Dear Friend:

Although I have not got around to answering until this moment (that quiet period just after lunch in the office before the afternoon's work grinds into high gear) I have safely received both your communications of Sept. 29th. and Oct. 9th. and all material has been duly forwarded to the designated addressees. Your letter of the 9th. containing the envelope for Walter Corti arrived only on the 19th. so it was pretty slow coming up from Italy. The letter from Corti to your wife was also despatched by airmail on the 19th. (she ought to have it by the end of this week) and let us hope it works so that you can have her nearer you.

I take the liberty of enclosing a rather interesting document (we had an Italian translation made) which our Quaker office received from the Friends in Australia. As you will note it deals with discussions in Australian governmental circles concerning Australia's need for immigrants and Laszlo Hamori and I thought that it would doubtless interest the Italian Government. Perhaps you could bring it unofficially to the attention of some appropriate Italian official or agency. Perhaps even the press (or periodical) might be interested.

I hope to be able to move my wife and children to Bern during the next month so that we can finally live in the same town. I have been commuting between Geneva and Bern long enough now.
