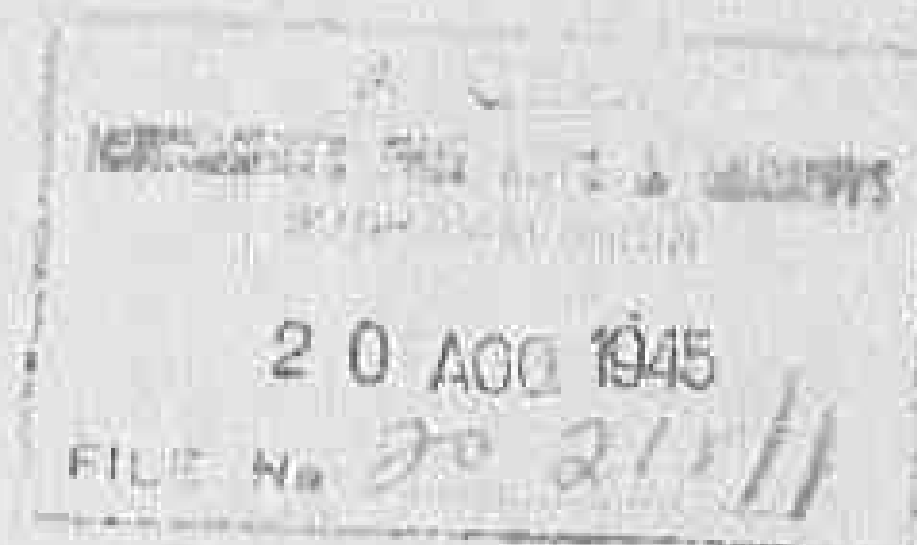

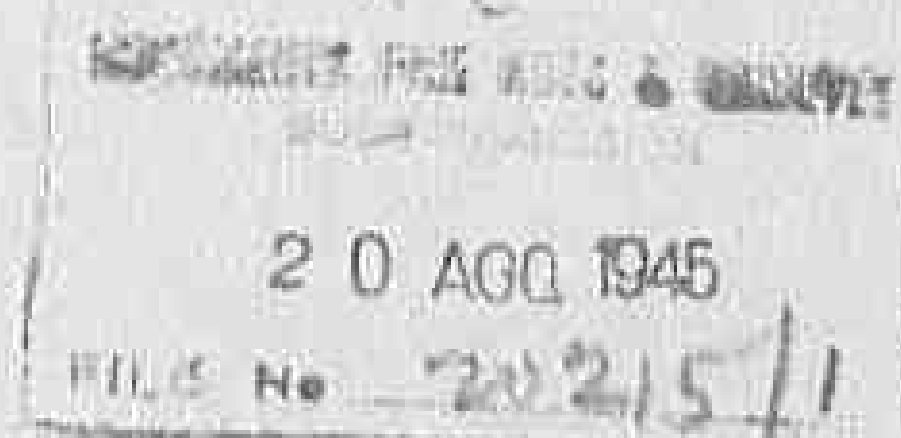

2. - The two cases will leave by road to-morrow morning and should reach your office first thing Thursday morning 12 July 45.

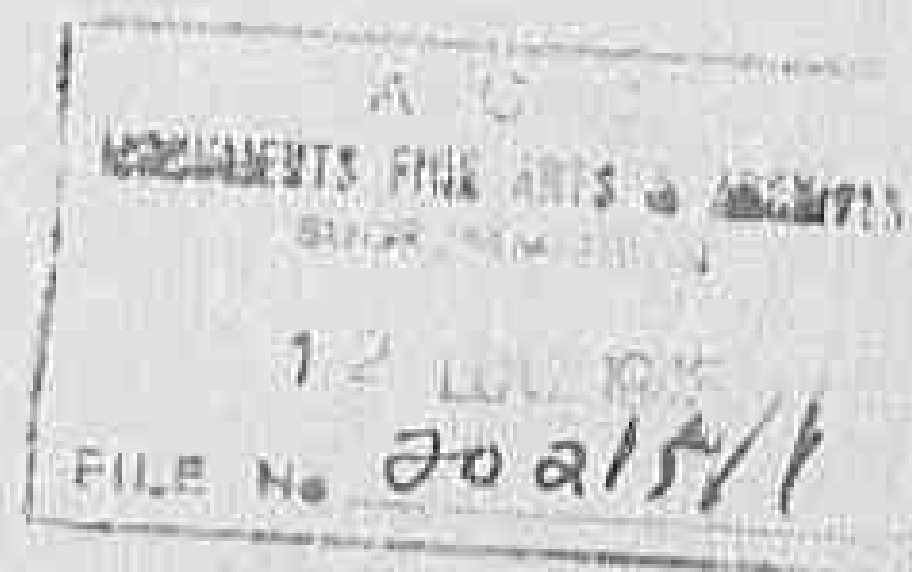

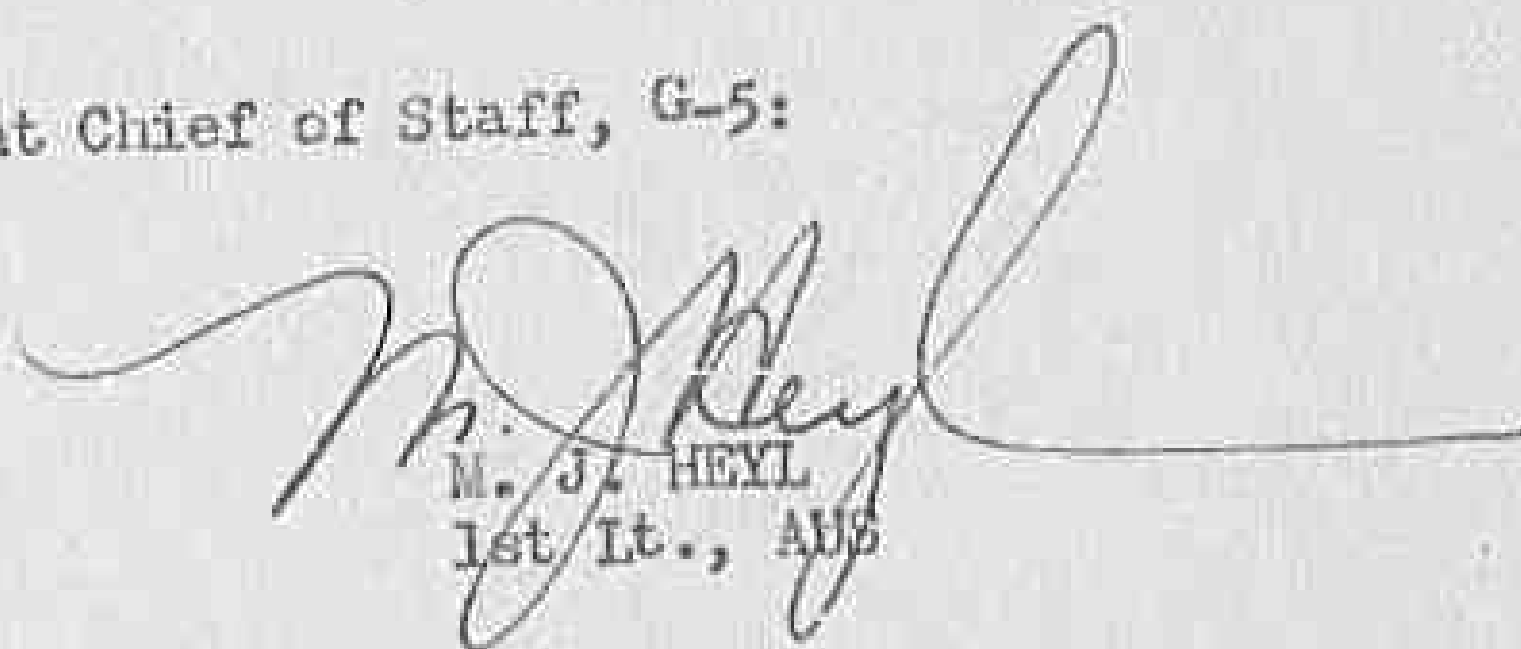

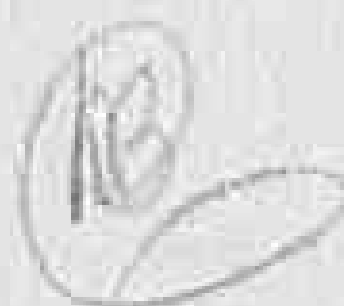

The Association has an anti-fascist and anti-dictatorial character.

The membership is not open to those who have showed feelings of sympathy toward Fascismo and Nazismo, and to all members of every party which intend to limit, in whatever way, the essential freedoms: freedom of thought, freedom of speech, freedom of work, freedom of press, freedom of religion.

The object of the Association are:

- a) - To promote relation of friendship and of a full co-operation among Italian, British and American people.
- b) - To keep high the principle of so hardly conquered liberty, always opposing all the Italians who would dare to attempt it.
- c) - To join all the Italians who have always fought against Fascismo; all the Italians who since the first day of this war have partaken in all British defeats and triumphs, seeing in the victory of the Allied Nations, the victory of liberty, the victory of the Italian people, the victory of Italy.
- d) - To co-operate with the Allied Command and with the Italian Government in the work of rebuilding and in the giving relief to the people of the provinces that have been struck hardly by war.
- e) - To found in Milan, as soon as possible, a club according to the character of British and American clubs. 6977

The Educational aims of the Association are:

- a) - To organize the increase and the diffusion of the English language, founding courses of English grammar and literature.

- b) - To organize, as soon as possible, journeys and cruises to the Allied countries.
- c) - To promote competitions and friendly intercourse between the Italians, British and American seafarers.
- d) - To organize conferences and meetings. To create Libraries supplied with master-pieces of the contemporary English literature.
- e) - To publish as soon as possible, an Association's Review, containing letters and works both in English and Italian, with the supreme purpose of diffusing uses, customs, /literary and of the United States, works, etc., of Great Britain, of British Empire.

I, Emilia BONGIORNO, as the promoter of the "ASSOCIAZIONE ITALIO-BRITANNICA-SINTONITENSE", willing begin the activity of the above Association only with the full consent of this Hon. Allied Command, take the liberty of enclosing a copy of the Association's programme, hoping that this Hon. Command will draw his kind attention on it.

To prove the sincerity of my own feelings towards Great Britain and the United States, I intend to write here below, some names and addresses of British subjects in whose homes I was guest during a travel through England and Scotland in 1938, by invitation of Dr. and Mrs. George SCOTT of Dundee, and with whom I have kept up a connexion of a hearty friendship and of an uninterrupted correspondence during all the period from 1935 to 1940.

I declare that after my coming back from England, I have always kept in touch with all the Italians who showed feelings of sympathy towards the British and American people, and who kept high their own feelings during all this sorrowful period, hoping that I would have been able to join them in an Association.

I, referring to a common declaration of the British Premier, Winston CHURCHILL, and of the late President of the United States, Franklin D. ROOSEVELT, in which they have told they would help all Italians wishing to give a real support to their country, hope that this Hon. Command will receive my request favourably, assuring that the Association shall see the possibility of a revival of Italy, only through work, order, discipline, justice and law: through the help and the co-operation of Great Britain and of the United States.

This is just to let you know that the Directorate of the Reduci di Guerra seemed willing to move into the 3rd floor of the P.S.B. building, No. 62a, Via Vittorio Veneto (which floor I understand was vacated on the 15th July). It has been made clear that it is now for the Reduci di Guerra to arrange to occupy this floor with the owners of the premises, either by leasing them or by getting the Italian Government to consider them under its own machinery. Meanwhile I hope that the British authorities will not de-regulation the floor until the Italian arrangements for taking it over are complete.

As much pressure as possible is being exerted on the Reduci di Guerra to move out of the Palazzo del Drago and I hope something will transpire before very long.

Thank you for the copy of your note to H.C. Allied Commission, No. 282, 1134 of the 20th June about office premises in town for the British Council. We are grateful to D.A.S.C. and H.C.A.C. for their assistance in this matter.

2. It may be well to explain that the sort of premises we require should have a good central location and also adequately imposing appearance and amenities for representative purposes. It has, in fact, been agreed, with the concurrence of H.M. Ambassador, that exactly the sort of premises we require are those on the first floor of the Palazzo del Senato which are at present occupied by the ~~Secretariat~~ ~~Chancery~~ (the contingencies of which organization has actually undertaken to H.M. Ambassador to vacate them for us as soon as alternative accommodation for the Embassy is available).

5. You were good enough in your note 600/A (1980) of the 26th May to suggest that we should investigate the possibility of the British Council occupying certain ex-German property. On inspection, it was felt that these would not furnish us with suitable permanent accommodation (and in fact 25 Via Broletto is at present occupied already by the Red Cross and 365 Piazza Colonna, at least in part, by the R.A.F.), besides not having the desired recommended amenities).

4. You also kindly suggested recently that we might consider the persons residing in the Via Monzuno, but I regret that this too hardly suits our needs although we propose to suggest to the landlord that they make

Thank you for the copy of your note to H.Q. Allied Commission, No. H.Q. 1174 of the 20th June about office premises in view for the British Council. We are grateful to H.Q. A.C. and H.Q. A.C. for their assistance in this matter.

2. It may be well to explain that the sort of premises we require should have a good central location and also adequately imposing appearance and amenities for representative purposes. It has, in fact, been agreed, with the concurrence of H.Q. A.C., that exactly the sort of premises we require are those on the first floor of the Palazzo del Duomo which are at present occupied by the scuola di ~~di~~ ~~di~~ ~~di~~ (the Commission of which organization has recently undertaken to H.Q. Ambassador to vacate them for us as soon as alternative accommodation for the school is available).

3. You were good enough in your note 600/A (H.Q.) of the 23rd May to suggest that we should investigate the possibility of the British Council occupying certain ex-German property. On inspection, it was felt that these would not furnish us with suitable permanent accommodation (and in fact 26 Via Gregoriana is of course occupied already by the Red Cross and 365 Piazza Colonna, at least in part, by the R.S.A.A., besides not having the desired representational amenities).

4. You also kindly suggested recently that we might consider the Palazzo Vecchio in the Via Nazionale, but I regret that this too hardly suits our needs although we propose to suggest to the Council that they might perhaps consider moving into it.

5. The latest suggestion is as regards the P.S.B. building in the Via Vittoria Veneto, one floor of which, comprising 20 offices, will be vacated by vacant on the 15th July, with the probability that the remainder may become vacant subsequently when P.S.B. finally closes down. If the worst comes to the worst, the British Council might, in its present extremity, move into the 20 offices of this P.S.B. building temporarily.

Could you please let me know very early whether you agree and if so, whether the Peduni may be also be given to understand that in addition they will have the option of further accommodation in the same P.M.S. building, as the remainder of it becomes available, thus making up the total of 40 rooms which they require?

5. I hesitate to complicate this matter further, but I ought perhaps to add that, in addition to the 15 rooms now occupied by the Peduni in the Palacio del Lago, the British Council will subsequently require the adjacent 14 or so rooms on the same floor of that Palacio which are at present occupied by Humaitas (a club with considerable facilities and only a very faintly cultural tinge). We believe that the Administrator of the Palacio del Lago may already have given Humaitas an indication that they will have to quit their present premises on the grounds that they will be required for the British Council; and we hope that, if referred to, Allied Command will support us in this. The Humaitas premises, however, will not be sufficient for us in themselves and even unlikely to be rented for some time, though we have every hope of getting them in due course. At the moment our urgent need is to get possession of the leased portion of the Palacio del Lago and to move in there ourselves, absorbing the Humaitas portion later on, as we expand and as Humaitas either ultimately closes down or moves elsewhere.

3. This would release twenty offices, which would not be sufficient for the needs of the Reduced in Charge.

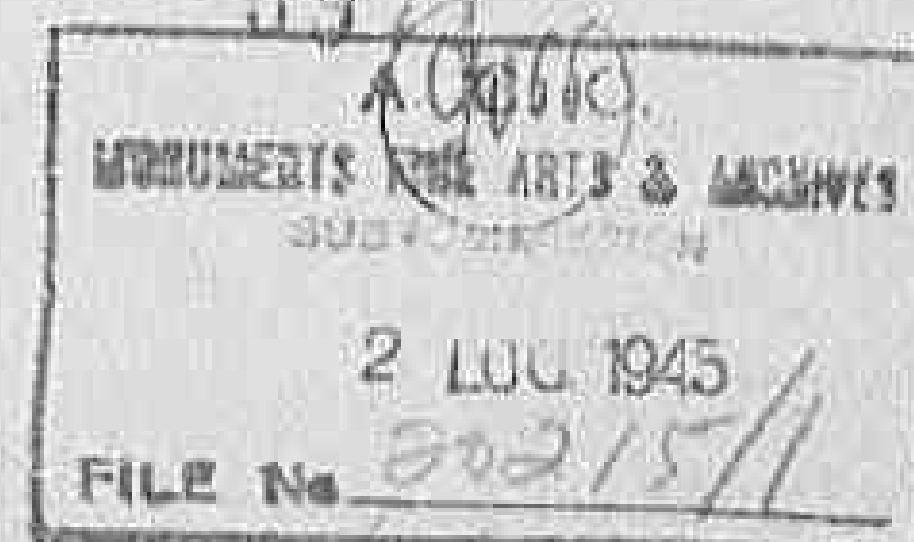

- 1 Brig. Low has previously expressed his sympathy to the difficulty of the British Council in finding accommodation here in Rome and it is believed that there has been some D.O. correspondence between Mr. Hazelton and Maj. Petre.
- 2 The situation now is as follows:
 - (a) The Palazzo del Drago would be very suitable for the British Council but is at present occupied by the Alto Commissariato for the Reduci di Guerra. This body would be quite prepared to give up their accommodation if an alternative can be found for them and state that their requirements are a building with:
 - 37 medium size office rooms of about 4 by 5 metres each;
 - 2 larger rooms of about 6 by 7 metres each; and
 - 1 big room for meetings of about 10 by 8 metres.
 - (b) The whole premises must be reasonably central and not too far from the Palazzo Vidinale.
- 3 It is very desirable that the British Council should be assisted in getting established as soon as possible as their work is visualised and included in directives for the rehabilitation of Italy from the Combined Chiefs of Staff. The American counterpart is already in operation.
- 4 The British Council is, of course, a permanent body and there is no question of them occupying requisitioned premises. They would enter into an agreement with the owners of any building which they may take over, in the usual way.
- 5 Your kind assistance is requested with a view to the possibility of finding alternative accommodation for the Reduci di Guerra. It has been suggested that you might have some suitable building on your list which could be derequisitioned for their occupation. Would you be good enough to consider this possibility.

With reference to the above question, the Italian Foreign Office have at length got the Reduci to state the alternative accommodation they need as follows:

- a) 37 medium size office rooms of about 4 by 5 metres each.
- b) 2 larger rooms for the Commissioner and his deputy of about 6 by 7 metres each.
- c) 1 big room for meetings of about 10 by 8 metres.
- d) The whole premises to be central and not too far from the vicinity of Signor Bonomi's office in the Palazzo Venezia, since the Reduci have no transport, work in constant touch with Signor Bonomi and deal with indigent ex-servicemen.

This accommodation is, of course, larger than their present premises but, after discussion with officials in the Italian Foreign Office, we genuinely believe that the Reduci are an increasingly important and expanding organisation, particularly in present conditions.

If you are in a position to offer the Reduci something which will meet their case, this of course will enormously facilitate our getting into the Palazzo del Drago at an early date.

Perhaps you will let me know whether you would like the offer of the alternative accommodation to be made through us and our Italian Foreign Office contacts.

1. A conference of the Directors of the Education Subcommittee and the USIS with former Minister of Public Instruction De Ruggiero resulted in two concrete plans - one for developing a central systematic catalogue of the highly important but scattered and badly catalogued libraries of Rome so that Rome may become an international center for historical and archaeological research, it having Europe's best source material in this field; the other for furnishing free room, board and tuition at the University of Rome to selected students from American and other foreign universities which will offer similar facilities to an equal number of advanced Italian students. Later the plans were discussed with the present Minister, Arabio Ruiz, who was in full accord. First steps toward realization of the plan are being taken.
2. The American Library Association reports having succeeded in getting a number of the most urgently needed publications requested by the National Library in Naples, and the first small consignment of these has reached the Education Subcommittee and been sent to the National Library.
3. Italian text books in engineering, etc., desired for use in Italian schools in North Africa have, with much difficulty, been procured in Rome for the Mediterranean command at their request and a first shipment has been made.
4. Reports from Northern Regions indicate that the opening of schools and universities on a non-fascist basis is proceeding rapidly and, on the whole, smoothly.
5. A large requisition for school supplies and text books paper and printing supplies from the United States is being held up while the Minister of Public Instruction tries to get the Minister of the Treasury to release the necessary American credits to pay for them.
6. Mr. André de Blonay, from the International Student's Relief Fund in Switzerland, has been in Rome during the past two weeks on invitation of the Italian Government, and working in collaboration with the Education Subcommittee. He has set up committees for student relief, arranged for immediate availability of funds, and made provisions for tuberculosis tests and the sending of a group of tubercular students to summer camps in Switzerland.

Here, as you requested, is a concise statement of my suggestions as to the practical requirements of the situation in regard to Learned and Cultural Publications. I suggest:

1. That the Ambassador be requested to forward a strong recommendation, to be passed to the President of the Libraries Association and to the Director General of the British Museum, stating that unless action is taken immediately very few Italian learned and cultural publications of the period 1940-45 will ever find their way into English Libraries.
2. The specific action proposed is:

4. It must also be emphasized that the volume of work involved is very large. It cannot be handled by somebody already busy ^{with} other duties.

The machinery suggested above would serve equally for the movement of learned and cultural publications from England to Italy, which I understand to be the concern of the British

Council. The Italian Minister of Public Instruction has already expressed his agreement to the appointment of a corresponding Italian working-committee to fulfill corresponding functions at this end.

The British Council would be required to sponsor the reciprocal scheme and to afford facilities to the Agent in Rome. I firmly believe this would be in the best interests of the aims which the British Council are setting out to achieve, and that the principle of reciprocity in such matters is sound.

MINUTES OF MEETING WITH MINISTER OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION
Held in Vice President's Office at 1600 hrs on 9 April 1945.

PRESENT: Brigadier G.R. UPWORTH, Vice President, Civil Affairs Section,
H.S. Arengia HUTZ, Minister of Public Instruction,
Gen. Sir GEORGE, Chief of the Cabinet,
Dr. MCLELLAN, Secretary to the Minister of Public Instruction,
Lt. Col. C.W. Cassburne, Education Sub-Commission,
Lt. Col. J.B. Ward-Perkins, Monuments and Fine Arts Sub-Commission,
Mr. DOLLARD, Civil Affairs Section.

1 The Vice President explained that he had asked the Minister of Public Instruction to attend this meeting in order to discuss para. 9 of ACOB Meeting dated 24 Feb 45.

2 After some general discussion it was agreed that it was desirable to arrange for:

- (a) the interchange of professors and students between the United Nations and Italy; and
- (b) the exchange of books and periodicals.

PROFESSORS AND STUDENTS.

3 The Minister stated that he was appointing two committees to study means for arranging for the interchange of professors and students.

4 On a suggestion from the Vice President that facilities for professors and students coming from abroad should be considered, the Minister agreed to ask his Committee to find out what facilities could be offered by Italian Universities for these students and professors, and it was agreed that the United Nations would supply information about the facilities which they might be able to offer.

5 The Minister said he would prepare a plan indicating the number of professors and students which he thought could be interchanged with the United Nations and in what branches of learning.

6 The Minister promised to ask Italian Universities to advise the United Nations about the specialities in study offered by Italian Universities.

BOOKS AND PERIODICALS.

7 The plan to facilitate the exchange of books and periodicals between the United Nations and Italy is to be limited by two considerations:

- (a) only books and magazines published during the war years, when interchange was interrupted, would be sent;
- (b) these are to be scholarly publications.

 - (b) those are to be scholarly publications.
- 8 The Minister would arrange to appoint Committees to make lists of Italian subscribers to learned journals of the United Nations and to find out whether they wished to fill out their files so far as possible and whether they wished to resume their subscriptions; likewise, the Committee would furnish a list of United Nations subscribers to Italian journals, for the same purpose.
- 9 The Minister's Committee will furnish lists (by category, e.g., medicine, archaeology, economics, history, etc.) of books published in Italy in each field since January 1940.

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SUBSCRIPTION	
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The United Nations, likewise, would be asked to supply similar lists to the Italian Government.

10 It was pointed out by Lt. Col. Nordenskiöld:

- that
- (a) both the British Council had independently begun work on these problems, and that the British Council would probably be the eventual channel for action for the United Kingdom;
 - (b) that in many cases there would be few copies of these loaned books available and that, therefore,
 - (c) bibliographies should be restricted to the extent that there existing quantities of books were limited, numbers available would be indicated (at any rate in general terms), and consideration would be given to restricted allocation.

11 It was pointed out by the Vice President, and agreed by the Minister, that the importation and exportation of loaned journals and books would be contingent upon the shipping space available, but that the bibliographies would be reviewed as quickly as possible so that the needs would be known when space became available.

Subject: Interchange of Learned Books and Periodicals
between Italy and other Countries.

1. The problems of restarting the interchange of scientific and cultural publications between Italy and other countries are complex but the following broad principles may be stated:

- a. The supply will not meet demand.
- b. Before demands can usefully be made it is necessary that bibliographical information be compiled in each country for transmission to the other.
- c. Both the initial application and eventual allocation will need to be strictly controlled at both ends.

2. In the case of England the Library Association has appointed a sub-committee to examine the problem, and it is understood that the matter is to be decided in conjunction with the British Council, whose representative is already in Rome (at present sick).

3. A scheme which appears to combine simplicity with practicability is that the Italian Government should appoint a similar Committee with the triple task of:-

- (1) compiling bibliographical information for transmission to other countries
- (2) compiling demands for the books of other countries on the basis of information received
- (3) deciding all questions of priority of demands or of allocation on receipt.

Precisely the same work would need to be done in any other country proposing to resume interchange of learned publications with Italy.

4. The work would be of a very considerable volume, and it is suggested that the English body eventually handling the matter should appoint an agent, who could usefully be attached to the British Council.

5. As it is understood that America proposes to deal with this problem through C.I.A., it would appear that the functions of A.C. in the matter should be assigned to the C.I.A. to ensure that the work is done.

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4. The work would be of a very considerable volume, and it is suggested that the English body eventually handling the matter should appoint an agent, who could usefully be attached to the British Council.

5. As it is understood that America proposes to deal with this problem through U.S.I.S. it would appear that the functions of A.I. in the matter are limited. It could however usefully ensure that the whole problem is coordinated, and the "good-will" of the Education and HEA Commission should be valuable.

Subject: FAN.487 - "New Deal" for Italy.

To : CA Section.

1. Reference your A/32.A/CA of 2 April 45, thanks to the continued non-appointment of a Director General of Fine Arts, this Subcommission has been unable to obtain any official information of the Italian Government's views on the matter of FAN. 487, para 2F. It has however received many enquiries from Italian libraries and other official cultural institutions, which make it abundantly clear that American and British learned and cultural publications are strongly desired.

2. One of the libraries concerned, that of the R. Istituto d'Arte e d'Archeologia, undertook to produce a bibliography of Italian publications in the field of archaeology and art-history since 1939. This list was sent in February to Princeton University and to the Society of Antiquaries, London, whence it has received wide circulation. These bodies have in return undertaken the compilation of bibliographies of American and British publications for circulation in Italy.

3. It is understood that an American agency has already widely circularized Italian libraries for the renewal of exchange of American and Italian learned periodicals.

4. As regards the exchange of British and Italian learned periodicals, and other books the Deputy Director on 22 March approached Mr. M. Stewart of the British Embassy with a view to discovering what was the proposed role of the British Council in the matter, and on his invitation submitted the memorandum herewith attached, Appendix A, especially paras 4 and 5.

5. An exchange of articles on recent classical research-work in England and Italy has been arranged between the Journal of Roman Studies and the Bollettino del Museo dell'Impero Romano.

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6. This Subcommittee would welcome clarification as to the proposed activities of the following bodies:

- a. Cultural Section of the C.W.I., Director Prof. C.R. Morey.
- b. The British Council.

It is known that the former of these bodies proposes to handle the proposed movement of artists and scholars between Italy and America.

MEMORANDUM ON EXCHANGE OF BRITISH AND
ITALIAN LEARNED PUBLICATIONS

1. Since 1939 there has been in Italy a large output of important scientific, historical and artistic publications, many of which are already unobtainable and many more will shortly become so. Not only have the complete stocks of certain large publishers, such as Hoepli been destroyed; but the presence in Italy of large numbers of interested individuals, both German and Allied, has resulted in the exhaustion of many small editions which would in normal times find their way first into the appropriate libraries in England and elsewhere. The destruction wrought by the war is creating an additional demand. It is no exaggeration to say that unless some action is taken at once, science and scholarship at home will be deprived of the complete output of five years of the Italian learned world.

2. The Americans have recognized this and have already acted. Since January 1944 a representative of the library of Congress has been at work acquiring books, arranging exchanges, and compiling bibliographical information. Recently a questionnaire has been circulated to all important institutions and libraries in Italy with a view to restarting exchange of learned periodicals.

3. There are obvious difficulties in the shape of currency, restrictions and shipping-space. Nevertheless I am convinced that there is a great deal of practical and useful work which could be done at this juncture. I suggest that the interested bodies in England (for immediate practical purposes the copyright libraries and the representative material institutions of the respective arts and sciences) should be approached to set up a committee and to appoint jointly a representative to be sent out to Italy. This representative would have two immediate tasks:

- a. The compilation of the bibliographical information needed by libraries at home.
- b. The blocking, against future exchange or purchase, of the necessary stocks of books and periodicals.

4. Such an arrangement would serve equally as a channel whereby British publications of a similar character could be made available to Italy. This is an urgent need and one which, I understand, the British Council proposes to meet. The two problems are essentially one and a solution which involves a solution of both.

The two problems are essentially one, and a solution which involves a cultural exchange rather than a one-way flow is likely in the long run to prove far more satisfactory from every point of view. The authority of some such official body as the British Council would be very valuable.

It must be stressed however that the operation of any practical scheme such as that here proposed would be a full-time job and not one to be undertaken by an official already engaged on many other duties.

5. The above suggestions are based on my practical experience of the problems in my own sphere of archaeology and art-history. The need for action in respect of Italian publications for British libraries is urgent; and I believe that the reopening of cultural relations will stand a far greater chance of success if it is established on a reciprocal basis.

Il paese ha bisogno di biblioteche a cui tutti possano accedere

CIVILTÀ SENZA LIBRO?

Il patrimonio delle nostre grandi Biblioteche statali, secondo notizie fino ad oggi accertate, può dirsi uscito pressoché salvo dagli orrori della guerra. Nelle regioni d'Italia già liberate vanno a poco a poco rivedendo la luce fuori dai nascondi rifugi i nostri maggiori tesori librari e riprendendo i loro posti, dopo quattro lunghi anni d'esilio. Gli studiosi tornano a respirare come liberati da un incubo, e il ritmo del loro lavoro riprende.

Ma devono servire solo al lavoro degli studiosi e a conservare tesori le pubbliche biblioteche? Questo si domanda l'uomo della strada quando entrando in una di esse s'accorge che non sono fatte per lui. Cercava un semplice oratorio e viene a trovarsi in una austera cattedrale; correva a distaccarsi a una fresca fonte e si vede dinanzi un monumentale serbatoio; aveva bisogno d'uno spacio per far modestissime comperie e deve aggirarsi disorientato in un emporio di merci rare destinate ad altre borse. Perché quelle che noi chiamiamo « biblioteche pubbliche » non servono, in realtà, che a limitare categorie di cittadini fornite dai professionisti dello studio; che meritano, senza dubbio, i maggiori riguardi e aiuti dello Stato perché a loro è affidato il progresso scientifico della Nazione, ma non sono né il « pubblico » né il « popolo ». E queste biblioteche di privilegio servono male anche a loro perché non riescono a conciliare le opposte funzioni che sono condannate a esercitare, di conservatrici gelose e di prodighe dispensatrici. Senza dire che l'assurda premiscuità delle due funzioni le sta minando da troppi anni. Le « biblioteche per tutti » sono altra cosa: né possono darne l'idea quei miseri tentativi fatti da noi a più riprese con le così dette « biblioteche popolari », le quali son sempre servite più a sbandieramenti politici e a montature d'enti parassitari che a diffondere sul serio la pubblica lettura. Il fascismo, ad onta degli incantamenti, non è stato buono, in venti anni, a creare una sola di queste biblioteche che ci mancano, forse perché sentiva d'istinto che l'ignoranza collettiva è sempre il miglior lievito per la fortuna dei governi.

Ciò che siano le vere biblioteche pubbliche è stato detto e ripetuto più volte, e non c'è che guardare fuori d'Italia per trovarne i modelli, senza neppure andarli a cercare negli Stati Uniti d'America dove fioriscono più rigogliosamente che in qualunque altro paese. Dove, per dare un'idea della concezione che s'ha dell'utilità delle biblioteche pubbliche, non interessa più sapere fino a qual punto s'è minimizzata la percentuale degli analfabeti, ma quanto si vada riducendo annualmente nella popolazione il numero dei « non lettori » di fronte a quello dei lettori di biblioteca. E questo numero sempre più va diminuendo tanto è invitante, accogliente e riposante la biblioteca quando tutto vi è organizzato in modo che ogni persona possa servirsene a suo piacere, in ogni ora del giorno e della sera, e quasi considerarla come il proprio club. Né alcuna condizione limitativa o formalità burocratica è necessaria interporre tra l'uso e gli utenti: la dignità dell'ambiente, la praticità del funzionamento, la cordialità dell'assistenza, dispongono fin dall'ingresso al rispetto che si deve alla Casa del Libro. Né è necessario che i volumi si confinino in queste biblioteche a molte decine di migliaia: non è il possesso quantitativo l'orgoglio della istituzione, ma il numero dei proseliti che si guadagnano a poco a poco alla causa della educazione e della cultura. Tali stazioni di rifornimento intellettuale non si vanno moltiplicando solo nelle grandi e nelle minori città, nelle quali ogni quartiere deve possederne almeno una e dove, per mezzo di speciali dis-

solo il libro che si riflette e si ritrova, è capace di trasformare in sostanza intellettuale le cognizioni balenanti alla mente in quelle forme intermittenti ed effimere. Dev'esser la biblioteca la scuola che ci resta per tutta la vita.

In Italia, in questo campo c'è tutto da fare: e, prima cosa, c'è da metterci in testa che l'onere delle pubbliche biblioteche organizzate in modo profuso e duraturo è talmente imponente da non potersi addossare, come troppi altri, allo Stato. Allo Stato toccherà emanare, come s'è fatto altrove, la legge necessaria alla loro costituzione, e ad esecutarla poi la necessaria sorveglianza sulla loro efficienza; ma una rete di così fitte maglie quale dovrebbe essere quella formata dagli istituti di tal genere da creare in tutta Italia, non può essere sostenuta a spese d'un solo ente, sia pure poderoso come lo Stato. Chiede ai comuni e alle province un finanziamento obbligatorio, di pertinenza locale, come sono quelli destinati all'istruzione pubblica, all'illuminazione stradale, all'igiene, alla viabilità, ecc. Là dove un tale finanziamento è in atto, tenuissimo è il contributo imposto ai singoli cittadini e proporzionale ai loro redditi; ma è tale, ad ogni modo, da assicurare col suo gettito globale vitalità a una istituzione che non potrebbe altrimenti sussistere. Il sistema fu introdotto in Inghilterra circa un secolo fa con la legge Ewart, che autorizzava i comuni alla tassazione del *penny-rate*, cioè di un solo *penny* di soprata per ogni lira sterlina d'imposta, destinata esclusivamente al mantenimento di una biblioteca in ogni comune del Regno. La tassazione fu in seguito elevata a 3 *pence* e in certe province fino a 6. La munificenza dei privati, l'emulazione fra comune e comune, la propaganda assidua di enti e società culturali fecero poi il resto. Ed oggi il sistema vige e fa proseliti in tutto il mondo civile. Subito dopo l'Inghilterra l'adottarono gli Stati Uniti d'America con tassazioni differenti da Stato a Stato, ed altre nazioni: la Cecoslovacchia, ad esempio, nel 1919, con un contributo variabile da 30 *hollers* a una corona per ciascuna abitante; il Belgio, nel 1921, con quello di 25 centesimi. Nell'Illinois, che è oggi il maggior centro statunitense del movimento bibliotecario, il contributo è di soli 6 centesimi per ogni 100 dollari di proprietà tassabile: ciò che basta a dare per tutte le biblioteche di Chicago e del circondario un gettito di 2.200.000 dollari all'anno.

Da noi, quasi in ogni città o cittadina esiste, è vero, una vecchia biblioteca mantenuta dal comune, dalla provincia o da altro ente, e sussidiata spesso anche dallo Stato, ma in misura necessariamente così inferiore al bisogno che il sacrificio non risolve niente. Perché tali biblioteche sono sempre più o meno in piccolo, del tipo venetando di quelle statali; e a codesti enti, che riescono sì e no a farlo reggere in piedi come sono, sarebbe assurdo chiedere, senza dar loro nuovi coespiti, il mantenimento del tipo nuovo di biblioteca che il tempo nostro reclama.

Persistere nei sistemi fino ad ora adottati non farà che allontanarci sempre più dalla mèta. E poiché la via da seguire è già tracciata in altri paesi, c'è poco più da inventare. Noi abbiamo insegnato tanto agli stranieri in materia di biblioteche che non dobbiamo formalizzarci se qualche cosa dovremo imparare da loro. Il nazionalismo della incompetenza e della spavalderia abbiamo visto quali risultati sa dare. Questa guerra che ha provato l'Italia in modo così spietato ha pure messo a nudo quanto il nostro popolo (e popolo oggi non vuol dire più soltanto una classe) sia ancora povero di risorse spirituali e morali. Ha bisogno d'imparare tante cose, e sopra tutto a pensare da sé e a saper distinguere le vere luci dai fatui miraggi che gli si fanno balenare a distanza. Bisogna dargliene il mezzo e nessuno, come si è fatto in

la necessaria sorveglianza sulla loro efficienza; ma una rete di così fitte maglie quale dovrebbe essere quella formata dagli istituti di tal genere da creare in tutta Italia, non può essere sostenuta a spese d'un solo ente, sia pure poderoso come lo Stato. Chiede ai comuni e alle province un finanziamento obbligatorio, di pertinenza locale, come sono quelli destinati all'istruzione pubblica, all'illuminazione stradale, all'igiene, alla viabilità, ecc. Là dove un tale finanziamento è in atto, tenuissimo è il contributo imposto ai singoli cittadini e proporzionale ai loro redditi; ma è tale, ad ogni modo, da assicurare col suo gettito globale vitalità a una istituzione che non potrebbe altrimenti sussistere. Il sistema fu introdotto in Inghilterra circa un secolo fa con la legge *Libraries Act*, che autorizzava i comuni alla tassazione del *penny-rate*, cioè di un solo penny di soprattassa per ogni lira *sterlina* d'imposta, destinata esclusivamente al mantenimento di una biblioteca in ogni comune del Regno. La tassazione fu in seguito elevata a 3 penny e in certe province fino a 6. La manifolanza dei privati, l'emulazione fra comune e comune, la propaganda assidua di enti e società culturali fecero poi il resto. Ed oggi il sistema vige e fa proseliti in tutto il mondo civile. Subito dopo l'Inghilterra l'adottarono gli Stati Uniti d'America con tassazioni differenti da Stato a Stato, ed altre nazioni: la Cecoslovacchia, ad esempio, nel 1919, con un contributo variabile da 30 *hellers* a una corona per ciascun abitante; il Belgio, nel 1921, con quello di 25 centesimi. Nell'Illinois, che è oggi il maggior centro statunitense del movimento bibliotecario, il contributo è di soli 6 centesimi per ogni 100 dollari di proprietà tassabile; ciò che basta a dare per tutte le biblioteche di Chicago e del circondario un gettito di 2.200.000 dollari all'anno.

Ma devono servire solo al lavoro degli studiosi e a conservare tesori le pubbliche biblioteche? Questo si domanda l'uomo della strada quando entrando in una di esse s'accorge che non sono fatte per lui. Cercava un semplice oratorio e viene a trovarsi in una austera cattedrale; cercava a dissetarsi a una fresca fonte e si vede dinanzi un monumentale serbatoio; aveva bisogno d'uno spacio per far modestissime compere e deve aggirarsi disorientato in un emporio di meri rare destinate ad altre borse. Perché quelle che noi chiamiamo « biblioteche pubbliche » non servono, in realtà, che a limitare categorie di cittadini fornite dai professionisti dello studio; che meritano, senza dubbio, i maggiori riguardi e aiuti dello Stato perché a loro è affidato il progresso scientifico della Nazione, ma non sono né il « pubblico » né tanto meno il « popolo ». E queste biblioteche di privilegio servono male anche a loro perché non riescono a conciliare le opposte funzioni che sono condannate a esercitare, di conservatrici gelose e di prodighe dispensatrici. Senza dire che l'assurda promiscuità delle due funzioni le sta minando da troppi anni. Le « biblioteche per tutti » sono altra cosa; né possono darne l'idea quei miseri tentativi fatti da noi a più riprese con le così dette « biblioteche popolari », le quali son sempre servite più a bandieramenti politici e a montature d'enti parassitari che a diffondere sul serio la pubblica lettura. Il fascismo, ad alta degli incantamenti, non è stato buono, in venti anni, a creare una sola di queste biblioteche che ci mancano, forse perché sentiva d'istinto che l'ignoranza collettiva è sempre il miglior lievito per la fortuna dei governi.

Ciò che siano le vere biblioteche pubbliche è stato detto e ripetuto più volte, e non c'è che guardare fuori d'Italia per trovarne i modelli, senza neppure andarli a cercare negli Stati Uniti d'America dove fioriscono più rigogliosamente che in qualunque altro paese. Dove, per dare un'idea della concezione che s'ha dell'utilità delle biblioteche pubbliche, non interessa più sapere fino a qual punto s'è minimizzata la percentuale degli analfabeti, ma quanto si vada riducendo annualmente nella popolazione il numero dei « non lettori » di fronte a quello dei lettori di biblioteca. E questo numero sempre più va diminuendo tanto è invitante, accogliente e riposante la biblioteca quando tutto v'è organizzato in modo che ogni persona possa servirsi a suo piacere, in ogni ora del giorno e della sera, e quasi considerarla come il proprio club. Né alcuna condizione limitativa o formalità burocratica è necessario interporre tra l'uso e gli utenti: la dignità dell'ambiente, la praticità del funzionamento, la cordialità dell'assistenza, dispongono fin dall'ingresso al rispetto che si deve alla Casa del Libro. Né è necessario che i volumi si contino in queste biblioteche a molte decine di migliaia: non è il possesso quantitativo l'orgoglio della istituzione, ma il numero dei proseliti che si guadagnano a poco a poco alla causa della educazione e della cultura. Tali stazioni di riferimento intellettuale non si vanno moltiplicando solo nelle grandi e nelle minori città, nelle quali ogni quartiere deve possederne almeno una e dove, per mezzo di speciali diramazioni estendono il loro beneficio fin tra le più chiuse convivenze quali sono gli ospedali, gli ospizi, le caserme, le prigioni; ma lo propagano pure nelle campagne fino a raggiungere i luoghi più isolati e nascosti con ambulanti servizi periodici.

Concepitate come il più necessario complemento della scuola e il mezzo più agevole d'autoeducazione collettiva, non c'è altra espressione della moderna civiltà che possa paragonarsi alle biblioteche di questo tipo. Perché la scuola ci ha insegnato gradualmente l'uso del libro (« Messo t'ho innanzi, ormai per te ti com'è »); ma poi? Uscite dalla scuola per le officine, per i campi, per gli uffici, chi dà più alle masse la possibilità di quell'elemento culturale del quale pur sentono continuamente lo stimolo? Sì, c'è il giornale, c'è la radio, c'è la rivista del chiosco; c'è il film del cinema; ma il libro,

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Luigi De Gregori, competentissimo in materia, ha affrontato un problema che, pur prendendo le mosse da una assicurazione almeno parzialmente confortante - parzialmente, perché si riferisce soltanto alle biblioteche statali - si prospetta, per le condizioni in cui si trova il paese, come estremamente arduo. ma in pari tempo estremamente importante. Perché la rinascita della nazione caduta in un abisso di miseria spirituale, oltre che politica e materiale, non sarà possibile se insieme con gli strumenti della vita statale ed economica non saranno rimessi in efficienza e rinnovati quelli della vita culturale.

La salvezza materiale del patrimonio librario delle pubbliche biblioteche non correge di queste, invero, la passata inefficienza. La loro insufficienza - che il regime fascista soltanto verbosamente affrontò ma non vinse - esce per certo aggravata dalla tempesta. E proprio quando, per l'impoverimento della nazione, solo un intenso sforzo collettivo anche nel campo culturale può esser condizione di vittoria sulle enormi difficoltà da superare affinché lo spirito del nostro popolo si liberi dalla paralisi in cui la lunga diseducatrice prova di più che due decenni lo ha indotto.

Caduti i realisti, reali individuali ad un livello infimo, mentre salgono quelli di congiuntura a vantaggio il più spesso di gente che al libro ed ai valori dello spirito poco bada, se non, al più, per snobistico orgoglio; soltanto ponendo a disposizione degli studiosi di ogni ceto e categoria ricche e ben organizzate biblioteche pubbliche può esser possibile suscitare una diffusa e vigorosa ripresa culturale, che, ai troppi e da troppo tempo distratti da ogni esercizio dell'intelletto, per le dure vicende di una vita di guerra, per le strette economiche in cui sono precipitati, per la stessa ormai annosa disorganizzazione degli

studi, per cui hanno ricevuto una deficiatissima preparazione scolastica, ridia il gusto delle cose intelligenti e solleciti il perfezionamento. L'affinamento della capacità professionale delle grandi masse motuante la loro elevazione nel campo della cultura generale e specifica.

La riorganizzazione e l'incremento, meglio si direbbe la creazione, delle pubbliche biblioteche nell'Italia d'oggi, appare così problema fondamentale anche agli effetti dell'avvenire economico oltre che civile del paese.

È un campo, questo, in cui ci auguriamo dagli Alleati possa venire non solo l'esempio delle loro mirabili istituzioni, ma anche l'aiuto concreto non diverso di quello che ci è offerto per la ripresa della vita materiale, affinché l'Italia ridiventi ben presto operosa latore di civiltà e di prosperità in un mondo pacificato. Aiuto che in special modo si esortino consentendoci di rapidamente arricchire le nostre biblioteche di quella poderosa letteratura straniera in ogni campo dello scibile, fiorita durante un intero ventennio in cui la stupida boria di un regime tirannico ha segregato il nostro paese dalla cultura e dalla vita spirituale del mondo intero.

ALIAS MEMORANDUM FOR COMMUNICATION TO THE ITALIAN GOVERNMENT BY THE
ACTING PRESIDENT OF THE COMITTEE OF THE NEW DIRECTIVE ON THE
FUNCTIONS OF THE ALLIED COMMISSION

4. The Allied Commission will limit its dealings with respect to territory under the jurisdiction of the Italian Government to consultation with and advice to the Ministers of the Italian Government.

5. The advisory functions of the Sub-Commissions of Education, Instruments and Fine Arts, Local Government, Legal and Labour in territory under the jurisdiction of the Italian Government will be performed only when requested by the Italian Government.

7. It will no longer be necessary for the Italian Government to obtain approval of the Allied Commission for Italian appointments, whether to national or local offices, in territory under the jurisdiction of the Italian Government except with regard to the attached list (Appendix "A") of positions having military significance. The Italian Government will have the right to alter appointments made previously by ANI authorities.

9. It is the desire of the Allies to encourage free trade in knowledge and learning with the Italian people. Arrangements will be facilitated for the flow between Italy and the United Nations of books and other publications of a scientific, political, philosophical, and artistic nature, and for the movement of scholars, artists and professional men between Italy and the United Nations.

Dear Maru,

I am taking the opportunity of Goodison's presence to send to you two requests for the reopening of exchange of publications, which I would be most grateful if you would speed to their proper destinations.

The one is from the Farnesina, which is especially worthy a) because since the removal of the German Institutes' Library it is the fullest archaeological and art-historical library in Rome; b) because it was the librarian who prepared the excellent bibliography of which you should by now have received a copy through Woolley.

The other is from the Museo dell'Impero Romano, which I personally consider a worthy institution and its director, Prof. Colini, has been very helpful to us.

I send this request through you because I feel the practical attempt in this case may reveal unsuspected difficulties, knowledge of which would be of value to your committee's researches into the general problem of exchange. I am perfectly happy however to act as a direct go-between in any further correspondence between the parties concerned.

The actual physical exchange is not an immediate requirement. Both would be happy to know that the necessary volumes, insofar as available, have been definitely earmarked.

The following paragraph from the published version of the new arrangements for Italy is obviously very relevant to the general problem:

"Para. 9. It is the desire of the Allies to encourage free trade in knowledge and learning with the Italian people. Arrangements will be facilitated for the flow between Italy and the United Nations

of books and other publications of a scientific,
political, philosophical and artistic nature,
and for the movement of scholars, artists, and
professional men between Italy and the United Nations."

I am trying to get some detailed clarification this end.

Anything you can do to help in this matter of book-exchange
would, I am sure, be infinitely worth-while.

1. Forty six learned institutions in Naples have been contacted for the establishment of exchange relations with the Library of Congress.

2. The director of each institution was visited personally; a request letter outlining the exchange policy was delivered at the time of the visit. When the publications were received a letter of acknowledgment was delivered. A complete file of all the correspondence involved accompanies this report for the exclusive of the Library of Congress.

3. In the attached list of institutions all essential data has been summarized. The abbreviations used are:

- P.V. = Personal visit
- R.L.S. = Request letter sent
- R.R. = Material received
- A.R.S. = Acknowledgment letter sent

The remarks are made up of notes taken during the personal visits or from the correspondence received.

4. In some instances the various institutions submitted lists of books and journals wanted. This information accompanies this report in the form of a separate memo.

5. It should be noted in the remarks that there is great interest in renewing subscriptions to journals which were interrupted during the war period. Any information along this line would be welcomed by the institutions themselves and the firm of Rosenberg and Gellier, Messengers 31, Naples, which handled the greater bulk of the foreign subscriptions before the war.

6. The institutions contacted have been told that at first the Library of Congress will send them bibliographies on the subjects pertinent to the

to the institutions. This proposal was met with enthusiasm since the contacts with bibliographies from the U.S. were interrupted with the outbreak of the war. No better way to re-orient these institutions could be found. It is hoped that the Library of Congress will meet this demand fully and promptly.

7. Due to present world conditions the Library of Congress will receive future publications addressed in care of the local American Consulate. It would be wise for the Library of Congress to address its publications in the same manner. The Consul General in Naples and Palermo have stated their earnest desire to cooperate in this cultural project.

8. All institutions have responded with generous contributions in spite of the great handicaps confronting them. It is worthwhile noting the unanimous expressions of admiration for the Library of Congress and the United States Government for undertaking a cultural mission of this nature practically behind the battle lines.

9. This project owes its success to its nature, its timeliness and the excellent cooperation extended by the Allied Control Commission.
