ORDINE DEL GIORNO

I Provveditori agli Studi Reggenti del Veneto, convenuti negli 16 aprile 1946 nelle sale del Provveditorato agli Studi di Venezia, per discutere dei problemi scolastici, prima di chiudere i loro lavori,

presa in esame la situazione che si sta creando nei riguardi dei Provveditori Reggenti dell'Italia Settentrionale, in seguito alla loro sostituzione, già in atto in alcune provincie,

a) fanno presente che il loro mandato, di natura eminentemente politico, non può ritenersi esaurito se non dopo la convocazione della Costituzione, non potendosi addurre nei loro riguardi le ragioni di opportunità che hanno in altro momento determinato la sostituzione dei Prefetti e dei Questori;

b) segnalano la disparità nel trattamento usato nei loro confronti rispetto ai Prefetti e ai Questori, ai quali, pur non appartenendo spesso a pubbliche Amministrazioni, fu tuttavia usato il riguardo di proporre loro una eventuale regolare assunzione in ruolo;

c) richiamano l'attenzione sul fatto che nel momento particolare, a un mese di distanza dalla Costituzione, vengono affidati Uffici direttivi così delicati come i Provveditorati ed elementi in cui avviene in molti casi è avvenuta senza alcuna garanzia che non fosse di natura fascista e che nei venti mesi di dominazione nazifascista volessero indubbiamente opere di collaborazione;

d) richiamano l'opportunità che l'eventuale riassunzione di questi elementi, anche se già discriminati, sia preceduta da uno scrupoloso esame della loro nomina e della loro carriera in regime fascista.

B O L Z A N O - Prof. Mattedi is a fair-minded man and has always been a willing worker. However he is not the best of administrators. He has handled the German problem with tact and has enabled a spirit of cooperation to come to life in this problems. SUBJECT: Problems¹ posed by Provveditore, Trento

TO : Regional Education Officer, Venetia Region

1. The Provveditore of Trento has been in Rome for a few days discussing with the Minister and on the problem of opening "post-elementary" schools in Trento in place of avviamento professionale, both as a means of restoring the much more satisfactory "Bürgerschule" type of education that existed under the Austrian regime and as a means of absorbing the surplus of teachers. He has worked out the plan and program very fully and well, and the Minister and I agree that it would be very desirable for him to proceed with his plans. They will also serve as an experiment and demonstration for the rest of Italy where the scuole di avviamento professionale are very unsatisfactory and many students go to the scuole medie in consequence who have no intention of following through this preparatory course with more advanced secondary education. It is recommended that you permit the provveditore to put his plans into execution.

2. The provveditore wants to open the schools (all types) on 1 October. It is recommended that you permit him to do so.

3. The provveditore is being pressed to continue the classi distaccate (branch classes of secondary schools in courses removed from the main schools) which were organized during the emergency. He believes that in only two cases is this justifiable under present conditions but wants to be assured of your support if he holds firm. Our directives give him authority to open such classes subject to the approval of the REO, but do not require him to open them. It is recommended that unless you have well considered reasons to the contrary, you accept his recommendation and support him in carrying it out.

4. He states that in one or two cases you have assigned teachers to schools or made transfers without first consulting him, resulting in his having two persons for the same post. This is doubtless due to a misunderstanding. Our general policy is that transfers are made by the Ministry even in EC territory, and that assignments are made by the provveditore, subject to the approval of the REO. It is obvious that if we act independently in matters of the internal administration of the schools, assignment of personnel, etc., only confusion will result.

5. Eight or ten teachers are reported to be in Trento who belong in other provinces but who are unable to go back to their regular posts - one, for example, belongs in Casimo. I have explained that Allied policy is that while they are in his province, if they are di ruolo, they should be attached to his provveditorato and paid; but this can continue for only a reasonable time while they are getting a reply from the Minister as to whether they may have "distinzioni" from their regular seats. The procedure is for the teacher in question to submit his reasons for asking "distinzioni" (permission to remain away from his regular post) or transfer to the Minister, through the provveditore. If granted, he may continue through the year to be paid in the province where he is; if denied, payment in that province will cease and he will have to return to his regular post to be paid. An AS order, ap-

lying to all civilian employees of the Italian Government in Military Government territory allows the respective Ministers direct jurisdiction on matters concerning individuals - transfers, promotions, pensions, etc. In regard to the career of individuals, the provveditore and Minister may communicate directly and the Minister can give orders even in MG territory. This does not apply to policies or to general school administration where, of course, Military Government is the sole authority, except where certain Ministerial decrees have been implemented in MG Territory.

6. The provveditore asks permission to make provisional transfers within his own province of certain professors and presidi who, though cleared by the separation commission, have a savor of having supported the fascist regime in their community and who would be much more effective in a locality where they are less known. The transfer being provisional and within the province, you can grant the provveditore this right, notwithstanding what was said in paragraph 5, since it in no way permanently affects the career of the individual or the situation outside the province. It is recommended that, unless you have reasons to the contrary, you grant this authority.

7. The provveditore states that he is hampered in his administration by not being able to get prompt, clear-cut decisions on his problems. I have said that this is probably in part due to your being new in the field and wanting to be very sure of your ground before making a decision - in part due to the fact of your transport having broken down - but largely due to his own failure to put his problem and his recommendation as to the solution before you in such definite written form that you can simply initial your approval, if you approve, deny the request if you disapprove, or submit the problem to me if you feel that it is a matter that should be decided at this Hq. or in consultation with the Minister.

8. I enclose herewith my report on Bolzano. You may wish to use it in persuading the MG in Trento to allow the opening of German-language schools in the border of Bolzano. Note the listing of actions still to be taken, at the end. I'll send you additional copies of this report, with copies of the language-distribution map, in a few days. Meanwhile, please urge your committee in Bolzano to prepare the revised plan, in which the Minister's suggestions for modification of the original plan are properly incorporated. Please send me two copies - for the Minister and my files.

9. I shall report to you immediately in regard to the textbooks for Bolzano when I have any news.

Pertanto sarebbe opportuno che nei casi più gravi si provvedesse da parte del Provveditore, previa autorizzazione, ad un trasferimento provvisorio nell'ambito della provincia. I funzionari per cui propongo il trasferimento sono: *mf*

a) Prof. Ulisse Morelli, incaricato dal governo tedesco di reggere il Provveditorato durante il periodo di occupazione. E' Preside del Liceo scientifico.

b) Prof. Marzari Chiesa Francesco, Preside del Liceo di Riva.

c) Prof. Pagano Armando, Preside dell'Istituto tecnico ind. di Trento.

d) Circa tre o quattro direttori didattici.

5) Sarebbe pure necessario, anche su richiesta della Commissione di epurazione, il trasferimento del Segretario capo del Provveditorato Dott. Salvatore Cappai. *Dea?*

6) Sarebbe infine necessario che il Provveditore agli studi avesse una maggior possibilità di azione. La dipendenza da un R.E.O., distante, operato di lavoro, sovraccarico di problemi non si risolve in un beneficio per l'amministrazione scolastica. D'altronde il Ministero è distante e per ovvie ragioni non può intervenire. Ne segue che la vita e l'azione del Provveditorato agli studi sono completamente paralizzate, che la sua procedura è lentissima e le sue decisioni eccessivamente tarde. E forse questo il nostro problema più grave e più difficile.

1. Since writing my report the woman Del Gaizo called at this office, saying that the Minister had said that it rested with me "to give" her back her school". Since the matter is evidently sub judice of the Ministry it is clearly not advisable or correct for me take any such step, even if I were favourably disposed to her cause.
2. The municipal report is so clear and the evidence against her so damning that I would not exacerbate the strong local feeling in Bassano by putting her back.
3. The report of high Fascist support in Rome and Starace's telegram (page 11) will take a lot of explaining, unless perhaps she still has powerful, clandestine support in Rome.
4. From the evidence therefore, I am not in agreement with her returning to Bassano, and for that matter, any other similar post. I have taken steps to secure her Scheda Personale.
5. The letters she produced from the British FSS I consider of little value, supporting as they do a feminine "Vicar of Wakefield."

I have told them to make the rounds of the book-stores in the city of Padova and to discover books that could be used for the elementary schools.

7. The Provveditori's are sending in their monthly charts filled with the material that they have at hand. Many Provvedito-

ri have not had the chance nor the transport to visit the communes in their provinces.

8. Several lists have come in for books from England and the United States. I have forwarded these lists to you.

9. I am in the process of checking up on visits to Rome of many officials of education without my consent. Too many people are in the habit of going direct and often without informing this office to the Ministry of Education in Rome. I am sending a separate letter on a prominent case. When an official of the standing of Prof. Marchesi visits the Ministry, (and he, at least, told me he was going), it appears to me as a matter of principle under AMG conditions that we, that is this office and yours, should know what transpires. I have found Marchesi rather devious in some ways, but without at present any serious results. Meneghetti, is I think a finer man.

10. You may find this report a short one but there are many things that I have already forwarded to Rome for your action and knowledge.

The same school also has a Kindergarten for children of the years 1939 -1942 with 21 children. The grammar school has 8 classes and 42 boys and 42 girls, i.e. 84 students are inscribed.

The leader of the primary school is the director Ivan Prijetelj. As teachers on same are occupied 8 teachers, ladies and gentlemen; the kinder-garden is in the hands of 3 school mistresses.

- 4) We beg to ask: the A.M.G. may give a subvention for all school-requirements: books, copy-books, school tools, office materials, etc.
- 5) Further we ask: the A.M.G. should give to the professors and teachers a convenient salary.
- 6) During the holidays a special course of English language and English culture may be held for our professors and teachers. The A.M.G. for this purpose could send a special school expert, who would acquaint us with the English schools and English culture.
- 7) An English library may be founded with English books, magazines and newspapers.
- 8) For our undergraduates we are asking, to make them possible to carry on their studies on the universities, now being any means.

The number of all Slovenian pupils will be nearly 800. The leaders of the schools guarantee, that only qualified professors and teachers will teach and that the education will be given in the spirit of the western democratic forces.

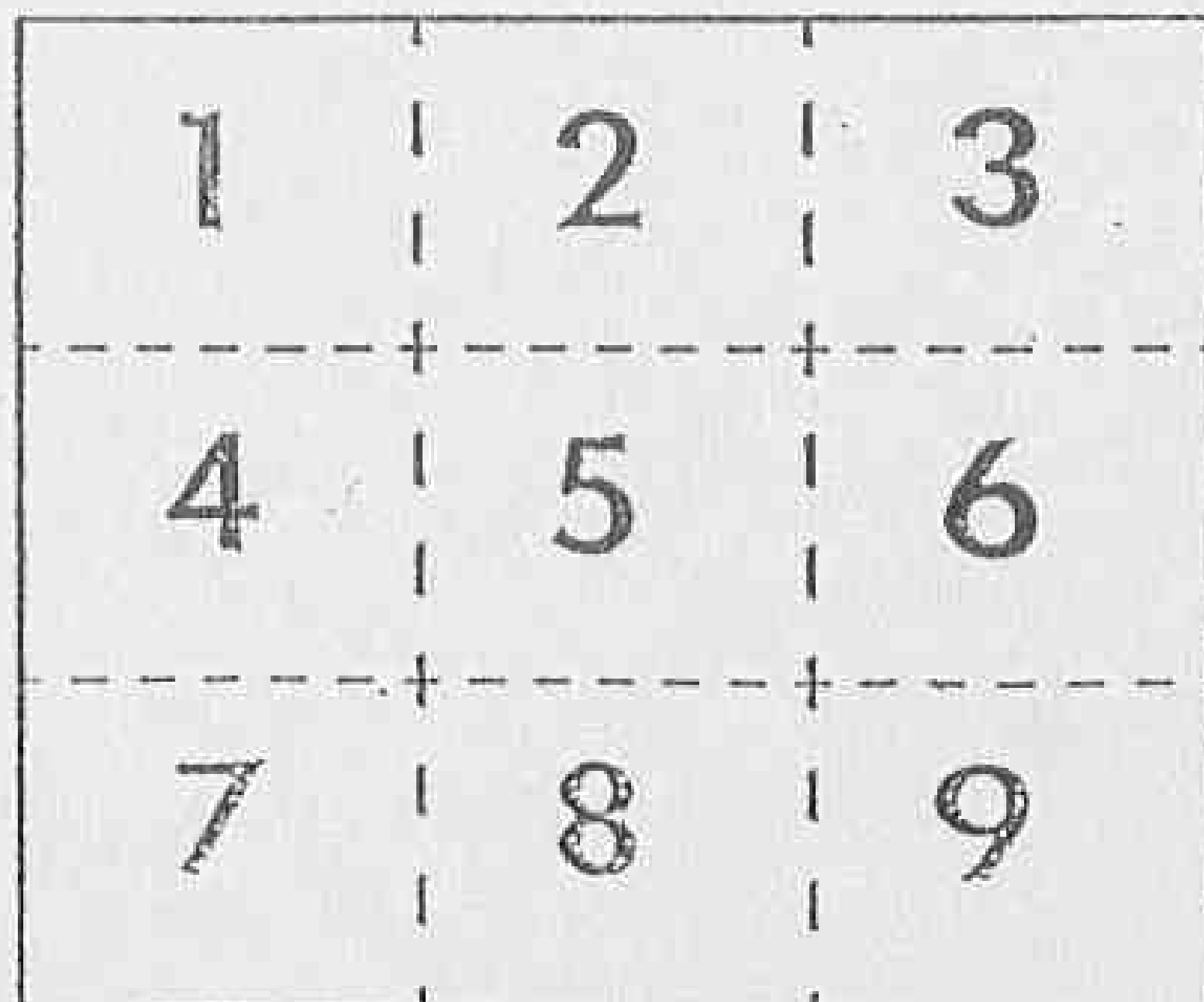
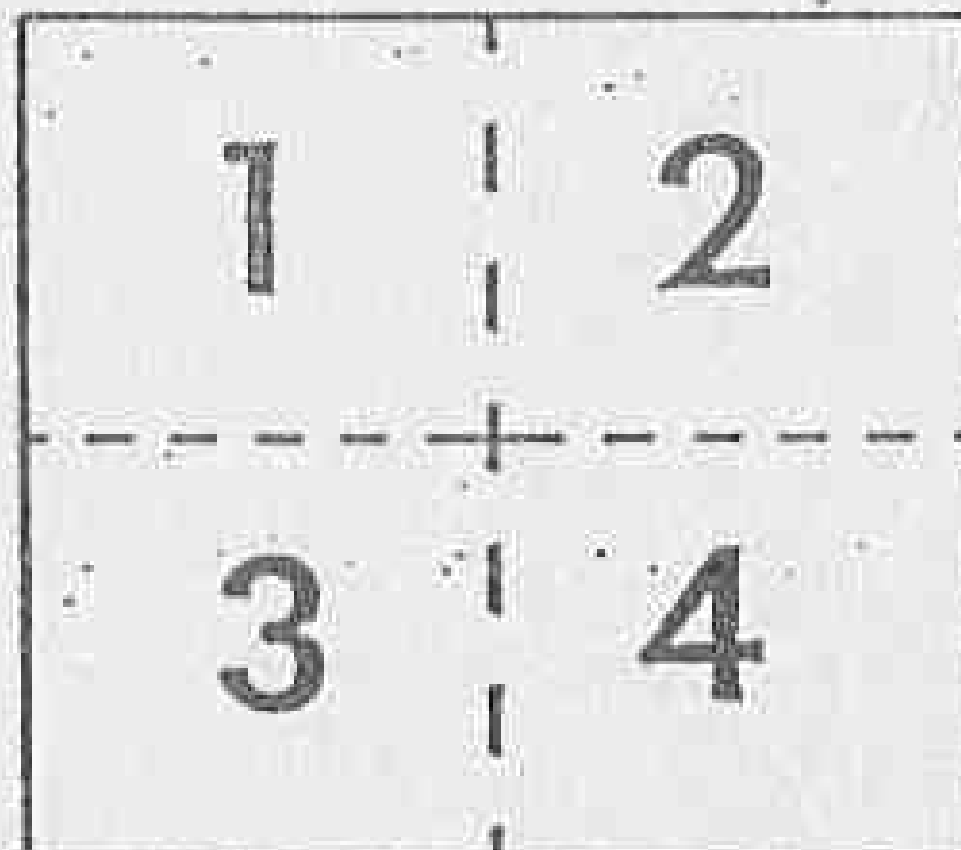

Generally, personnel will be found locally, with the exception of 2 or 3 key persons known personally to the R.E.O. as efficient, who, subject to official consent, may be offered posts.

Printing will be done in Pavia if possible.

It is, of course, impossible to say when this area will be liberated. More important is its speed of liberation. Should the advance continue slow, time will be available to commence in each province, in order generally from South to North.

Arrangements have been made, however, for the far more difficult situation which would present itself should a number of provinces be so liberated simultaneously.

Basically, our first job would be to appoint, with P.C. consent acting Provveditori in such provinces, provide them with the minimum of essential instructions and leave each to start work in his own province, while the Regional Education Officer takes each in turn for details. Once work in a province has been started, the routine matters could be dealt with by the chief clerk of the group with the help of Provincial Education Officers, and all important matters referred to Regional Education Officer at Reg.HQ.

Such is the provisional plan worked out by Region XII, any detail of which may have to be reviewed to meet certain conditions.

As far as possible, things are ready. A good supply of directives and other papers and certain office equipment is at present at Reg. XII HQ. at Pesaro. T/5 Apicella is at present on loan to Region IX.

1. This past week has been a busy one for this division.
2. In the early part of the week I visited the refugee centers in Treviso and Padova. The conditions for operating schools for the children in these centers are quite excellent. I have had the consent from Capt. Hudson of the Displaced Persons Division to go ahead with the purchasing of supplies and the setting up of classes. A few days ago I stumbled upon a cache of Fascist Ministry of Education stationary. I have requisitioned enough of this paper to supply the refugee schools with writing materials. Ink-wells and ink and pens and pencils have also been found. I am intending to distribute this material to the refugee centers gratis.
3. In regard to the epuration of the University of Padova, I believe that we are about ready to begin work and should be able to reopen the University within ten days or at the utmost by the end of this month. The political setbacks have held up the commissions functioning.
4. Attached you will find copies of letters that I have sent round to this HQ. One of the letters is on the establishing of classes in English for employees of HQ. and the other is on the issuing of a Regional newspaper. The Regional Commissioner was well pleased on both suggestions and has given me the go sign. 5925
5. The bi-lingual problem of Bolzano and Belluno and the reinstatement of teachers and Presidi suspended by the Germans from teaching in these provinces is gaining magnitude. I wish that a policy could be settled there in Rome.

6. I am having the book "Scout Games", translated into Italian by a professoressa here in Padova. The Boy Scout movement is coming along very nicely. Attached you will find a translation into Italian of Mr. Catty's "The Boy Scout Movement in Italy". I have issued the Italian copies to both the regular scout groups and also the Catholic Scout groups.

7. We have found a publishing house here in Padova that is willing to print text-books. In fact it has already submitted books to the Text-book epuration committee. The Provveditore here at Padova has already set up the commission and we are ready to go with the epuration. I have spoken to Major Rudie of Commerce about the materials needed for the printing of these text-books and he has asked me for my estimate of materials required. I told him that I would take all he could supply.

8. With the exception of Belluno all the Provveditoria are functioning smoothly. In Belluno the consensus of opinion is that the man chosen for the position is too young and should be replaced by a man of more experience. I am going to talk the question of bringing up a man from the south for the position with the Provincial Commissioner.

9. So far I am keeping my head above water but I fear that with the addition of Venezia Giulia I will be swamped under unless I have the assistance of another officer.

1. The salient points concerning the educational conditions in the above provinces are given below, followed by a brief general note.

a) VENETIA

In the city of Venice four schools are badly damaged and four requisitioned (probably for a short time only). The suburb of Mestre is most badly damaged, but officials are confident that education can be continued without delay. It has generally been little interrupted until April 25, 1945 as compared with the schools in the south. It was hoped to reopen the schools on May 11th, continue until May 28th and then to commence the exams on 1 June. This will have to be altered. The Istituto Superiore di Economia e Commercio is not damaged or requisitioned. The rector was arrested by the C.I.N.

b) Novigo Province

The city of Novigo has suffered little and work could recommence very soon. The position of the elementary schools is less satisfactory, especially in the towns along the banks of the Po, where education has been interrupted for some time. Many elementary schools are destroyed or badly damaged. Schools in Adria, Bedia, and Laas Superiore also suffered. The C.I.N. placed the Headmaster of the Technical Institute in position as temporary Provveditore agli Studi or School Superintendent. He is doing very well.

6) PROVINCIO

A new Provveditore Agli Studi appointed by the D.L.G. greeted me. His name is Prof. Vittorelli Girlando. This man was the former Provveditore of the scuola Commerciale. He has believed the former Provveditore, Dott. Bianchini Amadeo, who was an Italian before Italian unification. Dott. Bianchini is now in Genova. He has moved the Provveditorato to the town of Cagliari. The equipment and buildings of the Provveditorato in Genova have been completely destroyed. The files and records are now being brought back to Genova from Cagliari and will be set up in the building of the Archivio Notario. Prof. Vittorelli told us that he has received orders from the Commissario della Provincia, a Dott. Bianchini located at the D.L.G. to reopen schools on 14 May 1945.

Two thirds of the elementary schools in the city have been destroyed. One third of the elementary schools are in condition to be used with slight repairs necessary.

He appears good and I shall probably recommend his appointment to the Provincial Commissioner in due course.

The damages sustained to the buildings in the area of 12-15 million lire. All instruments of the University have been saved. The buildings have many broken windows which can be repaired soon.

The 43-44 semester began on 1 November 43 and functioned until 1 May 44 without interruption. From 1 May to 31 July 44 exams were held. Then from 1 October until 30 November 44 exams were held again. This year the school opened on 15 January and functioned until 30 April. Very few students attended one to the way this year. Students comprised mostly those from the city of Padova. Many students have not attended school because they were in hiding from the Germans. The Pro-rector intends a summer term for these students. The normal enrollment of the university is 8000 students. They are expecting the same amount this year now that the war is over.

2. General

The position is very much better than was feared as regards damages and amount of work done in present school year. Officials have shown commendable initiative and promptitude in getting started again, although too without proper authority.
