La ricostruzione dello storico ponte sul Ticino è stata decisa in una riunione convocata recentemente a Pavia. Il capitano Cott, nel darne l'annuncio ad un redattore della ANSA, ha dichiarato che i lavori di riparazione alla cattedrale di S. Ambrogio a Milano procedono bene. Presto si darà inizio alla ricostruzione del tetto di Palazzo Sormani per proteggere dalla intemperie gli affreschi esistenti. Non è stato invece ancora deciso di rifare il tetto del Palazzo reale, perchè la spesa preventiva si aggira sui 10 milioni, mentre esiste anche la eventualità che le carte del bilancio più gravemente danneggiata venga risolte in seguito al nuovo piano regolatore della città.

Data la gravità dei danni subiti dall'ospedale Maggiore, del Pal. 20 del Senato e al Palazzo Marino non è ancora possibile prevedere quale sarà la sorte di tali edifici.

Un'altra conferenza stampa; un'altra ottima prova della perfetta conoscenza che il Comandante Alicata ha dei maggiori problemi cittadini e del risolutivo proposito di dare loro una soluzione ispirata a criteri di praticità e di utilità ed adeguata alla loro importanza ed alla loro urgenza.

Questa volta parlò ai giornalisti, rispondendo alle loro domande, il governatore della Lombardia, col. Poletti, e gli argomenti trattati furono tutti del massimo interesse: il rifornimento del carbone, la concessione da parte degli Stati Uniti di autocarri (1700 già in funzione e 2000 in viaggio) per favorire ed intensificare i trasporti, i prezzi, gli scambi fra il Nord e Sud, per i quali un piano organico è allo studio per la loro unificazione.

Il nostro giornale, rendendosi interprete dei voti di qualche lettore, prospettò la questione delle opere d'arte che enti e privati depositarono nei sotterranei del Castello Sforzesco, messo a disposizione del Comune, per sottrarle alle conseguenze delle incursioni e che non possono essere ancora ritirate, essendo stato fatto divieto — si era detto — dalle autorità. Il col. Poletti era perfettamente al corrente della questione. Nessun divieto effettivo delle autorità per il loro ritiro, ma opportuna disposizione per assicurare la legittima provenienza delle opere in proprietà del denunciario, e più precisamente assicurarsi che nessuna delle opere appartenesse a fascisti e collaborazionisti, frutto di appropriazione o di pegno. Così per riavere le opere, se ne fa domanda al Sindaco, il quale, a mezzo degli organi competenti del Comune, fa le indagini opportune ed a seconda del loro esito la consegna avviene immediata.

A proposito di queste opere si ricorderà che andò a finire nei sotterranei anche il prezioso materiale prestato con bellissimo gesto da privati e da

gallerie inglesi per la grande mostra leonardesca. Scoppiata la guerra, non se ne poté fare la consegna e furono depositati nel Castello. Giorni sono, ne fu fatta una verifica e fu constatato che il materiale — dipinti e disegni di Leonardo e della sua scuola e quindi di grande valore — non hanno subito né danni né manomissioni.

REPUBLICAN PARTIES IN SICILY

Broncia Raided

Broncia was raided about noon on Friday for the third time in six days. The enemy formations, which followed one another in five waves, dropped their load of bombs indiscriminately. Some of the most artistic palaces of the town - declared national monuments - were destroyed, among them the churches of Saint Kuffrate, of San Francesco d'Assisi and of the Miracles. Hundreds of dwellings were also destroyed and about a thousand were seriously damaged. According to first reports, casualties total fifty-six killed and two hundred wounded.

Bombing and strafing actions have also taken place in the province of Pavia. It is learnt moreover that enemy bombers carried out a terror attack on the town of Pella, dropping large-calibre bombs on civilian houses. Killed and wounded are reported. The damage is enormous.

Danni a opere d'arte in Lombardia e nel Veneto

Il maggior danno causato dalla guerra a Venezia secondo le W.D.U. è rappresentato dalla distruzione dei suoi sette ponti famosi. La perdita dell'antico ponte degli Scaligeri, del ponte di Castello vecchio e del ponte di Pietra è paragonabile solo a quella del ponte di Santa Trinita di Firenze. Pure danneggiati sono gli affreschi del Tiepolo a Palazzo Cosulich, la biblioteca del capitolo del Duomo, le chiese dei Santi Apostoli, di S. Paolo, di San Giovanni in Valle e della Santissima Trinità e il teatro Suardiana. La chiesa di San Zeno è intatta, il sacello è solo lievemente colpito. L'Arca colpita due volte ha riportato lievi danni.

A Vicenza diciotto dei ventisei palazzi celebri sono stati colpiti; il teatro Olimpico con i suoi preziosi archivi, la villa Valmarana con le opere del Tiepolo, il Museo civico, la Loggia del Capitano, il ponte veneziano e le migliori opere di architettura gotico-veneziana sono intatte. Gli edifici più gravemente colpiti sono l'antico teatro Rinascimento, il palazzo Godi con gli affreschi del Sigismondo che sono stati distrutti, il palazzo arcivescovile, il palazzo Fumagalli, la basilica del Palladio del sedicesimo secolo il cui tetto è stato bruciato, il palazzo Valmarana con gli affreschi del Tiepolo e il palazzo della Ca' d'Oro.

A Mantova sono andati il palazzo ducale con gli affreschi del Mantegna, il palazzo del Te e la chiesa di Sant'Andrea mentre la chiesa di San Francesco del XIV secolo è quasi distrutta, le chiese di San Leonardo e di San Maurizio sono gravemente danneggiate e quella di San Simone è distrutta.

Indiscriminate Air-raids Continue

The brutal fury of Anglo-American terrorist planes against the cities and inhabitants of the Italian Republic has had fresh objectives - Padua, Verona, Trieste, Pola and Piacenza, as well as places in Trevigiano, Padua and Venice. Hundreds of explosive and incendiary bombs were dropped over inhabited districts without discrimination, the only aim being that of killing innocent people. The air-raid over Padua was of particular violence and the number of casualties is very high. Churches, hospitals and historic palaces were destroyed. The enemy can really boast of having reached his targets. In the face of all this ruin and sorrow, from the Italians of the Republic one cry only rises: that of increasing hatred for the barbarous enemy, whose aim is to quench the light of the spirit and the breath of life in our land.

TAF HITS BRIDGES AT MILAN AND PARMA

ADVANCE APHQ, ITALY, January 10 - Mitchell bombers of the Tactical Air Force yesterday knocked out one bridge and damaged approaches of four others in the Milan and Parma areas, in their continuing attacks on enemy communication lines in the vital rear area of the Valley of the Po, it was announced here today.

The medium bombers also bombed an enemy troop concentration at Crestallano, 10 miles west of Bologna.

Thunderbolt fighter-bombers strafed enemy ammunition dumps 15 and 20 miles southwest of Parma, causing fires and explosions. Havoc light bombers, in a night attack, set huge fires along the Brenner Highway west of Lake Garda, where it is believed enemy fuel stores had been concentrated.

MILAN POWDER PLANT DESTROYED

WASHINGTON, December 26 -- Northern Italy's biggest powder factory was destroyed during an Allied air attack on military targets in Milan yesterday, it was reported in a dispatch from Chiasso to the Swiss newspaper Gazette de Lausanne.

The bombardment of Milan shook houses in Swiss territory, where the roar of planes could be heard, the correspondent reported. Flames rose 1,000 feet over the Lombard Plain after two particularly violent explosions, he said.

AIR RAID ON MANTUA

Three bombs were dropped at less than a hundred metres from the tower of Gonzaga Castle, which contains the famous bridal chamber frescoes by Andrea Mantegna, during the air raids on Mantua which took place on October 11, and November 5. Owing to the precautions taken, the frescoes were not directly damaged, but the shaking of the ground caused by the fall of bombs has resulted in cracks in the walls.

DAMAGE IN MANTUA

The precious frescoes of the Bridal Chamber in the Gonzaga Castle in Mantua, have been seriously damaged by Anglo-American air raids. Despite the precautions taken, the explosion of bombs in the vicinity of the Castle have caused large cracks in the Castle walls, with resulting damage to Mantegna's masterpiece.

In March, 1943, American bombers had completely destroyed the Eremitani Chapel in Padua; one wonders whether the flying bandits deliberately intend to destroy all the masterpieces of Mantegna.

NEWS FROM REPUBLICAN FASCIST ITALYS. Ambrogio to be Restored

The Mayor of Milan has received the following letter from the Party's federal commissioner and a considerable donation in cash for the repairs of St. Ambrogio's basilica, which has been seriously damaged by Anglo-American air raids:

"On the day of St. Ambrogio, patron Saint of Milan, this city so hard hit by the barbaric fury of the enemy we, Republican Fascist of Milan, have collected the enclosed sum of money which we hand over to you as a contribution to the speedy repairs once more a place of beauty and veneration".

The present contribution of 14,313 lire will be followed by others.

Following this striking example of the Republican Fascists in Milan, the Mayor has raised a public subscription for the same purpose, which should have a religious patriotic and local significance. Meanwhile the municipal administration of the city has decided that one million Lire will be set aside for repairs to the ancient basilica.

MILAN AREA RAIL BRIDGES BOMBED

ADVANCE AFHQ, ITALY, December 1 - Although recurrent bad weather again limited operations of the Mediterranean Allied Air Force to less than 500 sorties yesterday. Mitchell bombers of the Tactical Air Force severely damaged important rail bridges in the Milan industrial area of north Italy, it was announced here today.

Only small forces were used in the successful attacks on the bridges, at Vrema, 25 miles southeast of Milan, and at Romana di Lombardia, 25 miles to the east. Fighterbombers, active in the same area, destroyed or damaged 130 rail cars and 49 motor vehicles, as well as effecting 37 rail cuts in the important supply network of the German forces in north Italy.

Coastal Air Force planes scored hits on a large building on Sansogo Island, 60 miles south of Fiume in the upper Adriatic, and also carried out strafing attacks on enemy communications along the Italian Riviera.

Allied Planes Raid Milan

Milan: About noon Saturday some Anglo-American planes dropped bombs in the northern districts of the town and strafed pedestrians in busy squares. A large building of several floors collapsed, burying everyone who was inside; thus far twenty-eight dead and seventy injured have been taken from the debris.

The hard-hitting Mitchells and Marauders struck at embankments, bridges, a rail yard and a cliff-side stretch of the strategic rail route along a 26-mile section between Verona and Trento as well as hammering at seven important road and rail bridges in the Milan and Turin areas.

Desert Air Forces fighter-bombers attacked railway lines in Yugoslavia, where desperate German forces are trying to effect their escape from the Balkan trap.

Approximately 30 enemy aircraft were encountered in northeast Italy and over the Brenner Pass area, and at least one was destroyed.

Chinese Front.Italian Cities Damaged in Enemy Raids.

During the terror raid carried out by Anglo-American formations on May 13th on Parma, many monuments were hit. The colossal building of the 16th century "Pilotta", which contained the Library, the picture-gallery, the State Archives of the State, the Academy of Arts and the famous Farnese Theatre has been partially destroyed. The famous monument to Maria Teresa has been smashed. The Gothic churches of San Francesco and of Santa Maria delle Grazie were also hit.

The following day, Mantua was the objective of the enemy's fury. An incendiary bomb hit the 15th cupola of the church of San Gottardo and other bombs fell on the Fabrizio building and on the church of San Gervasio. The church of San Lorenzo and the Museum of Palestrina especially were hit. During the enemy raid of May 14th on Vicenza, many buildings of historic and artistic importance were hit, among them the 16th century church of San Costanzo and Palazzo Bastico.

Serious damage was caused in Faenza during the enemy raid of May 15th. The famous International Museum of ceramics was destroyed. The twenty-two halls and the scientific installations are now a heap of rubble.

On May 27th, 28th and 29th the enemy airforce carried out a raid on Verona where, among other things, a school and several houses were hit. Casoa was also the objective of an enemy raid which caused heavy damage to residential districts and some casualties. The neighborhood of Florence was attacked again, as was Pistoia. Rural districts, also, were raided in this province with resulting deaths and casualties. Bologna and country districts of the province of Perugia were hit. An enemy aircraft was shot down and its crew captured. Other places in the provinces of Terni, Viterbo and Arezzo were raided.

MILAN: It was announced from the Duce's Headquarters that Anglo-American air forces have caused damage in Italy to date as follows:

242 Churches, 53 hospitals, 315 schools, 26 libraries, 36 art monuments, 34 theatres, 79 picture houses, one concrete hall, 117 cultural institutions, six public installations and nine institutions of social welfare.

Damage has occurred in the following towns:

MILAN: 4 churches, 12 schools, 12 libraries, 13 art monuments, 11 theatres, 30 picture-houses, 89 cultural institutions, one concrete hall.

TURIN: 30 churches, 32 hospitals, schools, three libraries, four theatres, 23 picture-houses, five cultural institutions, nine art monuments.

GENOA: two churches, three hospitals, four schools, one library, one picture-house.

BOLOGNA: 25 churches, seven hospitals, 33 schools, three libraries, six theatres, five picture-houses, two cultural institutions.

PARMA: six churches, three hospitals, one school, one library, five cultural institutions.

FLORENCE: two churches, two hospitals, one picture house, six social welfare institutes.

ROME: 23 churches, three hospitals, nine schools, one library, two theatres, two picture-houses, one art monument. 1842

BERGAMO: four churches, one hospital, six schools, one art monument, three picture-houses, six cultural institutions.

VERONA: three churches, one hospital, three schools, one library, one theatre.

MODENA: six churches, one hospital, one art monument.

ANCONA: five churches, two hospitals, four schools, three libraries, four art monuments, one theatre, four cultural institutions, seven social welfare institutes.

HEAVY BOMBING OF FLORENCE 25 M 1500 MAY 2

During a raid by North American bomber formations over upper Italy, U.S. heavy planes attacked Florence. Numerous bombs were dropped on the center of the town, damaging residential districts. Among other buildings, the Opera House was hit by the American bombs.

MILAN: Strong Anglo-American air fighting forces on Sunday noon attacked the outlying districts of Milan. Their objectives were apartment houses in war-blasted districts. A church was also destroyed.

The Allied Air Force has again attacked the papal villa of Castelgambello, in which more than 4,500 homeless people are sheltered. They dropped clusters of incendiary bombs. Some buildings were damaged. Moreover, workers' residential sections in Turin and Pavia have been bombed without discrimination. In the course of a recent air raid on Pisa, the old temple of San Paolo was seriously damaged. The historic church, which dates back to the year 805 contained frescoes by Cimabue and artists of the school of Giotto. The ceiling was completely destroyed and the portal was unhinged.

R24. Transocean (for Far East), 5/24/44 (16.29), reports from the Vatican: The Vatican illustrated monthly paper *Aeclesia*, in its latest edition, published a series of photographs of bomb-damaged Catholic churches and other cultural treasures. There are pictures of the devastated church of Saint Sabila, and the chapel of the Ospedale Maggiore, at Milan; the churches of the Madonna di Campagna and the Madonna della Divina Provvidenza, at Turin; S. Pietro della Porta, and two other churches at Genoa.

Many other pictures show destroyed churches at Bologna, Terni, Civitavecchia, Naples, Messina and in other badly bombed cities. The last three photographs show the destruction at Saint Hedwig's church in Berlin.
