Io sarò molto grato se vorrà riesaminare la questione e riferire a questo Comando quali sono stati i motivi per cui la Signora Gobbo e' stata allontanata dal Provveditorato.

2. Immediately after this conversation I made a
rapid investigation and attempted to convey to you the
results by telephone, but was unable to get through and
therefore I am writing this letter instead.

3. My investigation, though brief and inevitably
somewhat hurried, leads me to believe that the accusations
are totally unfounded.

4. Neither do the Provost Marshal nor at the time
was I able to find a trace of confirmation and it appears
exceedingly unlikely that even the ex-Provost Marshal
who is still here at having been unable to have ^{the} way
over the transfers of teachers, has made any charges against
Major Gomo, though he is known to be unfriendly to her.

5. The position therefore is that some person or
persons unknown has evidently made the charges in question
direct to the military without any notification either to
this office, or to the Provost Marshal of Milan, or to the
GMB, or, as far as I am aware, to anybody else in London.

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12. in view of the charge, and even though I have no grounds whatever for accepting it, I have felt that the situation is delicate enough for me to remove the name of the Sigma Kappa from the two Mason-Weaver. I was to have left here. I am sure that he has not taken in any sense an advantage of the unspecified charges against me. I do it only because the matter is for the moment subjudice.

13. I would very strongly emphasize it if you would kindly treat the whole thing as a matter of the greatest urgency and so that you can to clear it up as quickly as possible. If necessary Sigma Kappa is willing to come to some to defend herself. I am personally satisfied that an investigation will prove the Sigma Kappa to be completely innocent of any malfeasance.
