SUBJECT: Christmas Bonus, 1945.

TO : 11 Employing Departments.

1. Christmas Bonus for Christmas 1945 has been authorized by Allied Force HQ (Admin. Serv. No. 51, dtd 12 Dec 45) to all Italian civilian personnel (G-1 Civilian personnel) who are employed by this headquarters as of 20 December 45.

2. The amount of the bonus for each employee will be two days' current total pay (base pay plus cost of living bonus) for each month of service during the year of 1945.

For the purpose of this computation the following rules will govern:

- Employees in employ as of 20 Dec 45 will be deemed to be continuing in employment for the balance of the month of December.
- Only employment with the Allied Commission or AG, whether in Rome or in the provinces, or with the FAI will be considered.
- Previous records of employees will be disregarded.
- Fractional amounts will be computed from the following table:

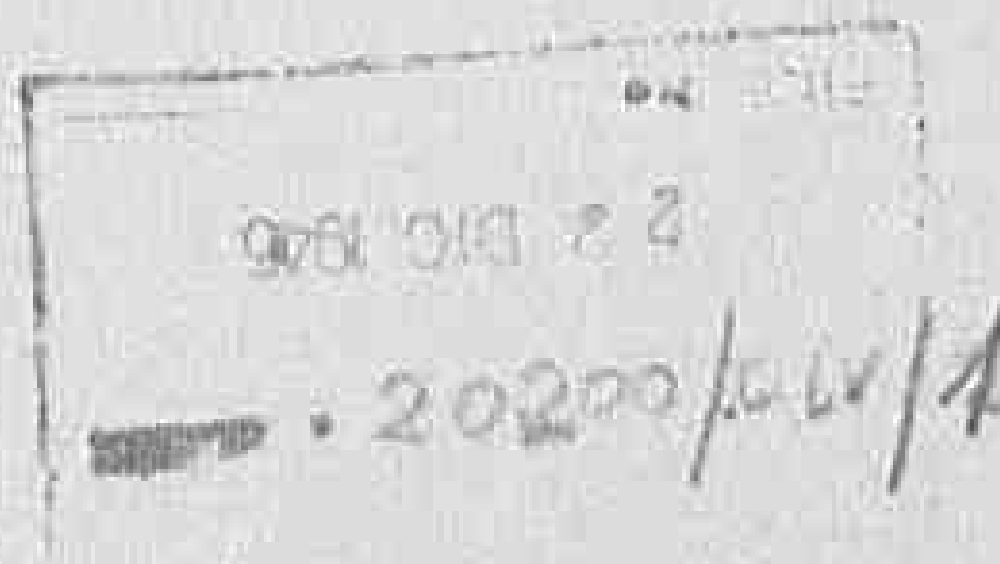

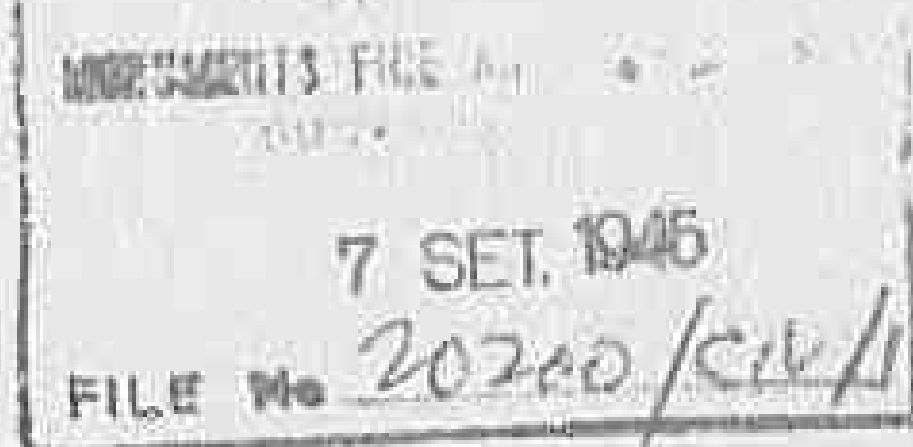

3. If, however, higher authority insists that the Paying Officer must so certify, could not the Civilian Personnel Section guarantee the correctness of the facts to the Paying Officer by including the required statement in their verifying stamp?
4. The Paying Officer would then be completely in the clear and should be willing to sign the required certificate.

1. The following is based on Ltr, HQ MTOUSA, AG 248/788-0 and 23 December 1944. Publication is made for the information and guidance of all Sections employing Italian Civilians.

2. The "Cost of Living Bonus" will not be considered an integral part of the wage for the purpose of any computation. All computations and adjustments for OVERTIME PAY, PERMANENT DIFFERENTIALS, NIGHT WORK, etc, will be made against the 1 Oct. 44 basic wage rate, to which the appropriate "Cost of Living Bonus" may be added.

(A) The "Cost of Living Bonus" for MONTHLY employees will not in any case exceed the maximum permissible bonus or any particular grade for the month.

EXAMPLE:

A typist who is not subject to 15% deduction, receives 3480 lire per month (1 Oct 44 Basic Wage Rate plus 10% for Home Province). She also receives 1300 lire a month "Cost of Living Bonus". She works 2 1/2 overtimes (or 2 Sundays) each half month.

Half Monthly Pay (Usually 13 days)	=	1280 L.
Overtime - 2 days = 3960/26 x 1 1/2	=	456 L.
Half of Monthly "Cost of Living Bonus"	=	650 L.
Total Pay and Bonus for half month	=	3086 L.

(B) The "Cost of Living Bonus" for DAILY employees will not in any case exceed the maximum permissible bonus of any particular grade for any one day. Bonus may be paid for the SEVENTH consecutive day or any proportional part thereof in the case of a DAILY employee, to be based on the basic rate of the grade (1 Oct 44) and not on the overtime rate.

1. The following is based on LTR HQ MECMA, 20 248/788-0 and 21 December 1941. Substitution is made for the information and guidance of all Sections employing Italian Civilians.

2. The "Cost of Living Bonus" will not be considered an integral part of the wage for the purpose of any computation. All computations and adjustments for OVERTIME PAY, FEMALE DIFFERENTIALS, NIGHT WORK, etc, will be made against the 1 Oct. 44 basic wage rate, to which the appropriate "Cost of Living Bonus" may be added.

(a) The "Cost of Living Bonus" for MONTHLY employees will not in any case exceed the maximum permissible bonus at any particular grade for the month.

EXAMPLE:

A typist who is not subject to 15% deduction, receives 3950 lirea per month (1 Oct 44 Basic Wage Rate plus 10% for Home Province). She also receives 1300 lirea a month "Cost of Living Bonus". She works 2 540 1/2 overtime (at 2 Sundaya) each half month.

Half Monthly Pay (Monthly 13 days)	=	1980 L.
Overtime - 2 days = 3950/26 x 1 1/2	=	456 L.
Half of Monthly "Cost of Living Bonus"	=	650 L.
Total Pay and Bonus for half month	=	3086 L.

(b) The "Cost of Living Bonus" for daily employees will not in any case exceed the maximum permissible bonus or any particular grade for any one day. Bonus may be paid for the SEVENTH consecutive day or any proportional part thereof in the case of a daily employee, to be based on the basic rate of the grade (1 Oct 44) and NOT on the overtime rate.

EXAMPLE:

A female typist who is subject to 15% deduction, receives 80 lirea per day (1 Oct 44 Basic Rate plus 10% for Home Province). She works 7 consecutive days for which time and a half is given for the 7th day. She also receives for each working day 60 lire "Cost of Living Bonus". Wages for 7 days therefore, should be calculated as follows:

1. Except in unusual cases where separate arrangements must be made, this office will act as a point of centralization, and will maintain files, records, cards, etc., as set forth in Administrative Memorandum Number 61, attached as an appendix to this letter.

2. To expedite payment of Social Insurance to an employee who might be entitled to same, all Sections are strictly requested to comply with the following, (as contained in Headquarters Allied Commission Office Memo No. 15, dated 1 Aug. 44):

"In those cases in which separation is desired, the employee will be sent to Civilian Personnel with a memorandum detailing the reasons for separation. At the same time a Final Payroll Form (W2/4) should be completed."

(a) This is extremely important in determining whether or not employee is eligible for unemployment compensation. Therefore, letter must include reasons for separation.

(b) When employment terminates or is interrupted by illness, accident or other compensatory contingency, employing Section will forward notification to this office. This Section will complete and certify card, (Form 31-1) and forward same to appropriate Section, who in turn will forward it to employee.
