would be provided about 1 April 1945. I am informed that the need for the space is critical and immediate.

3. In order to bring more pressure to bear on the University, Major Dollard of your Commission was contacted but apparently there the matter rests. May I ask that you look into the matter and assist the Armed Forces Institute in securing the space which is required.

The contractor shall make available to the Government the professional records of such instructors as may be employed in rendering said services, and shall retain in the correspondence of said services only such instructors as meet the approval of the Government.

It is agreed that during the life of this contract the contractor shall furnish the Government suitable office and storage space in the amount of not less than 8000 square feet (including heat, light, and janitor service wherefore, in order to enable representatives of the Government and the Armed Forces Institute properly to administer all of the work connected with this contract and required to be done by the Government, not such other work in connection with the Armed Forces Institute as the Government may elect to do in said offices. It is hereby agreed that this contract shall be in force and effect through 31 Jan 1945, and the option is hereby granted to the Government, to be exercised by notice in writing delivered to the contractor on or before 31 Dec. 1944, to renew this contract for such period as it may deem advisable upon the terms herein set forth, or any extension thereof at the government on ten (10) days' written notice.

Except as otherwise specifically provided in this contract, all disputes concerning questions of fact which may arise under this contract, and which are not disposed of by mutual agreement, shall be decided by the contracting officer, who shall receive a copy of the decision to him and mail a copy thereof to the contractor at his address shown herein.

SUBJECT: Protection of Educational Properties

TO : Military Police

1. It is the policy of the Allied Governments to protect from looting, damage, loss and waste all property and equipment of educational institutions and libraries. To this end heads of such institutions have been asked to stay with the property for which they are responsible or to designate some one to do so.
2. Such persons have been instructed to protect and conserve the property under their care.
3. They have been further instructed that if it becomes necessary for troops or others to occupy the building the person in charge of the institution is to remove books, scientific instruments and collections, etc., to a room where they can be safeguarded.
4. In case of requisition of any equipment, such persons in charge of the institution concerned have been instructed to require a requisition form clearly describing and enumerating the articles requisitioned and to demand that this requisition be clearly signed by a competent officer, with his name, rank and unit.
- \* 5. If any person in charge of such an institution appeals to you for assistance in carrying out his instructions, you are requested to give all aid possible.
- \*\* 6. You will give all possible aid to any such persons charged with the care of libraries to educational institutions in carrying out their instructions as outlined above.

1. Up to the present, we have engaged and paid language teachers by the hour. The rates payable have been listed in North Africa after consultation with the French Government representatives, and in Italy, after consultation with the Deputy Director of Labour (Civil).
2. It seems to me that in Italy, it may be as economical and will produce greater efficiency, to engage whole time teachers. We have a precedent at home where whole time lecturers are employed by the War Office. Rates of pay would be settled by the appropriate Deputy Director of Labour (Civil), and other details would follow provided that you accept the principle.
3. The advantages from the educational point of view are definite. We would control the whole time teachers for the whole of the working day and work them as long and as hard as we wanted. At present there is always the trouble of fitting in their work with us with their other appointments.
4. I do not think that we would need many of these teachers, and I do not propose to proceed in a hurry, but the first step must obviously be to get the principle accepted and to find out in advance any conditions that you may deem necessary.
5. I should then be grateful for your views.
