You doubtless have been notified that you may use the Castle, but are requested to protect the reputation of both the Scouts and the Superintendent of Monuments by seeing that the use is properly supervised, and that boys and girls do not use it at night without adequate chaperonage.

Dear Washburne,

On 24 November I had an interesting and useful talk with Captain J.A. Meadows, R.E., 994 Port Operating Coy. (RE), Bari, C.M.F.

He is putting in several days a week helping the local Scouts and had not previously been able to tap any source of advice on the policy level. He is obviously doing a first class job and I did my best to iron out some of the policy wrinkles for him. In Bari, the ASCI Scouts are beginning to show signs of repenting being too Priest-ridden and are particularly concerned at the lack of emphasis placed on the 4th Scout Law of International Friendship by the Church, even to the extent of separating from the ASCI. Meadows will do his best to encourage them to stick and do a bit of Home Mission work.

A practical problem with which he is faced is the use of the ground floor of the Old Castle at Bari as a Scout Centre to be used for both ASCI and CEI under the general supervision of the Bari Rover Scout Service. The local Superintendent of Monuments is sympathetically disposed, but the blessing of the Ministry of Monuments is desirable, if not essential.

I told Meadows that I would drop you a line introducing him so that he could get into direct touch with him whenever necessary. He has been playing rather a lone hand and would be glad to have some one to back him up and, as he himself affirms, give him a kick (very occasionally!) if needed.

The question of "Communist" Scouts has also been raised, and Meadows has quite rightly assured both ASOI and SEI that no material or spiritual assistance, as offered to ASOI and SEI by the Allied Forces, will be extended to the Communists.

Dear Col. Wilson:

I have just read Capt. Gifford's interesting report on his activities, and I want to second strongly his suggestion that a Scout Adviser be assigned to Italy, at least for a few months, preferably for a year.

The movement here is growing stronger all the time, thanks first to Loren, then to the long devoted service of Betty, and now to the enthusiastic hard work of Gifford. Such part-time volunteer service has been invaluable, but insufficient and interrupted. I assume that you have had some time conferences with Betty, since he is right there in London, knows the situation here so well, and gave of himself so assistingly here in Italy. You will know, therefore, how strongly he concurs in Gifford's recommendation.

The Girl Guides, as you know, have had two successive pairs of trainers here - the first pair from Switzerland, for a short stay, the second pair from Belgium for two months - they are still here. The aggregate full time help sent by the Guides from England (including Lady Baden-Powell; and Mrs. Leigh White's visit) is the equivalent of the full time person for about seven months. What this has done for the Guides movement is immeasurably great - but I am still recommending that the Guides follow through with a Guide adviser for a few months after Belgian trainers leave.

The multiplicity of the Scout troops, and the tremendous need for the constructive type of recreation and training given by Scouts makes help from the International Bureau most urgently necessary. We must substitute a strong Scout movement for the former ill and ill-fated of the fascists, or Italian boys will be either chaotically disorganized and frequently delinquent, or organized in a fascist pattern under the banner of political parties.

The obvious person to appoint as Scout Adviser, if he can be released from his present assignment, is of course, Capt. Gifford, since any outsider would lose much time learning the language, mentality, and problems here. Furthermore, expense and difficulty of arranging travel from England or America would be avoided.

If practicable, I should suggest that Capt. Gifford remain technically on his army assignment, as it would greatly simplify his 6675 and transportation, and as it would be a most economical arrangement for the International Bureau. Could you not arrange this through the War Office in

London: The War Office can order that while remaining on the strength of G.F. & P., Italy, (Ordinance) he be on detached duty and permitted to serve as adviser to the Federation of Boy Scouts. I would suggest that he be temporarily attached to the Education Subcommission, but the future of the Education Subcommission is too uncertain - it may go out of existence in January. (But I may be kept on as Educational Consultant to the Minister of Public Instruction, or Educational Adviser to Allied Commission - the matter is not yet decided).

The main point is to have a suitable person here who can give full time, or a large part of his time, to the Scout movement at least through next summer. I can assure that this will be welcomed by the Federation of Boy Scouts. And it is the strong recommendation of all of us who know the situation - Gatty, Gifford, and myself.

1. Herewith my interim report on Scouting in Italy.
2. It is regretted that it has not been possible to pass on this information before now.
3. Time has not permitted the writing of a proper report, but it was felt that a rough rather-rambling summary of the work done here would be more useful now than a carefully-considered report at a later date.
4. Scouting work has had to be reduced practically to nil during the last six weeks, owing to exceptionally heavy military duties. Our officer position, however, is improving again and it is hoped to resume these activities, and to send more regular reports to Allied Commission and Scout HQ's.
5. I hope that the appropriate authorities will give real consideration to the suggestion of having an Advisory Officer over here for Scout development.
6. If the appointment does become open, and I were eligible, I feel that there would be a chance of moving from my present occupation than before, as additional officers are taking over the extra work that I have been doing.

1. On account of my Army appointment's involving quite extensive travel in Italy, the offer of my spare-time services to assist the development of Italian Scouting was accepted.
2. It was agreed that I should proceed as I thought fit, to liaise with the Allied Commission, AMG, Military and Civil authorities where necessary, and to report progress when convenient.
3. Military duties have made it difficult to make reports before now, but this interim report is now submitted for your information.
4. During these 11 months, I have been fortunate enough to see - owing to my movements - more comprehensively than anyone person (Italian Scout people included) the development of Scouting here. A very brief summary of the kind of work that it has been possible to do follows:-

2. GHI Summer Camp, (Aug 45). Rather against my better judgement, I was more or less forced to take charge for a week of a Summer Camp of 40 GHI Scouts from Milan. Ultimately I was very grateful for this close connection with Italian Scouting, as it gave me an intimate view of Italian boys of all types - ranging from the son of the Chief of Police to poor boys who had been 'subsidised' to come to Camp; there were both ex-Partisans and young ~~man~~ ex-soldiers from the Republican and Brigata Nera armies amongst the few older boys.

The Milan (A.N. Italy) Commissioner was recalled on duty at the commencement of the Camp and he prevailed upon me, after much

after such resistance on my part, to take his place and run this Camp, taking complete charge of the adults already there (who were very helpful, but not qualified to organize a camp) and all the boys during my week's leave.

I had a most novel week, not seeing an Englishman nor speaking a word of English during that time. Courts of Honour, yards on discipline and the Scout Law, talks of health and all the normal duties fell to me. I translated many of the old Camp Fire favourites into Italian, and these have now been accepted in their programmes both here and in other parts, such as songs, where they have been spread from mouth to mouth.

A comprehensive programme covered many aspects of Scouting and, if Rome has not already forwarded details to INQ, a resumé could be forwarded.

A Rally of some 2000 Scouts was held in the Villa Doria park, and, on arrival, the Milan contingent (the largest number of visiting Scouts and Scouters) was given a great welcome.

There was a very good Camp Fire on that evening and we put across some of the Jam res songs and yells, now - after so many years - blossoming forth at last in the Italian language; a very

As Admirable Orlinton would almost seem necessary. But if something like that could be obtained, provided only that he is obtained quickly, Italian Scouting would move twice as fast, and many pitfalls, which are occurring from time to time could be avoided.

This suggestion has already been discussed with Col Washburne, Education Division, HQ Allied Commission, Rome, and I believe that he is in agreement with the principle. I hope, therefore, that it will be given serious consideration in England.

Dear Colonel Washburne,

May I first of all express to you my sincerest thanks for all your kindness and help during my "scouting mission" in Rome? I shall remember our meeting, as a steadfast encouragement in working for the future.

While visiting in Florence the heads of an ASCI Cooperative Association, formed by old ASCIs with banking credits for the purpose of providing equipments, hats, publications etc. (the Vatican didn't like the word "cooperative", so they called it "Stella Alpina") I spoke about "Boasting for boys" which, as you know, is to be published under their care in Florence. The man apparently in charge of ASCI publications in Florence (Cosimo Brandi c/o Esattoria Comunale, Via Castellaccio 12, Florence) was most surprised to hear of the Federation decisions not to have any D.P. translations published under the sole name of ASCI. He was "most surprised" and "knew of no such thing" - "and anyway, Rome was so slow about those publications that they'd decided to go ahead" by themselves.
