I am informed that probably the American Library Association will allot a limited number of sets of publications to Italy, and that selection of recipients may be left up to you and Mr. Moray. The only way in which to accommodate the Politecnico in Milan under the present circumstances would seem to be through this arrangement.

It is obvious from your communication that you are aware of the grave nature of the problem. We know that in the past the Istituto di Chimica Generale has done excellent work and believe that it is resuming its normal excellent level as rapidly as possible. It is hoped, therefore, that the request from this organization may be given serious consideration in the allotting of journals made available through the American Library Association.

It was fine to get your letter of November 23. I am enclosing the information for which you asked about John Dewey.

Your duties sound intriguing. From all reports which come back to us, you are performing in a thoroughly statesman-like manner.

We are just finishing our fall quarter and will shortly have a two weeks' break. Our winter quarter begins on January 8. The effect on registration from the return of veterans will be felt at that time. We have had large numbers of them interested in coming back to school and have been disappointed that we cannot absorb them. The housing situation here is very bad. It has become necessary to admit only men during this next quarter, and then only those men who can provide their own housing. The University does plan to build a 208-apartment building right across from the Orrington Hotel but that will not be finished until January, 1947. Some homes are also being built on the University golf course in Wilmette, but there, too, they are having trouble because of priorities. The V-12 will disband here on February 28. This should release some housing for men.

We are always glad to hear from you; we get many questions about your whereabouts and your work.



It would be almost impossible for us to provide an adequate and authoritative reply to Professor Bardecki's inquiry.

So far as my colleagues and I know there has been no continuation or repetition of McDougall's "Lamarckian experiment".

Regarding Japanese education I suggest that you work through channels to obtain the most authoritative reports are in the possession of OSS in Washington. One authority has done considerable work is Dr. Geoffrey Gorer at the British Legation, Washington.

1. I am returning herewith Prof. Mursia's letter of 3 November.
2. Dewey's "Democracy and Education" has already been translated into Italian by Prof. Codignola of the University of Florence. Application has been made for publication rights.
3. Prof. Codignola is also planning to publish in Italian Dewey's book on liberalism and an anthology of Dewey's writings.
4. As to the best person or institution with whom to make contact in regard to a bibliography of Dewey, any professor of philosophy or educational philosophy in a major university could give the necessary information - Columbia, Harvard, Chicago, or Northwestern, for example. Will Durant (address Great Neck, New York) wrote the article and bibliography on Dewey for the Encyclopedia Britannica and has discussed Dewey's work in several books. Probably he would be as good a contact as any.
5. To buy texts in the United States requires foreign exchange. Whether Prof. Mursia has any dollar credits or knows anyone in the United States who would pay for the books he wants and await reimbursement until there is a way of converting lire into dollars, Prof. Mursia alone knows. There is an organization of booksellers in Italy that is making arrangements for book purchases in the United States and before long it should be possible to order through it.
