TO : Office of Military Government for Germany (U.S.)
APO 742, U.S. Germany.

1. The Royal Institute of Geophysics of the National Research Council in Italy (R. Istituto Geofisico, Consiglio Nazionale delle Ricerche) requests that the American Command in Berlin ask the Geodätisches Institut of Potsdam for the results, even if preliminary, of the new absolute measure of gravity, with special mention of the altitude of the station.

2. Since Potsdam measurements are used as a point of reference in all parts of the world, and new measurements were begun there in 1939, this information is highly important for scientists in all countries.

against Nietzsche's doctrine, that is why no publication was possible not
even at the time before the Nazis took power.

At the present moment, my anti-Nietzsche attitude (which didn't
mean anything but an anti-nazi attitude) should be my starting point for
the re-education of the German people.

In my opinion such an activity should consist in a series of
conferences to be held with students in addition to their lessons, and
intending to help the formation and the supervising of a new German
literature.

My dear Major Washburne:

I am taking this liberty of writing to you in order to inquire whether or not my services could be of any use to the U.S. Government in connection with the necessary re-orientation of Austrian, and possibly, German education.

I taught for eight years at the Western Illinois State Teachers College, Macomb, Ill., then at the University of Kansas City, and for the last five years here at Genesee (J.R. Welles, president). I am, of course, a naturalized citizen, received a considerable amount of infantry training during three years of service with the New York Guard; my wife and three children are native Americans. Because I grew up in Vienna, graduated from the University of Vienna and had an appointment in the Austrian public school system from 1924 to 1927, it would seem possible to me that I could render a service to our government in its task of supervising and possibly re-directing the school systems in Central Europe. I speak German as well as English, have a fair knowledge of French, and know a little Italian. I do not think that the task in question is particularly easy or enviable for any one to undertake or to be associated with, but I would not hesitate to be of service if it is at all desired.

My dear Major Washburne:

When visiting my cousins, Miss Madi Bacon and Dr. Alfons Bacon, of Winnetka and Chicago, I learned of your association with AMG and was informed that at some future moment you would probably be in charge of supervision over the educational system in the liberated Republic of Austria. Assuming that this information is correct, I am taking this liberty of writing to you in order to inquire whether or not my services could be of any use to the U.S. Government in connection with the necessary re-orientation of Austrian, and possibly, German education.

In company of my cousin Alfons Bacon I was a guest at your home in Winnetka back in 1927, when I first had come to this country from my native Vienna; I gave a brief talk to your faculty at Winnetka and accompanied you on an excursion through the less respectable, but more interesting parts of Chicago with a group of "adventurous" club members. After that we met, I believe, only once in 1930; so you will hardly have a clear remembrance of me.
