GENERAL

1. Serious disorders in Fiume between Italians and Yugoslavs. (I.N.S. and REUTER)
2. Solemn funerals were given to the four "Garibaldini" killed in Trieste. (TANJUG)
3. Cecil Sprigge, commenting on the Italian crisis say that a new Govt can be created if an agreement is reached between the Liberals and the Christian Democrats (both viewing with apprehension the claims of the C.L.N.) on one side, and the Communists and the Socialists (both supporting the C.L.N.) on the other.
4. In Trieste the news that the Yugoslav Govt has promised to "protect" museums and all works of art, has caused concern among the population. (S.I.D.I.) *Was it so?*
5. The monument to Victor Emmanuel II in Civitavecchia was blown up last week.
6. France will continue to occupy Val D'Aosta until the Allies answer her request for a zone of occupation in Germany. (San Francisco)
7. It is foreseen that, before October, Milan will be supplied with Swiss wooden huts which will afford accommodations for numerous poor families.
8. 50 "Liberty" ships have been assigned to Italy, 15 of which to be handed over immediately and the rest in due course.

13. Contrary to rumor it seems that no special amnesty is to be granted on occasion of the first anniversary of the liberation of Rome.

14. Schuschnigg, the ex Austrian Chancellor, received by the Pope.

15. The Commission for control on bakeries is carrying on its inspection visits.

16. It seems that rationing of matches is soon to be lifted.

17. Interviewed by the correspondent of the French paper "Combat" De Gasperi, having expressed his admiration for France, said that the French should learn not to confuse the Italian people with Mussolini and that he hoped that friendly relations would soon be re-established between the two Latin Nations. Speaking about Venezia Giulia he said that Trieste has for Italy the same importance that Strasburg has for France and that he trusts the Allies will solve the question with the same understanding with which they recognised that Italy must become one of the United Nations. Passing to the subject of the Govt crisis he said that it is true that the Communist and Socialist parties have a great influence especially in the north among the workers but that one must not forget that the moderate and monarchic parties have also a great influence; should there be a regency for the Prince of Naples, this regency should be entrusted to men such as Sforza, Nitti and Orlando. De Gasperi ended his interview by praising Bonomi, "scrupulous administrator, the only man who could have undertaken the responsibility of governing the country in such a difficult moment". If the parties come to an agreement Bonomi, he said, is ready to hand over the power.

18. General Gombra, Tamburini and Gazzotti, arrested in the north. (S.I.D.I.)

19. The British Minister of war, Grigg, said that Henni was arrested for having broken his promise not to make public speeches.

Bomb Damage at Spalato.

The "Zagubrin Journal" writes that disastrous damage resulted from the June 3rd raid on the city of Spalato. As a result of further attacks effected on the same and subsequent days, 260 people were killed and 280 wounded. It is possible that the number of victims will prove larger after the removal of bodies has been completed. Two hundred homes were completely destroyed and many others seriously damaged. Many public buildings, schools, churches and hospitals were hit.
