Dear General:

When you remarked at the meeting Tuesday that the Education Subcommittee had requested enough microscopes to set up all school and university laboratories, and, later, said something about our asking for swivel chairs, I assumed of course, that you were being facetious and I did not attempt to deny the allegation. It now occurs to me that Mr. Antolini and some of the Subcommittee representatives present might have taken you seriously, and that, although it scarcely seems possible, you might really have had such a misconception.

May I, therefore, assure you that the Education Subcommittee has never ordered even one microscope - or chair, swivel or otherwise?

Our requisitions have been confined to two groups of articles: Paper, ink, etc., for printing school text books; and the commonest school supplies (pens, pencils, erasers, paper, etc.) and school office supplies (paper, typewriter ribbons, mimeograph ink, etc.). The same is true of the requisitions now in process - we have scrupulously confined ourselves to the minimum supplies necessary to let schools function on a scarcity basis.

Will you send the enclosed copy of this letter to Mr. Antolini?


I refer to our conversation regarding the above subject.

SUBJECT: French Institute in Florence

The French Institute in Florence, 2 Piazza d'ognisanti, branch of the University of Grenoble, has been founded in order to enable its students (about 300 in 1939) to initiate a thorough study of French language and of French civilization. Its Dean is Mr. RONZY.

The Institute made available an advanced course (of two years) a first degree intermediate course, a second degree elementary course, and delivered Degrees in French Studies.

The French Government has been contemplating the reopening of the French Institute in Florence * which seems to be the wish of a great many Allied Officers who expressed the desire of improving their knowledge of French. This reopening, of course, would be subject to military operations; however, the French Institute having greatly suffered from the liberation of Florence, it would be highly desirable if Mr. RONZY, Dean of the Institute, and Mr. Tony Andre, Secretary General, could be allowed to come to Italy in order to recognize this important French center.

The French Delegation to the Advisory Council and the French Section in A.C. both are in favour of granting requests made by Tony Andre and Ronzy.

The Czechoslovak Consul General presents his compliments to the Political Section of the Allied Commission and begs to express his thanks for the Commission's prompt intervention in the matter concerning the passage on the Czechoslovak State in the Italian text-book in question.

Owing to the fact, however, that copies of this reader have already been distributed to the schools and among the pupils in a considerable number, the Consul General fears that what instruction on Czechoslovakia Italian pupils will receive will continue to be based on a fallacy for some time to come. He would be most grateful, therefore, if the Italian authorities could be requested to take the following steps:

- a/ Prepare a new text for the next edition without further delay and submit it to this Consulate for perusal.
- b/ Have this text inserted in the present edition in lieu of the text on Slovakia.
- c/ The Italian Ministry of Public Instruction should draw the attention of all elementary schools to the error in the reader and furnish the schools with the correct text for teaching purposes.

The Consul General deeply regrets having to trouble once again with this request the Allied Commission and the authorities, but he finds himself unable to do otherwise than insist on the above rectifications being made as such a fundamental matter as teaching about the existence of the Czechoslovak State in the schools is for us too serious a point to be overlooked.

The Czechoslovak Consul General presents his compliments to the Allied Commission /Political Section/ and, enclosing herewith a school text-book entitled "Il libro della V Classe Elementare" now published by the Ministry of Public Instruction for the year 1944-45, begs to point out that on page 158 there is an article on the so-called "Slovak state" while no mention is made of the Allied state of Czechoslovakia although all the other European states are mentioned. Instead the book contains this article wherein it is stated that Czechoslovakia no longer exists and that the state of Slovakia has sprung up in its place.

The Czechoslovak Consul General, on behalf of his Government, would greatly appreciate it if the Allied Commission would draw the Italian Government's attention to the matter and request them to take the necessary steps in order to have the matter revised and corrected.

The Italian Government, by their declaration of September 26th, 1944, annulled the Munich Agreement and its consequences. In so doing they recognised the integrity of Czechoslovak territory as they recognise that of other Allied nations. It is inadmissible, therefore, that, when other European nations are mentioned in Italian text-books, Czechoslovakia should be omitted while mentioned in its stead is a state which has sprung into being as an ally of Germany and whose existence is not recognised by the Allies.

TO : Administrative Section.

1. Action on the following matters through the normal channels was agreed upon with the Minister of Public Instruction in a meeting which took place on 12 September:

a) To appoint a new Pro-Rector for the University of Perugia who would be instructed to form a Committee of Professors to continue the work of epuration begun by AMG. 22 members of the University have already been suspended.

b) To confirm the appointment by the Prefect of Perugia of the Commissioner for the University for Foreigners.

c) To appoint a Pro-Rector for the University of Pisa who would begin epuration in the usual manner. The same person also to be appointed Director of the Normal School which is closely connected with the University.

d) To confirm the Provveditore of Florence in his office. He had been installed by the Partisans.

e) To hold an election of the Rector of Catania University when the incumbent moves to his new Chair at Naples.

f) To attempt to obtain from the military authorities who have requisitioned it a release of part of the printing facilities of the firm of La Terna in Bari in order that its normal activities may be resumed if only on a reduced scale.

g) To initiate the printing of school books at Florence, where adequate facilities exist, for Regions VIII and IX.

h) To accelerate the task of epuration within the Ministry itself.

SUBJECT: Evacuation in the Field of Education.
 TO : Vice President, Administrative Section.

1. The following information is transmitted to you in compliance with your verbal request of 2 September 1944.

2. The methods of Evacuation adopted by the Education Subcommittee for Army and AMG territory are based on practical experience in the field. They have been approved by the Minister of Public Instruction and constitute first steps which lead logically to the methods established by the Italian Government for carrying on the work when Italian territory is restored to its jurisdiction.

3. The method of dealing with personnel belonging to Universities and other institutions of higher learning including Academies is incorporated in an R.C. & M.G. Section Executive Memorandum Number 76, issued on 2 September 1944. A copy thereof is attached hereto as Annex A. This method was first followed in dealing with the University of Rome and the results both in the opinion of the Subcommittee and of the Minister of Public Instruction recommended its adoption as standard procedure.

4. The method which has been adopted for dealing with the personnel of secondary and elementary schools has not been incorporated as yet into an Executive Memorandum. It is contained, however, in an education directive which is handed to the Provveditore agli Studi of each Province by the Education Officer in the field. Its basis of authority is R.C. & M.G. Section Executive Memorandum Number 48, dated 31 of March 1944. The Education Officer is charged with seeing that the provisions of the directive are carried out promptly and thoroughly so far as the Provveditore's authority is concerned and that the appropriate recommendations for action are made to the Provincial and Regional Commissioners. A copy of this directive is attached as Annex B.

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ART. (B)Directive to Provveditori agli Studi.Defascistization.

1. You will submit within 15 days Schede Personali for all inspectors, presidi and directors in the province along with recommendations concerning their retention or suspension. For those who do not submit Schede you will submit a list of such persons who should be suspended or continued and give reasons for your recommendation in each case.
2. Within thirty days you will submit Schede Personali for all teachers about whose retention you may have some doubt. You will be responsible for all other teachers for whom no Schede are submitted.
3. You will be notified in writing by the Provincial Commissioner of those who are to be suspended or retained. Following such notice you will transmit this information to the individuals concerned, notifying them of their right to appeal before a Hearing Commission within a period of thirty days.
4. You will recommend for approval of the Regional Education Officer names of five trustworthy individuals who will serve as members of the Hearing Commission. Results of the findings of this Commission will be forwarded to you and transmitted with your recommendations to the Regional Education Officer. On the basis of these findings, retention or continuation of suspension will be determined.
5. A file for each person investigated will be maintained in both the office of the Regional Education Officer and the office of the Provveditore agli Studi.
6. Such persons as are suspended must be replaced, "incaricati", by persons whom the Provveditore agli Studi considers to be trustworthy, non-fascist and competent. The names and positions of such persons must be submitted at once to the Provincial Commissioner for transmission to the Education Officer and approved by him. Until such approval is obtained, all appointments shall be regarded as provisional.
7. All new appointments as presidi, inspectors or directors shall be "incaricati" subject to the disposition of the Minister of Public Instruction at the close of the current school year.
8. In accord with a recent decree of the Italian Government the following persons shall be suspended from service:
 - a) Any person, particularly one in high office, who has participated actively in the political life of fascism or by showing himself as a consistent apologist of fascism, shows that he is unworthy of serving the state; any person who has obtained an appointment or promotion through favoritism of the party or of fascist officials of high rank shall be suspended.

b) Any employee who has been guilty of fascist bias, incompetence or corrupt practices such as have been introduced by fascism into public administration, shall be likewise suspended.

c) Any person who has held the position of "Squadrista", or "Sannepolarista", or "Antemarcia", "Marcia su Roma", "Sciarpa littorio" or who has been officer in the Fascist partisanshipe or improper conduct shall be suspended from his office or employment.

d) Any person who has received undue promotion or any preference in any competitive examination because of his fascist position shall be suspended.

e) Any employee who, after 8 September 1943, moved to northern Italy or has pledged allegiance to or has in any way collaborated with the (Republican) Fascist government shall be suspended.



2. The decree itself (Gazzetta Ufficiale, No. 42, dated 1 August 44) only suppresses the previous Ministry of Popular Culture and assigns its functions to the Undersecretary for Press and Information.
3. The question remains as to the wisdom of keeping all propagandistic functions so concentrated and the further question of propriety: how far should we concern ourselves with such internescine matters.

SUBJECT: Request from Marshal Badoglio.

TO : Administrative Section.

1. Reference Letter 9/3.1/43, dated 11 May 1944.

2. In regard to paragraph 9a - Unity of Direction:

The Education Sub-Commission is in full accord with the need of assuring unity of direction in school services and is in frequent contact with the Minister of Education. All matters of policy, time tables, calendars, programs, examinations, etc., for occupied Italy are presented to him for comment and counsel and, up to the present, nothing has been done contrary to his advice. It is the policy of the Education Sub-Commission to advise all Regional Education Officers in occupied Italy to incorporate in their Region the policies, programs, etc., which are from time to time agreed upon between the Minister of Education and the Education Sub-Commission, insofar as military and local situations permit. As of the present date no disagreement or conflict of policy has appeared.

3. In regard to paragraph 9b - Aid to Students:

The Education Sub-Commission has organized in Naples a Youth Commission of which the present Minister of Education has been the Chairman. This Youth Commission has prepared a statute for submission to the Minister providing for a reorganized Patronato Scolastico to give aid to needy students. The Minister is, of course, fully acquainted with this work and is in hearty agreement with it. The full report will be submitted to him this week.

A committee of the Youth Commission has worked out a comprehensive plan for hot school lunches in Naples, has secured the approval and promise of assignment of dedicated soup from the Food Sub-Commission, has analyzed the practical problems of distribution, etc., all in the hope of demonstrating in Naples what can be done in all large cities. This program has, however, been halted by the Regional Commissioner of Region III who disapproves, for the present, any plan for serving school lunches.

4. In regard to paragraph 7 - Institutions of Technical-Professional Instruction:

The Education Sub-Commission is in full agreement with the Italian Government regarding the necessity of releasing buildings and reconstructing scientific and technical institutions. Through its Regional Officers it is taking such steps as can be taken locally, but the practical difficulties have in most cases been temporarily insurmountable. The Education Sub-Commission will welcome suggestions from the Italian Government as to concrete ways in which it can be of assistance in this highly important work.

SUBJECT: Establishing Ministry of Education in or near Naples.

TO : The Administrative Director.

1. The new Minister of National Education has requested and received from the Head of his Government permission to establish his Ministry in or near Naples.
2. Since the territory involved is occupied, the Minister has requested of us permission for the move to Naples.
3. On certain grounds the move appears justified and fruitful. These grounds are:
 - (1) It would constitute a certain relief on over-crowding at Salerno.
 - (2) It would facilitate the gathering of an adequate staff for the Ministry of National Education, since not a few technicians whom the new Minister wishes to use reside in Naples, where the Minister's own residence and retinue are already established.
 - (3) It would put the Minister in more direct contact with the technicians in our own Education Subcommittee (who have remained in Naples), at a time when more and more of our collaboration is well within policies already agreed upon.
 - (4) His under-Secretary may, if necessary, establish an office in Salerno.
 - (5) It need not disturb immediately or greatly the present distribution of the Education Subcommittee staff.
4. It is recommended that the move be authorized.

SUBJECT: Report on Youth Activities.

TO : Deputy Chief Commissioner.

THRU : Vice President, Administrative Section.

The Education Sub-Commission has the honor to submit a brief report on its initial efforts to restore on proper foundations certain youth activities in AMG territory. We have approached this matter cautiously and with limited objectives. We have wished to see what initiative there is of the "grass roots" type and what use may be made of it in the educational enterprise. Education Officers of Regions III and IV have pooled their ingenuity under Sub-Commission encouragement to see what may be discovered in Naples worthy of further development in Rome and of eventual recommendation to the Ministry of National Education for the whole of Italy.

The general Commission has been divided into five subcommissions to benefit the youth of various ages. To date these subcommissions have considered the following problems:

1. The University subcommission has arranged a political forum for university students. It is considering plans for the re-establishment of the university printing house. It is attempting to set up a student mess.
2. The Scuola Media Superiore Subcommission has proposed a plan for the establishment of clubs in the secondary schools and the publication of a school newspaper. The first club has been started with great enthusiasm.
3. The Scuola Media Inferiore Subcommission has developed a plan for inaugurating groups akin to the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts. A request has been made of the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts of America for help in rebuilding this organization.
4. The Scuola Elementare Subcommission has presented a detailed plan for furnishing lunches to school children. If this plan is not in early operation, it will not be from any lack of enthusiasm and practicality on the part of the youths who have promoted it.
5. The Asili Infantili Subcommission has proposed plans for re-opening of kindergartens and day nurseries for children of working mothers.
6. The coordinating committee of these five subcommissions has

worked out a general plan for student aid (patronato scolastico) equally applicable in all regions.

We have employed a full time civilian secretary, a gifted and enthusiastic Italian teacher, who brings much energy to the direction of this work and radiates enthusiasm. All reports, from that of the Rector of the Naples University to the humblest student, indicate a genuine passion for independence and a fertility of suggestion which together show that here is a well-spring for the kind of self-management that underlies democratic government.

As a case in point, students below the University level recently gave a concert in a Naples theatre to raise money for their future enterprises. On two days' notice they filled the theatre and gave a creditable performance managed throughout by themselves.

1. Lacking in personal and commission experience with the matter here in hand, I am thrown back on general principles.
2. The case presented by the Italian Government seems right in general. So much so that I have said to my Minister that I would welcome any evidence that may come to him of mistakes we have made in removals or appointments and would consider them with an open mind.
3. We could hardly surrender the right at this stage to be the final judges as to individual cases of importance; but, in exercising judgment, I think we should lean toward their side of the case. As for education, I know that I shall not straighten the Learning Tower of Learning by springing leaks in its legal foundation (of administrative law and well established customs of precedence).

REPORT ON CONFERENCE WITH MINISTER OF EDUCATION

1. In a long friendly pre-inaugural interview with the new Minister of National Education, formerly Rector Onofredo of Naples University, he broached the question of his establishing his Ministry in or near Naples rather than at Salerno. For this he had received permission from the Head of his Government, and he wished permission from us to move into occupied territory. The permission has been recommended on general grounds of (1) convenience to him and the staff he wishes to gather, (2) access to the technical aspects of this Subcommissions own staff in Naples, and (3) relief to the overcrowding at Salerno.

2. We in our turn sought from him light upon our most pressing problem, defascistization, especially in the portion of Region II which has never been occupied. He urged upon him the necessity for prompt and even action so as to bring that territory in line with other A.C.C. and A.M.G. practice. He assured us of his willingness and desire to proceed energetically as soon as his office is established. He cited his own record at Naples University in this regard, and bespoke from our experience together there both collaboration and expedition.

3. He is a man not without energy and perhaps with ideas, and we may expect a growing efficiency in the management of education. We have already achieved with him at Naples a rather nice balance of collaboration and independence, and the prospects with him as national Minister are not bad. He appears less anti-clerical than certain clerics had suggested of him. There is a kind of sharpness about his temperament heightened rather than relieved by a high-tensional seriousness. But what is 'stubbornness' in enemies is often called 'character' among friends.

1. In the honeymoon of Military Government in Italy, particularly in Sicily, universities and cultural societies offered honorary degrees and other evidences to allied officers and particularly to allied educational officers. This was done in part from gratitude.

2. As gratitude passes through stress into want, emulation of precedent mixes with premonitions of prudence to extend this practice. The rich field for harvesting "honors" lies just ahead of us.

3. The present time, with the practice not yet deeply rooted on the Italian mainland, is a proper and opportune moment courteously to institute a policy consistent with Allied disinterestedness and dignity.

4. Our policy should be as scrupulous in competition for deference as in the acquisition of wealth. Our power is compromised, however subtly, in accepting honors from those who could not deny us them, as it would be overtly corrupted if we took money from them. That they, as conquered men are not free to withhold, we as free men are not privileged to accept, not as honors.

5. I recommend, therefore, as from the educational frontier, itself peculiarly exposed in this matter, that allied officers be forbidden to accept academic honors from institutions under the direct control of Allied Military Government.

1. A new instance of the interference by the Sub-Secretary of Education of the Italian Government with territory under A.M.G. has just been brought to our attention by the Chief of the Education Division of Region 3. While the incident itself is trivial, the principle involved is not - Cuomo apparently still is trying to exercise direct control or influence over Italian School officials in A.M.G. territory.
2. The incident in question is as follows: the sub-secretary of Education dismissed Cafiero Concetta and Zaniboni Leny, teachers of German in the R. Ginasio Tasso and R. Liceo Scientifico, respectively, both in Salerno, and sent them to the Provveditore agli Studi in Naples with an order or strong recommendation that he employ them, which he did. There was no clearance through the Chief of the Education Division in Region 3.
3. Obviously direct pressure by Cuomo on a Provveditore agli Studi in A.M.G. territory for whatever purpose, is improper interference.

1. Major Sherwood tells me that you have changed the arrangement which he made with you during his visit to you in January permitting the Sub-commission to remain in Naples.
2. In view of the fact that I am daily expecting to leave and therefore working at high pressure to finish the work of the University in order to get it open by the end of the month. I hope that this order is not immediately effective. When it was arranged that I should remain here I was granted a month to 6 weeks, and to countermand this now would be unfortunate.
3. Furthermore, this Sub-commission has always been so understaffed owing to the shortsightedness of the planners that it has had to operate on a largely civilian staff. At the moment we have 6 civilian employees all of whom are specialists. If this Sub-commission moves the staff must be disbanded, and a new one found in Salerno - which is no easy matter - or else that number of officers added to the staff. Alternatively the work stops.
4. In addition, as it is quite impracticable for the Rector and Deans or Faculty of the University or other officials to come daily to Salerno, daily travel to Naples would be required which is both a waste of time and petrol.
5. It is therefore suggested that the original arrangement be adhered to as far as I am concerned while I am here. But as soon as Lt. Col. Smith arrives and the files with the chief clerk from Palermo that they should be centered in Salerno. This ought to be any day now as Col. Smith was seen in Algiers last week on his way here. I suggest Major Sherwood should be left here after I have gone to carry on the work with the University and when this is completed he can gradually reduce the civilian staff here.

1. I refer to memorandum ED/3 of 8th February addressed to you by your Education Adviser.

2. I wish to keep the advanced Rome party belonging to 5 Army AMG to a minimum of officers and this party must, of course, contain those responsible for the immediate administration and preservation of law and order. I should have no objection to the attachment of Capt. Dollard to 5 Army AMG and I suggest that your Education Adviser should discuss this matter with S.C.A.O., 5 Army AMG.

3. While there will be no objection to the Education Officer, 5 Army AMG moving to Rome as soon as possible after the initial stages of occupation, I should feel very dubious about the wisdom of moving the whole of the Sub-Commission to Rome before the general move of the Italian Government with the Allied Control Commission. The arguments put forward by your Education Adviser are no different from any arguments which might be submitted by other Heads of Sub-Commissions and I hope that he can be convinced.

A. REGIONAL DIRECTION

1. Experience has shown the necessity of instant control in the educational field, as soon as territory is occupied by the armies, in order to prevent ill advised action in conflict with the Allied policies by the local Italian education officials.
2. It is therefore considered essential that a regional director of education, preferably one who would be persona grata with the Vatican, be appointed to the staff of AMG, 5th Army, to take immediate action in the forward areas, in accordance with the directions of the Educational Sub-commission. A most suitable officer, if available would be Captain Dollard.

B. ADVANCE OF SUB-COMMISSION

1. On the occupation of Rome it is considered of paramount importance that the Educational Sub-commission should move there at the earliest possible moment, for the following reasons:
 - a. The great importance of the University of Rome and the large number of Scholastic Academies and learned Societies there.
 - b. The proximity of the Vatican and the tendency shown by the Cardinal Secretary of State to a strongly critical attitude towards AMG/AC, however unjustified, in the field of education. In this regard it may be remarked that the representative of the Cardinal Secretary of State who visited this Subcommission in Sicily was convinced that his criticisms were based on inaccurate information.
 - c. The fact that University circles in Rome may be expected to contain much stronger fascist elements than have hitherto been encountered.
2. It would be appreciated if authority might be given for this Sub-commission to plan on the basis of a move to Rome immediately entrance is possible in order to take control of what will undoubtedly be a key situation in the Italian educational field.
