

Dear Colonel Washburne:

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of January 25 suggesting that "the American Chemical Society might find a way of underwriting a credit to Italian institutions for such chemical publications as they wished to buy."

SUBJECT : Training of teachers of
physical education.

TO :

1. The Italian Government is studying the problem of training of physical education teachers. Under Fascism such training was largely propaganda and military drill. At present there are no schools or courses to prepare teachers of physical education.

2. It will be very helpful if you will send whatever catalogues or descriptive literature you may have which will show how future teachers of physical education are trained in your institution. A detailed program of the total course, including the cultural aspects, would be most useful.

3. If you have any reprints of articles in professional journals, dealing with this subject, we should appreciate them.

4. If there are one or two outstandingly good books on the subject and you would be kind enough to order them sent to me at once, I shall be grateful. Bill may be sent to the Winnetka Educational Press, Crow Island School, Winnetka, Illinois, which acts as my agent for book purchases.

5. The need for these things is urgent; so I shall appreciate all possible expedition in responding to this request.

6. In sending these things you will be directly contributing to a vital part of the educational reconstruction of this devastated country.

Dear Mr. Welch:

Thank you for your letter of 17 September.

The Cultural Relations Division in the State Department never sent anything to me - if it went to London, as far as I know it stopped there. I see Prof. Morey, Cultural Relations for the U.S. Embassy here, very frequent - ly, as we work together on various projects, but he has never mentioned receiving anything from London. I'm sure they got to no educational commissions here.

The catalogues I asked for were for a book store in Turin, with a Rome office, (Libreria Paravia). They were very glad to get them. I ordered them from you direct on 8 June.

The confusion in the reports you get is understandable. Actually no one seems to have worked out a plan for the resumption of commerce with Italy. Italy's lack of foreign exchange makes trade for the moment almost impossible. Her limited dollar credits are used exclusively by the Italian Government in ordering basic essentials. In time this will of course clear up. Sometimes an Italian firm has some private credits in the United States, but this is rare.

As to what to expect for the next few years: All I can say is that the needs are unbelievably great, and the means for satisfying them equally small.

While the Education Subcommission continues to exist (presumably until some time in December) I am very glad to transmit requests, materials or information. When we go out of business, I may be attached to the U.S. Embassy to continue my educational work here. But no one yet knows.

If you want to send some of your demonstration sets I'll be delighted to receive them and put them where they will do the most good. A package (up to United States parcel post domestic size) may be sent to me if not addressed personally but to

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Things sent through State Department and London have little likelihood
of reaching Italy in the foreseeable future.

Thank you for your kind offer to help. When I think of concrete things

Dear Lt. Col. Washburne:

Thank you for your letter of August 20th acknowledging the Welch Scientific Apparatus Catalog on physics, chemistry, and biology and the School Furniture Catalog on equipment and supplies.

In the second paragraph of your letter, you refer to the fact that these catalogues have been forwarded to the Italian manufacturers requesting them. It is possible that the catalogues to which you refer have been sent on a different request than the ones with which I am familiar. We were requested to supply large quantities of our catalogues, I think, fifty of each to the Department of State, Division of Cultural Relations, and these catalogues in turn were taken to London and from there they were distributed to agencies in nine of the former German occupied countries, including Italy. It was our impression that these catalogues were to be used by the educational committees to select material for the rehabilitation of the teaching systems in the devastated areas of these countries. Are the two catalogues to which your letter refers as having gone to the interested Italian manufacturers requesting them copies which were distributed through the channels to which I refer? It is, of course, possible that we have received another inquiry to which we have not correlated your acknowledgement and on which the two catalogues referred to were sent.

It is indeed a pleasure to have your note. From the first announcement appearing in our north shore papers of your appointment as director of this commission on education in Italy, I have watched with great interest the press releases

Concerning your work, we have a great deal of interest in what is being done in the liberated countries and we hear so many rumors, stories of varying amounts of material that will be needed from America to rehabilitate the educational programs, conflicting stories that Germany is to return to instrument manufacture and re-enter that market, or that Russia or England has claimed the European sphere for that work. As manufacturers, principally of scientific apparatus and instruments for educational purposes, this leaves us very much confused as to what will be needed of us in the next few years. I have attended several meetings in New York and Chicago where this subject was discussed and each channel of information seems to bring only conflicting reports. Here in our plant we have developed greatly increased capacity during the war period for laboratory apparatus and instruments for educational and industrial use, particularly in the field of electrical measuring instruments and high vacuum pumps.

We would like very much to receive any information that you can get that is dependable as to the needs and channels through which these needs of the liberated countries will be satisfied. Any information that you could give that would guide us, and any suggestions that you could make as to the channels that should be contacted so that we will play our part in this work, would be greatly appreciated.

Recently I sent nine sets of recommended equipment for secondary education both for demonstration and for laboratory work for each of the three subjects, physics, chemistry, and biology, to Mr. S. A. Schaeffer of the Department of State, Division of Cultural Relations. He has acknowledged these and no doubt some time within a month or two this material will be passed on through the commission in London and may reach your office. We have similar material on hand and if any of it would be helpful, I would be glad to forward it directly to you, or follow any suggestions that will aid you in making our material available for this rehabilitation work.
