Subject : Books on British Education.

I am sorry not to have sent you the list of books on British education which I promised, but I find that certain notes on which I was relying have been left in Greece. I will send you something definite as I arrive, meantime a few points occur to me.

1. His Majesty's Stationery Office, Kingsway, London have produced a number of technical books on the British educational system as it stands today. They deal with such subjects as secondary education, adult education, industrial education, nursery schools, the teaching of sciences in schools, etc. Many of these are excellent. They have one brief outline (about 9 d) of the whole of British Education. These are the best and in most cases the only such descriptive books I know. If you state your problem I am sure they would be willing and able to help.
2. The Workers Educational Association, 43 St George's Avenue, Victoria, London, have brought out a series of pamphlets on current problems of education, together with a longer book, "Education for Democracy", which should be of interest. I have written to the Educational Secretary, Mr. Shearman, an airmail letter on this subject, so I expect you will hear from him. 1619
3. The British Film Institute, 4 Great Russell Street, have a number of printed reports of the use of films in education which may be of interest. I have written to them also.
4. The British Council (address Hanover Square, London) have produced one quite useful short book on the educational system as a whole with illustrations - about 50 pages long; also, I think a shorter one on nursery schools. The more controversial issues are skirted over, as one might expect; but as a description the books are useful.
5. "The Modern Schools Handbook", published by I forget whom, Gollancz I think, contains accounts of the various schools in England.

I shall write again from Greece and shall be glad to be of

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help in any other way I can.

Dear Sir,

I have just had a letter from my friend Sydney Carter, of the F.I.A.U. in Greece. He tells me that he recently met you in Rome and that you would welcome suggestions about books on British Education.

I don't know how far the kind of titles that occur to me would meet your case, but I venture to pass them on for what they are worth. I am very interested in the problem which you are tackling. SUBJECT : Educational Books for Italy

TO : Hon. John W. Studebaker
U.S. Commissioner of Education
Washington, DC.

Dear John,

Can you have a competent committee prepare a bibliography, annotated, of books to meet the following need?

Italy has been isolated from the thought and practice of the Allied nations for twenty-two years. In the field of education no books or periodicals have reached the schools, universities and libraries. The educational people have been living in a different world. Today they are very anxious to know how our schools (from nursery school through universities) are organized; what are the principal changes that have been made or are in the making as to organization, administration, curriculum, or method, and what are the principal issues being discussed, with arguments pro and con.

Books and periodicals covering these fields should be available in the Ministry of Public Instruction and the principal universities and libraries. We are seeking funds to purchase them. Meanwhile we need to know what the books are.

It is, therefore, requested that a basic list of such books, classified as to field and annotated be prepared, in two parts :

Part I would include a minimum number of books and periodicals -- a sort of nucleus of the essential ones -- for immediate acquisition even when very limited funds are available. I suggest that Part I should consist of about 25 titles -- certainly not more than 50.

Part II would include a wider range, including more specialised books which might be obtained for some libraries and not for others, or which should be bought as funds are available. There is no special limit on the length of this

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part, but my guess is that it would consist of another fifty or a hundred titles — if it is too long it will be relatively of less value as a buying list. We would rather give wide distribution to a small number of carefully selected titles than more limited distribution to a more comprehensive library. There will undoubtedly be bibliographies in many of these books, and libraries can gradually increase their collections through using these.

One other point: Can you tell me of any organization or foundation which we might interest in purchasing such books for Italy? The need is great and the satisfying of it is of basic importance in Italy's attempt to reconstruct its educational program, and, through it, its social and economic life.

Thanks ever so much for whatever help you can give us in this, John.

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In the last few months there has been a spate of writing about education in England. I have collected some of it and can remember the following-- the White Papers on education, the Bill and the Act. Also some of the Hansard Parliamentary debates.

Several committees have sat and issued reports. I can remember only the Fletcher report which is an interim one only on the Public schools, the MacNair (?) report on the supply and training of elementary school teachers, and the Norwood report on grammar schools. ^{and others} Of unofficial there were several very good publications from Nuffield College Oxford. The Headmasters Conference and the Teachers Associations issued more.

I would suggest that a letter to the President of the Board of Education, Whitehall SW1 would get full attention. He might be able to supply not only the official but also the unofficial.

Another useful man to write to would be Mr Morris, he is now acting as Director of Army Education but a letter to him as Director of Education Springfield Maidstone Kent would reach him. He is reputed as one of the coming men in education.

Dr Cyril Norwood, Master of St John's College Oxford has had great experience, he was top in the Civil Service exams, left that for headship of a Grammar school, then went to Harrow, is now at St John's.

I happen to be in the constituency of Mr R A B Butler, the President of the Board of Education. If it is any convenience I could write to him, he knows me. But official action might be quicker.

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For China-- The Chinese Ministry of Information Bentinck ST London W1 should have information, I never had to ask on this but at times they produced bulletins on this among other subjects. I expect that the branch in New York would be better informed, they have been longer at it.
