I'm very sorry to have missed you: I was away for 10 days, and on February 15th expect to be off to North Africa. I'm afraid that I shan't have a chance to see you en route.

I hope you're enjoying the School and having a good time. With luck I might manage to look in on Rome on my way back at the end of May, but that depends on all sorts of transport questions.

Probably the most serious individual loss to the works of
art of Italy was the destruction by Allied air attack of the
Mantegna series of frescoes in the Eremitani Church at PADOVA.
The church itself was badly damaged, the chapel which contained
the frescoes obliterated.

within are substantially intact but
require consolidation. Note protective
battress.
H. 9 - 13. The famous Statue of Gattamelata by
Donatello (1453) has returned to its
pedestal.

d. II. 14 - 20 VENEZIA

Save for the damaged Tiepolo fresco of "Anthony and Cleopatra" in the Palazzo Labia, VENICE has suffered little more than broken windows and lifted roof-tiles, caused by the explosion of a German ammunition ship in March. A special effort has been made to provide troops with the exhibitions which war conditions did not permit in FLORENCE last winter. In addition to a small exhibition of Venetian primitives, already open in the Accademia, a very interesting temporary exhibit of bronzes has been arranged in the courtyard of the Palazzo Ducale. This includes the four much-travelled horses from S. Marco, Verrocchio's equestrian statue of Bartolomeo Colleoni, and the Lion of St. Mark, down from his pedestal on the water-front. At the same time demolition of air-raid protective works is progressing fast and S. Marco is already free.

II. 14 - 19. The exhibition of bronzes in the Palazzo Ducale

e. II. 21 - 29 VERONA

One of the most senseless and wanton acts of German destruction was the mining of the two ancient bridges of Verona, the republican Roman Ponte delle Pietre and the lovely medieval Ponte Scaligero. This was done contrary to instructions by Kesselring and after both bridges had been rendered useless for military traffic by the establishment of massive concrete road-blocks. Bomb-damage to other monuments in VEN. is extensive but less disastrous than at first feared.

II. 21 - 23. The Ponte delle Pietre. Only the medieval span remains. The concrete block can be seen in the arch of the approach tower. In the background the Cathedral unscathed.

II. 24 - 27. The Ponte Scaligero and Castelvecchio, one wing of which was destroyed by bombing.

II. 28. S. Fermo Maggiore. Extensive roof damage but little more.

II. 29. The Library of the Cathedral Chapter. Many books were rescued.

E. H. 30 - 40 VICENZA

The most seriously damaged city is the VENEZIA both as regards individual monuments and the general complex of lesser buildings. The medieval roof of the Basilica Palladiana has been destroyed, but except for the vault of one bay of the north loggia the work of Palladio is here intact, and so is the Teatro Olimpico which had a miraculous escape.

Damage both to the Cathedral and to S. Maria Maggiore, some of the Council of Trent, was happily limited and repairs are well advanced. The most serious potential loss is the 12th century church of S. Lorenzo, beside the station, which is threatened with collapse. The Castel del Buonconsiglio is virtually unharmed.
